Taylor shares about how the local Pioneers had a great influence on the area. The museum offers many displays such as The Bell Mountain, toys and collectables such as the Terri Lee dolls, local history on the Fire Department, Library, Jess Ranch and memorabilia such as Roy Rogers golf boots plus many news articles and artifacts. Taylor talks about how they have a library, how people can loan and donate items to the museum by calling 760.985.1918. There is no admission fee to the museum however donations are welcome.
