

Senate Republicans to restrict police chokeholds in emerging bill

Republicans, Democrats optimistic they can agree on Senate police reform bill

Tonight, protestors will highlight the two-week mark since demonstrators were pushed out of Lafayette Park by police firing tear gas and pepper spray. It comes as Republicans and Democrats say they are optimistic they can agree on a police reform bill.

WASHINGTON (**AP**) - Driven by a rare urgency, Senate Republicans are poised to unveil an extensive package of policing changes that includes new restrictions on police chokeholds and other practices as President Donald Trump signals his support following the mass demonstrations over the deaths of George Floyd and other black Americans.

Sen. Tim Scott of South Carolina, the sole African American Republican in the Senate, has been crafting the package set to roll out Wednesday. While it doesn't go as far as a sweeping Democratic bill heading toward a House vote, the emerging GOP legislation shares similar provisions as Congress rushes to respond.

With Trump set to announce executive actions on law enforcement as soon as Tuesday, the crush of activity shows how quickly police violence and racial prejudice are transforming national party priorities.

"I think we're going to get to a bill that actually becomes law," Scott said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press." Scott said the chokehold, in particular, "is a policy whose time has come and gone."

The GOP package is one of the most extensive proposed overhauls to policing procedures yet from Republicans, who have long aligned with Trump's "law and order" approach but are suddenly confronted with a groundswell of public unrest in cities large and small over police violence.

Over the weekend, the shooting death of Rayshard Brooks during a routine stop by a white officer in Atlanta led to an outcry, more protests and the police chief's swift ouster.

The Republican bill would create a national database of police use-of-force incidents, encourage police body cameras and include a long-stalled effort to make lynching a federal hate crime.

Additionally, the GOP package is expected to restrict the use of chokeholds by withholding certain federal funds to jurisdictions that continue to allow the practice, according a Senate Republican unauthorized to discuss the pending bill and granted anonymity.

Democrats have said the GOP package doesn't go far enough in the aftermath of Floyd's death and the outpouring of protests and Black Lives Matter demonstrations over the number of black Americans killed at the hands of law enforcement.

In particular, the Republican bill does not address the issue of "qualified immunity," as the Democrats' bill does, which aims to enable those injured by law enforcement personnel to sue for damages. The White House has said that is a line too far. As an alternative, Scott has suggested a "decertification" process for officers involved in misconduct.

"This is not a time for lowest common denominator, watered-down reforms," said Sen. Cory Booker, D-N.J., a co-author of the Democratic bill, on CBS's "Face the Nation." "It's a time to stop the problem."

Yet Democrats signaled a willingness to look at the Republican approach for areas of common ground.

"I never call anything a nonstarter," said Rep. James Clyburn of South Carolina, the House's third-ranking Democrat.

Democrats face criticism over activists' calls to defund the police, and party leaders in Congress have distanced themselves from that approach. The defund movement describes a range of options, from dismantling departments to shifting policing resources to other community services. The Democratic bill does not go that far, but would instead provide grant money to departments that want to consider new ways of policing.

"Nobody is going to defund the police," Clyburn said. "We can restructure the police forces, restructure, reimagine policing. That is what we are going to do."

The House Judiciary Committee is set to consider the bill midweek, and House lawmakers are scheduled to return to Washington next week for a vote.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, whose state has been roiled by the death of Breonna Taylor after police entered her Louisville home, has signaled his interest in legislation.

Congressional leaders call out Maryland's unemployment backlog

US Senator Ben Cardin says the handling of the unemployment crisis is unacceptable and Governor Larry Hogan needs to take drastic action.

BALTIMORE (FOX 5 DC) - "Hogan: Fix the unemployment system" was the message displayed by protesters in front of the Department of Labor in Baltimore Wednesday.

That call is coming from all corners of the state as thousands continue to wait for unemployment benefits. It's also coming from the state's congressional delegation who are continuing to put pressure on Gov. Larry Hogan to take action needed to get people paid.

"Right now, it's clear the service level is unacceptable," said Sen. Ben Cardin (D-Maryland).

Cardin, along with Sen. Chris Van Hollen (D-Maryland) and every representative from Maryland in the House, sent a letter to Hogan calling on him to fix the system.

"We don't see this as a partisan issue, quite frankly, we want to work together state and the federal government to make sure those who need benefits can get benefits in a timely way," Cardin said.

He said members of Congress have been "in the dark" and need better information.

"This is a lifeline. They need the money now," he said of those waiting.

As of last week, the backlog of people waiting for benefits was over 70,000. New numbers are expected from the labor department on Thursday.

Nearly three weeks ago, Labor Secretary Tiffany Robinson told FOX 5 that she hoped "in a matter of days" she could make an announcement that every claim from March and before had been resolved.

That announcement still hasn't come. A spokeswoman for the department said Wednesday that "a large number of issues regarding March claims were resolved and addressed," but FOX 5 continues to hear from people who have been waiting since March for benefits.

Hogan has refused an interview with FOX 5's Lindsay Watts for the last six weeks. Instead of responding to the interview request, Hogan spokesman Mike Ricci said to email a list of viewers waiting for benefits.

Dozens of lists are coming in from state lawmakers offices as well as congressional offices. Spokeswomen for Cardin and Van Hollin say both offices have heard from about 1,000 people reaching out for help. It raises the question: doesn't the labor department know who needs help?

"I couldn't agree with you more. It shouldn't be necessary for a United States senator to inquire as to the status of a particular claimant," said Cardin. "Claimants should be able to get clear information from the department of labor."

NEW YORK - One nonprofit organization decided to take matters into its own hands when it gave out free personal protective equipment (PPE) to health care workers on the front lines of the novel coronavirus fight in New York.


On April 20, almost 3,000 health care workers lined up outside of Bellevue Hospital to receive the free equipment. The equipment was made available thanks to an initiative called Cut Red Tape 4 Heroes, according to Storyful.

"More than 2,800 doctors, nurses, and health care staff received bags of PPEs from our truck parked in front of Bellevue Hospital on April 20," according to a GoFundMe page from the group. "Each bag had 7 surgical masks and 1 N95 mask; 1000 bags also had a Level 3 or 4 gown, and 2000 bags included a face shield.

Businesses cautiously move into phase 2 in Prince George's County

While Prince George's County enters phase two today, FOX 5's Ayesha Khan is talking with some local businesses, many of which have been around for years, and why they say the reopening doesn't mean much since they've been struggling during and after the lockdown.

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (FOX 5 DC) - On Monday, more businesses opened their doors as Prince George's County moved into stage 2 of reopening.

The second phase allows 50 percent capacity for restaurants to have indoor dining, customers to be inside stores, and private and public pools to reopen.

While Prince George's County has been a hot spot for COVID-19, the latest data shows a decline in new cases, positivity rates, hospitalizations, and deaths. However, there is still an average of seven deaths per day.

"It doesn't mean a lot," said Donnell Long of Old Town Inn in Upper Marlboro when speaking about stage 2. "Some people are still paranoid like and even if we were to open our doors to the public, we probably would still be doing outside seating just as a precaution."

"The rate that we are going at right now who knows you know?" said Chris Carter, a barber with Crown Royal in Lanham. "We are in limbo, I mean we may be working this week but then all of a sudden they (county health officials) are saying COVID-19 is rising but you can still bring people in, so it kind of makes no sense to me where there are few people in the beginning and they stopped us from working and now they are bringing us back to work and more people are getting sick."

Carter said that even with the reopening the shop can allow customers by appointment only, rather than the usual walk-ins.

Carter said that when the shop reopened he texted about 170 of his clients and only 30 of them agreed that they might come in for a haircut.

Meanwhile, Long said that he applied for the business recovery initiative, a program that gives grants to businesses that have been struggled during the pandemic. He said he's waiting to see how he will receive.

FOX 5's Ayesha Khan also spoke with a representative of the Prince George's County Economic Development Corporation and was told that more that 900 applicants have completed the process and now it's just a matter of who will qualify.

As of last week, \$5 million in grant money has been distributed so far.

According to their website, the corporation is no longer accepting new applications for the COVID-19 Business Recovery Initiative.

If you have submitted an application, it is still being processed.

New features are expected to be added to the website that will allow applicants to check on the status of request.

The newspaper reported Monday that traffic from light-duty vehicles such as cars and SUVs is down by more than half along I-95 in Maryland. Satellite observations have also indicated that levels of nitrogen dioxide in March were 30% below the average along the corridor between Washington and Boston. Power plant emissions also appear to be down.

The children are believed to be in danger and a court order was issued to remove the children from the parents' custody. They were last seen at 2737 Greys Point Road in Topping, Virginia.

Daisy Foster is described as weighing 15 pounds and has blue eyes. Lily Foster is described as being 2-feet tall, weighing 20 pounds with blue eyes. Branson Horton is described as 3'3" and weighing 30 pounds. He has blue eyes and brown hair.
