Woman says she was sexually assaulted by stranger in her DC home

Woman says she was sexually assaulted by stranger in her DC home

A northwest D.C. woman say she was sexually assaulted by a stranger while sleeping in her own bed.

WASHINGTON - A northwest <u>D.C.</u> woman says she was sexually assaulted by a stranger while sleeping in her own bed.

FOX 5 spoke exclusively with the woman who lives along the U Street corridor. The station has declined to identify the woman since she's a sexual assault victim.

The woman says she went to sleep around midnight Friday but was awoken at 3 a.m. "I woke up and felt someone's hand, someone touching me," the woman told reporter David Kaplan, "I was like, quickly, who are you, still kind of like half asleep. And then panic set in."

The woman says the suspect immediately started apologizing and she chased him out of the house she shares with other roommates.Kaplan said the woman believes she was targeted.



"We were nervous it may have been a stalker/peeping tom scenario since I'm right on the main street and I have the largest windows. I was also the only girl in our household that was alone in her bed that night. Everyone else had their boyfriends over," the woman said.

Nothing was stolen from the house, and the woman's bed is further from the stairs than some of her roommates, leading her to believe he was looking for her specifically.



The woman says she's thankful the man wasn't violent, but wants him caught.

Metropolitan police are investigating this incident. A police report indicates they're investigating it as a sexual assault and burglary.

"There's a lot of young, you know, people that live alone or live in a household full of women, and just that, if we can catch these people, and if people can look at security cameras that it wouldn't happen to anyone else," she said.

Montgomery County elections officials preparing for primary despite map uncertainty

Maryland doesn't have a congressional map yet.


The primary was already pushed back from June 28 to July 19.

That move has created some challenges for elections officials.

Gilberto Zelaya works with the Montgomery County Elections Department. He says the county is already seeking elections workers for the primary, and changing the date made that problem worse.

"Individuals that were available at the end of June, the original date, are not available in the middle of July. If they move the date, we'll have another round of individuals who may be available for a later date and not July," Zelaya said.



Redistricting concerns delay MD primary

A court of appeals judge delayed the primary election day in the state on Tuesday from June 28 to July 19 due to a court case focused on state legislative districts and how and where residents vote to elect their state senator and representative.

Zelaya says Montgomery County wants to get the word out to its 677,870 voters about the primary date if they want to vote in person.

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However, Zelaya says people's summer plans change and voting by mail is a safe and effective way to ensure you get a ballot on time, send it back, and have it counted.

As for Zelaya's message to voters:

"The first one would be to flex their right to vote by mail, it's legitimate, it's safe, it's easy and secure. That's number one. Number two, not to procrastinate sending in that vote by mail. And number three is serving as a poll worker, we need individuals and without them, we can't run an election," Zelaya said.



Last week, <u>a judge did not accept the legislature's map</u>, saying they have to re-submit a new one by March 30th and then there will be a hearing on April 1. Zelaya says elections officials are watching the case closely, both because it could impact what precinct's ballots look like, and in case the primary gets moved again.

'You are worthy': Ketanji Brown Jackson tears up amid Sen. Cory Booker speech

Sen. Cory Booker draws tears from Ketanji Brown Jackson during emotional speech

"You have earned this spot, you are worthy. You are a great American," Sen. Cory Booker said during an impassioned speech on Wednesday.

WASHINGTON - Sen. Cory Booker cut through a <u>tense third day of hearings</u> on the Supreme Court nomination of <u>Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson</u> on Wednesday with a speech on racial progress that drew tears from the nominee and held the rapt attention of colleagues.

Booker, a Black Democrat from New Jersey, said he could no longer hold back his emotion over how Jackson has conducted herself in the face of combative questioning about her handling of child pornography cases, her representation of accused terrorists and her views on anti-racism teaching in schools.

"You faced insults here that were shocking to me," Booker said, speaking directly to Jackson, who is nominated to become the first Black woman on the high court.

"Nobody's taking this away from me," Booker continued, choking up as he spoke. Republicans are "gonna accuse you of this and that. But don't worry, my sister. Don't worry. God has got you. And how do I know that? Because you're here, and I know what it's taken for you to sit in that seat."

Jackson, who was sitting silently with her hands clasped, unlocked her fingers to grab a tissue and wiped tears streaming down her cheeks. It was the first time in nearly two dozen hours of questioning from senators that she had showed that much emotion.

Since the beginning of Jackson's hearings Monday, Democratic and Republican senators have saluted the nominee's history-making appointment, praised her pedigree, and noted her pleasant temperament and empathetic approach to the law.

But Booker used his remarks to ground Jackson's elevation to the Supreme Court in a significance beyond simple diversity. In order for Jackson to sit before the panel, he said, she had to overcome systemic barriers and overachieve at every level. Only then could she have the chance to break through one of the last remaining racial ceilings in American democracy.

"I want to tell you, when I look at you, this is why I get emotional," Booker said. "I'm sorry, you're a person that is so much more than your race and gender. You're a Christian. You're a mom. It's hard for me not to look at you and not see my mom. I see my ancestors and yours."

He added: "You have earned this spot. You are worthy. You are a great American."

After a day of charged partisanship, every Republican in the room gave Booker their full attention. Save for some sniffles, the room was completely quiet for the duration of his remarks.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Dick Durbin, D-Ill., recessed immediately after Booker's remarks for a short break. Jackson left the room quickly, accompanied by her husband.

During the recess, a line of people, including Jackson's father, approached Booker and hugged him, several wiping away tears.

When the hearing resumed, a question from Sen. Alex Padilla, D-Calif., about her being an inspiration to young Americans elicited more emotion from Jackson. She said his remarks and question were "very moving."

Jackson choked up as she told the story of walking around at Harvard University, feeling as if she didn't belong, when another Black woman who she did not know passed and seemed to understand what she was feeling. "Persevere," she said the woman told her.

"I hope to inspire people to try to follow this path, because I love this country, because I love the law, because I think it is important that we all invest in our future," Jackson said. "And the young people are the future."

Montgomery County is expanding popular youth sports programs for girls

Youth sports popular among girls expand in Montgomery Co.

Youth sports programs that are popular for girls will be expanding in Montgomery County. The council approved allocating \$100,000 this week to increase access and opportunities to sports like volleyball, soccer, softball, lacrosse, and tennis.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY, Md. - Popular youth sports programs catering to girls will be expanding in Montgomery County.

The Montgomery Co. council voted to allocate \$100,000 to increase access and opportunities in sports like volleyball, soccer, softball, lacrosse, and tennis.

Councilmember Hans Riemer told FOX 5 after conducting a study on gender equity in sports, they found there was a huge gap in participation between girls and boys.



"When we realized there was such an inequity of opportunity for sports programs for girls, we got thinking about well, what can we do about that," Riemer said.

As of now, Riemer says there aren't a lot of options for girls who play youth sports.

"I found out that we don't have youth volleyball in Montgomery County," Riemer said. "In most places, volleyball is like one of the most popular sports for girls."

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We want to provide sports programming that girls like to play, but also that are available in communities that are not included in the current expensive athletics model that we have, where you have to pay all these fees."

Riemer says the Montgomery County Department of Recreation will receive the approved funding from the council.



Oversight for Montgomery Co. youth sports

A push in Montgomery County is being made to address discrepancies in youth sports and to create a government body. Council President Gabe Albornoz joined us with more.

"The department will fund a variety of different opportunities," Riemer said. "It could be a league that's getting formed. It could help seed a new league that gets created, or it can be an existing program that we fund to expand its services."

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One existing program – MoCo Lacrosse, founded by Jeff Wagner, introduces the sport to both girls and boys in lower-income areas of the county that normally wouldn't be exposed to lacrosse.

"We have found over the years that it's a little more of a challenge to keep girls interested after a certain age," Wagner said. "The other barrier we found is some of the girls, more so than boys, are expected to be responsible for taking care of things at home. So, they're not allowed to stay after school for activities."

Wagner says by expanding these youth sports opportunities it could give more kids access to college.

"There are many, many more opportunities for girls' lacrosse in colleges than people would ever think," he explained.

Sunday from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the White Oak Community Recreation Center, there will be an event to promote some of the youth sports program opportunities for girls.

Airline CEOs, travel groups urge White House to lift mask rules on flights

Airline leaders urge President Biden to lift mask mandate Matthew McClellan reports

The CEOs of <u>Delta, American and United Airlines</u>, and others are urging the White House to end a federal mask mandate on airplanes, along with international predeparture testing requirements.

The airline executives sent a letter to the president late Wednesday, saying the restrictions are no longer aligned with the realities of the current epidemiological environment.

This comes after the Biden administration decided this month to extend current mask requirements at airports, train stations, ride-sharing vehicles, and other transportation through April 18. The order was set to expire on March 18.

In the letter, the CEOs told the president, "It makes no sense that people are still required to wear masks on airplanes, yet are allowed to congregate in crowded restaurants, schools and at sporting events without masks, despite none of these venues having the protective air filtration system that aircraft do."

Passengers who spoke with FOX 13 Thursday morning at Tampa International Airport said they feel it's time to ease mask requirements on planes and airports.

"I think it makes sense. I mean, it's waived everywhere else," said one passenger. "At the airport, you're kind of wearing a mask at the terminal and then you're sitting sideby-side on the plane. I see all the numbers coming down as it is, so why not lift (mask requirements) all the way around? What's the difference between the airport and the schools?"

One day before the letter from the airline executives, the U.S. Travel Association made similar calls for the White House to ease the country's remaining travel restrictions.

RELATED: American Airlines to resume alcohol sales on certain flights in April

In a letter on Tuesday, the group urged incoming White House <u>COVID</u> Response Coordinator Dr. Ashish Jha to zero in on replacing COVID-related travel measures with endemic-focused policies.

This includes repealing the federal mask mandate by April 18, removing the predeparture testing requirement for inbound vaccinated international travelers, and ending international COVID travel advisories.

The mask requirements have led to widespread tensions on flights. The Federal Aviation Administration says that since January 2021, there have been a record 6,942

unruly passenger incidents reported, with seven out of ten incidents involving mask rules.


The White House has yet to respond to either group but said earlier this month that the CDC is working to develop a revised policy for masks on public transportation.

Manassas cemetery illegally sold land, causing families to lose burial plots

Bankruptcy battle complicating cemetery ban

FOX 5 continues its coverage of a Virginia family fighting for nearly 10-months to have an 82-year-old Army veteran named buried at a family plot in a Manassas, Virginia cemetery.

MANASSAS, Va. - On Thursday, FOX 5 reported on the emotional story of a family fighting for nearly 10-months to have an 82-year-old Army veteran named Ellis Maxfield buried at a family plot in a Manassas, Virginia cemetery. FOX 5 has learned there are actions Prince William County can take to fix some issues the Maxfield family and others are having at the cemetery. However, the zoning work it requires has been held up due to a property ownership battle that's apparently still going through court.

David Cornwell's family hasn't gotten their money back after the Woodbine Cemetery illegally sold nearly \$50,000 worth of burial grounds.

"You know when you have the death of a loved one, it's – it's at a sad state at that time," Cornwell said. "And it seems like the preachers or the cemetery folks got you. And you want to do the best for your loved one. Just know who you're dealing with. We thought, you know, we had everything going in the right direction but unfortunately, it didn't turn out that way." Cornwell reported this to county authorities.

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Prince William County issued violations to the cemetery property after learning that a pastor who was previously running the church and cemetery was illegally selling plots on land not zoned for a burial ground. One area was zoned for septic overflow.

It's been previously reported that the pastor faced bankruptcy and a new owner purchased the foreclosed property, but a county official tells FOX 5 the property ownership battle began around the time of the violations.



Family fights to bury loved one 10 months after death

Army veteran Ellis Maxfield died last summer after battling Leukemia. His family tells FOX 5 they've been fighting to get him buried with his mother and grandparents in a Virginia cemetery ever since.

"The county was diligent in issuing the violations, but then it got caught up in the courts which made it much more difficult and the court systems, especially during COVID times, were moving very, very slowly. So hopefully that will speed up here and in the near future, we'll get this resolved," said Tom Smith, Prince William County Director of Public Works. "We believe the owner has come in and started meeting with us on submitting revised plans and revised special used plans to kind of quote on quote make it right. We are still waiting for that. But some of the issues are tied up in legal issues that caused some delay in getting this worked out."

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Prince William County Public Works Director Tom Smith told FOX 5 no official plans have been submitted by the current owner yet. However, once proper ownership is determined, the county can move forward to address the cemetery's zoning issues, which could potentially open more land to families currently fighting for their space at the cemetery.

Smith mentioned one possibility for the current owner would be to hook up the property to water and sewer so that the area zoned for septic overflow could actually be approved for cemetery land.

There is a lot more going on behind the scenes. FOX 5 found an assault charge online against the current owner that appears to have been filed last year by the pastor accused of illegally selling land. Court records show the charge was dropped.

David Cornwell hopes the county would form some kind of cemetery oversight board because of everything going on at Woodbine.

Phase two of the Silver Line will not move forward as planned this summer, and there are hold-ups with the 7000-series trains.

WASHINGTON - Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) announced two big delays Thursday morning during a rail service restoration plan briefing.

Phase two of the Silver Line will not move forward as planned this summer, and there are hold-ups with the 7000-series trains.

As leaders press for a return to normal -- back to the office, back to restaurants, museums, wanting to lower traffic congestion -- the announcement by Metro CEO Paul Wiedefeld has impacts beyond trains on tracks.

The 7000-series trains that were taken offline will stay offline longer than intended. WMATA hopes that they'll be phased back in over the course of the summer.

Metro said today they still haven't identified a uniform fix to the root cause of the issue that took them off the tracks.



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In the meantime, they'll phase more 6000-series trains back in for metro riders. Wiedefeld said the plan also includes installing digital sensors on some 7000series trains and getting that approved by the Washington Metrorail Safety Commission.

Wiedefeld told FOX 5 safety is more of a concern than sticking to timelines.

"We have, and will continue to put service out there when it's safe," he said. "And if it's not, we're not going to try to force things that just aren't ready. I understand that's very frustrating for customers, with a large headway, but we're doing that from a safety perspective."



WMATA facing congressional backlash after Blue Line derailment

Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton, who represents D.C. in the House, is calling for a hearing into WMATA's handling of the failures identified on the 7000-series train cars.

Metro officials hoped the Silver Line extension, which will take passengers to Dulles Airport and beyond, would be operational by July 1.

Today, WMATA said that won't happen since safety upgrades still need to be installed, and the airport authority needs to complete things on its end with occupancy permitting.

Wiedefeld previously set a target date of June 30, but as of now, there is no set timeframe for when the Silver Line extension will open.

3 students charged with hate crime after social media posts

Three eighth grade students are facing hate crimes charges after investigators say they posted online threats targeting Black students.

FREDERICK COUNTY, Md. - Three eighth grade students are facing hate crimes charges after investigators say they posted online threats targeting Black students. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office says they have four photos where the boys, who are White, are posing with weapons.

One of the photos is captioned, 'Slaves ran away.' Investigators say the three other photos have the same caption,'We finna shoot some more n---s,' using a racial slur. The boys are holding guns in the pictures.

At a press conference Thursday, investigators said two of the guns were BB or Airsoft guns, but one was real. They said in addition to the hate crimes charge, one student is facing a charge of possession of a firearm by a minor.

Sheriff's Lt. Jason Deater said investigators determined parents are not liable for the child obtaining the weapon but didn't elaborate on why.

Deater said the photos were first shared on Snapchat a month or two ago, but for some reason, they were shared again in a group chat among students Wednesday morning at Middletown Middle School.

Staff became aware and Deater said one of the students was immediately pulled from class to determine if there was an active threat.

Yanira Gordon, PTSA President at Middletown Middle, said this is behavior that's been building up over the school year. Her child is in eighth grade.

"It's very commonplace for them to communicate with each other using slurs and terrible terms in person and on social media," said Gordon. "I think it culminated in the images we saw yesterday that just shocked everyone."



Gordon is planning a community rally at the school at 7:15 a.m. Thursday, she says to take back the town and condemn racism, bullying, and violence.

Frederick County Sheriff Chuck Jenkins said he and his staff will attend the rally.

Deater said it doesn't appear the three boys were targeting specific students, and it's still under investigation what led up to this.

"That's something we're actively looking at, whether there was any kind of incident that sparked these photographs and these hateful messages and stuff," Deater said. "So we are actively looking at that right now. We don't have anything that leads us to why this was done."

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Frederick County Public Schools Spokesman Dr. Eric Louérs-Phillips said what happened caused people at the school to feel unsafe.

"Every Black child was targeted, every Black community member was targeted by the posting of those messages," said Louérs-Phillips.

He said for now the three boys are not allowed at school and disciplinary action will be decided at the end of the investigation.

The sheriff's office said the investigation could last another week or two as they interview students who saw or were sent the photos.

The students are being charged as juveniles and have been released to their parents, according to officials.



WASHINGTON - DC Fire and EMS rescued a total of five people, including one infant, from a burning apartment building Monday in Southeast.






