Topic – Sponsorship of location and personnel... Korean Union Methodist Church's most active

In San Diego, about 70 Korean churches serve in the form of connections or support with organizations active in the community to evangelize the region.

Among them, the Korean Union Methodist Church supports the largest number of organizations.

The church, which marks its 40th anniversary last year, provides places and manpower for five out of six "neighborhood-serving organizations" (A22-myeon), which the Dong-A llbo reported on July 3.

In addition, organizations such as the Senior Center and the Korean Confederation of Participants provide various conveniences as well as places.

The church's service of various organizations became an important beginning of Pastor Lee Sung-hyun's pastoral philosophy, who was appointed as the sixth homeroom pastor in 2015.

Pastor Lee said, "The best explanation of Pastor John Wesley's principles of discipleship is the covenant discipleship community," and added, "Our church serves various organizations in the Korean community corresponding to the sharing of love, justice training, and charity in the covenant discipleship community."

There are churches that come into the community and serve organizations that serve those who are marginalized and need to be cared for instead of directly supporting or sponsoring them.

Hanbit Church, which runs the "Hanbit Library" in Zion Market, is such a place.

It first opened in 2002 and offers various books for free to local Koreans and provides a place as a cultural space.

According to Hanbit Library, 22 volunteers are serving and about 500 books are lent to an average of 180-200 Koreans a month.

In addition, the Church of Jesus Village (Pastor Jang Yeong-rak, the homeroom director) conducts oriental medical service twice a month.

Regarding the background of doing oriental medical service, Pastor Jang said, "While I was doing ministry activities, I contacted Koreans through various channels and listened to their voices. It was very sad that there were many people who could not visit the hospital due to economic, time, and status problems." What can I or our church and Christians do for these people?"I spent a lot of time praying for those things.

Topic – LAPD looking for 5000 Community Patrols.

The "Community Patrol," which the Olympic Police Station started in Korean Town last year, will be expanded across the city of Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles Police Department has decided to expand the patrols consisting of volunteers from each community across the city to prevent crime and recruit 5,000 volunteers.

The plan is to organize community patrols in the form of community residents participating in police patrol work to prevent crimes and strengthen public security.

Los Angeles Police Commissioner Michael Moore said on Thursday that he would recruit 5,000 patrol volunteers to conduct patrol activities with police, focusing on communities with high demand for patrols, to maximize crime prevention.

This is because the LA Police Department judged that the patrol volunteer system introduced in October last year in Koreatown has various effects, including crime prevention and communication with local communities.

The 5,000 patrol volunteers, who will be recruited by the Los Angeles Police Department, will patrol and monitor at least eight hours a month in various areas, including residential, commercial, and shopping malls.

Residents will participate in patrol activities by not directly responding to police officers and not carrying firearms, but contacting officers directly through radio or phone calls paid if they are found guilty or suspicious activities are detected.

Also, in some areas, patrol volunteers are expected to patrol with police.

According to the Los Angeles Police Department, patrolling volunteers are available to anyone over the age of 18. However, there should not be a criminal record. Applicants will undergo extensive background checks and successful applicants will receive eight weeks of training to learn about LAPD's patrol, surveillance techniques and incident response procedures.

The LAPD introduced a patrol volunteer group at the end of October last year amid an increase in local crime. It is also located at the Olympic Police Station, which controls Koreatown, and currently has 400 volunteers throughout the city.

The LAPD analyzed that the increase in the number of patrol volunteers contributes greatly to the prevention of theft, especially in residential areas, merchants, and vehicles.

He also explained that strengthening the patrol force will allow police officers to focus on fighting crime, and that community members will understand police work and increase communication between the community and the police.

NBC reported on the 3rd that a fire broke out at a substation in Irvine, south of Los Angeles on the 2nd, causing 28,000 households in the area to lose power.

This also suspended all commercial aircraft at John Wayne Airport in Orange County until Sunday morning.

The substation fire is believed to have been caused by an electric short circuit.

The accident also caused traffic lights at more than 50 intersections to go black or flashing red lights, Irvine said.

There was also a disturbance in which about 100 residents living in the Villa Siena apartment were evacuated.

The city government set up a shelter in a high school and opened it to residents affected by the power outage. Irvine police are stepping up patrols in the blacked out area and monitoring traffic conditions.

Topic – U.S. Arbitrary Shooting Fears... 78% of Americans "can recur in three months"

Following the recent shootings in Texas and Ohio, fears of indiscriminate shooting are spreading in American society.

The majority of Americans are concerned that the shooting spree will recur soon, according to a poll.

Reuters released the results of an online poll of 1,116 Americans for two days on the 7th and 8th (local time) in collaboration with polling agency Ipsos on the 9th.

According to the survey, 78% of respondents said similar events could recur within the next three months, including 49% who said similar events were "very likely."

Only 10% of the respondents believed that similar incidents would not occur within three months.

Sixty-nine percent of respondents said guns should be regulated 'strongly' or 'appropriately'. Half of the respondents said that the way people talk about immigrants encouraged acts of violence.

Most Americans regard indiscriminate violence, including shootings, as the biggest threat to safety, and one in four respondents said that domestic terrorism for political and religious reasons poses the biggest threat to safety.

Only one out of six respondents said terrorism by foreigners was the biggest threat.

Many respondents cited mental problems, racism, prejudice, and ease of access to firearms as the reasons for the frequent shootings.

The poll has a margin of error of ±3 percentage points.

The investigation came amid at least 31 deaths in two consecutive shootings in El Paso, Texas, and Dayton, Ohio, over the weekend.

El Paso shooter Patrick Crucius, 21, surrendered to the police and confessed that his crime was aimed at Mexicans.

Connor Betts, 24, who was shot dead in Dayton, was also said to be a hate crime against people of color because six of the nine dead were black.

In this regard, criticism is spreading that U.S. President Donald Trump, who has been making racist remarks in the U.S., is also indirectly responsible.

Last month, President Trump raised his voice to the four members of the Democratic Party's Congress of Color to "go back to your country," and said Baltimore, Maryland, where many black people live, is "a mess infested with mice and rodents."

The remarks were interpreted as part of next year's presidential campaign strategy to solidify the support of white voters, but faced headwinds in line with the shooting disaster, which was full of white supremacy.

The gunmen who were hospitalized at El Paso University Hospital refused to meet with President Trump who visited the hospital on the 7th.

President Trump tweeted on the 9th that "guns should not be left in the hands of mentally ill or mentally ill people," expressing his willingness to tighten gun control.

However, it is still unclear whether the legislation will actually take place as the National Gun Association (NRA), an interest group that has supported Republicans and President Trump, is known to be opposed.

Topic - "The joy of liberation to peace and prosperity on the Korean Peninsula."

On the 15th, the 74th anniversary of Korea's liberation from the Japanese Empire, a shout of "Hurray for Korean independence" rang out in the Korean community in San Diego.

The event, co-hosted by the Korean Association of San Diego (Chairman Baek Hwang-ki) and the Trade Association (Chairman Kang Yong-hoon), was held at the J&J Event Hall, co-hosted by the Senior Center (Chairman Han Chung-il) and the Dance Association (Chairman Choi Sung-ae).

The ceremony was held in the order of a first-part ceremony, a second-part luncheon and a commemorative performance, with about 70 Korean community figures including former and current Korean presidents and heads of major local organizations attending.

Pastor Cho Joo-ho, the wall of the New Life Church, preached under the theme of "God Achieving New Work," at the first part of the service, which was held by the Trade Council as pastor Lee Chang-hoo, in charge of the Somang Church.

Pastor Cho preached, "Elevation means the beginning of a miraculous history of opening a new future." "We must make a history of light that gives light to the hungry, poor and desperate as people who have received Christian light."

"Today's situation at home and abroad makes me sad and frustrated," Chairman Baek said. "Tension between the two Koreas is mounting due to North Korea's continued missile tests, and Japan is imposing economic sanctions as a means of retaliation for the ruling on forced labor compensation."

"In order to strengthen sovereignty regained from Japan at the expense of countless people's blood and sweat, all Koreans in the world must unite to strengthen their independent power, resolve military tensions between the two Koreas, and strengthen their national power," Chairman Baek said.

Finally, Chairman Baek said, "There is a hope that Koreans in San Diego will unite and unite with each other to become a symbol of their overseas compatriots."

In a performance to commemorate the 74th anniversary of Korea's liberation, Carol Jung, a leading instructor of the Dance Association, then performed a solo dance titled "Eternal Love, My Country."

Topic – Shooting in St. Louis, 8-year-old girl killed... Three people injured

One 8-year-old girl was killed and three others were shot in St. Louis at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, police said.

The shooting took place near a high school downtown and was fought outside the Harold's Chop Shay restaurant, a section off Academy Street, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch magazine reported.

St. John Hayden, the St. Louis police chief, said the dead child was Jenny Thompson, 8 years old, and was watching a football exhibition near Soldan High School with his family. In the evening, a gang fight broke out in the area, and shots began to ring while police were blocking the streets and evacuating pedestrians and others, Hayden explained.

The injured were two 16-year-old men and a 64-year-old woman, police said. Two or three of the people shot on the day were in the same family, Hayden said.

Police say several suspects have been arrested and under investigation.

Topic – Highschool students in rural areas have advantage in SAT tests.

According to an analysis, high school students based in Richon, Los Angeles, are taking the SAT in an advantageous situation compared to those in poor areas.

It is said that students in the richon area are receiving additional test time benefits by exploiting the "504 Plan" to consider students with special disabilities taking the test. It is heard that students in the richon area benefit from the "504 Plan" through expedient methods such as false medical certificates.

The "504 Plan" is a system for disabled students such as dyslexia, attention deficit disorder (ADHD), and anxiety, and benefits from a variety of support and additional test hours from tutoring to behavior management counseling.

The local media "LA East" (laist.com) pointed out on the 29th that the federal education ministry analyzed the data and found that high school students in the richon area were receiving the benefits of the LA County 504 Plan.

Students in poor areas are at a disadvantage compared to students in rich areas in SAT because even students with disabilities do not receive the benefits.

It is because schools in Bucheon have a good 504 plan benefit guidance and application support system, but parents in Bucheon are abusing the system even though their children do not have a disability.

In fact, there were cases where they paid money and received false medical certificates and abused them, who paid thousands of dollars for false medical certificates. He also said he knew these methods after interviewing school officials and parents.

Palisade Charter School is the high school with the largest number of 504 designated students in LA County, with 8.5 percent of all students benefiting from the 504 plan. It was followed by Palos Birdis (7.4 percent), Agura (5.7 percent), Mira Costa (5.3 percent), and Santa Motica (4.7 percent) high schools. There were many schools in the richon area.

On the other hand, Elmonte High School, which has the lowest number of 504 designated students, accounted for only 0.1% of the total. It was followed by the Santi Education Complex (0.1 percent), Elizabeth Learning Center (0.1 percent), Mountain View (0.1 percent), and Saint Gabriel (0.2 percent).

According to the media, Palisade Chartered High School has half of its students white, with housing prices reaching as high as \$3 million in the region, but has the largest number of students eligible for the 504 plan.

Elmonte High School, where 95 percent of the students receive free or discounted lunches, had the lowest percentage of students with the 504 plan, with more than 25 percent having difficulty in English due to Hispanics.

Topic – It's not too late... Help me try smoking again.

As autumn approaches one step, half of the year has passed and it is now approaching the end.

Earlier this year, smokers decided to quit smoking for their families, including their children, but if they failed, let's try again this time.

Asain Smoker's Quitline (hereinafter referred to as the Anti-smoking Center), which is providing anti-smoking support to smokers nationwide, including San Diego, has stepped up its promotional activities for smokers who failed to quit smoking earlier this year.

"While smokers know that quitting smoking can improve their health and prevent heart disease, cancer, lung disease and many other smoking-related diseases, they often hesitate to start or fail to try without planning," said an official at the smoking center.

According to data released in 2008, the probability of non-smoking counselors was more than twice as high as that of smokers who did not, and when using supplements such as nicotine patches in conjunction with non-smoking counselors was three times higher.

Those eligible, including free one-on-one counseling, can receive two weeks' worth of nicotine patches approved by the FDA as a smoke-free aid.

Topic – It's the first university in the U.S. to open a university named after Koreans.

The University of Illinois (ISU) named the university's arts university "Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts and the Wonsook Kim School of Art" after veteran Korean painter Kim Won-sook (66), the Associated Press reported on the 13th.

The ISU in Normal, central Illinois, said the decision was made to honor the couple's huge donation.

This is the first time a Korean name has been given to a U.S. university.

Artist Kim donated \$12 million (about 14.3 billion won) to the university with her husband.

ISU President Larry Dietz thanked Kim and his wife for not only supporting the students but also investing in the future of Illinois.

Artist Kim said he hopes the donation will mark the U.S. as a "land of opportunity."

Artist Kim and her husband Thomas Clement were both born in Korea and moved to the U.S.

Artist Kim came to the United States to study and settle down in college, and Clement was orphaned by the Korean War and adopted to the United States, and ran a medical device company in Illinois and neighboring Indiana.

In 1972, the year after entering Hongik University's Department of Western Painting, Kim studied at ISU University of Arts with a full scholarship and earned a bachelor's degree, a master's degree in arts, MFA, and an honorary doctorate.

Artist Kim, who has been praised for painting daily beauty in various ways such as painting, drawing, engraving, and ridicule, was named the "Artist of the Year" selected by the U.N. in 1995.

Painter Kim's works are on display at the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art (MoMA), the National Museum of Women's Artists in Washington, and the Vatican Museum of Art.

Topic – CDC "Suspected E-Cigarette-related Lung Disease Surges 52%..."Twelve dead."

The CDC announced on the 26th that suspicious lung diseases related to e-cigarette smoking surged 52 percent last week, and at least 12 people have died in 10 states so far.

According to CNBC and other media, 805 cases of suspected lung disease related to e-cigarettes were reported last week, including confirmed cases and suspected cases, up 52 percent from the previous week.

"Most patients have a history of smoking electronic tobacco products containing THC, a marijuana compound," the CDC said. "Some say they smoked a mixture of nicotine and THC, and some testify that they smoked electronic cigarettes containing only nicotine."

The CDC said the number of stocks with suspected lung diseases related to e-cigarettes increased from 38 to 46. In other words, most of the 50 states in the U.S. had lung disease.

Two-thirds of patients with mysterious lung disease are aged between 18 and 34, but 16 percent are under 18, the CDC said.

The CDC currently dispatched more than 100 medical staff to investigate the connection between lung disease and ecigarettes. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is also analyzing more than 120 samples containing various substances, including THC and nicotine.

The early symptoms of this lung disease are similar to those of pneumonia, which causes coughing, difficulty breathing, fatigue, chest pain, dizziness, vomiting and diarrhea.

Some states, including New York, have banned the distribution of fake e-cigarettes, which have been pointed out to be directly related to lung diseases. Some large discount stores, including Wal-Mart, also stopped selling e-cigarettes, and the CEO of Juul, the largest e-cigarette maker, also resigned.

The federal government is also considering removing homegrown e-cigarettes from the market.
