 A) EDUCATION: Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.

Title: ISU HOUSING

Broadcast Date: 1-13

Duration: 2:18

Description: A California housing developer purchased the former Bannock Hospital near the ISU campus and will develop the 4-acre site for student housing. Nelson Partners has 25 student apartment buildings in 11 states. The project will include 177 units with 540 beds, 250 parking spaces, a full gym, study halls, and lounge. Ground will be broken in spring 2020 within an eye towards opening by 2021 fall semester.

Title: NATIVE AMERICAN "MASCOTS"

Broadcast Date: 1-31

Duration: 2:21

Description: The Shoshone Bannock Tribes are organizing to oppose any effort to lock-in school mascots that use cultural clothing, symbols, and imagery. The issue caught new attention as the Kansas City "Chiefs" won a place in the Super Bowl. The tribes are confronting the issue by speaking to legislators and school districts about cultural appropriation and the way it leads to demeaning bullying.

Title: TEEN REBELLION

Broadcast Date: 2-5

Duration: 2:22

Description: A child and adolescent psychiatrist met with parents to discuss warning signs pointing to a need for professional help. One key is to determine how much reaction to give, knowing that all kids are going to do things their parents don't like. Warning signs include times when they aren't interested in long time interests or are too anxious, depressed or their self-esteem is low. And the cues can be verbal, behavioral or situational.

Title: BLACKFOOT CALENDAR

Broadcast Date: 3-5

Duration: 2:34

Description: The Blackfoot School District is considering a move to a four-day school week. The district's superintendent said he has long opposed such a move, but believes the current landscape may make a 4-day schedule to best way to recruit and retain qualified teachers. Nearly 40% of Idaho school districts have already made the move. The trade-off could include elimination of early release days and an additional 35 minutes on each period of the day.

In American Falls, a pressurized room is being prepared at Power County Hospital to house infectious patients. It is fully sterilized, with alarms in case a quarantine is broken. Hospital officials do not expect the virus, but will be prepared if it's found in the community.

Democrats voiced no major objections. A Pocatello lawmaker said legislators generally get along and work together to protect the people of the state.

A state administered software program forgot to bill residents of the town for the fire district. Instead, the billing was sent to residents

of the fire district living outside the city. Now discovered, the problem is being redirected to the state tax commission for correction and a new billing.

Title: CHUBBUCK CITY HALL

All three are charged with robbery.
