

SECTION ONE:**KIDK****ISSUES PROGRAM LIST****Jan. 1, 2021**

The following represent some of the key issues facing the broadcast area of KIDK during the current filing period. They are referenced on the accompanying programming summaries.

Unless otherwise noted, all programs aired as part of Eyewitness News at 5:30 p.m. and/or 10 p.m.

A) EDUCATION: Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.

Title: D91 TRANSITION

Broadcast Date: 10-1

Duration: 2:15

Description: The Idaho Falls School District is defending its action transitioning classroom instruction to a "yellow" phase, offering alternating days in and out of classes. It involves Idaho Falls, Skyline, and Compass Academy high schools. Administrators said they are the district's COVID-19 "hot spots". District-wide, 416 students are self-quarantining and 189 are absent from the three high schools. Secondly, administrators want to insure that educators are kept safe.

Title: ISU ENROLLMENT

Broadcast Date: 10-22

Duration: 1:38

Description: Idaho State University is reporting a 5% reduction in fall enrollment. The number includes dual-enrollment high school students, which saw the biggest reduction in students this year. While undergraduate numbers fell, ISU saw an increase in the number of graduate students. A number of students moved into ISU after starting their education in other institutions. One of the university's top goals is to keep that level of interest into the spring semester.

Title: POCATELLO H.S. MASCOT

Broadcast Date: 12-15

Duration: 1:08

Description: The Pocatello-Chubbuck School board officially voted to drop the Pocatello High School "Indian" mascot and replace it with the "Thunder". School officials say the real issue was dealing with a mascot name that offended students who are members of the Shoshone Bannock Tribes.

FOLO: The Tribal Council endorsed the change, pointing out that "We are a people, not a mascot."

B) **HEALTH / ENVIRONMENT:** Issues related to our environment and health of our community.

Title: EIPH SOUNDS ALARM

Broadcast Date: 10-8

Duration: 2:30

Description: The Eastern Idaho Public Health Board voiced concern over the rate of hospitalizations in the region. At this time, the number of Covid-19 cases were taking up ICU beds for a long period of time, putting a strain on hospital staff and resources. Because all regional hospitals were close to capacity, the board of health moved to a high- risk advisory level in Madison County. Health officials warned of COVID-fatigue that might encourage people to let their guard down.

Title: COVID-19 TREATMENT

Broadcast Date: 11-13

Duration: 1:35

Description: Madison Memorial Hospital will be among the first in Idaho to receive a new treatment plan for COVID-19 patients. "Bilamanvimab" is described as a treatment for a narrow window of patients, but holds promise for reducing the need for hospitalization among them. Hospital doctors say it is best used early and, in fact, will not be authorized for patients already hospitalized.

Title: HOSPITAL WARNINGS

Broadcast Date: 12-3

Duration: 1:48

Description: An Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center physician warned Health District board members that the hospital is now effectively rationing care. He said the facility will not be able to stay ahead of new cases unless the board sets rigid health standards and follows through with enforcement. Specifically, Dr. Kenneth Krell called for mask and distance mandates, and closure of bars and restaurants. He said it is not up to the "lunatic fringe" or even law enforcement to decide what rules to enforce.

Title: PHARMACY VACCINATION

Broadcast Date: 12-28

Duration: 1:51

Description: Local pharmacies are preparing to provide COVID-19 vaccinations. Long term care facilities (LTCF) have begun to vaccinate their staff and facility residents. But, pharmacists say it may be a few more weeks before vaccine is available to the general public and to general pharmacies. The second "roll-out" will target people aged 75 and older and other frontline workers. So far, pharmacists say the vaccine appears to be as safe as flu vaccines. Once they become available, people will be asked to stick around for 15 minutes after receiving a shot to check for any adverse reaction.

C) **GOVERNMENT/POLITICS:** Issues facing local government including taxation and politics.

Title: 2ND AMENDMENT SANCTUARY CITY

Broadcast Date: 10-14

Duration: 1:50

Description: The St. Anthony City Council passed a resolution declaring itself a sanctuary city for the 2nd Amendment. The Mayor said that means the city police will not enforce or honor any federal or state law the city deems to violate the 2nd amendment right to bear arms. A 2014 state law already protects local authorities from carrying out federally mandated gun confiscation. The city's Police Chief advised that the resolution does not preclude gun owners from the responsibility that comes with gun ownership.

Title: REXBURG PUBLIC TRANSIT

Broadcast Date: 11-9

Duration: 1:57

Description: The city of Rexburg has initiated a study aimed at providing public transportation for elderly citizens. Now, BYU-Idaho students have entered the discussion after petitioning the city for a public transit system. The Mayor's office said the idea was under investigation, but said the city could not make any promises at this point. At best, it could be a couple of years out.

Title: REXBURG PROPOSES MASK ORDINANCE

Broadcast Date: 11-18

Duration: 1:15

Description: The Rexburg City Council is one of the few in the state to propose a mandatory facemask ordinance. A council meeting set to consider the ordinance, however, was disrupted by dozens of protestors screaming threats outside city hall and others interrupting a ZOOM broadcast of the council meeting. The council ultimately decided to table any action.

Title: IDAHO FALLS MASK REGULATIONS

Broadcast Date: 11-25

Duration: 2:07

Description: The Idaho Falls City Council said it would create a new ordinance by December 1 to efficiently enforce the Governor's pre-existing health regulations limiting the number of people who can gather together. The action was primarily taken to protect a growing surge of patients at local hospitals and the strain that puts on emergency workers. The Police Chief speculates his officers would continue to respond to assist businesses dealing with people not acting appropriately. But, he does not anticipate intervening in "private" gatherings.

Title: GOVERNOR PREVIEWS LEGISLATURE

Broadcast Date: 12-18

Duration: 2:07

Description: Governor Brad Little said budgeting would once again be the predominant issue before the 2021 legislature. He said he is hoping the legislature will consider investments in public and higher education. Little also defended his participation in a Trump legal challenge of the vote outcome in states Trump lost the popular vote. He believes that was justified because those states votes helped determine who gets elected.

D) **ECONOMY:** Tracking trends affecting our community's business base as well as the rise and fall of industry in the community.

Title: INL REACTOR PROGRAM

Broadcast Date: 10-13 & 10-14

Duration: 2:00

Description: The US Department of Energy has selected two diverse technologies that will develop prototype nuclear energy reactors. The program will provide financing and facilities to demonstrate the technology that could meet green energy requirements within the next 7 years. INL Manager Mark Peters said DOE awarded \$160 million for the demonstration program. He said the programs would also offer new opportunities for growth throughout the state of Idaho.

Title: EVENT CENTER UPDATE

Broadcast Date: 12-29

Duration: 2:39

Description: A \$500,000 donation from the Teton Auto Group is helping to move the Idaho Falls Mountain America Event Center closer to reality. In exchange, a plaza at the front of the building will bear its name. Since it is funded by hotel/motel room taxes, the pandemic of 2020 set back finances for the auditorium district project. Officials said they are still about \$2 million short of funding to begin construction of the building.

Title: INL & NASA

Broadcast Date: 12-2

Duration: 3:02

Description: The Idaho National Laboratory is teaming up with NASA to provide nuclear power for upcoming missions to the moon and Mars. INL is working to develop SFP....surface fission power. The first mission could come as early as 2026. At this point, they know it will have to be a multi-use energy system to support home base and field operations. INL expects to release a round of

proposals and ideas on how to move forward in the next few months.

Description: Idaho Falls Fiber welcomed its 1000th customer to the network. The utility expects its number of new sign-ups to expand quickly. People can counter the thieves by letting friends know when they are shipping a package. The shippers have a number of online tracking tools. Or, they say, ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your doorstep.
