CBN Reporter Caitlin Burke Reports: "Supply Chain" is a term not many of us thought of before March of 2020. We did, however, enjoy getting what we wanted, when we wanted it. The pandemic changed all that. Some of the worst backups are happening in what's called durable goods: appliances, laptops, and furniture. That's because the pandemic changed spending habits. Many businesses also cut back at the outset, expecting a major slow-down in sales. Then, according to economic consultant Bill Conerly, came the perfect storm. Still, Conerly believes the biggest overall interruption came in the workforce. This affects each level of the domestic supply chain; from factories to the trucking industry to distribution centers. And international goods can't get here because of a major backup at our ports. Shipping containers are waiting to unload for up to eighty days, due in part to labor shortages at docks. Experts and businesses alike don't see this ending until 2022. For some industries that's meant shutdowns. GM, Toyota, and Nissan have all paused production because of a shortage of computer semiconductor chips used in a large number of car parts. Other industries are forced to pay up to three times more for supplies than in the past, and still, barely get enough to keep the doors open. Oakley Monument Company has seen a major surge in business due to COVID-related deaths, but grieving customers are waiting months for memorials. Alignable, a small business network, is helping companies pivot. A major step forward has been simply connecting business owners to others in their industry. That way of thinking allowed Mark Patterson, co-founder of Civilized Coffee to get around some supply chain issues. Meanwhile, consumers are feeling the result of all this in their wallets. He predicts this could lead to a Boom and Bust Economy similar to the late '60s and 1970s. Simply put, that would mean high inflation, followed by a tightening of monetary policy by the Federal Reserve, resulting in a recession. Then, they would hit the gas again, causing more inflation. Conerly's advice to businesses comes straight from the Old Testament. With the holiday season upon us, experts say retailers are doing their best to prepare for the rush, but there's only going to be so much they can do to stock their shelves. So whether you typically shop early or last minute, now is the time to start marking items off your list.

CBN News Reporter Jenna Browder Reports: Protests are erupting across the country over COVID-19 vaccine mandates. Parents in California are fired up, protesting outside the state Capitol and across the state. California teachers are now required to get the shot. The mandate is coming for students too once the vaccine is fully approved for their age groups. In Chicago, police officers are facing off with the major. Thirty-five percent of officers haven't reported their vaccine status and risk losing their jobs. In Washington state, an officer signed off for the last time after being forced to leave for not complying. Nationwide, 62% of all officer deaths last year were from COVID. In the sports world, Washington state has fired its head football coach Nick Rolovich and four assistants for refusing the state mandate. It all comes as a so-called sub-variant called "Delta Plus" ramps up its spread. About 6% of all cases in the UK are from this new strain, which has spread to the US. But a new study from the "Covid States Project" shows support for governors slipping in states without mandates. While the battle brews, the FDA could make an announcement on booster shots this week. The agency is expected to recommend people get boosters that match their original doses but could still allow mixing and matching. Meanwhile at midnight, a vaccine mandate went into effect in Seattle. The city reports 99% of its 11,000 employees have complied.

CBN News Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: Sixty-six million Americans remain unvaccinated, and those on the job now face the prospect of unemployment and economic ruin. Companies are reportedly nervous about worker shortages while city governments scramble to protect their citizens after firing police, and other first responders, placing them on unpaid leave or seeing them resign. Joe Biden's vaccine mandate, however well-intentioned it may be, threatens to create even more suffering and misery in what has already been a very tough year. Forty percent of TSA employees have yet to meet the deadline to be fully vaccinated which hits just before Thanksqiving. That's a recipe for holiday travel chaos. Also facing termination: many airline pilots, teachers, doctors, nurses, and military service members. But outgoing NIH Director Dr. Francis Collins admits officials underestimated opposition to the vaccine. But those who believe the vaccine is unsafe or morally wrong say there wasn't ever really a choice. A Christian, Beth Faber, a producer at ESPN Radio for 29 years, was fired for refusing to be vaccinated. ESPN says by not getting vaccinated, Faber chose to voluntarily separate from the company. A single mom with two kids in college as she homeschools her youngest, Faber choked back tears as she explained how the financial hardship hit after just recently losing her father. Dr. Jaroslav Flidr is a physicist and cyber security expert who was fired by George Washington University for refusing to be vaccinated. Flider grew up in communist Czechoslovakia and was student leader during Czechoslovakia's Velvet Revolution. He says the vaccine mandate is the sort of thing a communist government would do. Based on his experience under communism, Flidr believes that when citizens submit to government orders like the vaccine mandate, it only encourages governments to do it again. Some states are fighting back with new laws blocking the federal mandate. Liberty Counsel has filed a class-action lawsuit and temporary injunction against the white house and all five branches of the military to stop it. Still, many legal experts believe the government will win. And if the mandate isn't blocked, millions of Americans not only face unemployment but the possibility that unemployment benefits could be blocked as well.

CBN Washington Correspondent Jenna Browder Reports: The jab or your job? That's what 84-million Americans are facing after the Biden administration has finally, officially, released the President's vaccine mandate against private businesses. More than two dozen states are pushing back, and millions of employees say they'll lose their jobs rather than take the shot. But the message from the Biden Administration is vaccine or bust. The President is demanding that all businesses with more than 100 employees should force them to take a COVID-19 vaccine. The order calls for businesses to either require vaccinations – or – weekly testing for unvaccinated employees, and those tests would be required at the employee's own expense. The new mandate gives millions of Americans until January 4th to comply. That includes 17 million healthcare workers in nursing homes and hospitals that receive money from Medicare and Medicaid. They do not have the option of testing out of the vaccine. Businesses that don't find a way to enforce the mandate will face a \$14,000 fine per violation. At a hearing on Capitol Hill, Dr. Anthony Fauci, Chief Medical Advisor on COVID-19, defended the extremely controversial move. States are pushing back with more than two dozen taking legal action. Several business groups have expressed concern too, arguing that the mandate will burden them during the busy holiday season. The mandate does not include a carve-out for truck drivers, sparking concern for an already crippled supply chain that has helped to fuel inflation. A recent survey from the Kaiser Family Foundation shows 37 percent of unvaccinated workers say they would leave if their employer required them to get vaccinated or be regularly tested. So what are opponents specifically challenging? Some point out that while the mandate is supposed to be an "emergency" rule, it doesn't take effect until January, about four months after President Biden announced it. For that reason, they question how it can be called an "emergency." Opponents also note that COVID-19 cases have declined from a recent wave in September and that the U.S. is nearing herd immunity. Some like Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis (R) argue that the mandate being issued via the Labor Department is government by bureaucracy, inconsistent with the Constitution.

CBN News Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Port experts say President Joe Biden's mandate to open the LA-Long Beach port complex 24/7 won't fix the backlog issue unless the entire distribution chain follows suit. Captain Manny Aschemeyer oversaw our nation's largest port complex for 15 years as executive director at the Marine Exchange for Southern California. He says the real reason ships are backlogged is that ports have no room for product because the truckers responsible for the last mile in the supply chain are dropping in droves. He says the logistical nightmare certainly begins at the ports. Backlogs began due to COVID shutdowns, which sparked massive warehouse layoffs. Then the hyper-buying of goods to restock shelves followed, leaving only limited staff to do the work. The former captain says the real panic in the pantry comes from what's happening in the trucking industry. California independent truckers are fighting an uphill battle with the state legislature. That's because California Assembly Bill 5, which is intended to give Uber and Lyft drivers minimum wage and other benefits, also affects about half of the state's truckers. The bill has stopped them from operating their own rigs by their own rules. Another hurdle is a California environmental group barring truckers from registering rigs built before 2010. Given these restraints and driver shortages, he says store shelves will sit bare past Christmas. And the cost of most everything will continue going up. In addition to the excessive backup and incoming cargo, contracts for about 15,000 West coast dockworkers are set to expire next summer. This comes as union workers fight the impact of automation which is expected to increase at more terminals. Manny and other professionals in the business ask you to thank anyone you know in the port industry, as they are working around the clock to remedy the situation as fast as possible.

CBN Washington Correspondent Jenna Browder Reports: U.S. international travel restrictions have been lifted for fully vaccinated visitors from 33 countries for the first time in 18 months. Airports across the U.S. saw emotional reunions among family members who have been kept apart during the pandemic. Most foreign travelers are happy to be on U.S. soil after showing proof of vaccination and a negative COVID test within three days of traveling. Meanwhile, travelers from Mexico and Canada only need proof of vaccination. The change comes as the White House continues to push its vaccine mandate for businesses with more than 100 employees. Over the weekend, a federal appeals court temporarily blocked the mandate, citing grave statutory and constitutional issues. Still, the Biden administration is encouraging businesses to go ahead with enforcement. At least 27 states have sued the Biden administration over its sweeping vaccine mandate. The multi-state lawsuit is led by Louisiana Attorney General Jeff Landry. Meanwhile, the U.S. economy is showing good signs, even though inflation is rising higher and higher. The federal reserve says the economy is coming back after the COVID recession. But there are concerns though this new mandate could hurt the economy. One reason is that the Biden administration pushed its deadline past Christmas. While the fight over the vaccine mandates rages on, Pfizer's will reportedly seek FDA approval for booster shots for those 18 and older as soon as this week.

CBN Senior Washington Correspondent Jennifer Wishon Reports: Inflation is putting tremendous stress on the pocketbooks of Americans and is becoming a political headache for President Biden. Now top economists see no end in sight. As millions of Americans prepare to host Thanksgiving dinner, it's not just the cost of turkey and pie putting a strain on family budgets. This week the Consumer Index which keeps track of what people are paying jumped 6.2-percent, recording the highest level since 1990. A CNBC survey shows inflation now ties with coronavirus as the biggest concern facing Americans and it's punching the president politically. Republicans were hitting the president hard even before the consumer index quantified Americans' financial pain. The president says the infrastructure plan passed this week will help alleviate bottlenecks in the supply chain. However, critics say his policies are the problem, like cutting back on the U.S. fuel supply. Today a gallon of regular gasoline costs \$3.41, up more than a dollar from a year ago, and as winter approaches, the Energy Department estimates heating bills will be up by as much as 54 percent. And while some blame the supply chain problems for inflation, others point out that Europe has those supply chain issues too, but without inflation. Instead, many point to government spending. Democratic economist Larry Summers warned in February that the Democrats' COVID relief plan could lead to inflation. He was blasted by the White House which called inflation "transitory." Now some economists say it could easily last another year. And now as Biden and Democrats work to infuse \$1.75 trillion into the economy through his Build Back Better bill, they're facing more political roadblocks. Sen. Joe Manchin (D-WV) signals he's concerned new federal spending may make inflation even worse. Americans do know the pain because even though salaries are up, prices are up even more meaning people are falling behind. So economists and business leaders are looking to the Federal Reserve to do more to slow inflation. However, that could mean multiple hikes in interest rates which could hurt the economy.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Already horrific childhood mental health stats were made significantly worse during the COVID-19 pandemic. While the predominant focus during the pandemic has been and still remains physical health, the mental health of America's youth has recently deteriorated to never before seen levels of concern. Several leading pediatric health organizations declared children's mental health a national emergency. The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, and the Children's Hospital Association issued a joint declaration highlighting the steep rise in mental health challenges among America's youth, urging America's policymakers to increase access to mental health resources for children regardless of the parent's ability to pay. Even before the pandemic, the number of children committing suicide had been growing steadily for a decade. In 2018, for example, suicide became the second leading cause of death for kids over age 10. The pandemic took it to a whole new level. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention researchers found between March and October 2020, emergency department visits for mental health emergencies rose by 24% for children ages 5-11 years and 31% for children ages 12-17 years. In addition, emergency hospital visits for suspected suicide attempts increased nearly 51% among girls ages 12-17 years in early 2021 compared to the same period in 2019. Christian psychiatrist Daniel Amen treats young people and told CBN News his Amen psychiatric clinics across the country are seeing a disturbing increase in young people with mental health problems. He said he's never seen kids in more distress in his more than 40 years of practicing psychiatry. While returning to school helps alleviate some root causes of mental health problems among young people, other issues that often lead to emotional distress persist. Dr. Amen says social media influence can diminish a young person's outlook on life. In his book, "Your Brain Is Always Listening: Tame the Hidden Dragons that Control Your Happiness, Habits, and Hang-Ups," Dr. Amen describes scientifically proven techniques to calm anxiety and boost mood. Dr. Amen says part of the reason behind this phenomenon in kids is that adult depression tripled during the pandemic, which impacted children. Sometimes physical changes in areas such as exercise, diet, and sleep can lesson emotional problems, or in some cases, eliminate them. Psychiatrist James Greenblatt, author of "Integrative Medicine for Depression: The Breakthrough Natural Treatment Plan That Defeats Depression," told CBN News too many depressed children and teens aren't eating right, including kids who are overweight. Dr. Greenblatt says two of the primary contributors are low levels of vitamin D and zinc, which have been linked to emotional problems in young people. He suggests parents consider supplementing their child's diet with these nutrients because it can be difficult to get adequate amounts into a child's daily diet. Dr. Green blatt says one of the often overlooked possible contributors to a child's depression is his or her sleep patterns. Once again, technology may be why kids aren't getting the shut-eye their bodies require. Pediatric sleep specialist Dr. Winter(http:www.cvilleneuroandsleep.com/), author of "The Rested Child: Why Your Tired, Wired, or Irritable Child May Have a Sleep Disorder and How to Help" said parents can, and should remove that temptation from their child. Getting a child to sleep on time, however, might just be the first step to making sure they're well-rested. Dr. Winter says parents should be sensitive to any behavioral changes such as a drop in school performance, increased anxiety or isolation, or weight changes. He also advises parents of young children to pay attention to whether their child is not physically growing at the same rate, as in the child is not in the same height/weight percentile as he or she was before. These changes could indicate one of many sleep disorders that can lead to depression. For help, call the 24/7 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline 800-273-8255. CBN Washington Correspondent Jenna Browder Reports: President Biden rolls out his administration's newest strategy on Tuesday to battle the pandemic as the Omicron variant spreads rapidly across the country. The speech comes as he had a COVID scare of his own after he was exposed to a staff member who tested positive. The White House says Biden tested negative Sunday and Monday and will be tested again Wednesday. COVID cases are once again spreading like wildfire across the country, driven by the new highly transmissible Omicron variant. Omicron now accounts for 73 percent of new cases in the U.S. and in some parts as much as 90 percent. And now the first Omicron death has been reported – a man in Harris County, Texas. A city official says he had an underlying health condition and was unvaccinated. With effective vaccines and boosters, Omicron symptoms do appear to be less severe and there's some encouraging news from vaccine makers. Moderna says its booster increases antibody levels against Omicron 37-fold. Pfizer reports 25-fold. But many Americans still have concerns about the vaccines. Even fans of former President Trump booed him when he admitted to getting a booster shot. In a speech Tuesday, President Biden is expected to encourage all Americans to get vaccinated. He'll also lay out his administration's latest strategy:

- \* 1,000 military and medical personnel will be deployed to help hospitals.
- \* FEMA will set up hospital overflow sites to distribute supplies
- \* New federal testing and vaccination sites will be created beginning in New York City.
- \* Free rapid home tests will be sent to any American who requests o e.

The problem may be getting those tests in time for Christmas. Shortages of home tests sold at drug stores and pharmacies are being reported across the country.

CBN News Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: President Biden laid out his plan Tuesday to fight the COVID-19 omicron variant. The strain is the now most dominant in the country and is expected to surge over the holidays. The President's strategy includes the deployment of military personnel to help overwhelmed hospitals, more federal testing sites, and free at-home testing kits to help control the spread of this highly transmissible variant. With millions traveling over the Christmas holiday, the President addressed the threat of the omicron variant. However, the sheer number of cases is expected to put a huge burden on hospitals. Biden pointed out that vaccinations, including boosters, offer the best protection, warning the unvaccinated are putting their lives at risk. In addition to sending military personnel to help overwhelmed hospitals, the president's plan includes tapping the national stockpile of masks, gloves, and ventilators, as well as increasing testing sites. This as long lines form in cities across the country as many seek to get tested before the holiday starts. The plan also calls for the distribution of half a bill-free at-home rapid tests in January to any American who requests one. The President quickly reassured the nation the rise in COVID cases is not the same as the dark days of last year. The FDA is expected to authorize pills to treat covid by drugmakers Pfizer and Merck soon. Meanwhile, Israel has announced plans for a fourth COVID shot to protect people over the age of 60, leading to questions that another round of boosters might be necessary.

CBN News Reporter Brody Carter Reports: COVID-19 infection rates have reached a new all-time high as the holidays march forward. The U.S. shattered its single-day record of new COVID infections, with more than 441, 000 cases reported on Tuesday. The previous record was around 290,000 new cases in a day. However, the CDC says current data is incomplete since testing sites were closed over Christmas and states are still sorting through a backlog of cases. Over the holiday, familiar scenes of cars waiting in lines for COVID tests were once again witnessed across the nation. Critics say the Biden administration should have been prepared with more tests ready to go when cold weather came. As the virus marches forward, confusion and doubts are setting in following updated guidance from the CDC that cuts the suggested isolation period in-half, from 10 days to five. Some are worried people will leave quarantine still infected and spread the virus. That change came after an oversight led health officials to prematurely suggest Omicron is responsible for 73% of all new U.S. cases, but analysts significantly backpedaled that number down to 58%. Some experts think the U.S. needs to shift its focus for a more accurate picture of where the pandemic stands, from the rise in cases to the number of hospitalizations and deaths. More than 816,000 Americans have died from COVID. That's higher than any other country. In total, 5.4 million people across the glove have reportedly lost their lives to the virus. But some critics question those figures since China has only reported 4,636 deaths out of a population of 1.4 billion people.

CBN News Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Holiday travelers are still having a hard time reaching their destinations. Harsh winter weather and COVID-19 staffing shortages are causing big delays. Thousands of flights have been cancelled since Christmas, and more winter weather is in the forecast. More than 8,000 U.S. flights have been nixed since Christmas Eve. Delta Airlines delayed 600 flights on Wednesday alone, canceling 129. Alaska Airlines cancelled 170 flights. Seattle-Tacoma International Airport saw the most flight cancellations in the world for two consecutive days. And with a New Year's winter storm threatening travel across the plains and Midwest, more delays and cancellations are expected. It's been an extra-busy travel season too. On average, two million travelers have been passing through TSA each day – that's more than double the number of passengers in 2020. Meanwhile, parts of Nevada, California, and Oregon have issued states of emergency after heavy snow and torrential rains threatened travelers both in the air and on the road. From Dec. 23 – Dec 28, frozen roads have caused almost 1,000 traffic accidents in Oregon.

At the same time, most Americans are either overweight or obese. The pandemic made a bad situation worse, as Americans sat at home, stressed, and bored, reaching for junk food. Jeff and Angela Jordan were no different. At five-feet nine inches tall, Jeff tipped the scale at 264 pounds, and at five-feet three inches, Angela weighed 195. But through faith in God, combined with healthy habits and exercise, Jeff lost 100 pounds and Angela lost 50. Jeff told CBN News if he and Angela can do it, so can other people. After 25 years of marriage, like many couples, over time they gradually put on weight, especially during the pandemic. The two decided to make a change, starting with exercise. CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Deaths from drug overdoses are hitting astronomical levels. An estimated 100,000 Americans, or roughly 272 a day, died from drug overdoses from March 2020 to April 2021, the CDC said Wednesday, which is a record high. In fact, it's roughly one-third more deaths from drug overdoses than the year before. Drug overdose deaths have been steadily climbing the last 20 years, but those increases pale in comparison to the acceleration the last couple of years when the nation has been gripped in the throes of a pandemic that led to isolation from closures, as well as increased fear, anxiety, and other mental health issues that can foster drug abuse. On top of that, the illicit drug supply has been tainted with the highly lethal synthetic opioid fentanyl, which is often secretly added to street drugs, including pills, thereby catching the unsuspecting user offquard. Virginia, like much of the nation, saw dramatic increases in drug overdoses deaths in which the victims' bodies contained fentanyl, according to forensic epidemiologist Rosie Hobron, who works at the state medical examiner's office. Hobron says nearly three out of four overdose deaths involved fentanyl and almost all of the deaths were accidental. The trend shows no signs of slowing down. Fentanyl is a synthetic opiod that is 100 times more powerful than morphine. Alexandria, Virginia's opioid response coordinator Emily Bentley told CBN News fentanyl is so potent that the equivalent of a couple of grains of sand can kill. Fentanyl is also added to pills like Xanax, Oxycodone, and MDMA, the party drug often referred to as "Ecstasy" or "Molly." Bentley says it's almost impossible to spot fake pills. That's because drug dealers crush the real pills, add fentanyl, then re-press them using a sophisticated pill press that makes the final product look identical to real pills. In addition to the fentanyllaced street drugs, pandemic closures also contributed to the high number of overdoses. Dr. Paul Hardy, who runs Recovery for Life, a drug treatment center in Virginia, told CBN News far too many recovering addicts relapsed when they could no longer attend support group meetings. A disruption of routine schedule combined with being cooped up at home with family members who can "trigger" drug use also contributed to relapses. Some drug prevention organizations, such as those affiliated with police departments, are taking action to stop future overdoses by giving known users two things: fentanyl test strips, which detect the substance in other drugs, and Narcan, the opioid-reversal spray. Fentanyl test strips can be purchased online through BTNX or DanceSafe. Many pharmacies sell Narcan without a prescription. Drug users are being advised to never use when they are alone so that if an accidental overdose occurs, the person with them can administer the Naracan nasal spray and call 911. Users are also being warned against buying pills on the street that are in unlabeled prescription bottles or are in bottles with pills that are not identical in appearance. While law enforcement and drug prevention organizations are trying to diminish the number of deaths among people who use illegal drugs, they say the best solution is for the user to get into drug treatment. Dr. Hardy says it's the only option that works in the long run.

CBN Reporter Mark Martin Reports: It's a tragedy at an epidemic level, although you rarely see it making headlines. We're talking about the alarming number of missing and murdered Indigenous women in the U.S. CBN News traveled to Montana to hear from those facing this crisis and what they're doing to stop the trend. In the remote windswept town of Browning, on the Blackfeet Reservation, tribal members grieve the disappearance of Ashley Loring HeavyRunner. The young Native American woman was 20-years-old when she went mission in June of 2017. One member of the Blackfeet Nation, who asked to remain anonymous, helped organize a petition drive on behalf of Ashley and offered a tearful plea. CBN News reached out to the Salt Lake City FBI, which now oversees the case, for an update on the investigation. A spokesperson said because the case is "active and ongoing," she's not able to "provide any details." Tragically, Ashley's case is just one of many in a crisis known as "MMIP," which stands for "Missing and Murdered Indigenous Person." Det. Guy Baker with the Missoula Police Department is assigned to Jermain Charlo's disappearance. He said he doesn't believe she is still alive. Twenty-three years old at the time, the young mother is a member of the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes. She has now become a prominent face in the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons epidemic. According to the Indian Law Resource Center, in the U.S., more than four in five American Indian and Alaska Native women have experienced violence. In addition, the organization reports that Indigenous women are murdered at more than 10 times the national average on some reservations. And this isn't limited to Montana. The Urban Indian Health Institute reported that in 2016 alone, there were more than 5, 700 reports of missing American Indian and Alaska Native women and girls. The causes of the crisis are numerous. Other concerns include lack of law enforcement and breakdowns in coordination between the agencies servicing reservations. So what is being done to address the MMIP crisis? One way is a Tribal Community Response Plan. The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes became the first in the nation to develop this coordinated effort, which addresses active missing persons cases. Gov. Greg Gianforte (R-MT) told CBN News that legislation is becoming a key weapon in the fight. On the federal level, both Presidents Trump and Biden signed executive orders to confront the crisis. Back in Browning, Montana, on the Blackfeet Reservation, Drew Landry designed a higher-tech way that tribes could be more involved. A common Native American saying goes, "When an Indigenous woman goes missing, she goes missing twice – first her body vanishes and then her story." As the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons epidemic gains more attention, advocates hope their work brings about closure and lets loved ones know they are not forgotten.

CBN Senior Washington Correspondent Tara Mergener Reports: Empty shelves in stores, record-breaking backlogs at ports, and a severe shortage of truck drivers - the breakdown in our supply chain is hurting the economy and increasing costs for everyday Americans. President Biden met virtually with CEO's and leaders of the country's biggest ports on Wednesday as the problems in the supply chain fester. Americans are already feeling the strain of higher prices and shipping delays which the White House and businesses across the country are warning could go on for many more months. To help get things moving again, Biden says he's brokered an agreement for the port of Los Angeles to become a 24-hour, seven-days-a-week operation. Big retailers and shipping companies are also pledging to expand their hours. L.A. and Long Beach account for 40% of shipping containers that enter the U.S. Both are suffering from record-breaking backlogs. High consumer demand, a shortage of truck drivers and factory workers, and other supply chain issues are also keeping many items off store shelves with shortages expected to continue through the holidays. U.S. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen is telling Americans not to panic. The White House has launched a task force to examine the supply chain issues. Economists also warn delays and higher prices may stifle consumer spending in an already fragile economic recovery. The latest inflation reading shows that prices rose by 5.4% in September with the biggest increases in food, shelter, and gas. According to a recent Bankrate survey, 89% of adults have noticed rising prices, and 66% say those extra costs are hurting their financial situation. Meanwhile, President Biden's Chief of Staff Ronald Klain is being accused of making light of the plight of millions of Americans being hit in the pocketbook by the higher prices.

CBN News Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: If you haven't started setting money aside for your heating bills this winter, it's time to start. Experts are forecasting that the cost for heating oil could rise more than 40%, natural gas could shoot up 30%, propane, 54% and electricity, 6%. If it's a bad winter, prices could go even higher, with propane costs doubling. Add to that, rising gasoline prices. The energy crisis is the result of several factors, including policy decisions by lawmakers. Some would say bad policy decisions. Energy experts are calling it "the revenge of old energy," – meaning the fossil fuel industry – which is being increasingly abandoned by investors of the push among lawmakers for new green energy sources. A worldwide energy crunch is also to blame. China has had rolling blackouts from an energy shortage and Europe has seen natural gas prices rise 350%. Energy experts say Europe is being forced to return to coal – a dirty word to environmentalists – to generate the power it needs. Even cheap, abundant, clean-burning natural gas has fallen out of favor because of a belief it causes climate change. But while green energy may sound like a good idea to some, the world will discover this winter just how much it still needs fossil fuels.

CBN News Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Ongoing standstills at the nation's largest port are driving prices through the roof. Others are stepping up to help, but it's not enough to fix the problem. The Port of Virginia is already soaking up some of the congestion that's plaguing the West Coast. They're operating very efficiently and hope to keep the cargo and turn it into long term business. As many as 73 container ships have been waiting to unload goods at the ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles this week – the largest ports in the nation, now a chokehold to the global supply chain. L.A. - Long Beach processes about 10-million shipping containers each year. In comparison, all the major ports on the East Coast process just above 8 million. With roughly 250,000 containers sitting idle on the West Coast, the president plans to call on the U.S. military for help with fixing the supply chain woes. Supply chain bottlenecks are driving inflation across America. Store shelves are bare and many have likely felt the impact in their wallet. Inflation is up more than 5% this year. The typical American household is now spending an extra \$175 more each month on housing, groceries, and gas. And it could be the new normal for months. Major companies are charging more because of rising costs, like Nestle, Unilever, and Proctor and Gamble. The U.S. Postal Service and other shipping companies have added new facilities, machines, and seasonal workers in an attempt to avoid the brunt of bottlenecks come Christmas. The strain in the supply chain will endure well past COVID-19 and well into 2022. Joe Harris, spokesman for the Port of Virginia, says they just hope they can contain the workload they've already taken on to help alleviate the problems in the West Coast.

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: America's clean energy transition is underway, bolstered by money in the new infrastructure bill. Over the next decade, consumers will start to see options to power their homes, businesses, and even vehicles through renewal resources. The infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which is now law, provides money to pursue the administration's overall plan to cut carbon dioxide emissions at an accelerated pace. The bill provides \$65 billion for clean energy transmission and the electric grid. Some states are already implementing renewable energy sources. Virginia-based, Dominion Energy, launched an offshore wind pilot program over the summer and is now moving forward with a large-scale commercial wind project. The pilot turbines are the first built in federal waters, and just one rotation of the powerful arms could power a home for an entire day. Fossil fuels will remain part of the larger power generation mix as a reliable backup, but when the clean sources are producing, they'll knock the fossil fuels out, helping to reduce the state's carbon footprint. Experts say it's important for the Biden administration to stick to this slow phasing in of renewables, especially for consumer acceptance. If the old supply goes away too fast, while demand stays the same, prices would skyrocket. We're seeing some of that right now at the gas pump. During the pandemic, oil production decreased because people weren't traveling. When restrictions eased, people started moving again, while production stayed at pandemic levels. Frank Fannon, the inaugural Asst. Sec. of State for Energy Resources under former President Trump, now runs an advisory firm focused on all aspects of the energy transition. One thing he says needs much more focus, is the critical minerals required to make clean energy happen. administration sought to create an alternative supply chain. The goal: avoid more reliance on our greatest competitor, ensure clean energy is developed in a manner upholding U.S. values and remains attractive to investors who value human rights, environmental protections, and transparency. The Biden administration has continued this approach. Fannon says the next step would be using funds from the new infrastructure bill towards accelerated development of mining in North America. There are also efforts underway to restore major manufacturing facilities so that we aren't having to import the parts that make up things like wind turbines and solar panels. The new infrastructure bill offers manufacturing tax credits, and also cuts through some red tape like permit timelines.

CBN Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: There's a boom happening in homeschooling in America. The number of children taught by their parents has doubled since COVID lockdowns began. This includes a significant spike in black families who have switched to home education for the first time. When COVID-19 hit the US last year, public schools, much like other institutions, were forced to shut down. Students and families struggled with remote learning. But now that classrooms are reopened some kids are still home and many parents have turned into teachers. Krystle Lynch recently turned her Apopka, FL home into a classroom for her three boys. That also means teaching three grade levels, third, fifth, and high school. When schools went virtual, Lynch, a former teacher, helped her kids with their lessons. She soon discovered that it was easier to teach them at home while also protecting them from COVID and the debate surrounding it. According to US Census Bureau data, the pandemic has sparked new interest in homeschooling. In 2019, about 2.5 million students learned at home. Today that number has doubled to nearly 5 million. In California applications to homeschool tripled from 2020 to 2021. And black households saw the largest boost with the rate rising from 3.3. percent in the spring of 2020 to 16.1 percent in the Fall, according to the National Home Education Research Institute. Virginia is part of the growing trend. Yvonne Bunn, Director of Support at Home Educators Association Virginia, told CBN News while COVID has played a role in the increase, other factors are also having an impact. For example, more schools are adopting Critical Race Theory also known as CRT, an academic concept that teaches that racism exists everywhere in America. Ray added that many want to shield their kids from other hot-button issues such as transgender policies in public schools. Bunn said that leaders in the faith community are also searching for better educational options for families. A common theme for a number of parents is that their kids performed well while homeschooling during the pandemic and they don't want to change that. And the results are undeniable. Lynch says these are all reasons that prove homeschooling worthwhile. Meanwhile, as the interest in homeschooling grows, Ray believes that it's more than just a fad.
