The U.S. Postal Services has filed a request with the Postal Regulatory Commission to raise prices on First-Class Mail Forever stamps, postcards, and international letters and postcards. A Forever stamp would cost 66 cents.</p> <p>Stamps might cost more but food prices appear to be headed lower. The Labor Department reports the cost of groceries fell in March for the first time since 2020. Egg prices, which reached record highs last year, fell nearly 11 percent. Fruit and vegetable prices fell 1.3%.</p> <p>Moving season has begun and the U.S. Government agency overseeing moving companies is warning consumers to be on the lookout for rogue operators. The agency is trying to reduce the 7,500 moving scam complaints it got in 2022, through “Operation Protect Your Move.”</p>

Forty-three incidents were documented in January, while there were fourteen acts of vandalism in February and 12 in March. The total figure marks a significant increase in the number of attacks compared to previous years. Lord, we pray for an end to the acts of aggression toward churches and we pray you change the heart of those committing these crimes.</p> <p>Myanmar’s military dropped bombs and fired on a civilian gathering, killing up to 100 people, including children. Human rights groups say security forces have killed at least 3,000 civilians since taking power in a 2021 coup. The military actions are affecting food security in the country where prices have skyrocketed. Lord, we pray for a government leader and an end to the hostilities in the country.</p>

His kidney was operating at 16 percent. His father, Daniel Kablutsiak, was a blood type match, but there was one problem. Daniel was overweight at 275 pounds. To be a donor, he had to get his weight under 200 pounds. Daniel wanted to help his son, so he began a weight loss program. In March, about one year after he started his weight-loss regimen, he had reached his goal. He now weighs 195 pounds. Daniel got the call on his birthday last month, confirming that he was accepted as an organ donor for Hunter. The transplant is scheduled for June.</p> <p>Daniel said he did it all for the love of his son. I was determined, he said. Lots of work, lots of walking. Challenging at times mentally, but for the love of my son I just kept pushing myself and paying off now.</p> <p>Daniel says he hopes to be an inspiration to anybody else who is struggling to make some necessary change in their life. Whatever it is, just put your mind into it and go for it; he said.</p>

Chances are thousands of other churches around the country also sang that song—or one very similar to it. A new study found that Bethel and a handful of other megachurches have cornered the market on worship music in recent years, churning out hit after hit and dominating the worship charts.</p> <p>Texas State Sen. Phil King (R) introduced a new bill in the Lone Star State to mandate the Ten Commandments be displayed in every public classroom. The Ten Commandments have been the basis of all morals for the Western civilization, for the Western world, really, since the inception of the Western world. Tim Barton, president of Wall Builders, says he thinks it’s a great idea. Whether or not the bill makes it to the floor for a vote remains to be seen.</p>

The company disputes the claim.</p> <p>The Postal Service is proposing a new shipping option – USPS Ground Advantage – that it says would both lower shipping costs and improve reliability for deliveries. The new product is currently being pitched to the Postal Regulatory Commission for approval.</p> <p>The Wall Street Journal reports Wells Fargo will agree to a one billion dollar settlement with shareholders who have filed a class-action lawsuit. In the lawsuit, some shareholders accused former bank executives of misleading them about progress in resolving the 2016 fake accounts scandal.</p>

Cyclone Mocha was the most powerful storm to hit the area in the past 10 years. Lord, we pray the restrictions will be set aside and aid will reach those in need.</p> <p>Ongoing ethnic violence in Manipur, India, has killed 70 people and forced 35,000 to flee for their lives. Bibles For the World’s John Pudaite says, “Approximately 1,900 houses have been attacked and destroyed.” The Hindu majority is attacking the Christian minority. There are reports of over 120 churches that were attacked, destroyed, burned, or looted. Lord, we pray for order to be restored and protection for Christians.</p>

The Radiant Foundation released the results of a survey based on the responses of more than 1,700 Americans, coinciding with the annual National Day of Prayer. The poll, named the "2023 American Prayer Wrap, showed that 87% of respondents who pray saw at least one of their prayers answered in the past 12 months. According to the survey, the average American prays twice a day and for 18 minutes every day. Eighty-four percent of those surveyed believe God hears their prayers regardless of how they believe.</p> <p>Kathy Keller, the wife of pastor and author Tim Keller, has requested prayers for her husband after he suffered "complications" from his cancer treatment. In a social media update Saturday, Kathy Keller shared an update on her husband's health: "Tim is out of the hospital and recovering at home after complications from his treatment. Please continue to pray during this slow recovery, she wrote. Keller, the founding pastor of Redeemer Presbyterian Church in New York City, was initially diagnosed with stage four pancreatic cancer in May 2020. New tumors had developed requiring his recent treatment.</p>

The Federal Trade Commission sued Ring, claiming that it violated customers' privacy by allowing employees to access their videos. Instacart has just launched a new feature called Ask Instacart. The new AI-powered search tool will help streamline the grocery shopping process for consumers by providing personalized recommendations and offering suggestions for meal planning.</p> <p>June is Airbag Recall Repair Month. Why is that significant? Because federal safety regulators say there are currently more than 7.1 million vehicles on the road with at least one unrepaired, recalled airbag. Many are defective Takata airbags blamed for 24 deaths.</p>

The Cessna was believed to be on autopilot and did not respond to the authorities. It has been reported that the pilot was unresponsive and that there were four people on board the plane. The cause will be investigated. Lord we pray for the families of all who were on board the plane that you bring them comfort at this time.</p> <p>An education official says nearly 80 girls were poisoned and hospitalized in two separate attacks at their primary schools in northern Afghanistan. It is thought to be the first time this kind of assault has happened since the Taliban swept to power in August 2021 and began their crackdown on the rights and freedoms of Afghan women and girls. Lord we pray for healing and recovery for these girls.</p>

He added that he plans to release three songs that celebrate the United States on June 23rd.</p> <p>The leader of The Episcopal Church had to be hospitalized over Memorial Day weekend due to suffering from internal bleeding and an irregular heartbeat. He has since been sent home. Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Michael Curry was sent to a hospital in Raleigh, North Carolina. Curry's internal bleeding is under control, and additional test results are expected soon. He has been receiving treatment for atrial fibrillation (AFib), which was detected in an annual physical, ". "While in the hospital, Curry experienced two other episodes of irregular heartbeat, and he will wear a heart monitor to determine what further treatment is necessary."</p> <p>A church in Pennsylvania is nearing the completion of a cross that stands 108 feet high on its property, with the sizeable Christian symbol expected to be finished in June. Hilltop Baptist Church of Indiana, Pennsylvania, just north of Pittsburgh, is building the large cross with volunteer help and hopes it will serve as a beacon for evangelism outreach.</p>
