BIN Public Affairs Show

Sun Jul 3 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss the appropriate way to approach and celebrate Juneteenth...especially for non-Black people. We discuss the increased attention and celebrations of the newly founded federal holiday (as well as some examples of things that feel offensive).

In the second half of today's show, we discuss the commercialization of the Juneteenth holiday and explain the difference between authentic celebrations and performative demonstrations. Our Way Black History Fact details the origins of the holiday!

Sun Jul 10 – In the first half of today's episode, we talk about the Akron, OH man who was shot 60 times after fleeing from police. The 25 year old Black man named Jayland Walker is the subject of our discussion and we do our best to go over the many details leading up to his death. In the second half of the show today, we juxtapose how police often take mass shooters into custody, yet will execute black people at the mere thought of them being potentially dangerous. Our Way Black History Fact highlights the very Black origins of the 4th of July celebrations in this country.

Sun Jul 17 – In the first half of today's episode, we talk about the failure of police in the Uvalde school shooting after looking at a newly released video of the officer's response to the mass shooting. We take the time to examine the role of police and to determine if the institution of policing is living up to its values.

In the second half of the show we challenge the idea of Black on Black crime. We delve into the history of the narrative and discuss why it has persisted as a harmful and hateful political talking point. We discuss the 3/5th compromise for our Way Black History Fact.

Sun Jul 24 – In the first half of today's episode, we talk about the viral videos circulating of Black children being ignored by famous characters at theme park parades and the correct action that should be taken to address this issue.

In the second half of the show we discuss racist sports fans and how confusing and unsettling this behavior is. We cite examples from LeBron James and Ja Morant alongside other well-known athletes. Our Way Black History Fact covers Jim Crow Laws.

Sun Jul 31 – In the first half of today's episode, we cover lots of articles that have come up this week that point to racist practices at different points of society accross the country. We normally don't get to stories like these, but this week they piled up on us and we ask the obvious question..."Why do we keep supporting these systems?"

In the second half of the show we discuss the disconnect the government has from our reality. We tell real stories about what life is like day-to-day and how divorced our elected officials are from that. Our Way Black History Fact discusses the origins of policing in this country.

Sun Aug 7 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss accountability in policing. We use the example of Army lieutenant Caron Nazario and his interaction with police to illustrate what police misconduct often looks like and how little to nothing is done to hold officers accountable. In the second part of the show, we identify what is done with complaints against officers. We cite sobering statistics that paint a picture of police brutality and misconduct being positioned well behind the blue wall of silence.

Sun Aug 14 – In the first half of today's episode, we expound upon the rampant mistreatment of Black women in this country. We use the case of Breonna Taylor to explain the value of Black life relative to Gabby Petito in a thought experiment that shows how White supremacist systems tend to undervalue Black women.

In the second part of the show, we discuss the importance of voting in midterm elections and uncover many hidden truths that are specific to this upcoming election. Our Way Black History Fact tells the origin story of House music and gives proper credit to its Black roots.

Sun Aug 21 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss the profound implications that stereotypes can have on BIPOC children and how it can shape their view of the world growing up. We use personal stories to explain how we often learn our place in the world based on prejudices and racism. In the second part of the show, we tell the origin story of Civic Cipher and explain why we believe the show is important in the current social and political climate in the U.S. Our Way Black History Fact details the origin story of the Urban League.

Sun Aug 28 – In the first half of today's episode, we go over some of the major news stories of the week and give some insight and context to the headlines you may have seen. We break down some of the more troubling events and provide a reaction to the stories.

In the second part of the show, we explain how we--as a show and as a community--process the trauma that we see in the media against Black and Brown bodies. We discuss how it feels to be a second-class citizen in this country. Our Way Black History Fact tells the origin story of R&B music.

Sun Sep 4 – In the first half of today's episode, discuss environmental racism and cite examples from recent stories in the United States. We spend a good amount of time discussing the recent example that has left Jackson, Mississippi without water indefinitely.

In the second part of the show, we cover a story of a 12-year old boy who was a victim of police violence in New Orleans. We then bring attention to how the aggressive tactics of police are often only pointed at Black people and the implications of these actions.

Sun Sep 11 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss a bit more about our origins. We also share some stories that have some positive outcomes that we have been able to witness since our show started!

In the second part of the show, we talk about our positioner "Broadcasting the Balance. Defending the Discourse." We also discuss a few more positive stories that we have seen in the past two years of being on the air!

Sun Sep 18 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss the trailer for Disney's Little Mermaid and the backlash it has received since the reveal that Ariel is played by Black actress Halle Bailey. We also look into the backlash received by shows like House of Dragons and Rings of Power where Black actors have found their way into these fantasy lands.

In the second half of the show, we have a necessary conversation about the death of PnB Rock and other rappers whose deaths are usually high profile and involve guns. We take the time to break down the circumstances that lead to deaths like these.

Sun Sep 25 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss the political stunt performed by Ron DeSantis where he deceived a group of migrants into relocating to Martha's Vineyard by promising jobs and support that didn't exist.

In the second half of the show, we discuss Bill Maher's incomplete view of American slavery and the legacy of the institution. Our Way Black History Fact covers the Reverse Freedom Riders.

Sun Oct 2 – In the first half of today's episode, we discuss the profound implications that stereotypes can have on BIPOC children and how it can shape their view of the world growing up. We use personal stories to explain how we often learn our place in the world based on prejudices and racism. In the second part of the show, we tell the origin story of Civic Cipher and explain why we believe the show is important in the current social and political climate in the U.S. Our Way Black History Fact details the origin story of the Urban League.

Sun Oct 9 – On today's show, we are joined by city council candidate for Phoenix's district 6 Harry Curtin. We spend the first half of the show discussing the importance of local government and citizen engagement. We also examine the scope of work at different levels of local government. In the second half of the show, we discuss some of Harry Curtin's policies and ideas that will work in Phoenix and around the country. We provide an important examination of policing and what the future of policing might look like. Our Way Black History Fact is dedicated to Benjamin Banneker. Our Ebony Excellence is dedicated to Irin Daniels who directed the film The Unhitch King in theaters now.

Sun Oct 16 – On today's show, we spend the first half discussing a couple of recent high-profile police shootings where the victim was White and not guilty of any crime. Erik Cantu was shot while eating in his car and Christian Glass was shot after calling police to help him get his vehicle out of a ditch. In the second half of the show, we discuss the police department in Kansas city and some of the corrupt things that have caused them to make the news under different headlines in recent months.

Sun Oct 23 – On today's show, we spend the first half discussing a distressing and upsetting example of the consequences of failing to listen to Black women. We turn to a friend of the show and another Black media outlet called The Kansas City Defender for the story they broke nationally regarding missing Black women.

In the second half of the show, we discuss the city council meeting in Los Angeles that turned racist seeing Hispanic officials laughing and making racist remarks toward Black people and the Black community.

Sun Oct 30 – On today's show, we are joined by Dr. Camilla Westenberg on behalf of the NAACP discussing midterm elections, their importance, and what outcomes they shape. She shares a story of the importance of voting according to her elders, and also discusses what is at stake for this midterm election.

In the second half of the show, we discuss voter suppression initiatives across the country. We discuss ways to identify and combat these actions that seek to weaken the voting power of the historically disenfranchised.

Sun Nov 6 – On today's show, we adopt a slightly different format. We share the audio from an interview with LA's Big Boy...for those who have noticed, we had a busy couple of weeks. It all started with this conversation and we hope you enjoy it and gain some additional insight into who we are and what we are trying to do with this platform!

In the second half of the show, we talk about social media and Black culture with Fanbase creator Isaac Hayes III. This conversation gives insight into why control of our narratives is so important and what options we have for owning our platforms.

Sun Nov 13 – On today's show, we adopt a slightly different format. We share the audio from an interview with LA's Big Boy...for those who have noticed, we had a busy couple of weeks. It all started with this conversation and we hope you enjoy it and gain some additional insight into who we are and what we are trying to do with this platform!

In the second half of the show, we talk about social media and Black culture with Fanbase creator Isaac Hayes III. This conversation gives insight into why control of our narratives is so important and what options we have for owning our platforms.

Sun Nov 20 – On today's show, we talk about the viral video of a Black man named Jarrett Hobbs being beaten in a jail cell. We break down the facts surrounding the police violence as we know them so far, and try to provide a glimpse into how the criminal justice system interacts with Black bodies. In the second half of the show, we talk about our current political climate after the midterm elections. We discuss the divide we are witnessing in this country and offer some ideas on what to do about it.

Sun Nov 27 – Today's episode is a Way Black History Episode...lol! We discuss the uniqueness of American slavery and contrast it with slavery around the world. This conversation allows us to more directly deal with the implications and legacy of slavery in the United States.

We spend the second half of the show familiarizing you with some key takeaways from the Willie Lynch letter which we often refer to on the show. This gives insight into the ripple effects of the chattel slavery system from the United States.

Sun Dec 4 – Today's episode starts off with our discussion on Black White supremacists. There are folks who are Black who go well beyond the conservative label...and they can be dangerous and confusing to the masses. We discuss some of the more prominent names and identify common characteristics with this type of individual.

The second half of the show is dedicated to discussing mental health and more specifically, forgiveness. We use the recent interview Will Smith had with Trevor Noah to approach the subject of conflict resolution and identify the value in seeking and granting forgiveness.

Sun Dec 11 – Today's episode begins with us going through the many things that have made headlines in the past year regarding the former president and how none of it seems to significantly quell the enthusiasm behind his movement. While we appreciate that some right-wing leaders have finally decided to acknowledge his toxicity, it is simply too little and too late. Furthermore, it seems to have had no impact on his actual voting base.

The second half of the program deals with one elected official's plan to remove American History (rebranded as CRT by conservatives) from classrooms. We discuss his (Tom Horne) delusions and fears with respect to the traditional teaching of American history and give insight into how one might approach an individual who feels this way.

Sun Dec 18 – Today's episode is a Way Black History Episode...lol! We discuss the uniqueness of American slavery and contrast it with slavery around the world. This conversation allows us to more directly deal with the implications and legacy of slavery in the United States.

We spend the second half of the show familiarizing you with some key takeaways from the Willie Lynch letter which we often refer to on the show. This gives insight into the ripple effects of the chattel slavery system from the United States. **Sun Dec 25** - Today's episode begins with us discussing the death of Ronald Greene—the 49-year old who was killed by police 3 years ago. We discuss the delay in releasing the footage and the further delay in having charges filed. We also break down his arrest and the brutality of the officers involved.

The second half of the program deals with the weaponization of police, how the presence of officers affects non-criminal issues, and how Black women often suffer the most under the current law enforcement system. Our Way Black History Fact is dedicated to Lunsford Richardson...the pharmacist behind Vicks Vaporub.
