During 45 years of litigation, there was minimal progress in creating a school system that provided quality education to students regardless of their race. Contrary to its intentions, the U.S. Justice Department and the federal judiciary accomplished just the opposite. They had re-segregated a school system that fell far short of the goals and ideals rooted in the U.S. Supreme Court's 1954 Brown decision and other subsequent high court rulings. DESEGREGATION: A DREAM DELAYED attempts to explain the complex and multi-layered reasons behind the long-delayed melding of races and cultures in public schools. This provocative documentary offers a better understanding of the process by which communities unify to provide quality education and social structure for its youth.

The press claimed that Mexican youth -- known as "zoot-suiters" for the clothes they wore -- were terrorizing the city with a wave of crime. Police fanned out across the city arresting 600 Mexican Americans. Seventeen "zoot-suiters" headed to a trial in which prosecutors had little evidence to present. Nonetheless, guilty verdicts were handed down to all. The tensions the trial inflamed sparked riots between servicemen and the Mexican American community that led to "zoot-suiters" being beaten and stripped of their clothes. Despite vigorous denials from city officials, a citizens' committee concluded the riots had been fueled by racial prejudice and encouraged by sensational news reporting and a discriminatory police department.

Description: In August 1955, a 14-year-old black boy from Chicago whistled at a white woman in a grocery store in Money, Mississippi. Emmett Till didn't understand that he had broken the unwritten laws of the Jim Crow South. Three days later, two white men dragged him from his bed in the dead of night, beat him brutally and shot him. Although his killers were arrested and charged with murder, they were both quickly acquitted by an all-white all-male jury. Soon after, the defendants sold their story, including a detailed account of how they murdered Till, to a journalist. The murder and the trial horrified the nation and the world. Till's death was a spark that helped mobilize the civil rights movement. Three months after his body was pulled from the Tallahatchie River, the Montgomery Bus Boycott began. Mamie Till returned to Chicago, remarried, taught public school for twenty-four years, and continued to speak publicly about her son's death.

Description: Radio stations banned it, but when Billie Holiday sang "Strange Fruit" the whole world listened anyway. Interest was renewed in his work through "The Cosby Show" that featured one of Wilson's paintings as a subject of a program in 1985. The painting was then a set piece for the duration of the series. This program chronicles Ellis Wilson's life and his art.

Description: Hosted by Tony winner Cherry Jones and Tony nominee David Marshall Grant, In the Life's "The Fundamental Fight" delves into the religious right's crusade against lesbians and gays as it plays out on our televisions and ballots, inside our classrooms and libraries, and within our houses of worship. "Battle for the Box" tracks the response from the government, school boards, and the religious right to the PBS broadcast of Debra Chasnoff's "It's Elementary: Talking About Gay Issues in Schools". "Children's Books, Adult Battles": in 1998, the town of Wichita Falls, Texas, placed the children's books Heather Has Two Mommies and Daddy's Roommate in its local library. But Baptist pastor Robert Jeffress took the books hostage, fighting to erase gay and lesbian families from the town's consciousness. ITL travels back to 1992 Oregon, where a conservative Christian group proposed "Ballot Measure 9", an amendment declaring homosexuality "abnormal" and "perverse" and banning its mention in government agencies and schools--and leading to outbreaks of violence. "Gay Muslims" follows young gay men who have fought within their families and their faith to worship as homosexuals. American gay Muslims struggle to reconcile their dual identities. While in their home countries, many live under governments that punish homosexuality with death, and others face extreme isolation and ostracization from their families and communities. "There's hope for change" promises the "Ex-Gay Movement", which seeks to convert gay men and lesbians into heterosexuals. But critics of the movement contend that this religious crusade is really being fought for political purpose. "Promise Keepers", a widespread movement among Christian men, seek to reclaim patriarchal supremacy. Because its traditional values include codified gender roles and financial and political fidelity to the Christian right, Promise Keepers have alarmed LGBT and feminist organizations. The late African-American filmmaker Marlon Riggs looks at the dimensions that race adds to gender identity and sexuality in "Black Is. . .Black Ain't". And in "Out Takes", guest commentator Paul Rudnick sits in for ITL regular Harvey Fierstein with a response to Jerry Falwell's indictment of gays and lesbians for the 9/11 attacks.

Title: I Can't Marry You

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/4/04, 8pm

Description: I CAN'T MARRY YOU chronicles the legalization of marriage for same- sex couples in America. Betty DeGeneres, mother of talk show host Ellen DeGeneres, narrates this timely documentary. The program profiles 20 gay and lesbian couples in long-term, committed relationships ranging from 10 to 55 years. Participants represent a very diverse grouping of younger and older people, as well as African Americans, Hispanics and Caucasians, and people from various religious backgrounds, including the Jewish, Baptist and Catholic faiths. In interviews taped around the country - from big cities to small towns - same sex couples discuss everything from their "coming out stories" to the legal obstacles they face as unmarried couples. The program also addresses the civil rights question surrounding gay marriage. Marriage as an equal right for same-sex couples would provide over 1,000 rights, benefits and protections currently afforded all other United States citizens. Evan Wolfson, voted by the National Law Journal as one of the top 100 attorneys in the country with respect to civil rights achievements, is interviewed in the program. Wolfson heads the Freedom to Marry Organization in New York City. Another interview features John J. McNeill, a former Jesuit priest and author of *The Church and the Homosexual*.

Title: In The Life 1304 – Culture Wars

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/6/04, 11pm

Description: In *Odd Girl Out*, special guest Lesley Gore travels back to 1950s Greenwich Village, the epicenter of the lesbian pulp fiction underworld. Gore follows the "queen of lesbian pulp", Ann Bannon, as she returns to the Village fifty years later and considers how these novels laid the foundation for a community of women. After non-discrimination laws were passed in the state of Maine, the Christian Coalition twice led referendums to overturn the laws and keep discrimination legal. Now, activists both inside and outside of the statehouse seek to create a home in Maine for gays and lesbians—one bolstered by governmental protections. In San Antonio, Texas, a gay and lesbian film festival triggered a showdown between the grassroots organization The Esperanza Peace & Justice Center and the city government. The controversy set off not only a major legal battle for The Esperanza Center, founded by a group of Latina lesbians with a vision for social change, but also created a rift within the gay community of San Antonio. ITL talks to director/producer Kate Davis about her film *Southern Comfort*, which was awarded the Grand Jury Prize for "Best Documentary" at the 2001 Sundance Film Festival. In *Real to Reel: Southern Comfort*, ITL looks at this remarkable documentary that delves into the intricate lives of two transsexuals, Robert Eads who is female-to-male and Lola Cola, his male-to-female partner. In our award-winning story, *Foster Parents of the Year*, foster kids share why it was important to nominate their two dads for Iowa's "Foster Parents of the Year" award. ITL talks to the award recipients, Gair Bridges and the late Ron Travis, who over the last ten years opened their home to eighteen foster children. Despite reprisals from church superiors, heterosexual minister Reverend Jimmy Creech supported the gay and lesbian community. Rev. Creech lost his position at the First United Methodist Church in Nebraska for performing a commitment ceremony for two women, and has since been defrocked by the Methodist church. Rev. Creech said, "I believe the church cannot just quietly say, 'we welcome you'. We must shout it out." An estimated 40,000 women converged on Beijing, China to attend the United Nation's sponsored fourth World Conference on Women. At the "lesbian tent" at the Non-Governmental Organization Forum nearby, women from around the world met to discuss issues of international gay rights. In *Out Takes*, four-time Tony Award-winner Harvey Fierstein's own take on the culture of his local grocery store.

Title: In The Life 1306 – The Latest Trend

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/13/04, 11pm

Description: With gays and lesbians playing an increasingly prominent role in everything from pop culture to politics, the March episode of "In the Life", the television newsmagazine of record on gay and lesbian America, sets out to explore what's really behind "The Latest Trend." Hosted by Tony Award-winning actor Cherry Jones, the March episode leads off with a segment revealing why gays and lesbians have become a top target market -- particularly for the travel industry. In "Out & About: New York", the first of a new series spotlighting gay and lesbian hot spots, ITL checks out what the Big Apple has to offer the queer traveler.

Title: Lance Loud! A Death In An American Family

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/14/04, 9pm

Description: This "final episode" of the Loud family saga explores the legacy of Lance Loud, who died on December 21, 2001, at age 50. Lance asked Alan and Susan Raymond, filmmakers of *AN AMERICAN FAMILY*, to film the documentary several months before his death. In addition to material filmed with Lance in the last months of his life, the program shows his memorial service and includes scenes from *AN AMERICAN FAMILY* featuring Lance. Beyond

examining his role as America's first gay icon on television, the documentary delves into his years as a rock 'n' roll performer in his punk rock band, the Mumps, during the 1970s, and his later years as a writer and columnist for The Advocate, Details, Vanity Fair and other publications.

Title: Under The Pink Carpet 103 – Celebrity Profiles: Steve Guttenberg/Jennifer Tilly
Length: 30 minutes
Airdate: 6/20/04, 10:30pm
Description: Under the Pink Carpet travels to the Philadelphia International Gay and Lesbian Film Festival. We meet actor Steve Guttenberg (star of Police Academy, Diner, Cocoon, Three Men and a Baby) for an in-depth discussion of his directorial debut and starring role in the gay themed movie, "PS, Your Cat is Dead." We also meet Academy Award winning actress Jennifer Tilly and discuss her dedication to her substantial gay fan base. Backstage with Cyndi Lauper: After performing at Cher's sold out concert at Madison Square Garden, singer/songwriter and 80's pop icon Cyndi Lauper made a personal appearance at Chelsea's gay and ultra-hip "XL" nightclub. Under the Pink Carpet goes backstage at XL for an exclusive interview. Report includes footage from Cyndi's performance and music from her latest CD. Regular Segments: Man on the Street: Drag correspondent Clover Honey visits the Fulsom Street East outdoor leather/fetish fair, and asks the question, "Does the mainstream gay community frown upon the leather/fetish community?" Belly Up: Scenes from a gay bar featuring actors Tom Bondi and Mark Holt. Homo Comicus: Openly gay standup comic (TBD) at New York's Gotham Comedy Club.

Title: In the Life 1307 – The Home Front
Length: One Hour
Airdate: 6/20/04, 11pm
Description: Actor Bill Brochtrup who plays John Irvin, the openly gay police administrative aide on ABC TV's NYPB Blue, will host this episode of "In the Life". And recording artist Joi Cardwell rounds up the news and cultural events for Out & About. ITL profiles the life and legacy of Larry Kramer, critically acclaimed gay author, activist, and founder of ACT UP (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power). In Real to Reel: Daddy and Papa, filmmaker Johnny Symons discusses fatherhood and the political and cultural issues involved with gay men who are raising children. In A More Perfect Union, ITL reports on the wave of civil unions by gay and lesbian couples who are eager to claim some semblance of marital equality in Canada. In Hecho a Mano, ITL features the Cuban recording artist, Albita, who talks about her innovative Latin music, its crossover appeal, and her road to becoming a singing sensation. In a controversial new Out Take, Tony award-winning actor Harvey Fierstein questions caring, conscience, and the fight against AIDS.

Title: Hope Along The Wind: The Life of Harry Hay
Length: One Hour
Airdate: 6/21/04, 9pm
Description: This documentary examines how gay activist Harry Hay and his group, the Mattachine Society, changed the face of gay civil rights in America through a landmark lawsuit against the Los Angeles Police Department.

Title: Independent Lens 414 – Daddy & Papa
Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/22/04, 9pm

Description: What if your most controversial act turned out to be the most traditional thing in the world? DADDY & PAPA explores the growing phenomenon of gay fathers and their impact on American culture through the stories of four families, including the filmmaker's. Beyond the age-old struggles all parents face, DADDY & PAPA delves into the particular challenges that gay dads face. From surrogacy and interracial adoption, to the complexities of gay divorce, to the battle for full legal status as parents, DADDY & PAPA presents a revealing look at some of the gay fathers who are breaking new ground in the ever-changing landscape of the American family.

Title: Under The Pink Carpet 104

Length: 30 minutes

Airdate: 6/28/04, 10pm

Description: Gay Life Expo report at the Jacob Javitts Convention Center in New York. The report features "Cheer New York" (New York's volunteer all male cheerleading squad), researchers and participants of the "Sex and Love" survey, gay figures from Madam Tussaud's Wax Museum, and a representative of the NYPD (on hand recruiting gays and lesbians for ...the police force???). Coverage also includes celebrity interviews with Broadway diva Jennifer Holliday and tennis legend Martina Navratilova, and wraps with Clover Honey and Tony Sawicki partaking of unique refreshment at the Oxygen Bar. "Blinkfest" is a four day festival of short, sassy, gay-themed films. We meet Blinkfest co-founders Frank Cephalo and George Lyter, speak with director Glenn Gaylord about his award winning film, "Boychick", and chat with hunky "In and Out" actor, Greg Siff. The report features incredible clips from several of the festivals 12 short films. "Get Out" is a monthly mini concert series featuring performances by gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender artists at the Fez in lower Manhattan. ~We meet "Get Out" founder and organizer, Zecca Esquibel, transsexual glam punk legend Jayne (formerly Wayne) County, tranny rocker Lisa Jackson and her ultra-cool band, "Girl Friday," and the delicious musical trio, "Girlyman". As always, the report includes generous doses of sizzling performance footage. Regular Segments: Man on the Street: Drag correspondent Clover Honey attends the opening night of John Blair's "Estate" at the Limelight, and asks "What is a party boy's worst nightmare???" Belly Up: "Does Brian want?" Tom Bondi and Mark Holt offer another satirical slice of life in the gay bar scene with their regular sketch comedy presentation.

Title: In The Life 1309 – Social Engineering

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 6/27/04, 11pm

Description: In "Political Science," ITL examines how the science around homosexuality has been politicized, from the 19th century when sexologists coined the term "homosexuality" through the 20th century and today. Interviews with early activists including Barbara Gittings and Frank Kameny detail how they dramatically overturned the APA's classification of homosexuality as a mental disorder and forever changed the course of history. Other interviews include historian Lillian Faderman and conversion therapy survivor Martin Duberman. What began as a small support group for parents whose adult children had come out of the closet, PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) has now evolved into one of the LGBT community's largest support organizations. In "PFLAG Evolution," ITL celebrates the 25th anniversary of an organization whose mere existence helps combat the homophobia that still surrounds its members' children. This month's Real to Reel profiles "Bombay Eunuch," a film investigation into what has become one of India's most secretive subcultures. Once considered

spiritually divine, Indian eunuchs have now become objects of mockery and have resorted to begging and prostitution for survival. Interviews include filmmakers Alexandra Shiva and Sean MacDonald. When Joseph McCarthy took on the communist menace of the 1950s he added a second identifier of un-Americanism, homosexuality. In "Level Pink" ITL looks at how the tradition of framing queerness as a threat to our national security continues, 50 years after McCarthyism. And in Out Takes, Harvey Fierstein challenges the socialization within his own community in "Bringing up Babies."

Title: Make It Happen: Mentors, Dreams, Success

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 4/2/04, 9pm

Description: Helene Lerner hosts MAKE IT HAPPEN: MENTORS, DREAMS, SUCCESS, a program that addresses the ambitions, hopes, fears and successes of a diverse group of women and young girls. A recurrent theme of MAKE IT HAPPEN is that no one succeeds alone, which points to the importance of mentors. Three compelling documentaries anchor this hour-long special, after which a forum of women and men share their insights, frustrations and triumphs in dealing with similar issues.

Title: Scully (The World Show) – Shira White

Length: 30 minutes

Airdate: 4/3/04, 10:30am

Description: Acclaimed author and consultant, Shira White joins Robert Scully this week to discuss innovation within the corporate world. White's inventive book, "New Ideas About New Ideas" studies the idea of creativity and business. White, an engaging authority on inventive thinking, has several decades of experience working with companies to push their boundaries on the innovation process. "Creativity," White says, "should not be pigeonholed," nor should it be limited to only one department within a company.

Title: Superpower 132 – Islam and Women's Rights

Description: The global human rights movement got a rare bit of good news when the Nobel Prize Committee singled out one of theirs for the world's most prestigious humanitarian award. Shirin Ebadi, an Iranian lawyer and human rights activist, was recognized for her efforts on behalf of women struggling for equality in Iran. Her selection invites examination of the broader issue of women's rights throughout the Islamic world, especially in Afghanistan and Iraq where the U.S. is playing such a central role. For Americans, the question is whether we are doing enough to help bring about improvements in human rights. Joining Superpower moderator Lisa Simeone to discuss these issues will be: Khalid Abdel-Karim, Washington Correspondent Middle East News Agency of Egypt; Mahnaz Afkhami, President, Women's Learning Partnership; Helen Esfandiari, Middle East Program Consulting Director and Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars.

Title: Scully (The World Show) 648 – Carol Stephenson

Length: 30 minutes

Airdate: 4/10/04, 10:30am

Description: Carol Stephenson has been named "Woman of the Year" by several publications, served as CEO of two Fortune 500 companies, and today is the Dean of the prestigious Ivey School of Business. In conversation with Robert Scully, Stephenson discusses what to expect from the business leaders of tomorrow. She talks about innovations in business school curriculum, as well as the importance of women in the corporate world. The discussion also focuses on corporate governance and re-instituting trust within companies.

Title: Great Museums 102 – The National Museum of Women in the Arts: A Woman

Description: The National Museum of Women in the Arts offers the single most important collection of art by women in the world. Description: This is the story of three American-Jewish women who reconcile their roles as mothers, daughters, homemakers and career women with their ties to family, religion and generations of women before them. While Ada, Bernice and Brenda prepare for their annual Passover Seder, welcome their guests, read the Haggadah and eat the festive meal, they reveal the restrictions they encountered over the course of their lives as Jews and as women. Paralleling the Exodus story of the slaves of Egypt, these sisters finally escape their burdens and are able to celebrate and appreciate their family and their freedom.

Title: American Experience 1607 – Emma Goldman

Description: For nearly half a century, Russian emigrant Emma Goldman was the most controversial woman in America, taunting the mainstream with her fervent attacks on government, big business, and war. To the tabloids, she was "Red Emma, queen of the anarchists," but many admired Goldman for her defense of labor rights, women's emancipation, birth control, and free speech. Emma Goldman explores the life of the notorious lecturer, fearless writer, and merciless publisher.

Title: Independent Lens 525 – Death of a Shaman

Length: One Hour

Airdate: 5/29/04, 8pm

Description: Through a journey that takes her back to her roots in Thailand, a young Mien woman from Sacramento strives to come to terms with her father's death and drug addiction, and her sister's murder. Reunited with her Mien relatives, she begins to grasp the complexity of her father's past and experience the nuances of lost identity.

Title: European Journal 2218 – Mussolini's Granddaughter

Length: 30 minutes

Airdate: 6/8/04, 6:30pm

Description: Italy -- Mussolini's Granddaughter - Originally, she planned to follow the footsteps of her famous aunt, Sophia Loren. But she went into politics instead, and there Alessandra Mussolini has indeed gained fame. She recently left the Alleanza Nazionale -- with all the sound and fury she could muster. The granddaughter of fascist dictator Benito Mussolini didn't think the rightwing party was rightwing enough. Now she has founded her own party. After all, some voters regard her name as a seal of quality.

Title: Virgin Diaries

Description: Fatiha, a Moroccan woman, and her American friend Jessica head off on a journey through Morocco with provocative questions about sexuality, virginity and Islam. Fatiha is to be married off soon until the arrangement-which began with a controversial kiss on the hand and was supposed to conclude at Fatiha's wedding-careens off track. To complicate matters, Fatiha is overcome by the sudden possibility of real love.
