GA IMMIGRATION LAW VO :19

In the final days of Georgia's legislative session, the author of a proposal to crack down on illegal immigration was spotted several times in hushed discussions with D.A. King. For nearly a decade, King has pushed for stricter enforcement of immigration laws. With a sometimes confrontational approach, he's won a lot of supporters but also a lot of enemies. His advice has been sought by legislators crafting laws targeting illegal immigration, including state Rep. Matt Ramsey, who wrote Georgia's new law. Ramsey says King's help was invaluable in writing the law and organizing supporters to pressure lawmakers to pass it.

L: E-VERIFY REPORT MARIA ROSA LUCCHINI. WASHINGTON, DC PKG 1:55

As Congress considers legislation to mandate the use of E-Verify - a federal, electronic program to verify the work authorization of new hires - without pairing it with a path to legal status for the approximately seven million undocumented workers in the U.S. workforce,

Members of Congress should look to the experience of state legislatures which struggled mightily with the issue this year. Several state legislatures will close this month after considering, but not passing, mandatory E-Verify legislation largely modeled after Arizona's mandatory E-Verify law, but in some cases more extreme. At least five states (Alabama, Georgia, Utah, South Carolina and Indiana) passed harsh anti-immigrant measures that include burdensome E-Verify provisions, but many more rejected them or failed to consider them at all.

New York same-sex couples begin online marriage license applications. Same-sex couples in New York could begin filling out online applications for marriage licenses on Tuesday (July 5) -- just 11 days after a bill was passed in New York's State Senate on June 24th, legalizing gay marriage. The online applications, on the City Clerk's website, is one step in the marriage license process. Couples are still expected to appear in person to finalize the process and to collect the licenses, which will be issued on July 25th. The moment the licenses are issued, couple are free to wed. Many are hoping to tie the knot on the same day or soon after.

A growing number of Los Angeles police officers who have used excessive force, driven while intoxicated, falsely imprisoned people or committed other serious misconduct are being let off without punishment as part of a new, controversial approach to discipline at the LAPD.

7/11/2011**SECOND HAND SMOKE****JULIE FERRER - MIAMI, FLORIDA****PKG: 2:00**

There's an alarming new link between secondhand smoke and your children's health that you need to know about. Two new studies from the American Academy of Pediatrics look at how exposure can affect their brains. That secondhand smoke may be to blame for ADHD or other learning disabilities. The study results may have you kicking the habit right now, if not for you then for your children. Cassandra Peacock agrees. She is 10 days into a smoke free life. "I just decided after 15 years it wasn't worth wasting my time, money and energy," Peacock said. It's a decision she made not only for herself, but for her kids. "We haven't been people who would smoke inside the home generally because we have small kids -- we'd go outside," Peacock said. "But still -- the residual smell on your clothing. There are just so many reasons to quit." Here's another reason to quit: the American Academy of Pediatrics found that children exposed to secondhand smoke in the home had a 50 percent increased risk of developing childhood neurobehavioral disorders, like ADHD, compared with children who were not exposed at home.

7/13/2011**AIRPORT SECURITY BREACH****VO :23**

A Republican congressman wants to know why U.S. airports remain vulnerable to terror attacks nearly a decade after 9/11 and despite billions spent to enhance security, and he's holding a hearing Wednesday to find out. Rep. Jason Chaffetz of Utah says U.S. airports have sustained more than 25,000 security breaches since November 2001. That averages to slightly more than five security breaches a year at each of the 457 commercial airports. Chaffetz says the number of security breaches is "stunningly high," but a spokesman for the Transportation Security Administration says the number is a "tiny fraction of 1 percent" of the more than 5.5 billion travelers screened since 9/11.

U.S. President Barack Obama told Republicans during debt talks on Wednesday that "enough's enough," urging them to halt political posturing while the two sides seek a deal to increase the debt ceiling. Democratic officials familiar with the talks described the exchange to reporters. The officials said all sides backed some \$1.5 trillion in spending cuts to reduce the deficit.

The Maricopa County Sheriff's Office is investigating 31 workers at Mesa's Alpine Valley Bread bakery outlet as possible illegal immigrants who obtained their jobs through stolen Social Security numbers and fake driver's licenses. The sweep by Sheriff Joe Arpaio and deputies started about 10 a.m. Thursday. As of 2 p.m., 24 workers had been arrested and the bakery had closed as deputies continued to investigate other workers, according to Sheriff Joe Arpaio, who was at the business at 300 W. Southern Ave. No Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials were at the bakery Thursday morning, but Arpaio said he plans to continue cracking down on illegal immigrants who commit crimes to obtain their jobs and the companies who knowingly employ them during a time when many American workers are out of work.

When the sun rises above Los Angeles on Saturday, residents in this car-dependent, traffic-choked city will see a rare sight: a 10-mile stretch of one of the nation's busiest freeways turned into a virtual ghost road. Interstate 405, a freeway normally so clogged that locals like to joke that its name is shorthand for "traffic that moves no faster than 4 or 5 miles an hour," is closing for 53 hours for a major construction project. As crews worked feverishly to get the freeway open in time for Monday morning's rush-hour, residents have been making plans for weeks to stay off local roads, lest they trigger what officials dubbed "Carmageddon."

US DEBT SHOWDOWN**JULIE FERRER. MIAMI, FLORIDA****PKG 2:02**

Democrats and Republicans have been meeting behind closed doors on Capitol Hill to assess the debt limit situation, and they've emerged giving no ground on their hardened positions. Republicans say they're planning a vote next week on a balanced budget

constitutional amendment that would force the government to balance its books. President Barack Obama says there's no need for an amendment -- he says, "What we need to do is do our jobs." He says lawmakers shouldn't be getting this close to an Aug. 2 deadline to raise the debt ceiling without an agreement. Obama says he still wants to strike a big deal that would raise the debt limit as well as cut spending and raise revenues.
