7/1/15	25:00	#1354	We'll hear about two famous cousins in the Roosevelt family who took on public, powerful roles for women at the time; and a woman honors patients who died at a mental institution and a man in Nigeria ditches Barbie dolls for African queens.
7/8/15	25:00	#1355	We explore choices in a lifetime. First we'll hear from an author who wants to change the approach to exercise. Then we meet a woman honored with being her town's oldest resident followed by a teenager who wants the right to make her own medical decisions.
7/15/15	25:00	#1356	New York is home to new legislation combating sexual assault on college campuses; a woman talks about companies that hire workers with disabilities, a female comedian says there's more than just humor in her Disabilities Act; and a young woman provides art therapy to marginalized kids in Portugal.
7/22/15	25:00	#1357	A psychotherapist talks about healing and self-love, a Nobel laureate marks her birthday by opening a school for girls, and an essay on storytelling after the shooting at a Charleston church.
7/29/15	25:00	#1358	We hear about a book on First Ladies. Then, three young women head off for military life and we hear from a lawyer who says the U.S. criminal justice system is broken.
8/5/15	25:00	#1359	We explore pregnancy from two different angles. First, we hear from a mother who gave birth as a teenager in foster care. Then, a midwife talks about her profession and latest novel. While teen pregnancy has declined throughout the years, it has not for girls in the foster care system. They're two and a half times more likely to become pregnant by the time they're 19. Nicole Rocke was one of these young girls. Making Contact Reporter Leticia Miranda has Nicole's story from New York City.
8/12/15	25:00	#1360	Two mothers launch a math and science-themed clothing line for girls. We also have a story about a coveted red dye, and you'll hear from a few women about a mental health line for peers.
8/19/15	25:00	#1361	A Kurdish singer takes her message to the war zone; we check in with a mother who started a foundation after her son was fatally shot by police; and a writer shares a story about racism.
8/26/15	25:00	#1362	A woman hopes to help others caring for their aging parents, a female activist works to keep youth from fleeing an African country, and an anthropologist tells us about a macho sport involving birds.
9/2/15	25:00	#1363	It's living large with a same-sex couple from many decades ago; and women going to or teaching at the gym is commonplace in the U.S., but not in another country.
9/9/15	25:00	#1364	We talk about empowering women and men. First, a producer attempts to crack the mystery of men, and starts The Testosterone Project. Then, we hear from a few high-school students about feminism and gender equality.

And a women's choir sings without a director, by choice. College students are back in school and, over the past couple of years, governmental leaders and victims have increasingly called attention to sexual assault on campuses across the country. Using a pilot program at a college in Massachusetts, one company is working to combat the issue with technology.
