WCPE/WZPE/WURI determined that there were thirteen major issues of concern to people in the Triangle Bath and Manteo areas during the First Quarter 2022

Coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic. Unprecedented international & local health emergency.

As of March 29, 2022 in North Carolina, 2,842 cases have been reported. The previous week was 3,924. Hospital admissions were 401. The previous week was 524. 76% of adults are vaccinated and 50% boosted. 38% of children and teens vaccinated. The metrics are headed in the right direction. Mask mandates have been down-graded to "optional" in schools for all counties in Central North Carolina.

Classical Music Appreciation

Funding for area cultural organizations.

Growth: Raleigh-Durham was ranked as the #1 large market for housing construction growth last year as more people moved to the metro area.

Gun control. Since the beginning of 2022 in both Raleigh and Durham, nine people have been killed by gun violence in each city. This is major increase from this date last year.

Inflation: U.S. Inflation was 7.9% in February 2022, a rate that's a 40-Year High before Oil Spike. North Carolina gas prices average \$4.25.9.

Infrastructure: For North Carolina In the bipartisan bill over the next 5 years: \$7.2 billion for roads and highways. The State as more than 3,000 miles of highway in "poor" condition. \$911 million for public transportation. \$457 million for bridge construction and repairs. Currently, there are nearly 1,500 bridges considered in "poor" condition. \$440 million for clean water. And \$100 million for broadband.

Mid-Term Elections: The N.C. Supreme Court approved a third version of North Carolina's congressional districts for the 2022 election. Candidate filing began less than 12 hours later for the May 17 primary.

Supply Chain Issues: Raw-material shortages, factory closures, not enough truck drivers on the road, port congestion, high demand for ocean and air shipping, inadequate transportation infrastructure.

Issue: NEED FOR 24-HOUR CLASSICAL MUSIC BROADCAST STATIONS IN THE TWO COMMUNITIES OF RALEIGH-DURHAM, NC BATH, NC AND MANTEO, NC.

The Triangle Area (Raleigh-Durham-Chapel Hill, NC), is ranked as the 38th radio market in the United States. It's recognized throughout the nation for its involvement in the fine arts. One reason for the popularity of the arts is the concentration of three major universities in this area: Duke University in Durham, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and North Carolina State University in Raleigh. This area is also home for a number of smaller universities, two and four year colleges, many local music groups and a number of concert series that offer outstanding performances by both local and nationally known artists and orchestras.

On August 27, 2004, WZPE began introducing WCPE's *Great Classical Music* to the Bath, North Carolina area via satellite from WCPE's main studios in Wake Forest, NC. Initial listener reaction by telephone, mail and email has been most favorable. Several months will be required for the full impact of WCPE's classical music programming to be realized as new listeners in the Bath area and Beaufort County, NC discover WZPE now broadcasting on 90.1-FM.

Bath, North Carolina, founded in 1705 is known as North Carolina's Fourth town. It's located at the Pamlico and Pungo Rivers and the Pamlico Sound with easy access to the Atlantic Ocean. Bath remains a small village. Restoration efforts in Bath have saved the St. Thomas Church, the Palmer-Marsh House, Van Der Veer House (ca. 1790), and the Bonner House (ca. 1830). The original town limits are the boundaries for a National Register historic district. Tourism activities include golfing, boating, fishing, hunting and sightseeing. Other industries include agriculture, logging, manufacturing, phosphate mining, seafood, and textiles.

Manteo is a town in Dare County, North Carolina, United States, located on Roanoke Island. The population was 1,434 at the 2010 census. It is the county seat of Dare County. The town is named for an American Indian named Manteo, who was of the Croatans tribe of American Indians. Manteo had been "civilized" by the English during a trip to London in 1584 where he and another Indian, Wanchese, learned to become the liaisons between the Roanoke Colony settlers and the Indians, and had favorable interaction with British colonist John White. When the colonists disappeared after supplies from England were delayed for three years, the ongoing mystery of "The Lost Colony" began.

Surveys conducted over the past forty years continue to indicate the need for a 24-hour a day broadcast service of Classical Music in the Triangle area to fulfill important educational and entertainment requirements. This station is the only broadcaster in the Raleigh-Durham radio market to dedicate itself entirely to providing the service of classical music programming 24 hours a day.

Listener surveys are conducted daily through our Internet website. Periodically, mail questionnaires are sent to listeners in the station membership database. The continued written expression of the Need for a 24-Hour Classical Music Broadcast Station in the Raleigh-Durham, Bath and Manteo Communities, as well as comments made in person and on the telephone all support the type of educational programming provided by WCPE/WZPE/WURI.

THE THURSDAY NIGHT OPERA HOUSE

This program on WCPE/WZPE/WURI is designed to help develop an appreciation for opera. This long-established locally produced radio program, has been hosted and produced by the late Al Ruocchio, who passed away on February 8, 2007. Previously recorded Opera House programs from the WCPE archives continued to be broadcast between 7:00 p.m. and 10:00 one every month. Bob Chapman, an opera singer, dancer, and librarian was named the new WCPE Opera House host and his Opera House programs began airing on December 4, 2008. With the continuing development of the network, the program was re-named "The Thursday Night Opera House" in the spring of 2020.

February 3 Barber's Antony and Cleopatra Antony (Wells) leaves his mistress Cleopatra (Hinds) in Egypt and returns to Rome, where he's forced to marry Octavia, sister of Caesar (Grayson), leading to Antony's return to Cleopatra and their suicides.

February 10 Offenbach's Les Contes d'Hoffmann Poet Hoffmann (Gedda) is inspired by three muses (d'Angelo, Schwarzkopf, de los Angeles), but several villains (Ghiuselev, London, Blanc) conspire against him.

February 17 Puccini's La Fanciulla del West Saloonkeeper Minnie (Tebaldi) falls in love with a stranger, Dick Johnson (del Monaco), who's actually the bandit Ramirez, wanted by sheriff Jack Rance. (From the Ruocchio Archives.)

February 24 Suppé's Boccaccio Libertine Florentine poet Boccaccio (Prey) wins the hand of Fiametta (Rothenberger) after finding favor with her father, the duke (Böhme).

March 3 A Roman general makes a last stand in North Africa against the first Roman Emperor. Join former host Bob Chapman for Antonio Vivaldi's Catone in Utica this Thursday/tonight at 7:00 p.m. Eastern on the Thursday Night Opera House.

March 10 A young working class Frenchwoman escapes to Paris to avoid an arranged marriage. Join new host Jay Pierson for Gustave Charpentier's Louise this Thursday/tonight at 7:00 p.m. Eastern on the Thursday Night Opera House.

The results are then reported and discussed. "Classical Conundrum" questions and answers for the First Quarter 2022 are listed below:

January 3rd, 2022

Question: This pianist was born on January 28, 1887.

He was the youngest of seven children and his named was supposed to be "Leo" but, at the time, his 8-year-old brother said that giving him another name might make him a great musician. And - indeed - this man went on to become known as one of the greatest pianists of all time.

He passed away on December 20, 1982.

Answer: Artur Rubinstein

January 4th, 2022

Question: This violinist and composer was born in The Russian Empire on July 10, 1835. His father was a barber.

He published his first opus in 1847 at the age of 12.

His daughter was also a composer.

Answer: Henryk Wieniawski

January 4th, 2022

Question: This keyboardist and composer was born, we think, on November 18, 1860.

He is known as much for his music as he is for his politics, as he and his second wife are credited with enhancing Poland's diplomatic relations.

He also established a trust fund to encourage composition in the United States. He passed away while on tour in New York on June 29, 1941.

Answer: Ignacy Jan Paderewski

January 5th, 2022

Question: This Polish pianist was born in 1969 in Warsaw.

He has studied at the Chopin Academy and USC's Thornton School of Music.

Known to be a world class musician, he became widely known initially for a walk-off.

During the Leeds Piano Competition in 1990 he walked off stage because he thought that he had not been playing in a manner worthy of the competition.

Answer: Piotr Anderszewski

January 10th, 2022

Question: This clarinetist was born in Chicago, Illinois on May 30, 1909. He was one of twelve children.

For most of his life he was known as the "King of Swing," making jazz respectable in the eyes of many.

He led one of the first integrated jazz groups.

Toward the end of his life he grew interested in classical music, and added classical music to his performances, playing right up until the end of his life.

He passed away on June 13, 1986.

Answer: Benny Goodman

January 11th, 2022

Question: This clarinetist was born on July 12, 1942 in Omaha, Nebraska.

He went to Yale, Columbia, and Ohio State, and now teaches at the New England Conservatory and Boston University.

He gave the first clarinet recital ever at Carnegie Hall.

He was the first player of a wind instrument to be awarded the Avery Fisher Prize.

Answer: Richard Stoltzman

January 12th, 2022

Question: This clarinetist was born on March 30, 1959 in Germany.

Her very first teacher was her dad, who is also a clarinetist.

She was hired by Herbert Von Karajan in 1982 but her hiring cause controversy as she was one of the first women hired by the orchestra.

She was dismissed following her probationary period much to Von Karajan's dismay.

She went on to become a highly successful soloist.

Answer: Sabine Meyers

January 13th, 2022

Question: This clarinetist was born in Sweden on December 14, 1970.

He started playing the violin at the age of 5 but says he switched over to the clarinet after hearing Mozart's "Clarinet Concerto."

Both of his parents were string players.

In 2019 he was named the principal conductor of the Swedish Chamber Orchestra.

Answer: Martin Frost

January 17th, 2022

Question: This violinist and composer was born on September 3, 1695 in Bergamo.

We know very little about his life. He studied, we believe, under Arcangelo Corelli.

He had a passionate interest in literature, science, and ornithology. When he died he left behind a library of more than a thousand books and documents.

He passed away on March 30, 1764.

Answer: Pietro Locatelli

January 18th, 2022

Question: This concert pianist was born in Boston, Massachusetts on August 24, 1995.

He started playing piano at the age of 4 and made his orchestral debut at the age of 9.

Following his Carnegie Hall debut at the age of 11 he appeared on the Martha Stewart show.

Answer: George Li

January 19th, 2022

Question: This very versatile composer was born on March 22, 1948 in London.

Both of his parents were keyboardists.

His father was also a composer and his mother was also a violinist. His brother is a famous cellist.

He started writing music at the age of nine and has since composed more than 21 musicals.

He was knighted in 1992.

Answer: Sir Andrew Lloyd Webber

January 20th, 2022

Question: This composer was born in a part of Hungary now known as Slovakia on April 30, 1870.

He is best known for his work "The Merry Widow."

He passed away on October 24, 1948.

Answer: Franz Lehar

January 24th, 2022

Question: This classical guitarist was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

She began her studies at the age of nine in Italy.

Her father is a nuclear scientist.

She has won multiple Grammy awards and is known for her promotion of transcendental meditation.

Answer: Sharon Isbin

January 25th, 2022

Question: This musician was born on March 8, 1944 in Spain. The family moved to the United States when he and his brothers were young.

His father, also a guitarist and composer, was his only teacher. The two have performed together.

He taught for many years before becoming an adjunct professor at the USC Thornton School of Music.

Answer: Pepe Romero

January 26th, 2022

Question: This classical guitarist was born on December 14, 1947 in Los Angeles, California.

He started listening to the recordings of Andrés Segovia when he was an 11-year-old.

By the time he was 19 he was already touring.

He currently teaches at Pepperdine University.

Answer: Christopher Parkening

January 27th, 2022

Question: This classical guitarist was born in 1953 in Glasgow.

As a student he won the Julian Bream Guitar Prize twice and says that Andrés Segovia and Julian Bream were among his major influences.

In addition to playing the guitar he is also a golfer.

He studied at the Royal Academy of Music and was named a Fellow of the academy in 1997.

Answer: David Russell

January 31st, 2022

Question: This work was published in London in 1739.

It is known by its nickname, although composer Domenico Scarlatti was not known to have used it.

It is a one movement harpsichord sonata.

According to the story...Scarlatti had a pet named Pulcinella who often walked across his keyboard.

Answer: Cat Fugue

February 1, 2022

Question: This work was completed in 1901 and is thought to be the companion to "The Angora Ox."

It was composed by Eric Satie.

It was not published for many years and is thought to be an experimental work written as an homage to Debussy.

Answer: Dreamy Fish

February 2, 2022

Question: This particular movement is one of 14.

The whole work takes about 25 minutes to play and was originally written for a private performance and published in 1922.

The composer was Camille Saint-Saëns, who died in 1921.

This particular movement features a feathered friend known for its grace and elegance.

Answer: Carnival of Animals, the Swan

February 3, 2022

Question: Should a proper bird be able to swim or fly?

This bird swims safely to the middle of a pond but is later devoured in one of the most popular narrated classical tales of all time.

It was written by Sergei Prokofiev in 1936.

Answer: Peter and the Wolf, the Duck

February 7, 2022

Question: This symphonic poem was composed in 1870 by Richard Wagner.

It was written for his wife's birthday and was first performed during a private performance in Switzerland on Christmas Day.

It was almost eight years before he decided to sell it to a publisher.

Answer: Siegfried Idyll

February, 8 2022

Question: This work, often voted one of the most romantic of all time, was composed in 1801 and dedicated to one of the composers students in 1802.

It is Ludwig van Beethoven's Opus 27, Number 2.

What is the popular name of this work?

Answer: Moonlight Sonata

February 9, 2022

Question: This is the most popular part of Aram Khachaturian's ballet "Spartacus," which premiered in 1956.

It is also considered to be the most popular part of the movie "Spartacus," composed and conducted by Alex North.

It is in the air and the answer to today's Classical Conundrum.

Answer: Adagio of Spartacus & Phrygia

February 10, 2022

Question: This work is a set of three published in 1850 and composed by Franz Liszt.

The translation of its German title means "Dreams of Love."

The third in the set is the work played most often of the three.

Answer: Liebestraum No. 3

February 14, 2022

Question: This work is a suite written by Italian Composer Ottorino Respighi composed around 1928.

It is described as an attempt to translate the songs of this creature into music.

The one featured today is known for its song in the piece, and not the fluttering of its wings.

Answer: Respighi's "The Birds: The Nightingale"

February 15, 2022

Question: This piece is named for one that symbolizes peace.

It was written by Alfonso Ferrabosco the Younger who lived, we think, from 1578 to 1628.

Answer: Dovehouse Pavan

February 16, 2022

Question: This waltz is named after the beauty and proud independence of this great bird.

It was originally written as an encore in 1876 by composer, Jacques Offenbach, in honor of his first American tour.

Answer: American Eagle Waltz

February 17, 2022

Question: In the 1940 adventure film, Composer Erich Wolfgang Korngold, only took him seven weeks to complete this 96 minute score.

Many critics regard it as his best film music in his career.

Answer: The Sea Hawk

February 21, 2022

Question: This piece was written by Johann Sebastian Bach.

The final version of the fifth is the most popular.

Answer: Brandenburg Concerto

February 22, 2022

Question: This composer published his first book of harpsichord pieces in 1706 and his last in 1747.

He was born on September 25th, 1683, the seventh of eleven children.

He passed away in 1764.

Answer: Jean-Philippe Rameau

February 23, 2022

Question: This award-winning contemporary harpsichordist was born in 1984 in Tehran.

One of his primary goals is to make the harpsichord a mainstream instrument.

He currently lives in Prague.

Answer: Mahan Esfahani

February 24, 2022

Question: This classical artist is regarded as one of the leading performers of new music for harpsichord.

She was the former president of the Historical Keyboard Society of North America.

Her teachers have included Ton Koopman, and the late Gustav Leonhardt.

Answer: Elaine Funaro

February 28, 2022

Question: This composer was born on January 29th, 1862 in Bradford, England.

He famously lived in Florida for a while and that experience affected his work.

As we celebrate spring, he wrote "On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring in 1912."

Answer: Frederick Delius

3/1/2022

Question: Vivaldi is best known for his set of four concertos composed in 1723.

Vivaldi published the concerti with accompanying poems, possibly written by Vivaldi himself, that describes its freshness and beauty.

The first movement signals rebirth and is the world's most recognizable piece of Baroque music.

Answer: Spring from The Four Seasons

3/2/2022

Question: This piece contains an optimism that is rare among Jean Sibelius' works.

It was written in a single continuous movement for orchestra in 1894.

You can hear the bells ringing at the end of the song.

Answer: Spring Song

3/3/2022

Question: This composer was born in Argentina, 1921, but moved to New York City in 1924.

He immersed himself in the music culture of jazz, blues, classical – while his family exposed him to traditional Argentine music at home.

He moved back to Argentina in 1936, and there ensued a long and remarkable career as a composer of tangos.

Answer: Astor Piazzola

3/7/2022

Question: Born on May 31st, 1804 in Paris, France, she was known to be a great pianist and a composer of symphonies and chamber pieces.

She was hired as the only female professor in the nineteenth century at the famous Paris Conservatory.

She was also co-editor of a book on early music called “Treasure of Pianists.”

Answer: Louise Farrenc

3/8/2022

Question: After her husband’s death in 1856, she adopted the role of a “professional widow” as a tribute to her husband’s memory.

A gifted pianist and an accomplished composer, she devoted her life’s work to her husband, whose music she championed until her death in 1896.

Answer: Clara Schumann

3/9/2022

Question: Born on September 5th, 1867, she was by far the most prominent woman composer in the United States. She had over a 150 numbered works.

After the death of her husband, she spent 4 years in Europe. Her performances and compositions were widely acclaimed.

Answer: Amy Beach

3/10/2022

Question: This composer and violist was born on August 27th, 1886.

She is considered the most distinguished British female composer of her generation.

Though her works were later recognized for their compositional skill, they were revived when she reached her ninetieth birthday in 1976.

Answer: Rebecca Clarke

3/14/2022

Question: Born on September 5th, 1867, in Henniker, New Hampshire, she made her public debut as a pianist in 1883.

She was the first American Woman to write a symphony, and this was important because she received all her training in the U.S.

At her death she left more than 300 published works, and more of her music has been published in recent decades.

Answer: Amy Beach

3/15/2022

Question: Born on July 8th, 1882, in the city of Brighton, Australian-born American composer played a prominent role in British folk music in the early years of the 20th century.

He was heavily influenced by English folk music, which he arranged for keyboard instruments, chamber ensembles, and chorus.

He is probably best remembered for "Country Gardens".

Answer: Percy Grainger

3/16/2022

Question: We believe this American composer was born in the year 1867.

He performed at the World's Colombian Exposition in Chicago in 1893 and later went to study at George R. Smith College.

His career as a concert pianist and classical composer earn him the title "king of ragtime" during the 20th century.

3/17/2022

Question: This German composer and musician was born in November 1786 in the Holy Roman Empire.

His compositions were said to be a major source of inspiration for Chopin and Liszt.

Among his best known works are "Euryanthe" and "Oberon."

He passed away on June 8, 1826.

Answer: Carl Maria von Weber

3/21/2022

Question: This violinist was born on February 2nd, 1875 in Vienna, Austria.

At age seven, he entered the Vienna Conservatory.

He cause a major controversy in 1935, when he revealed that several "lost" works of great composers he had "discovered" were actually his own works.

Answer: Fritz Kreisler

3/22/2022

Question: Born on January 27th, 1756 in Salzburg, Austria.

At the age of three, he was picking out chords on the harpsichord, at four playing short pieces and at five composing.

He mastered his works by perfecting his existing forms which raised the symphony, sonata, and opera to new heights.

Answer: Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

3/23/2022

Question: Born on January 31st, 1797.

He received a thorough musical education and won a scholarship to a Chapel boarding school at the age of 10.

This Austrian romantic composer died at the age of 31, he was a prolific composer, having written some 600 works and nine symphonies.

Answer: Franz Schubert

3/24/2022

Question: He moved to Moscow in 1921 to study at the Moscow Conservatory. He was the first Armenian composer to compose the first Armenian ballet music, symphony, concerto, and film score.

Answer: Aram Khachaturian

3/28/2022

Question: Born on September 18th, 1972, in New York City.

This female pianist graduated from the Juilliard School.

Her breakthrough came with her New York debut at Carnegie Hall in 2005, where she played Bach's Goldberg Variations.

One of her recordings from 2007 went to the top of the Billboard Classical Chart in the first week of its release.

Answer: Simone Dinnerstein

3/29/2022

Question: Born in San Francisco on April 22nd, 1973, she was playing piano at the age of 4 and later joined the San Francisco Symphony's Youth Orchestra.

Her accomplishments as a performer, recording artist, writer, broadcaster and educator were recognized when she received the 2017 UC Davis Innovator of the year Award.

Question: Born in Detroit, on November 20th, 1937.
