In the past few weeks, between natural calamities, passionate protests, the UN General Assembly, we have seen some pretty dramatic human behavior... heroism in the face of disaster, hatred and violence over our differences, posturing and personal threats between the leaders of nations. If ...in taking all this in...you've ever wondered...what makes people do what they do??... we have the perfect guest for you this week on KCBS In Depth.

Dr. David Eagleman is a neuroscientist and adjunct professor at the Stanford School of Medicine, a best-selling author of several books on the brain... including The Brain-The Story of YOU...which was the companion to his international PBS Series.

Along with 4 start-ups involving the latest in brain research and technology, Dr. Eagleman heads the Center for Science and Law, a national non-profit working to better our criminal justice and corrections systems by understanding brain damage and illness in crime... ISSUE: The Failed ACA Repeal Effort, Medicaid and Medicare, Gun Violence

This morning our guest is Dr. Andres Bindman SF General UCSF We will discuss the failed ACA repeal effort, the continued sabotage of the law by the Trump administration, the new federal budget proposal targeting Medicaid and Medicare, and the AMA's stand on gun violence as an epidemic.

Just days ago the clock and support ran out for this fiscal year...on attempts to repeal the nation's health care program known as the Affordable Care Act.

There are now bipartisan efforts in the Senate to strengthen the ACA, and at the same time new efforts by the administration to discourage enrollment.

And... We have a 2018 proposed federal budget that picks up efforts to cut Medicaid and Medicare where the failed ACA repeals left off.

In the wake of last weekend's Las Vegas gun massacre... The entire American Medical

Community including The American Medical Association, The American College of Physicians, The American College of Surgeons has renewed calls for immediate action on what it has identified as a threat to public health... Gun violence.

We're going to talk about all of this with Dr. Andrew Bindman, Professor of Medicine, researcher, medical practitioner at Zuckerberg SF General... Part of the Phillip R. Lee Institute for Health Policy Studies at UCSF. His expertise on Medicaid policy and healthcare access was tapped in the drafting of some of the legislative language of the Affordable Care Act.

President Trump has followed through on his threats to decertify the Iran nuclear deal, reached in 2015 by the Obama administration, European allies and Iran...the product of more than a decade of diplomacy and successful cap on any military nuclear work by Iran.

The president's decertification does not totally scotch the agreement, but it does set up an opportunity for Congress to do so if it chooses to re-impose sanctions. The move in itself puts the agreement on shaky ground.

Joseph Cirincione is President of Ploughshares Fund, a global security foundation. He's a leading global expert on nuclear proliferation and disarmament.

Former vice president for National Security and International Policy at the center for American Progress.

ISSUE: THE OPIOID CRISIS

Our guest today is Doctor Anna Lembke, Chief of the Addiction Medicine Dual Diagnosis Clinic at Stanford. She's written a book on the prescription addiction crisis called 'Drug Dealer, M.D.': How Doctors Were Duped, Patients Got Hooked, and Why It's So Hard To Stop.

Surprising his staff and department heads a few days ago, president trump said that an emergency declaration on the national opioid crisis would be coming out this next week.

You may remember Mr.Trump also promised an emergency declaration in August which was supposed to include a plan to tackle the drug epidemic.

Politico has reported that federal health officials were blindsided by the President's unexpected announcement and are now scrambling to develop a plan. But funding for, and the type and reach of an plan remain unclear...

Other impediments to implementing an emergency declaration on the opioid crisis include empty desks at several top administration departments, which would have to be involved in the implementation:

The health department is without a secretary. Tom Price resigned last month after spending more than \$1 million in taxpayer money on private and government planes for travel.

The ACTING Director of the Drug Enforcement Administration ...Chuck Rosenberg...resigned last month in protest of the president's statements including those condoning police roughing up prisoners.

Mr. Trump's nominee to lead the Department of Homeland Security has not yet been confirmed. This is the department, which would work to stop the flow of illegal drugs including opioids...

And, the president's choice to head up the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Rep. Tom Marino, withdrew his nomination amid reports, including this network's program 60 Minutes, that he may have actually helped fuel the opioid crisis through a 2014 bill he introduced designed to make it harder for the DEA to stop distribution to drug abusers.

But, whether or not an emergency declaration is announced this week, any plan to tackle this health crisis must acknowledge how it began... and be willing to do what it would take to get a grip on what the Centers for Disease Control call an epidemic....

We spoke with Doctor Anna Lembke... Chief of the Addiction Medicine Dual Diagnosis Clinic at Stanford. She's written a book on the prescription addiction crisis called 'Drug Dealer, M.D.': How Doctors Were Duped, Patients Got Hooked, and Why It's So Hard To Stop.

Today she discusses; the drug industry's lie that opioids were not addictive when selling them to the medical community; doctor's reluctance to say no to patients asking for pain medication; lack of help for patients addicted and in need of alternative pain mitigation; and poor response from the government in recognizing the epidemic.

Every New Year brings new laws into effect... and one of the most anticipated of 2018 is the full legalization of marijuana. Of course, Medical cannabis has been legal in California for years, but in November of 2016 we passed prop 64, the Adult Use of Marijuana Act...and when the calendar turns officially to 2018, licensed cannabis businesses can begin selling to any adult.

This law is also bringing some big changes to the way marijuana makes its way to market, as well as the cost and accessibility of previously available medical marijuana products.

To get all the specifics, and the do's and don'ts of legalized marijuana in California, I'm joined once again on In Depth by Steve De Angelo, long time cannabis rights activist and CEO of Harborside Health Center... one of the largest and most respected medical cannabis dispensaries in the nation. In a matter of hours, it becomes a dispensary for all adult Californians.

What exactly happens on Jan 1? ? Medicinal vs commercial vs home growing?

Is there a roll out of legality dates after 1-1 depending upon local jurisdiction's preparedness?

Is the state control apparatus in place? Taxes?

How does it affect growers.. customers... prices... is it like other states which have set it up similarly to alcohol and tobacco distribution with a middle-person structure in place?

What about existing labs like yours? Are there now state labs?

Law enforcement... prepared for the issues of impaired driving?

It's still illegal, federally, so where do state jurisdictions and federal jurisdictions run up against each other? (border checkpoints, national parks, federal courthouses...)
