NOTEWORTHY INFORMATION REGARDING THE UPCOMING ELECTION

Elections tend to generate much interest among the electorate. However, confusion and misunderstanding often accompany the process and the particulars involved. For instance, in Tazewell County, there will be several different ballot styles due to the town elections that will be taking place concurrently in some – but not all – precincts. In those precincts where town elections do occur, not all voters live within the town limits. Therefore, some have one ballot style while others have a different one at the same polling place. Additionally, there are still some voters who are not familiar with the change from touchscreens to paper ballots. These two situations represent only two potential causes for voter confusion and frustration.

Furthermore, there have been numerous changes regarding elections that have occurred in the past several years. Local changes, in particular, have caused some bewilderment and no small amount of exasperation. For example, several precincts in Tazewell County were combined two years ago and one of the new precincts made its second relocation in as many years.

Brian Earls, Director of Elections and General Registrar for Tazewell County, did a radio interview with WGTH last year that appeared to be effective in clearing up some confusion regarding issues surrounding the 2018 election. Earls gave a summary of what would be appearing on the ballot and addressed the changes that were being made within the county, such as precinct consolidation. Based upon the questions that were being asked by voters (in person and by phone) regarding this year's election, Earls suggested that another interview would be helpful. Again, he used the opportunity to let potential voters know what would be on their ballots, according to the areas in which they reside. Since town elections were running concurrently, he explained that residents within town limits would have a different ballot from those outside town limits.

Many questions Earls' office received had to do with precinct relocation. He gave detailed directions to and descriptions of the most recent relocation. Other changes and answers to commonly asked questions were discussed. One other point of confusion was the relocation of the Registrar's Office that will take place after the election. Due to a local newspaper's article about the relocation, some voters had been led to believe that the office had already moved and wanted to know where to go to vote absentee in person. Earls explained that the new office facility was not yet ready, and the move would not happen until after the election.

ELECTION RETURNS

Election returns are much more readily available than in years and decades past. However, many of the listeners to WGTH are used to the election returns being broadcast every half hour on the night of the election, beginning shortly after the polls close and announced – along with additional information as it becomes available – until the winners are established. A sizable number of listeners do not have use of the internet, yet they enjoy knowing the results as quickly as possible. Of interest to a significant portion of the electorate are the returns from each individual precinct. Accessing the official Virginia Election website or waiting for the local paper to be published would be most people's options for getting this information if the returns were not broadcast on the radio.

Program: Election Returns broadcast live (by WGTH's Ron Brown)

Date and times: November 5, 2019, every half hour from 7:30 pm until 10:10 pm

Duration: Various from approximately 5 minutes increasing to 15-20 minutes as more precinct returns are posted

Listeners have come to expect reliable and instantaneous reports regarding election returns. This year, town elections were included which generated even more interest in local reporting.

Federal, state and local governmental leaders and law enforcement officers took part in the ceremony, along with the Richlands High School Air Force Junior ROTC Color Guard and the Richlands High School Brass Ensemble and Advanced Choir.
