Program Description: In response to the racial injustice and social justice issues that moved front and center with the death of George Floyd, students from Concord Carlisle High School's 'Intersections' club worked with WIQH to produce a 30 minute program during which they discussed systemic racism they've experienced at Concord Carlisle High School and in the Concord Carlisle communities. The six student panelists suggested improvements to school policies and changes the school community can make to provide a more just and inclusive experience for Black/Brown students and other People of Color. *Program Length: 30 Minutes*

Program Description: The second episode of "Cue The Culture", produced by Concord Carlisle High School's 'Intersections' club and WIQH, was a discussion of cultural appropriation, 'cancel culture', and colorism. The panel of high school students hosting the program pointed out their observations about these issues not just in the communities directly served by WIQH but also around the world. The panelists defined 'cultural appropriation', 'cancel culture', and 'colorism'. They provided examples of the practices and explained how these phenomena can be culturally demeaning and racially insensitive. *Program Length: 27 Minutes*

Program Description: The third episode of "Cue The Culture", produced by Concord Carlisle High School's 'Intersections' club and WIQH, included students from the club along with two teachers from the Concord Carlisle High School English Department. Discussion centered on the high school's English curriculum, beginning with how the school selects the literature students are assigned to read. The panel critiqued that literature's cultural and racial diversity – or lack thereof and analyzed, in broad terms, cultural biases inherent in many of the books. The program also considered revisions that could be made to the CCHS English curriculum to make it more representative of the diversity found in the high school's community.

The students and teachers joined in a critique of the high school's social studies curriculum. They posed, and then considered answers to, the questions, "How effectively does the school's social studies curriculum represent a diversity of cultural, racial, gender and sexual identity?", and "What can be done to broaden the curriculum's diversity?" The panelists also discussed the CCHS faculty's lack of cultural and racial diversity. The program included a brief conversation about how to increase diversity among the school's staff.

In answer to questions from the students, the teachers encourages young people to advocate for causes they consider important, and then presented ways to be successful activists. Adults and students alike discussed instances where they encountered privilege. The discussion concluded with strategies for ensuring that activism is inclusive and welcoming. *Program Length: 87 Minutes*

Program Description: Long time Georgia Congressman John Lewis was the featured speaker at a Concord Carlisle High School all-school assembly on November 5, 2001. Lewis came to CCHS in response to an invitation from one of the school's Social Studies teachers. To honor the legacy of Congressman Lewis upon his death in July 2020, WIQH rebroadcast the assembly in its entirety. Lewis spoke about his childhood, how he became a civil rights activist and how he ultimately ended up in the US Congress. He offered advice and encouragement to the school's students who were interested in politics, public service and activism. Lewis also spoke about how the United States government was handling the aftermath of the recent (at the time) September 11 terrorist attacks.

Also speaking at the assembly, and in the rebroadcast, was Martin Meehan who was, at the time a member of the Massachusetts delegation to the US House of Representatives.
