

Radio Health Journal - Radio Health Journal is a one-half hour radio magazine produced by Media Tracks Communications that keeps tabs on the latest in the world of medicine- breakthroughs, what medical advances to look for, and eye opening news. The show airs on Sunday morning at 5AM.

The Best Of Our Knowledge/Legislative Gazette –The Best Of Our Knowledge/Legislative Gazette is a one-half hour New York State (WAMC) produced discussion program focusing on education and New York State political issues. It is heard Sunday mornings between 6:00am and 6:30am, inside Sunday morning public affairs programming.

Issue- Health

Radio Health Journal 4/3/16 at 5:13AM (8 minutes)

- Studies have found that many doctors don't really listen to their patients, and so miss how illness is affected by the "other things" in life. Experts discuss how to help doctors consider the patient as a whole.

Radio Health Journal 4/10/16 at 5:13AM (8 minutes)

- Experts discuss symptoms and treatments of Meniere's disease, an often misdiagnosed disorder producing loss of hearing and crippling vertigo.

Radio Health Journal 4/17/16 at 5:00AM (12 minutes)

- Since FDA rules on prescription drug advertising were loosened in 1997, the amount of advertising has mushroomed. However, there is still controversy over whether that's good for patients, and now the American Medical Association has come out for an ad ban. Experts discuss the pro's and cons of direct to consumer advertising and its effect on patients and physicians.

Radio Health Journal 4/24/16 at 5:00AM (13 minutes)

- Diseases apparently have distinctive odors that humans can't detect. Researchers are using dogs, mice, rats and other animals to literally sniff out cancer and other diseases in the laboratory. In the 3rd World, rats are used to diagnose TB. Experts discuss the use of animals to diagnose disease and their efforts to build machines that can do the same thing.

Radio Health Journal 4/24/16 at 5:13AM (7 minutes)

- Many people confuse allergies, colds, and sinus infections. A physician specializing in these maladies describes the differences, and the new ways sinusitis can be treated.

Radio Health Journal 5/8/16 at 5:00AM (13 minutes)

- Freezing eggs in their 30's allows women to preserve fertility well into their 40's. The concept was originally meant for women whose fertility was threatened by disease or medical treatment, but today the majority of those having eggs frozen are doing so for social or career reasons. Now egg freezing is even offered as a corporate benefit in some places. Experts discuss the procedure and its uses.

Radio Health Journal 5/8/16 at 5:13AM (8 minutes)

- Behavioral similarities between prodigies and some people with autism have long been noted. Now some researchers are beginning to find genetic links between the two phenomena. Experts discuss findings and their implications for autism treatment.

Radio Health Journal 5/15/16 at 5:00AM (12 minutes)

- Homeless Americans have a life expectancy of only around 50, and often use the ER for primary care at a huge cost. The lack of followup care for their illnesses and the mental health or substance abuse disorders common in this population add up to an enormous health burden. Experts discuss how doctors on the street can improve health for the homeless and lower cost for society.

- Major League Baseball teams spend \$1.7 billion annually on pitchers, yet it is an extremely risky investment. Teams haven't figured out how to prevent all-too-frequent arm injuries, which are now filtering down to children as well. A journalist who investigated the science of pitching injuries explains.

- Bleeding disorders such as hemophilia and von Willebrands disease can be extremely serious, but today are very treatable. However, many people who've had these disorders for some time fight the legacy of more primitive treatment, such as HIV and hepatitis C. Experts including a hemophilia patient explain.

- Bladder cancer is the fourth most frequent cancer in men. However, research into the disease has been slow. The newly appointed director of the world's only research center devoted exclusively to bladder cancer discusses risks and treatments.

- As a survival mechanism, the human brain is wired to remember negative events more strongly than positive ones. An expert neurologist discusses changes in thinking that can create more positive physical brain pathways, making us happier.

Radio Health Journal 6/5/16 at 5:00AM (12 minutes)

- When doctors can take advantage of massive amounts of data on patient outcomes, lives will be saved. We look at one of the first efforts, an attempt to associate dangerous drug interactions, and the difficulty in convincing other doctors that "crunching numbers" can provide adequate proof. A researcher and reporter involved in the case explain.

Radio Health Journal 6/5/15 at 5:13AM (8 minutes)

- Some people who need a kidney transplant have immune systems so sensitive they will reject almost any organ. Experts explain a new desensitization technique that may help them and kidney exchanges that make more patients eligible for transplants.

- It's a rare thing for people to lose their memory of past events. An expert discusses why doctors believe it may occur, and a woman to whom it happened recounts her experience.

- Pain is an often misunderstood reality for millions of people. A noted university professor who became a quadriplegic in a bicycle accident discusses her constant pain and the way it changes life.

- Kidney stones in children and adolescents used to be unusual. Over the last 30 years, they've become much more common. Experts discuss why this may be occurring, why doctors still sometimes miss the diagnosis, and how kidney stones are treated in children.

- Gluten free diets have taken the world by storm and some experts say for people who do not have celiac disease, the diets can do much more harm than good. One such expert explains which kinds of people would find the diet appropriate and the pitfalls to avoid.

- For more than 10 years, hospitals have been plagued by shortages of important drugs, sometimes forcing doctors to decide who will receive them, and who will die. Experts explain why these shortages occur, the unfortunate outcomes, and what they do to try to minimize the damage.

- The Governor's explanation of some of the circumstances of a US Attorney's probe into his administration has left some unanswered questions, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on that probe and the sentencing of Sheldon Silver, and two New York politicians announce they're leaving politics.

- Many children are bullied especially in the middle school years, but kids with disabilities are about twice as likely to be victims. Experts discuss the problem and how parents and schools can work together to prevent bullying of these children.

- Summary: Fingers meets with Don Gomo from the Empire State Motorcycle Safety Education Program The goal of ESMSEP is to go out and provide free informational education to drivers and motorcyclists about the risks associated with motorcycling and how we can take steps to minimize them through increased awareness and learning.

The Legislative Gazette 6/5/16 at 5:30-6am (25 minutes)

- Questions remain over what exactly Governor Cuomo's special prosecutor is investigating in response to a federal probe, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on his conversation with Assembly Minority Leader Kolb about the continuing federal investigation, and New York joins a worldwide effort to discourage tobacco use.

- Doctors are attempting suicide in high numbers, and are much more likely than the general population to complete it. Experts discuss the coverup of doctor suicides, the reasons behind depression in doctors, and why doctors who are depressed are less likely than normal to get help.

- Increasing recalls for food contamination have scared many Americans. A noted expert discusses why contamination scares are becoming more common, what government and producers are doing to protect us, and what we can do in our own kitchens to make foods safer.

- Summary: Brando meets with guests from the Long Island Council on Alcoholism & Drug Dependence (LICADD). They discuss how to get affordable, confidential help for yourself, family members or friends. They provide information and facts about drugs and alcohol, explain how to make healthy decisions, and discuss some of the workshops that the LICADD provides for kids, teens, parents and professionals.

- As the legislature wrapped up the 2016 session, just two ethics proposals remained, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on the end of session, and federal, state and local officials update residents of Newburgh about PFOS water contamination.

Charter Schools are public schools of choice, meaning that families choose them for their children. They operate with freedom from some of the regulations that are imposed upon district schools.
