

Quarterly Issues 2016

Jan 1 It is New Year's Day. We reported on a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that indicates the use of excessive alcohol is a drain on the American economy by \$249 billion. We shared various statistics and estimates and encouraged those who may have an alcohol problem to get help this year.

Jan 4 We reported on World Magazine's article under religious liberty the update on the bakers in Oregon who were ordered to pay huge fines for refusing to bake cakes for homosexual weddings. We learned two days ago that the state of Oregon seized all the family's bank accounts even while appeals were being made. The Kleins maintain that the Constitution protects from being forced to participate in something that violates their conscience and religious beliefs.

Jan 5 In our continuation of coverage of loss of religious freedom in America, we reported on a doctor who lost his appeal at a hospital and was fired because he would not perform operations to alter a person's gender. He contended, saying both scientific evidence as well as religious conscience prevented him from performing the operations.

Jan 6 Being the new year, we discussed resolutions. Research shows that health was the number one resolution, followed by relationship with God, use of time, and improved relationships. We discussed the top 3 for four minutes at 440 and shared the most common and successful approaches to succeed according to the research.

Jan 7 We had extensive rains, and three of the states in our coverage area, and therefore, throughout the day, we have issued flood warnings on many of the rivers. We alerted the public and carried points of action from various agencies to ensure the safety of our listeners.

Jan 8 We carried Focus on the Family at 8am and 730 pm, as they discussed how to help single and teenaged mothers. They offered how families and churches can assist these moms and families to help keep them from the statistical poverty and crime rates.

Jan 11 We discussed a hot political topic of the day which is Politically correct speech, or newspeak as George Orwell called it. We cited an example this week of a college freshman who was arrested last month after he said stated that he was worried he was going to bomb the exam. His term usage was that he worried he was going to fail, but the bomb squad was called out, and he was arrested. Our interest was to encourage

truth and better communication but not to succumb to the political correct speech that is destroying language and understanding.

Jan 12 We carried an 8 minute segment at 505 that discussed pain and suffering and offered some advise on how people in our audience that are experiencing difficult times could avail themselves to the various help that is available to them as they attempt to make sense of their situations.

Jan 13 At 410 for 3 minutes, we reported on a religious freedom issue in South Carolina where lawmakers have proposed a law that would withdraw recognition of “same-sex marriage”. The idea is to obstruct the Supreme Court overreach by making it illegal for state officials to issue marriage licenses to homosexual couples.

.Jan 14 At 420 for 3 minutes, we highlighted points from this week’s State of the Union address. We offered commentary and outcomes as well as discussing the overall tenure of this presidency on the legal and cultural impact on our communities.

Jan 15 Presidential candidate Ted Cruz launched a homeschool coalition along with a new video explaining his stand on school choice. We discussed the impact of homeschooling and private education, and how the federal government can restore power back to the states, local government and ultimately parents that it has taken over the past decade.

Jan 18 Religious Freedom day was Saturday, and as it turns out, 4 political prisoners in Iran were released, giving us the opportunity to report the story and explain the purposes of the day, since religious freedom is at great risk.

Jan 19 Covered a press release by the state Fire Marshal on steps to take to protect one’s home and family during these cold days. Fire deaths increase by 63% in the winter months; so we gave out the recommended fire safety tips.

Jan 20 As a non-profit, we updated the audience on secure donations to charitable organizations. The IRS had proposed last year that non-profits collect social security numbers. There was such an outlash that the IRS backed down and withdrew the proposal a few days ago. With cyber security risks and the reputation the IRS has garnered by targeting conservative groups, this was a significant accomplishment.

Jan 21 At 440 for 2 minutes, we announced this weekend’s events, and we described to our listeners how to access our free public service announcements for on air as well as event calendar

Jan 22 We have a massive blizzard moving into our area. We have issued several winter storm warnings, we have advised people how to prepare for emergencies, and we have discussed cancelled flights as well as fire hazards as temperatures plummet.

Jan 25 This is tax season. We discussed the increased taxes, premiums, deductibles and penalties associated with Obamacare. We also described Christian health care alternatives that can reduce the costs of monthly expenses, but can still pay for health care.

Jan 26 Updated our listeners on a Freedom of Religion issue, where American citizen had been held and tortured for 3.5 years in Iran. He was just released in a prisoner swap, and we gave updates and details of his release

Jan 27

Jan 28 Reported on a story where a high school has implemented Islamic teaching into their curricula at 420 for 4 minutes. We presented what they were teaching, whether students could opt out (they could not) and kickback from the community. We discussed pluralism in this nation as well as the establishment clause.

Jan 29 Interviewed Gerry Callioute from a 30 minute weekend show we carry. He is conducting a one day seminar next week, and we talked at 505 for 10 minutes about hunting, fishing, camping, and outdoor activity, but we discussed how churches and communities can use these activities to pull a community together and create small groups of citizens that otherwise would have been alone.

Feb 1 Today is the last day to register to vote for the upcoming primaries in Georgia and North Carolina. We announced this and gave information as to how folks could register to vote today.

Feb 2 Carried a story where a group of 300 scientists and academics want the U.S. Congress to investigate the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration for cooking the books on climate data in order to erase the pause in the rise in temperature cited by the IPCC. Climate change dogma has resulted in higher taxes for us, increased regulation, and overall, a loss of freedom. One of the most significant problems has come from the falsification of data and the resulting impact on the average American.

Feb 3 There is an increasing danger to unborn babies from a virus spread by mosquitos. We shared information from the World Health Organization. We also gave practical tips for protection against mosquitos.

Feb 4 We had unusual weather with tornadic and flash flood activity throughout our listening area. We ran updates, bulletins, alerts and gave instruction as to action to take if severe weather threatened any of our listeners.

Feb 5 Carried a 25 minute show, Family Talk, and they discussed the military, and how we can better serve both active members, families, and veterans. We have several military installations in our coverage area.

Feb 8 Interviewed Ian Bultman about a new show we are carrying calling the Brinkman Adventures. It is a Radio Drama, but it tells real stories of how people are making a difference in the world. They provide avenues for listeners to reach out to the real life people in order to find opportunities to volunteer and serve.

Feb 9 We carried a 30 minute show call Family Talk at 930. The topic was Adult Children of Alcoholics. They covered a variety of issues of how alcoholism had impacted them growing up and tools to make changes now. There were 13 common issues that are in homes of families of alcoholism.

Feb 10 We reported on a religious freedom issue at 510 for 3 minutes. A county clerk objected to granting same sex marriage licenses; so the Governor granted a religious accommodation, changing the forms, so she would not have to sign them. The ACLU wanted to force her to violate her conscience, but a federal court upheld her right.

Feb 11 Discussed the tension between the states and federal government at 520 for four minutes. This election cycle is showing a lot of Americans are angry at the way politicians ignore them in favor of a political agenda. We cited a news story where Tennessee has now become the 5th state signing a bill to call for a Convention of states as outlined in the Constitution article 5.

Feb 12 Updated our audience of a Freedom of Religion concern. Open Doors USA revealed that 2015 was the worst year in modern history in terms of Christians being persecuted for their faith. The killing of Christians nearly doubled.

Feb 15 Reported on the Pastor Protection Act passed last week in the Georgia Assembly that protects religious officials and churches from being forced to imitate marriage ceremonies for same sex couples and was approved 161-0 in the house and was moving on to the state senate.

Feb 16 Covered the story of the recent and tragic death of Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia. The implications of how the court will argue cases concerning religious liberty, abortion, and gun rights are significant. Justice Scalia affirmed the Constitution and interpreted it along originalists ideas which preserved its original intent. He believed in natural law as did the Founders; so his absence creates an opportunity for relativists and reconstructionists to change our nation through their interpretation.

Feb 17 We carried a commentary about the government's decision to open up combat roles for women. A 1981 Supreme Court decision upheld different treatment for women for not being drafted based on the legal decision that they could not be forced into combat. If this administration confirms an egalitarian ideology, it endangers the legal standing of women in the draft. We discussed this at 520 for 4 minutes.

Feb 18 We covered the make the vote count at the Georgia State capitol. Many of our listeners attended and participated in contacting family and friends about voting and the political positions of each candidate

Feb 19 We reported on a story of how and why Syrian Christians are fleeing their country. The confiscation of their property and the killing of their people is at an all time high, but since our government refuses to recognize ISIS as a legitimate government oppressing Christians, very few Christians are allowed to come here under persecution laws. This is a very significant position on religious freedom

Feb 22 We are continuing our coverage on the call for a Constitutional Convention to give power back to states. Tennessee has become the fifth state to approve legislation under Article V of the Constitution.

Feb 23 Many of our listeners support and volunteer for the various Crisis Pregnancy Centers throughout the southeast. We interviewed Susan Swanson at 505 for 7 minutes about the efforts they are doing, the progress they make each week and the closing of the neighborhood abortion clinic and how that will impact the community and women's and babies' health.

Feb 24 Interviewed Ian Bultman with the Brinkman Adventures, a new show we are carrying. It is a weekly drama that portrays real life stories. The idea behind the show is to make folks aware and to encourage them to be bold and do good things in society.

Feb 25 We reported on the latest data from Open Doors USA that tracks global persecution. Although there is a lot of talk about tolerance, persecution, especially among Christians has doubled in the past year. We attempted to make folks aware of this growing dilemma.

Feb 26 Reported on cyber security at 420 for 3 minutes. We explained how state agencies are trying to implement safeguards and steps people can take to protect their identities especially during this tax season.

Feb 29 We promoted events coming up this weekend. We explained how folks can utilize our free public service announcements, and spoke of several events.

March 1 Carried the 30 minute show Family Talk at 930. The topic of discussion was childhood abuse, how to identify it, how to stop it, and how to help victims recover. At the conclusion of the show were references people could go for more information.

March 2 In regards to the ever increasing protection of privacy rights, we continued coverage today at 440 for 3 minutes of the congressional hearings regarding the FBI and the encryption of an Apple I Phone. Law enforcement does not just want a warrant and

the company give them access to a phone used by a criminal, they want a “master key” that will unlock all phones for them.

March 3 Only one week after our last report, We are continuing our coverage on the call for a Constitutional Convention to give power back to states. Indiana has now become the sixth state to approve legislation under Article V of the Constitution.

March 4 We served the local community by promoting events coming up this weekend throughout the area, and we explained how listeners can access our free public service announcements.

March 7 At 510 for 5 minutes, we interviewed a citizen of United Arab Emirates here on a temporary visa. We discussed Immigration, and the how the rest of the world loves the U.S. and needs this country to be strong so as to protect the world against tyrants, dictators, terrorists, and communism. They strongly suggested we secure our borders and vet all immigrants...its what the rest of the world does.

March 8 At 450 for two minutes, we discussed early childhood development and the research that shows the importance of introducing certain ideas, concepts and values are the most important in the first few years of life.

March 9 We interviewed a nurseryman at 505 for 10 minutes. He explained what needed to be done for lawns, fertilizer, pruning, and planting.

March 10 At 510 for 4 minutes we promoted all the events coming up this weekend. We also spoke about how listeners can use our free public service announcements and website community board.

March 11 Representatives in the state of Georgia approved a measure that would give pro-life women’s centers as much as \$2million a year to help expectant mothers. We interviewed Susan Swanson about how this measure helps women across the state.

March 14 Reported on a Freedom of Religion Bill that passed congress today. It gives the Executive Branch authority to declare the Christians who are being executed and run out of their property by ISIS to be recognized as an official act of persecution. If the Secretary of State does this by Thursday, Christians in Syria can apply for entry here in the United States

March 15 We carried the 30 minute show Family Talk at 930am. The panel discussed forgiveness, and how people can learn to forgive and become free from when someone has injured them.

March 16 There was extreme weather in our Mississippi/Alabama area with severe flooding that required evacuations. Throughout the day we gave bulletins and

information for those listeners as well as informing the rest of the area of ways they could volunteer and help those in need through disaster relief organizations.

March 17 Reported on the human rights issue and Religious Freedom concern regarding Christians in the middle east. After tens of thousands of deaths, property loss and refugee status, the U.S. Congress has declared this as genocide. We explained the definition and technical terms of what that means for our ability to help them. The Secretary of State has agreed with Congress, but the President seems to be wavering on this unanimous decision.

March 18 Carried Family Talk at 930 for 30 minutes. They discussed how to organize and establish Boy and Girl clubs and organizations in a community to help develop character.

March 21 Interviewed a veterinarian about a ground-breaking open heart surgery at 545 for 5 minutes. We discussed the implications of this surgery for pets, livestock, and other animals . The success of this operation sets a positive precedent for the future care of animals

March 22 We carried the call in show Money Wise at 6pm for 25 minutes. It allows our listeners to call in about financial questions as they cover a variety of topics.

March 23 Since the Brussels suicide bombing this weekend, we discussed how Immigration policies that are at the forefront of this political season have contributed towards terrorism. Listeners are extremely concerned that we are going to see an increase in terrorist activity throughout the world, including the U.S. We covered 3 solutions that are being offered by the candidates.

March 24 We reported on the Supreme Court hearing where thousands gathered outside the courthouse. The decision is the Zubik v. Burwell, where the Obama administration is requiring even religious groups to provide abortion inducing drugs through their health care plans. This is a huge religious issue at stake.

March 25 Followed up on the story where Charlotte, NC adopted a rule that would have allowed people to use gender-specific public restrooms and locker rooms of their choice. This issue has huge concerns from privacy to religion to safety. The Council overlooked thousands of concerned citizens. This would have also impacted anyone visiting the city. So the North Carolina legislature and Governor signed into law a bill that overturns the Charlotte measure and defines biological sex as the physical condition of being male or female, not choice. The Governor said Charlotte had defied common sense.

March 28 After the President said there was no difference between Capitalism and Socialism, we carried a commentary by economist Chuck Bentley to outline the

differences and explain the practical outcomes of how each economic philosophy is carried out by government and policies. We also discussed the fallacy that the Bible teaches socialism, which it does not.

March 29 Carried the 30 minute show Family talk at 930. Today, the panel discussed specific ways to work on families to facilitate a healing and restoration among the family members

March 30 We carried the 30 minute show Focus on the Family at 830. They discussed how common it is for women to suffer emotionally after having an abortion. This distress can continue throughout their lives if not addressed. They discussed how to find healing and hope.

March 31 Gave continued coverage to the new law in North Carolina that overruled an ordinance that would have allowed people to use gender-specific public restrooms and locker rooms of their choice. This issue has huge concerns from privacy to religion to safety. The Council overlooked thousands of concerned citizens. This would have also impacted anyone visiting the city. So the North Carolina legislature and Governor signed into law a bill that overturns the Charlotte measure and defines biological sex as the physical condition of being male or female, not choice. The Governor said Charlotte had defied common sense. Now the state Attorney General says he will not defend the new law. Many are calling for his resignation.

Second Quarter

April 1 Carried the 30 minute show Money Wise at 6:00pm. This is a call in show that gives our audience an opportunity to ask questions about money, budgets, debt, retirement, investing, estates and other aspects of personal finances.

April 4 Discussed an interview Democratic Presidential candidate Hillary Clinton had on Meet the Press yesterday. In her defense of abortion, she claimed unborn persons do not have constitutional rights, however, by using the word persons, she used a legal term that contradicts her statement. All persons have constitutional rights. It was a hot topic for people on both sides of the issue.

April 5 We carried the 30 minute show Family talk at 930am. Today, they discussed Autism, how it impacts the person and the family. They discussed care, and how families and churches can help support families who have a member with autism.

April 6 Carried the 30 minute show Focus on the family at 800am. They discussed how to develop a life of character, and how to encourage others to live a life of character as well.

April 7 Followed up on a Freedom of Religion issue, which is a huge concern for our audience at 440 for 3 minutes. We continued with the story where the school teacher would not allow her student to read his Bible in his free time, which is clearly a constitutional violation. The family had to acquire legal help, which provided the win, but we also looked at the teacher to discuss how world view and personal morality impact daily decisions and ethics.

April 8 Reported on the growing hostilities at political events. Organizers are hiring people to disrupt freedom of speech and attempt to shut down rallies. Yesterday, protesters attacked former President Bill Clinton, but he doubled down and called the protesters out. The lack of civility is lending to climate of intimidation and bullying for speaking personal thoughts

April 11 We continued today with our Freedom of Religion and Freedom of speech concerns at 440. We cited Professor John McAdams of Marquette University has been suspended because he defended a student's right to defend traditional marriage without being bullied and demeaned.

April 12 We carried the 30 minute show Family Talk at 930. The topic was how parents can change their talking strategy to better influence teenagers.

April 13 After this weekend's delegate fight in Colorado, we spent four minutes at 515 explaining some of the rules for delegates, how the parties choose candidates, and what role the voters have in the process

April 14 With all the discussion on North Carolina's bathroom bill, we referenced Canada's law that did the opposite. We cited where a biological man who claimed to be a woman gained access to a Women's Shelter, where he sexually assaulted two women. Although he is in jail, we affirmed the common sense of privacy and protection the law should provide.

April 15 Continuing with yesterday's discussion regarding the bathroom bill, we explained how and why businesses seemed to be against the state of North Carolina. We outlined how the "Human Rights Campaign" has carefully orchestrated a campaign that threatened businesses and corporations to fight this legislation or become blacklisted

April 18 At several times throughout the day, we explained the 3 day delay beyond April 15 for tax deadline and encouraged listeners to still file even if they had to file an extension.

April 19 Discussing the volatile moral issues that have been on the national platform for the last few months, we discussed

April 20 The Supreme Court has heard a case and is now debating a Religious Freedom case in conjunction to health care mandates. According to the Marist Poll released 2 days ago, the public is against the government by an overwhelming 21 point margin. It has placed the court's opinion in a delicate position. We discussed the tension and implications for our listeners of the potential outcomes.

April 21 Another Religious Freedom issue. We discussed at 420 for 3 minutes a doctor in Georgia who is also a lay minister. After he was hired last month to work for the Georgia Department of Public Health, some fellow employees spent hours reviewing his online sermons. Because he addressed social, cultural and other matters in his sermons, he was terminated because his viewpoints did not coincide with his employer. He has filed a lawsuit. The implications that in America, one's personal beliefs and views cannot be tolerated is troubling to many who call us.

April 22 At 520 for 2 minutes, we issued a warning of a scam that is targeting smart phone users. We used the opportunity to educate our listeners about phishing schemes and unsolicited texts and emails that ask for personal information.

April 25 Since Utah kick started a national discussion by declaring a resolution that pornography is a public health hazard, we discussed the pros and cons at 520 for 5 minutes. Citing research and their resolution, it is clear that pornography is linked to aggression, the breakdown of families, and can be addictive in nature. However, the biggest obstacle to the government taking action against it, would be the ability to limit or even abolish freedom of speech.

April 26 With the new ruling from the U.S. District Court, we explained how the new North Carolina law requires voters who appear in person to vote to present an accepted form of photo identification. The law also eliminated same-day registration and reduced the early voting days.

April 27 At 505pm We discussed continuing research that shows the value of having a daily meal together with your family and loved ones. For children, it will raise their grades by one letter. It also gives important interaction with varying age groups, instilling values, and knowledge.

April 28 We shared a story at 410 how a 26 year old man was reconnected with his mother after being abducted 22 years earlier. We discussed the prevalence of human trafficking and its various forms, as well as how to look for signs. We gave out help lines and told of agencies that handle this kind of crime.

April 29 We carried a report at 515 for 2 minutes about the increased number of people crossing the border illegally. Over 10,000 a month are entering. We discussed the laws and how all of this is compromising our national security.

May 2 At 505 we carried a six minute clip by Family Life, discussing ways to improve marriage. We will play the second part tomorrow at the same time.

May 3 At 505, we carried the second part of a Family Life program discussing ways to improve a marital relationship.

May 4 Carried 30 minute show with Gary and Erin Smalley that addressed families on how to plan a summer to benefit the whole family and create meaningful relationships among the generations.

May 5 We explained how listeners could utilize our free airtime for public service announcements. We then announced and promoted several events that have been submitted

May 6 At 510 for 4 minutes we discussed last year's protest at University of Missouri and the fallout today. After all the problems that came to the surface, enrollment is down 25%, and donations are down 72%. The result is millions of dollars. We discussed how parents are changing their minds about sending their children off to universities where there is no accountability and ideas contrary to home values are taught.

May 9 North Carolina passed the bill making men use male bathrooms and women use female bathrooms. The Federal government is suing the state, so we discussed the issue asking questions: what is a man? How do you know if you aren't one, what does being a woman feel like, what is gender? Are just the physical differences significant?

May 10 After the storms swept through last night causing damage and death in the Midwest, we spent 3 minutes discussing alerts, watches, and warnings. We explained why safety concerns should be taken seriously, and how people can prepare for severe weather.

May 11 With the election cycle under way, we discussed the grass roots movement of rural voters across the country who are concerned about Federal land grabs and oppressive EPA regulations. Several people are running for political office to try to return power to the states.

May 12 We reported on the upcoming Republican national convention in July. Although a candidate will be put forward, the debate over the platform and what the party stands for has just begun. Issues like pro-life, definition of marriage, and other societal and cultural issues are slated to be debated.

May 13 We promoted events and explained how listeners and organizations can use our free airtime for public service announcements.

May 16 Carried the 30 minute show Money Wise at 6pm. It is a call in show for our listeners to ask financial advice on anything regarding money.

May 17 We reported at 420 for 4 minutes on the Supreme Court decision to send the case back down to the lower courts to work it out. The case is a conflict of the Obamacare mandate and religious liberty. At the center of the case is the Little Sisters of the Poor. Because other cases have been bunched together with this, it is good news for religious freedom.

May 18 Last Friday, the Obama administration issued a directive to all public schools and colleges to allow transgender students access to single sex bathrooms consistent with their Identity. This is a significant issue, and our listeners are overwhelmingly angered and want to know how to stop the insanity. Several states are standing up to the government, and as well as moral implications for our communities, we see a potential of real threat to public schools as we know it.

May 19 We carried a 6 minute segment on six steps to improve your marriage by Family life Today at 505

May 20 We announced several events at 540 for 3 minutes, and explained to the listeners how they can access and utilize our free public service announcements.

May 23 Reported on the vote looming in Congress on whether the U.S. Selective Service System should call up women as well as men in a draft. The vote is tomorrow, and we covered the details of the bill to allow our listeners to weigh in with their Senators.

May 24 Promoted a last minute called meeting for parents called the protect our students tonight at 6pm. Parents are concerned with curricula as well as the safety of students with the talk of removing limitations on bathrooms.

May 25 We carried a report from World Magazine about the investigation into the Egypt Air crash. While the investigation is underway, we addressed the concerns travelers have for security as they plan to go to historic sites this summer. The alarm of terrorism is having a huge impact on tourism to Egypt and now to France. We discussed security at these places.

May 26 At 505 for 3 minutes, we reported on the Supreme Court issued opinion involving the Little Sisters of the Poor. This is a huge victory for religious freedom in that the government was trying to force non profits to pay for abortion causing drugs or face fines that would put them out of business.

May 27 At 420 for 4 minutes we listed five things our audience can do about transgender restrooms. This was from an editorial piece by Eric Metaxis and how church people can navigate these political waters.

May 30 Being memorial Day, we ran patriotic music, and we pre-recorded messages that explained the holiday, and how Americans have given their lives to secure Freedom.

May 31 The Washington Post conducted a poll among Native Americans regarding their attitudes towards sports teams using Indian mascots, specifically, the Redskins. Their findings agreed with our audiences' from just a year ago, that 9 in 10 are not offended at all. This is significant as we measure offenses and the impact of politically correct speech, and the assault on the first Amendment.

June 1 We interviewed Nick Eicher from World Magazine about why lawmakers fear standing up for religious liberty. In today's climate, the media tends to equate religious liberty with a license to discriminate. As a religious station, this is of great interest to our listeners.

June 2 A Medical journal published last month that medical errors in hospitals and other facilities are common and are now the third leading cause of death every year. We shared the details of the report and offered steps our audience could take to minimize errors during a hospital stay.

June 3 The medical journal obesity biology and integrated physiological journal followed the lives of 14 contestants from a weight loss reality show for six years, and concluded the people regained the weight. We discussed the bad news of rapid and extreme weight loss, and offered research on gradual, life style weight loss as a healthy and practical means of overcoming obesity.

June 6 We cited the National Survey of Family growth and showed the correlation between support of homosexual marriage and the decline in marriage overall. There is a direct link to the fracturing of the family as traditional norms are degraded.

June 7 Since the announcement by our President that anyone can use the bathroom of whatever sex they identify with, we continue to report how parents are pulling their children out of public schools and going private or home schooled. Texas Lt. Governor Dan Patrick predicts this transgender mandate will be the end of public education. We discussed these implications.

June 8 Discussed the May 15th Supreme Court ruling against the HHS contraceptive mandate. We talked about how the Religious Freedom Restoration Act formed the basis of the legal challenge, and how this is a huge victory for religious freedom.

June 9 Reported on the increase of tinnitus among young people. Typically tinnitus is more common among the 50 plus crowd, as it is a symptom of auditory nerve damage. Because it is incurable, we discussed how people can protect their hearing and try to minimize hearing loss.

June 10 Now that school is out, we discussed the constitutional freedoms of students. As an example, we covered the end of the year case where an elementary school in Palmdale, CA attempted to prevent a parent from sending encouraging scriptures in the

lunch bag with a student. The school's treatment was a clear and gross violation of the rights of the student, and had to issue an apology to the family.

June 13 Carried a report by Fox News that featured retired Homeland Security Agent Philip Haney. He discussed how political correctness has crippled our government's ability to connect the dots regarding terrorism.

June 14 We reported on a story from this weekend where a lifeguard rescued a three year old girl in a wave pool in South Carolina. We discussed water safety, and how parents have to be able to keep attention on children and non-swimmers around water.

June 15 We covered a World Magazine feature that discussed the increase in Muslim immigration into America in regards to the 99% who support Sharia law over the U.S. Constitution. We discussed the probable outcomes and what we can do now to assimilate these immigrants.

June 16 Carried a story by Dr. Michael Brown that compares how LGBT activism has changed the rules of morality and fairness. Citing the Charlotte Observer from earlier this year, "girls will just have to get over the discomfort of seeing men in their locker rooms." We discussed how these changes break down traditional mores and lead to the decline of a culture.

June 17 Cited a World Magazine report over a local superior court judge who denied a request for a name change that could be misleading. The case was about a woman who identifies as a man, but the judge says the law must be followed, not ideology.

June 20 We had severe weather over the weekend, so we ran PSA's on safety and information regarding severe thunderstorms and precautions listeners need to take.

June 21 Interviewed Michael Blue about a leadership conference coming up this weekend. They are paying for one of the nation's leading experts to come, and they are offering it free to the public so folks can benefit from the training.

June 22 We covered the sequence of news articles since the Orlando shooting a week ago. There seems to be a concerted effort by several liberal journalists to blame conservatives rather than radical islam for the shootings. As a religious station, this has huge implications for our audience, and may be an alarm that repeats history, such as Nero blaming Christians for the fire in Rome.

June 23 We promoted several events and our event calendar. We took time to explain to listeners how to submit information for the free air time.

June 24 A local conservationist died from a rattlesnake bite this week. We cited information from the Mayo Clinic on how to avoid snakes, but if bitten what action to take to receive the most urgent medical treatment.

June 27 We reported on two bills in California that are attempting to force religious organizations to financially support abortion, and a bill that would require religious organizations to drop their views on gender and sexuality.

June 28 We reported on a new procedure that unblocks narrowed heart arteries with sound waves as to traditional methods.

June 29 The IRS is warning of a renewed scam where people are called by a false agent demanding immediate payment or face immediate arrest. We discussed how the scam works and how to avoid being taken in by it.

June 30 We shared how school districts are exploring ways to not receive federal funding so they can regain local control over their schools.

Third Quarter

July 1 We ran a PSA explaining how folks can adopt animals from the local shelter and the need for senior animals and those that have been unadopted for a long time. We discussed the mutual benefits of pets and humans.

July 5 We carried a 30 minute interview on Focus on the Family on how to improve parenting skills in today's challenging culture.

July 6 Carried Family Life Today at 830. They discussed step parenting and overcoming the challenges of a blended family.

July 7 Carried Family Life Today, and they discussed how people can find contentment at whatever season of life they are in.

July 8 We covered the story of the opening of the Ark Encounter with the news that Bill Nye (the science guy) attended. We discussed the educational value of opposing world views and how science is interpreted.

July 11 We updated the report that now 23 states have sued the Obama administration over transgender bathroom mandates. These additional 10 states now include South Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama. They suit challenges the due process as well as the overriding of local school districts.

July 12 We followed up on yesterday's lawsuit against the transgender mandate to report on North Carolina. Several states and businesses threatened economic sanctions and a smear campaign against the state, however, the bill has survived and 80% of the state supports pushing back against the federal government.

July 13 In light of the police shootings over the past week, we announced a day of unity that is designed to strengthen community relationships and lines of communication between local law enforcement and citizens.

July 14 We used the news of the marriage of high profile NFL star Russell Wilson and R&B singer Ciara as an opportunity to discuss purity, sexuality, and marriage. When this couple announced their engagement a year ago, they were interviewed by the Rock Church of San Diego. They revealed they were remaining celibate, and the sports world was merciless in their mockery. We discussed how to live a principled life in a culture of the lower values.

July 15 Regarding religious freedom, we noted that this week Russia signed into law an anti terror bill that also limits religious freedom. We discussed how similar legislation works in this country and how to look for unintended consequences of laws.

July 18 There was a shooting over the weekend that killed three police officers. All the major networks characterized the shooter as a former marine with anti government ideas. In reality, after seeing his You Tube and Facebook postings, he was a racist member of the Nation of Islam who ranted against white people. We had on air discussion at 440 for 5 minutes on how to find information and how to become better informed.

July 19 We carried Family talk at 930, and they discussed how to prepare your child for going off to college.

July 20 U.S. Senator Tim Scott from South Carolina is one of two black Senators in the nation. He addressed the racial tension in the black community and the police department. We covered the story and his suggestions for solutions.

July 21 We reported on the House of Representatives initiative to protect freedom of conscience, specifically protecting pro life employees and healthcare workers from being complicit in the practice of abortion. They advanced legislation and sent it to Senate.

July 22 We followed up on last summer's video releases of Planned Parenthood and the fetal tissue industry. According to the congressional panel, the companies are stonewalling and being less than cooperative. So far, the panel has discovered a 400% markup of tissue, and falsification of documentation. Under U.S. law, profiting from the sale of fetal tissue is a felony.

July 25 We offered news coverage of the Democratic Presidential Convention. Taking the headlines as it opened was the release of 20,000 emails that suggested the Party worked against the voters, and forcing the resignation of the DNC chairwoman. We discussed voting in a democracy and the constant battle against tyranny and cronyism.

July 26 We covered the story of the Islamic terrorist attack on a church in France, and then we discussed the need for churches to evaluate and reconsider security measures.

July 27 During the political week, we offered commentary on the rise of and balkanization of the Evangelical voting bloc. With all the congregations, colleges, seminaries, bookstores, and radio stations, we wondered why statesman leadership is lacking from our community.

July 28 We reported on the shooting in Louisiana that killed several police officers. As Funeral and memorial services were held, we picked up comments from the Baton Rouge Sheriff, Sid Gautreaux, who stated that this problem was not about gun control but what is in men's hearts. We examined how the faith community could better address this issue to bring healing.

July 29 We reported on yesterday's decision of the NBA to relocate next year's all star game from Charlotte because North Carolina laws support men using male bathrooms and women using female bathrooms. We discussed the damage a politically correct and relative truth post-modern society has caused. We also highlighted the hypocrisy of the NBA in that it is selling tickets for preseason games in China...one of the world's leaders in humanitarian abuse.

August 1 We updated the story of last years video investigative report that uncovered Planned Parenthood selling fetal body parts. The charges against the reporters were dropped in Texas, but California is considering its options. These charges are a concern to any citizen who has concern that law can become a political tool to oppress instead of establish justice.

August 2 With school resuming this week, we interviewed a school administrator from Aiken who discussed the options to a child's education as well as parental involvement.

August 3 In a Freedom of Religion issue, we reported on the removal of the Christian Flag from a Bryan County Georgia courthouse as a result of demands made from the freedom from religion foundation. Ironically, We also noted the Georgia Constitution acknowledging Christianity and requiring its leaders to be Christians.

August 4 We discussed blended families at 540 for 4 minutes. We gave statistics of the number of blended families, and we gave resource information where people could go to acquire more information and support for blended families.

August 5 We promoted events throughout the area at 520 for 4 minutes, and we explained how listeners could utilize our free public service announcements and website.

August 8 There is a growing concern in our culture of the dangers of pornography, and we covered a story how there is increased attention of how to make the internet safer for our citizens.

August 9 We promoted our free event calendar. We explained how to access it and utilize it as well as submit events to be online as well as on the air.

August 10 We reported on an Advocacy Coalition, a group of 11 non-profits and churches that support sex-trafficking survivors, and how they are trying to influence Amazon to stop selling books that offer detailed instructions on how to become a pimp. There are currently 15 books available online.

August 11 Continuing our coverage of the dangers of pornography and sex trafficking, we reported that Donald Trump has become the first presidential candidate to sign an anti pornography pledge, promising to crack down on obscenity after an eight year hiatus at the federal level.

August 12 With increasing concerns about terrorism, we learned yesterday that The State Department gave at least \$400 million in ransom money to Iran to release US hostages. This change of policy increases fears that Americans will become targeted around the world.

August 15 We reported on the speech presidential candidate Donald Trump delivered on the importance of foreign policy, specifically how we deal with ISIS. The national security differences between the two main parties is significant.

August 16 There has been a lot of flooding in the Southeast due to storms. We covered the storm alerts in our area, but we also emphasized the importance of flood insurance. Flooding causes a huge amount of damage, but unless homeowners and renters have the extra coverage, they have to ability to file a claim.

August 17 We interviewed Gerald Stephens at 505 for 10 minutes about lawn care at this time of year. He answered questions from our listeners.

August 18 We highlighted a Dental Clinic in our listening area that provides dental care and social services to the uninsured and underprivileged. We Then mentioned several ministries throughout our area that provide similar services.

August 19 We ran a public service announcement regarding the high rate of auto crashes as a result of debris on our roadways. One of the issues is how people fail to secure vehicle loads, so we emphasized safety measures to make sure loads are secure.

August 22 At 440 we ran a World Magazine report on how unelected officials and commissions have used their authority to advance regulations while ignoring religious exemptions

August 23 We covered the jobs report that came out a couple of weeks ago. Because they always adjust the numbers, we waited for the revision, and saw that we are in the weakest recovery since 1949, and more economists are predicting a collapse.

August 24 Reflecting on Religious freedom and the new court rulings on sexuality, we reported at 420 for 2 minutes of a Funeral home, run by a Christian had to defend in court his decision to fire an employee who decided to change sexes. The court upheld the funeral home's right to conduct business with their beliefs in accordance to the Religious Freedom of Restoration Act.

August 25 Hackers who have stolen emails from political officials have been exposing their inner communications, and revealing how they have misled the American people. We discussed ways to protect privacy and information while using computer technology.

August 26 We cited an August 8 New York Times piece that that admits the tilt in its presidential campaign coverage, and justified its bias. We used the story to help equip listeners wade through reports so they could determine the truth.

August 29 We covered a story at 520 for 3 minutes on the latest research that suggests the Mediterranean diet is better than statins at reducing the risk of an early death.

August 30 Since we are a religious network, and many of our listeners attend church, we covered a report on how churches can increase security and take measures to protect their congregants.

August 31 Due to the cultural confusion, the latest trend is to name children with a gender neutral name. These names have increased 60% in the last decade. We discussed how media, and marketing has mainstreamed homosexuality and how these blurred lines can impact our future as a nation.

Sep 1 We reported on a story from last week on how a high school principal banned students from carrying American flags into a football game. He felt it would be a taunt to immigrants. This same principal has taken similar actions in the past, and we discussed how political correctness was used in communist countries and how it is crippling free speech in this country.

September 2 The Obama administration has announced it is turning over the internet to a World organization. We opined our concerns that freedom of speech and religion will be impacted if this prevails. We joined with the National Religious Broadcasters to insist congress force the president to cease with this action.

September 6 In context of the death of Phyliss Schlafly, we discussed her work to overcome the Equal Rights Amendment, but we discussed her contribution to the

development of the Eagle Forum, with over 80,000 members, in which they trained millions of citizens how to participate in self-government.

September 7 We interviewed Gerald Stephens at 5:05 for 6 minutes on how to plan now for a fall garden.

Sept 8 We reported on how the UK government has mandated 5 year olds are taught sex education. We followed up on this report today, on how Planned Parenthood admits they use these kind of classes to remove discretion from schools, undermine parents, and how it is part of an overall exercise to break down children's inhibitions and natural sense of modesty. We connected dots on how this kind of education leads to a breakdown of societal norms.

Sep 9 We reported on how a judge blocked the Obama administration's attempt to force public schools into opening restrooms, locker rooms, and showers to members of the opposite sex. We updated how many states are suing the federal government over this mandate and what our listeners can do to provide security and privacy in these situations.

Sep 12 In a follow up of yesterday's report, we updated listeners on the financial impact of Target's decision to allow anyone to use the bathroom of their choice in their stores. There has been a called boycott, and their 2nd quarter earnings are down. They are spending \$20 million to install new bathrooms in all their stores, and for the first time, they are offering a 10% discount on every product. Many of our listeners have indicated that Target does not value the safety of families.

Sep 13 We have reported on the hacks into politicians email accounts, and have discussed privacy and security concerns, however, Judicial Watch has announced that a federal court has ordered a review of Hillary Clintons emails because they indicate a cover up of the arms trade in Libya and the deaths of four Americans. As a candidate, our coverage is concerned with transparency and accountability.

Sep 14 With the upcoming elections, the FBI has uncovered evidence that hackers penetrated two state election databases in recent weeks. Officials are not concerned that it would be significant, but listeners have indicated they are already concerned about voter fraud, and the possibility of hackers compromising the machines only compounds their fears.

Sep 15 Regarding our freedom of speech concerns, we reported on the California State Legislature passing a bill that would make it a crime to expose a health provider, like Planned Parenthood's activities. The bill is specifically targeting what the Center for Medical Progress did last summer to expose the trafficking of human body parts.

Sep 16 We updated our coverage of the IRS at 420 for 4 minutes. They refuse to recant the targeting of conservative groups, continue to delay approval for groups, and continue to use criteria designed to discriminate against them.

Sep 19 The Obama Administration announced that it intends to turn over the keys to the internet on October 1. We expressed concern over the possibility of repressive governments and the suppression of freedom of speech and religion. We encouraged our listeners to contact their representatives.

Sep 20 We reported on a recent report from Johns Hopkins University that argues that there is not enough scientific evidence available to suggest individuals are born with a certain sexual orientation. We discussed how World Views often skew opinion even in the light of respected research

Sep 21 Over the past month, we have reported on the vulnerability of privacy and security online and how hackers have compromised emails and voting machines. In the latest on this issue, it emerged that liberal think tank foundations have attempted to influence public policy on immigration and voting by using crises and unrest. We reported this and discussed with our listeners the underlying motives of many news reports.

Sep 22 There were terrorist bombings and stabbings in America last weekend. We reported on them as information became available, and we discussed how to keep safe and not be overcome by the intended terror.

Sep 23 We reported on the Hyde amendment and how every year on September 30, it has to be reaffirmed, yet it is always vulnerable to being overturned. The amendment disallows federal funding for abortion, and this being an election year, Clinton has called for it to be overturned. We made our audience aware of the time frame.

Sep 26 We interviewed Jody Hice, U.S. Representative in Georgia about terrorism, immigration and the budget...We spoke at 5:05 for 13 minutes.

Sep 27 We carried coverage of the first presidential debate for the upcoming election. We broke down the various talking points and policies of the two candidates.

Sep 28 We discussed at 505 for 4 minutes the recommendation by several candidates to enforce the existing laws regarding immigration. Our polling among our audience indicates a desire to vet immigrants and secure our borders to prevent illegal immigration and minimize terrorist activity

Sep 29 We promoted our event calendar. We announced all the events coming up this weekend, and we explained how to look up events as well as how to submit information for our free public service.

Sep 30 We carried a speech by James Dobson to Liberty University at 930 for 25 minutes. He encouraged listeners to live for what matters most in life: who you love, who loved you, and service you gave.

Fourth Quarter

Oct 3 We reported on research showing the correlation between divorce and the erosion of religion. Many studies support these findings, so we discussed where families can turn to get help in times of need.

Oct 4 We carried Focus on the Family at 830 and 730 for 30 minutes each as the show covered how to improve family relationships

Oct 5 We updated a story we have been following for over a year, in which North Carolina is attempting to protect magistrates who desire to opt out of issuing marriage licenses to same sex marriage. The courts supported religious freedom, and only 5% of the state's magistrates have asked for the exemption.

Oct 6 We provided weather alerts and information for all of our coverage area regarding Hurricane Matthew

Oct 7 We discussed the open window for applying for Obamacare beginning November 1. Insurers are increasing their rates by double digits 10-20%, making the increase 2x the rate over last year, and making it more unaffordable.

Oct 10 We followed up on the power outages and damages from the hurricane and how it impacted our community. We recruited volunteers to join relief efforts for those who have lost loved ones and property

Oct 11 There is a lot of flooding in our area from the hurricane, and we have been telling folks how to apply for aid to help them re-coup from their losses

Oct 12 Followed up on a Freedom of Religion issue from July. We had reported how a scientist lost his job over religious views, because he determined soft tissue on a dinosaur they were researching could only be a few thousand years old at most. The courts ruled last week that it was indeed discrimination, and he was awarded financially for his loss of employment.

Oct 13 We carried an hour long interview on Point of View from 2-3pm about ministries that are rescuing girls from the human sex trafficking.

Oct 14 We discussed and took phone calls about insurance and the storm damage. We spent several minutes discussing insurance and Fema

Oct 17 Reported on a Washington Examiner story about how folks are beginning to see the dangers of pornography the church has been discussing for 30 years. Part of the journalism article was to spell out the research and coordinate a plan that would work against pornography the way the media did tobacco 20 years ago.

Oct 18 With the election coming up in three weeks, we discussed the two party platforms regarding abortion and the Republican pro life stance. It came up in last week's debate when the democratic candidate affirmed abortion and continued funding of those organizations.

Oct 19 Reported on the rising unemployment and Federal debt. We discussed how debt and job loss affect families and where the unemployed can go for relief and employment services.

Oct 20 promoted our event calendar. We announced events, and explained to listeners how to use our free public service announcements to promote other events and services.

Oct 21 Many of our listeners have indicated their concerns about transgender use of bathrooms. We reported on a dozen of voyeur crimes that have occurred in Target stores over the past few months and how they can contact Target.

Oct 24 Updated listeners on the progress of repairing roads and bridges in the aftermath on hurricane Matthew due to damage.

Oct 25 With the upcoming election, we discussed the charge of voter fraud and rigged elections. We discussed the machines, photo ids and the primary and party system for four minutes at 435pm

Oct 26 Again, in context of the election, we reported on a story that the flood of illegal immigrants has become a crisis situation. We discussed the need for proper immigration, the impact of crime, job loss, tax loss, and increased benefit payouts at 520 for 4 minutes.

Oct 27 We reported on the upcoming enrollment period for Obamacare at 420 for 3 minutes. The Premiums are expected to rise sharply, along with deductibles as fewer insurance companies participate. Health coverage is important, but the current mandated laws seem punitive and inefficient in an attempt to place everyone in single payer, nationalized health care.

Oct 28 In light of the protests against America by some football players, we covered the story of a student who stood alone in Illinois while the Star Spangled Banner was played. We discussed the character traits of courage and the ability to stand alone, when the crowd is doing otherwise.

Oct 31 We promoted our event calendar, explaining how churches and organizations can utilize our free public service announcements and website.

Nov 1 We covered a story at 510 for 3 minutes on where an unborn baby at 23 weeks was pulled from the womb, operated on, and returned...to be born again 15 weeks later. We discussed how modern medicine and new techniques can assist both mom and baby, without causing death.

Nov 2 Interviewed Gerald Stephens about what to plant this time of year regarding lawns and gardens.

Nov 3 We cited an essay by Shane Idleman on what Christians can do to facilitate healing in our nation. We discussed how to restore and mend broken communities according to century old advice from the scriptures.

Nov 4 Following up on yesterday's commentary, we reported at 420 for 3 minutes how a Civil Rights hero, Clarence Henderson, who sat at a white counter in North Carolina during the 1950's approaches politics and how policies impact the everyday man and minorities living peaceably together.

Nov 7 We interviewed Bill Gaither for 10 minutes, at 510 about an upcoming concert. We also discussed how Christians can approach politics and keep perspective on the differences between the kingdom of man and the Kingdom of God.

Nov 8 Today is election day. We have discussed the two main candidates, and encouraged listeners all day to go to the polls to vote. We also gave links websites they could visit to learn about more local issues in various races.

Nov 9 With Donald Trump winning the presidency with an electoral landslide, we reported on the eight areas of executive orders that have been used over the last 6 years that he has promised to overturn, with healthcare, immigration, and jobs being the priorities.

Nov 10 In October, we had shared a story about a professor who has predicted the last five elections correctly. He was the only person asserting Donald Trump's victory. Now that the election is over, and all the pollsters were wrong, we revisited Helmut Norpoth's model and how it is so different from traditional polling.

Nov 11 We carried Family Life Today at 830. They discussed communication and listening that can improve a marriage.

Nov 14 For the past few days, several people have claimed they were the victim of a hate crime at the hands of a Trump supporter. All of the reports have turned out to be false. We examined the narrative as well as the mindset that causes this, and we looked at ways Americans can come together.

Nov 15 We promoted The Georgia Gives a Day , in which the Georgia Center for non-profits help organizations raise funds and accomplish their mission.

Nov 16 We carried the Focus on the Family broadcast at 8 and 730. They discussed foster care and adoption and how we can be involved.

Nov 17 Regarding the election, we reported that the transition team for Donald Trump has disclosed that they want to begin building the wall in March. There are 650 miles of fencing now, but, he desires a 50 ft high wall that is 2000 miles long. For Americans who believe in national sovereignty and the rule of law, this is good news.

Nov 18 The media has been covering protests to the election. We have covered the story as well only to find the protests are not organic but paid for in order to discourage the country.

Nov 21 Carried Family Talk where a panel of educators discussed the pros and cons to common core education, and its political and economic impact in local school districts.

Nov 22 We reported on the President-elect's plan to scrap the TPP trade agreement his first day in office. He has broad, bi-partisan support, and the country is wanting to keep more manufacturing jobs in the U.S.

Nov23 We carried the broadcast Family Talk at 930, and they discussed the pros and cons of common core education and how it impacts our students and our nation.

Nov 24 There are wild fires in NC, Ga, TN, and SC. We are experiencing the smoke all over the southeast. There has been a lot of property loss, now loss of life. Authorities are looking for the people they believe started the fire. We are encouraging folks to support the red cross and Samaritan's purse to help.

Nov 25 We carried a report from the U. of Cambridge that suggests that body cameras worn by police do in fact, reduce complaints against police by 93%

Nov 28 We reported how the IRS is ready to send out millions of letters to taxpayers to let them know if they do not sign up for an Obamacare approved health plan, they will have to pay a penalty. The House of Representatives has put an end to it because it is threatening. We further discussed health care options.

Nov 29 We carried the PSA by the national transportation group about the increased number of cars on the road between now and New Years. We cautioned listeners to slow down, buckle up, and not drink and drive.

Nov 30 We carried Focus on the family twice as they discussed grief after losing a spouse to death and how to approach moving forward.

Dec 1 We reported on the nomination and acceptance of SC governor Nikki Haley to become the ambassador to the United Nations next year. We discussed the transfer of power in the state and how that would impact state senate seats.

Dec 2 As recounts continue, we have taken opportunity to explain how the electoral college works, and how precincts report. We have explained how the voting boxes work and at what point of the process there is potential fraud, which is very limited.

Dec 5 We carried the broadcast Family Talk at 930 for thirty minutes. They discussed the current gender issues and what research tells us about the impact of erasing gender boundaries.

Dec 6 There is jury selection occurring for a church shooter in Charleston, SC. We have reported on it and covered how the judge has permitted the shooter to represent himself, and how the community has come together to support the church. We discussed forgiveness and justice and how these factor into our daily choices.

Dec 7 Today is the anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack. We discussed the history of it, and we discussed national security, and the constitutional responsibility of the government to protect our borders and its citizens.

Dec 8 We promoted our Event Calendar and in addition to announcing events coming up over the next couple of weeks, we explained how folks can use our free air time for public service announcements.

Dec 9 We carried an AP story about the change in the way people are shopping. Although more products have been sold, people are paying less. Apps are helping people become more savvy and deliberate about their purchases.

Dec 12 We carried Family Life Today. They discussed generosity and giving...how those virtues impact us and the world around us.

Dec 13 Several counties in our listening area were hit hard by the hurricane 6 weeks ago. The news coverage has moved on to the next big story, but we shared real stories of loss and clean up that continues today. We also shared organizations that are busy working in those affected areas.

Dec 14 Interviewed Gerald Stephens with Nurseries Caroliniana at 505 for 7 minutes. This is a bad time of year for fire ants, and he discussed how to treat the mounds and get rid of them from a property.

Dec 15 We carried Focus on the Family at 8am and 730 pm as they discussed ways to keep a marriage and family together during difficult times.

Dec 16 With the upcoming electoral college vote, we discussed how the founders developed a constitutional republic, how federalism places the power in the states, and how the electoral college gives representation to smaller populated areas.

Dec 19 Since the election, there has been reporting on Fake News and if it influenced the election. We cited a journalism piece by Marvin Olasky and World Magazine about the topic and its influence.

Dec 20 We reported on a study by Shaunti Feldhahn about what men are looking for in marriage. We then summarized the 10 ways a wife could accomplish these responses.

Dec 21 We discussed the plan to bring waste into the country from China and dispose of it in Georgia. We announced a public hearing for tomorrow at 3 at the Brantley County Courthouse

Dec 22 We discussed a book (Stealth Invasion) about the invisible jihad...how terrorists use immigration to infiltrate a nation and create pockets of non-acclimated communities that can unfold at a later point. In this weeks news, Germany and France are already experiencing this outcome.

Dec 23 With the deadline for healthcare enrollment approaching, we discussed Christian Health Care sharing alternatives that are affordable and exempt from the fines.

Dec 26 Reported on the Church that was vandalized and burned down the week before the election. It turns out the perpetrator attended the church. He tried to make it a racial and political issue, but since he did it, it did nothing but dishonor his cause. These false reports seem to be on an increase, and we discussed the reasons why people even do this kind of activity and how we can be alerted to false reports that try to stir up problems in our communities.

Dec 27 At 420 for 4 minutes, we promoted the healthcare deadline and that folks need to make sure they are covered according to the mandate. We also discussed some exemptions available to the mandate.

Dec 28 We carried the 30 minute broadcast, Family Talk at 930. The panel of doctors discussed infertility and adoption.

Dec 29 We carried an interview with Dr. Karyn Purvis who offered practical advice for parents on building and maintaining a trust-based relationship with their children. She explains how parent-child attachments are designed, what happens when that connection is broken and how parents can give their children a voice for their thoughts and feelings.

Dec 30 We carried Money Wise at 6pm for 25 minutes. They discussed budgeting, credit and debt as well as taking phone calls from the listeners.
