

Quarterly Issues

2011

January 3 We reported on the story about the man in Florida who was going to live in a lion's enclosure for 30 days to raise money for wildlife refuges as well as raising awareness of the needs for these exotic animals. We posted a link to a website.

January 4 We covered a technology update on the new year changes to the Android smart phones. They have a re-designed keyboard, and we discussed differences between the droids and iPhones.

January 5 We interviewed Gerald Stephens regarding horticulture and winter pruning of trees and bushes.

January 6 We read former U.S. Senator's wife, Elizabeth Edwards' Will and discussed estate planning and wills as an important planning to take care of before death.

January 7 Conducted an interview with World Magazine regarding the shooting of the Arizona congresswoman. We discussed the political climate, and how the coverage and commentary of this shooting would impact the upcoming vote on Obamacare. Already the vote has been delayed.

January 10 We covered the story of Homeless, Ted Williams, and how a church ministry was able to get him out the shelters and get him employment and reconciled with his family.

January 11 Because of the recent winter weather we have had, we detailed preparedness in regards to incimate weather.

January 12 Since President Theodore Roosevelt made the Grand Canyon a national park over a hundred years ago, we reported on that event. We advanced the story of our national parks, their benefits, and how to access and enjoy these national treasures.

January 13 We covered the story that Facebook announced that they were going to implement the Amber Alert into their program. We used the opportunity to discuss the importance and usage of the Amber Alerts and how to protect our children from predators.

January 14 We updated our listeners on the recovery effort of the Haiti earthquake from one year ago. We shared stories of success as well as hindrances. We gave links to organizations where our listeners could get more information, donate, or volunteer to help.

January 17 We reported on the sanctity of human life week. We offered information and links to websites on how our listeners could be better informed on the developments in the discussion. We also gave information on how to lessen abortion and assist unwed mothers.

January 18

January 19 Read an NRB article and explained the pros and cons to the discussion regarding the fairness doctrine. We advanced to story to explain how the legislation would affect religious broadcasting and why talk radio is opposed to it.

January 20

January 21 Advanced an interview about Billy Graham. We used the story to springboard the discussion into caring for elderly parents. We offered several stories and gave resources people could access for further reading.

January 24

January 25 We carried the State of the Union address and offered commentary on certain policies and how they would impact American lives.

January 26 We discussed the report on how church foreclosures have increased and what congregations can do to minimize that risk during this recession.

January 27 We covered the story on how the black population has been decimated by abortion, and how cities like New York abort 50% of all the black pregnancies. We carried excerpts from prominent black leaders regarding this crisis.

January 28 We covered the news of riots in Egypt. We discussed how social media was assisting the people in communication and organization of daily demonstrations, and we interviewed World Magazine to acquire news analysis on the developments.

January 31 We reported on the death of a missionary to Mexico by the drug cartel. We placed it in the context of training so as churches were preparing for summer missions trips, they could be better informed and equipped to cope with latent dangers.

February 1 Our show on legal alert addressed the contributions Chic Filet had made that were legal, but caused P.R. problems among a vocal group of protestors. We covered how to make policies and donations without discrimination.

February 2 We interviewed Nurseries Caroliniana about yard care at this time of the year. Specifically, we discussed the use of and amount of lime to apply to grasses and bushes.

February 3 In discussing the Superbowl, we read an article about quarterback Aaron Rogers, and we discussed his personal reputation and character context of achievement and success. We extended the discussion in regards to personal self-improvement.

February 4 Interviewed World Magazine regarding a federal judge ruling that Obamacare is unconstitutional. The administration continues to move ahead. How does all this factor in balance of powers and constitutional government.

February 7 We rebroadcast an interview with congressman Paul Brown, specifically where he stated how seeing John 3:16 at a sporting event led him to read the scripture. This was in context of the Fox network refusing to run an ad specifically promoting John 3:16...what does it mean anyway? It was in the context of freedom of speech.

February 8 We discussed how to help people who are facing foreclosure. We referred them to a seminar we were promoting on our website that would help homeowners navigate this difficulty.

February 9 We interviewed Nurseryman to understand how to control weeds in the yard. He recommended Astrizine as one of the top weed killers and when to apply it.

February 10 Interviewed a listener who had been sued as a result of a car accident. We discussed protecting one's assets with a Revocable living trust.

February 14 We referenced an article on why men don't attend church, and discussed the various points of why and solutions to alter that departure.

February 15 Covered the story of "Date Night" at the Creation Museum in Kentucky. The focus was on tolerance, slander, rights, and censorship

February 16 We reported on the Der Speigal article on the Muslim Brotherhood's idea for a united Muslim nation. This was in context of our ongoing coverage of the demonstrations in the Middle East and Northern Africa.

February 17 We advanced the story of human rights and women's rights in the middle east, particularly in the discussion and debate of Sharia Law. This was in the context of the sexual assault of Lara Logan the CBS news correspondent.

February 18 Family News and Focus reported on how Social Issues seem to be minimized in the current political climate, yet they are actually linked to economic and political ideology.

February 22

February 23 We interviewed Gerald Stephens from Nurseries Caroliniana regarding the application of lime at this time of the year to yards and bushes.

February 24 We discussed public safety in regards to our upcoming tornado drill. We read all the recommended safety measures and discussed scenarios and plans in the event of a tornado. We gave resources and links to go to for more information.

February 25

February 28 We covered a recent story from the Barna group on how devout religious behavior can decrease divorce and strengthen marriages and families. This study actually debunked the erroneous assumptions that devout faith don't make a difference from the general population.

March 1 We discussed the increase in pollen count for this time of year and the health risks that are associated with allergies. We also discussed treatments and suggested prevention to minimize those risks.

March 2 We interviewed the garden man about the priorities of lawn design and lawn care

March 3 Answers in Genesis discussed the theological idea that all humans are one blood, but how genetics can affect skin pigmentation and other features, but that all humans are one race not many. Therefore, the conclusion was to disarm any false religious ideas that would support racism.

March 4 We reported on the EPA's deadlines for the conversion from incandescent bulbs to the new bulbs. We discussed the health risks and costs of the new bulbs and contrasted the pros and cons to each.

March 7 We interviewed World Magazine regarding the status and implementation of Obamacare since its passage a year earlier.

March 8 We reported on the rising costs of gasoline, how it impacts the family budget. We also discussed governmental policies that affect the increase and how the media is covering the story as opposed to their coverage in 2008.

March 9 Reported on how 10 states are adopting legislation to accept gold and silver for currency, and offered analysis on since the removal from the gold standard and the American dollar as the global standard are affecting deficits, debts and other nations.

March 10 We discussed the Augusta learning center and how they approach tutoring. We also informed people how to get their children the help to succeed academically.

March 11 We covered an event regarding the story of Job. During the interview, we discussed the universal questions and responses to suffering. We posted the interview on our website as a podcast.

March 14 In discussion of the earthquake and tsunami in Japan, we discussed preparedness and insurance issues in the event of local emergencies and national emergencies.

March 15 We covered a story of how a boy in Ohio created “Man Scent” candles because he did not like the flowery smells his sister’s candles had. We detailed how he marketed them and how his sells are progressing. We referenced a couple of entrepreneurial websites for listeners who have ideas they want to develop.

March 16 Because of the damage to the nuclear plant damage in Japan, we reported on what iodine pills Japanese were taking to reduce radiation damage to the liver. We identified Nuclear plants in our coverage area and explained precautions in the event of similar leaks.

March 17 We updated our audience on the ongoing recovery efforts in Japan, and we suggested ways they could help and offered websites they could go to to make donations.

March 18 We carried a report from Baptist Press on how the church is fulfilling the great commission. The report suggested a plan on how to accelerate the ability to reach the last remaining 3800 people groups across the globe.

March 21 Interviewed a former inmate (Larry Price) who discussed his road to crime, his incarceration, what changed his life and how he helps inmates today make the changes they need to turn their lives around. We posted the interview on our website as a podcast.

March 22

March 23 Probe ministries carried a broadcast addressing the existential question many people ask about finding meaning and purpose in life.

March 24 With the warmer weather, we discussed exercise and getting outside, planning activities. We focused on bicycle riding and safety.

March 25 Gave a report on how the 2010 elections have resulted in how abortion laws are changing all across the country on a state-wide level

March 28 Aligning with March Madness basketball, we produced a report on the history of basketball with its goal to shape character and develop young men into gentlemen.

March 29 Interviewed Annie Dupre about their upcoming concert. We discussed legacy and their fine arts camp that develops the talents of young people, helping them to pursue that profession.

March 30 Interviewed Wayne Shepherd about a radio show he produces that tells human interest stories. We discussed the courage and inspiration of the story he just produced about Bethany Hamilton, the girl who had been attacked by the tiger shark and how her story was now a major motion picture.

March 31 Interviewed Wayne Shepherd today about another show he produces that is kind of a political round table and all the current political issues of the day are discussed. We begin carrying the show this weekend.

April 1 Advanced the story of the British family who was denied the right to adopt because they are Christians. The British courts were concerned that Christian faith could infect the children. Of course we covered this as a religious freedom issue.

April-June

April 4 Talked about the tornado warnings that are issued this time of year. Explained the difference between a watch and a warning and listed action steps in the event of a tornado.

April 5 With the warmer weather, we discussed exercise and getting outside, planning activities. We focused on walking. Had an encounter with a water moccasin while walking; so related the story and discussed precautions.

April 6 Interviewed master gardener, Gerald Stephens and he led discussion about diagnosis and treatment of leaf gall.

April 7 Interviewed Frank Ulle about his upcoming children's special. We advertised it and talked about children's interests.

April 8 Interviewed Nick Eicher, publisher of World Magazine. He analyzed and commented on the debt ceiling and budget cuts.

April 11 Did a book review on Eric Metaxis' best seller "Bonhoeffer". Bonhoeffer, a theologian, was executed by Hitler because of his conspiracy to assassinate him.

April 12 Broadcast Legal Alert in which they discussed Illegal Immigration.

April 13 Released press statement regarding the safety of cribs and the federal requirement to upgrade cribs. Discussed how this should impact church nurseries as well as day care centers.

April 14 Carried broadcast by answers in Genesis that examined the notion of whether the Semitic God was war like and vindictive in juxtaposition to the current Christian world view.

April 15 Discussed getting help with taxes and the deadline being Monday as opposed to today.

April 18 Gave coverage to the weather and the devastating tornadoes that affected listeners in our North Carolina coverage area. Referred people to places of help and how to organize relief efforts.

April 19 Covered a Freedom of Religion and human freedom story of how the Chinese government was working against the Shouwang Church, shutting down their facilities and arresting the leadership.

April 20 Discussed the budget of 6 trillion dollars, the deficit in relation to revenues versus expenditures, the 14 trillion national debt and the 60 trillion dollar unsecured debt of the nation.

April 21 Shared article on how the Department of Justice is no longer enforcing the Defense of Marriage Act.

May 9 Covered a story on how the defense department needs to change its policies regarding recruitment. They discriminate against home schoolers who want to serve.

May 10 Carried probe broadcast that explained macro-economics and capitalism

May 11 Discussed the TSA procedures of invasive searches in light of an online posted, photograph of a baby that was patted down.

May 12 Carried story of how the middle eastern revolutions are creating difficult times and incidents of persecution for Christians.

May 26 Probe ministries carried broadcast to assist people who have been victimized by abusive and authoritarian churches.

May 27 Covered the story of the ongoing relief and reconstruction after the tornadoes. We highlighted the work of Samaritan's Purse and gave out volunteer information and contact information so people could get involved.

May 30 Today is Memorial Day. We carried a series of stories covering the history of and significance of this national holiday.

May 31 We brought an update on the legal challenges and the union standoff between the new Republican leadership and the Wisconsin liberals.

June 1 We covered the local story of the Ocheegee River fish kill and advised the public of health risks and EPA meetings.

June 2 We examined the issue of immigration and voter identification. How does this discriminate?

June 3 We looked back at the historic crackdown of democracy in China with the Tiananmen Square incident and how capitalism is fostering greater freedom in that country.

June 15 Advanced the recent research regarding the impact of divorce on children. Made reference to marriage and parenting resources.

June 16 The President visited Puerto Rico. We discussed the U.S. Territory of Puerto Rico. Their voting privileges and limitations and how it impacts U.S. Policy.

June 17 Discussed the research on the decimation of the Black population through abortion, and the growing pro-life movement in the Black community.

June 20 Discussed article and pointers on caring for the Elderly.

July 1 Discussed Firework safety for the upcoming Independence Day.

July 4 Discussed the founding of our nation, its documents, and what it means for us today.

July 5 Covered the Casey Anthony verdict. Discussed how the judicial system works

July 6 In light of the drought conditions, we referenced video of a huge dust cloud descending on Phoenix, AZ. We discussed ways to best conserve our own resources and utilize rain water.

July 7 Probe broadcast was about the history and influence of religion and war.

July 8 Carried program that covered the differences in human, animal and plant life and how that defines death and meaning of life.

July 11 Discussed the new book by Jaycee Dugard and her 18 year abduction. We discussed her current mindset, her attitude, and how we can benefit from her experience to help us cope with difficult times.

July 12 Advanced story of the archeological dig in the Gaza Strip that supports Aegean immigrants to the middle east around 3,000 years ago, and how it correlates to sacred texts.

July 13 We discussed the failed vote to overturn the fluorescent bulbs mandate, its economic and health impact.

July 14 Probe carried a broadcast on the new Malaria pandemic and how various cultural world views impact solutions.

July 15 Interviewed Frank Ule about his upcoming children's program in which he assumes the role of an investigator to determine the facts and interpret the events.

July 18 Advanced story about Freedom of Speech in which an atheist group rented billboard space owned by a church.

July 19 Cited recent research on the development and success of Christian universities and how their roles are increasing as parents prefer them, and how the colleges are accommodating a liberal arts approach.

July 20 Discussed the issue of Separation of church and state in regards to Texas governor Perry's call for a prayer gathering.

July 21 Discussed the shut down of a child's lemonade stand by the Sheriff. We discussed entrepreneurial efforts, taxes and fees.

July 22 We promoted a play/drama that tells the story of William Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army in conjunction with the ribbon-cutting of the new community Kroc center.

July 25 Discussed the politics behind the S.C. lawmakers debate of the new congressional districts.

July 26 Covered the story how a Chinese minister was arrested and sentenced to a two year re-educational labor camp without trial or representation in context of human rights.

July 27 Interviewed Gerald Stephens about the year round program for healthy azaleas

July 28 Covered the North Carolina legislature's veto over-ride of Gov. Perdue's objection to abortion restrictions. The law prohibits an abortion unless a woman is provided with state-specified information about the physician at least 24 hours in advance. Women also would get information about the likely stage of development of the unborn child, the medical risks of having an abortion and giving birth, and the availability of alternatives.

July 29 Reported on the dismissal of the law suit against Gov. Perry able to attend a prayer event. Placed it in context of freedom of religion

August 1 Covered story of South Carolina redistricting and how the census affects that district, and how the Justice department has the final say as to whether it is representative.

August 2 Covered story of the 100 year old archaeological dig of Shekem. Related it to biblical times as well as the impact on current Palestine.

August 3 Covered the story of Macon's decision to place a referendum on the November ballot to determine Sunday Alcohol sales

August 4 Carried storied about home health care and posted it on our website.

August 5 Covered story from the scientific journal "Surgical Neurology International". Discussed the latest information about concussions and how to help prevent brain damage in the context of school starting back and athletics.

August 8 Forwarded the story of Governor Rick Perry's controversial use of and support of Adult stem cells. He used a non FDA approved procedure that was highly successful and strongly supported the pro-life argument that there is no need for embryonic stem cells.

August 9 Reported on the 2.3 magnitude earthquake that hit South Carolina today. Used it as a public service to remind folks about preparedness.

August 10 Covered a report about the 15 most dangerous cities for driving. Several were in our coverage area; so we discussed why so many fatalities and what roads were the worst.

August 11 Reported on the boy in Washington state who was caught in the current and swept out to sea this past weekend. He was found, and he has recovered somewhat, but we took a safety angle of (other than gratitude) about adequate supervision and activities where someone who cannot swim is wading in the ocean. Parents can be trusting because the church, or the recreation center is doing something.

August 12 Interviewed World Magazine Publisher about variety of subjects and the implications on our nation: last night debates, the 11th district ruling against Obamacare, the Wisconsin recall election, and the riots in England.

August 15 Covered story how U.S. financial support of \$50 million per annum to the Palestinian Authority directly supports terrorism. 3.5% of their budget goes to support terrorists who have been imprisoned, thus, paying them salaries and bonuses while they are “unemployed”.

August 16 We discussed the voter ID legislation in South Carolina. We covered the role of the Justice Department and how and if such legislation could be discriminatory.

August 17 Citing a recent study from the Brookings Institute, We discussed Augusta’s increased rate of poverty for the surrounding area of the metro. Analyzing the rate of increase and attempting to discover the cause, it reveals the spiraling economic trap many more of our audience is finding itself in.

August 18 Covered the news release that the Georgia House had approved new political boundaries as a result of the 2010 census. We discussed the next steps in the process and possible outcomes regarding political representation.

August 19 Updated the audience on the increase of unemployment in South Carolina. Highlighted the worst and best counties to find work

August 22 Reported on a story about the Life At Conception Act, which is co-sponsored by 105 congressmen. It is directed at a loophole in the Roe V Wade decision in 1973 that would negate that ruling.

August 23 Began coverage of Hurricane Irene. We went over evacuation plans and preliminary planning.

August 24 Interviewed Gerald Stephens with the Nursery about preparing for autumn. Lawn care, and pruning.

August 25 With Hurricane Irene coming, we discussed hurricane preparedness, and covered who in our area was to evacuate.

August 26 Continued coverage of Hurricane Irene. Reported on the teacher of the year who posted his opinion on Facebook about gay marriage in New York as a freedom of speech issue.

August 29 Did post storm coverage of the aftermath of Hurricane Irene. Our N.C. listeners were affected with flooding and power outages. We gave steps to take if there was loss and announced closings and delays.

August 30 Reported on the new rules regarding health care facilities and how that will impact abortion clinics in Virginia. The law now requires them to meet the same standards as hospitals.

August 31 Advanced a story on the correlation between poverty and the breakdown of the family. By following three simple rules: graduate high school, marry after the age of 20, and waiting until married to have children, a person increases their odds of staying above the poverty line by 92%. The initial study was conducted by William Galston, former advisor to president Clinton.

September 1 Covered the story of S.C. governor challenging the White House to support the Boeing plant. The issue of union membership could cost the state 1,000 jobs, and the White House has not been pro-active.

September 2 Covered the latest job report and gave the list of best counties in our listening area to find work.

September 5 Reported on the epidemic of Methamphetamine. Discussed its addictive power and how it destroys lives and families. Gave signs of how to identify if someone may be using it, or if there is a lab in the community.

September 6 Recent report on how South Carolina's rural roads are the most dangerous in the country. We discussed why that is and what action is being taken to improve that situation.

September 7 Carried a program, Probe, that discussed the meaning and practice of tolerance.

September 8 Discussed steps to take to prevent Identity theft. Also, gave steps to take if identity has been stolen.

September 9 Interviewed World Magazine publisher, Nick Eicher. Discussed the current events of the week, specifically analyzing the Republican debates and the President's speech to the joint house.

September 12 Discussed how federal regulations cost the United States \$2 trillion a year, how there has been an increase in government regulation, how it affects business and the economy, and historically, how de-regulation improves the economy.

September 13 Carried broadcast of Focus on the Family. Dr. Lehman gave practical tips of how to help teenagers develop judgment and responsibility.

September 14 Reported on the New York special election. Republicans took a seat that had been Democrat since 1921. Two explanations have to do with the Democrats voting to allow gay marriage and the Democrats position on Israel. This district is forty percent Orthodox Jew, and these two issues are paramount to them.

September 15 Referenced Miss South Carolina's involvement over the years, supporting Food Banks. Encouraged listeners to support food banks and pantrys as well as looking for ways to assist the hungry in our communities.

September 16 Interviewed World magazine publisher, Nick Eicher. Discussed this week's current events, and offered analysis on the economic speech given.

September 19 Covered the news story of a church shooting in Florida. Discussed the need for churches to establish a committee to dialogue with local law enforcement and develop security strategies for the church.

September 20 Reported on the City of San Juan Capistrano, California issuing a heavy-handed permit requirement on a home Bible Study. Discussed this in context of the first amendment.

September 21 Interviewed Gerald Stephens with the Nursery. We discussed adding color to landscaping for the stark winter months.

September 22 Reported on the just released report ranking South Carolina as the 7th most dangerous place for women, per capita. We followed up on discussion about education and awareness.

September 23 Covered story about Arlene Tessitore taking on the school district, after they ignored her complaint about giving middle schoolers a sex survey. She acquired help from the Rutherford Institute who helped her successfully reverse a policy of "passive consent". We went on to discuss how parents can be involved in the school district.

September 27 Carried the broadcast, "Probe" with Kerby Anderson, and he discussed the philosophy and theory behind a just war, and he discussed the context of the current engagements our nation is involved in.

September 28 Discussed Obamacare and the administration's willingness for it to advance past an appeal to the 11th circuit and advance to the Supreme Court. Discussed the implications and what is at stake.

September 29 Reported on the foiled attempt to attack the Pentagon. Discussed the intent of terrorism and its impact on the national psyche.

September 30 Discussed the release of the movie "Courageous" and its theme dealing with fatherhood. Discussed principles of being a good father.
