Sunday, April 6, 2014 - Radio Health Journal 6:30 a.m.

15:00

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Liza Mundy, Reporter, Washington Post, Fellow, New American Foundation, and author, <u>The Richer Sex: How the New Majority of Female Breadwinners is Transforming Sex, Love, and Family</u>.

Nearly half of married working women out earn their husbands, and the trend is likely to accelerate with women making up 60% of college students. Ms. Benson discussed with Ms. Mundy the trend and what it means for families and life at home.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Lara De Francesco, Senior Editor, Nature Biotechnology; Steve Hughes, Founder, Chairman, and Chief Executive Officer of Boulder Brands; Gregory Jaffe, Director, Biotechnology Project, Center for Science in the Public Interest; Ronnie Cummins, National Director, Organic Consumers Association; and Mark Lynas, Visiting Scholar, Cornell University College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. Genetically modified organisms or GMO's have come to represent nearly half of all crop acres in the U. S. More than half of all processed foods contain GMO's. Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. De Francesco, Mr. Hughes, Mr. Jaffe, Mr. Cummins, and Mr. Lynas whether this is a food safety threat and if GMO products should be labeled.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Greg Canty, Medical Director, Center for Sports Medicine, Children's Mercy Hospitals and Clinics, Kansas City, Missouri. With the arrival of spring, baseball, softball, and soccer take over the neighborhood sports fields. Ms. Benson discussed with Dr. Canty the most common injuries in spring and summer sports and the preventive steps to take to keep kids healthy.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Walter Martin and Kathy Mellendy, surgical patients; Dr. Lawrence Cohn, Hubbard Professor of Cardiac Surgery, Harvard Medical School, and Chief Emeritus, Cardiac Surgery, Brigham & Women's Hospital, Boston; Peggy Huddleston, Psychotherapist and author, <u>Prepare for Surgery, Heal Faster: A Guide of Mind-Body Techniques</u> (healfaster.com).

Mr. Pence and Dr. Cohn discussed how surgeons are learning that a high proportion of people facing surgery are terrified of what might happen. This stress adversely affects outcomes. Ms. Huddleston discussed the programs of relaxation and visualization that so many large hospitals are turning to as a way to combat the problem.

Host: Lynn Holley. Guests: Karla Dzienkowski, Interim Director, Willis-Ekbom Disease Foundation, and parent of a daughter with restless legs syndrome; Dr. William Ondo, Professor of Neurology, University of Texas Health Science Center, Houston, and Advisory Board Member, Restless Legs Syndrome Foundation.

Ms. Holley, Dr. Ondo, and Ms. Dzienkowski discussed how many patients who suffer from restless legs syndrome, a neurological condition that strikes in the evenings, experience some of the worst sleep conditions. Identifying and treating the syndrome were extensively covered.

Host: Reed Pence. Guest: Dr. Nathalia Holt, HIV research scientist and author, <u>Cured:</u> How the Berlin Patients Defeated HIV and Forever Changed Medical Science.

Mr. Pence discussed how HIV has become a treatable chronic disease in the U. S. Yet around the world, millions still die of AIDS. Two patients better known as The Berlin Patients have apparently been cured of HIV. Researchers have made great strides in defeating the disease. Dr. Holt discussed where we are and where we are headed in the fight.

2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Ramon Franco, Jr., Director, Division of Laryngology, Harvard Medical School; Dr. Susan Miller, Principal, Voice Trainer, Washington, DC. Ms. Benson and Dr. Franco discussed an unusual "voice strangling" disorder and the toxin that can treat it.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Ezekiel Emanuel, Vice Provost for Global Initiatives, and Chair, Department of Biomedical Ethics and Health Policy, University of Pennsylvania; Henry J. Kaiser, Professor Emeritus of Economics and Health Policy, Stanford University, and Senior Fellow, Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research; and Dr. Gail Morrison, Senior Vice Dean for Education and Director of Academic Programs, University of Pennsylvania Perleman School of Medicine.

Mr. Pence, Dr. Ezekiel, Mr. Kaiser, and Dr. Morrison discussed both sides of an issue regarding the increase in medical complexity and how some leading thinkers in medical education are proposing that the time spent on medical education can be cut by nearly one third. The key is reorganizing what is taught to rid curricula of research and other requirements that most doctors never use in their working lives.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Colleen Patrick-Goudreau, author, <u>The 30-Day Vegan Challenge</u>.

Over 1% of Americans follow a vegan diet. Ms. Benson and Ms. Patrick-Goudreau discussed how eliminating animal products from the diet is not as hard as many people think it is.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Aaron Miller, Medical Director, Corinne Goldsmith Dickinson Center for Multiple Sclerosis, Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, New York; and Dr. Tim Coetzee, Chief Advocacy Services and Research Officer, National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

More treatments are needed for multiple sclerosis patients because, for some, no existing treatments work. Many experts have been stunned at the FDA's rejection of a promising new drug which has been approved in much of the rest of the world. Mr. Pence, Dr. Miller, and Dr. Coetzee discussed the consequences of rejection of this drug and whether the FDA has changed how it evaluates medicines.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Adele Levine, author, <u>Run Don't Walk: The Curious and Chaotic Life of a Physical Therapist Inside Walter Reed Army Medical Center.</u>

Ms. Benson, along with physical therapist Ms. Levine, discussed how veterans who had lost their limbs in combat were treated at Walter Reed Army Medical Center during its last days.

Sunday, May 11, 2014 - Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guests: Dr. Brian Kimbrell, Trauma Care physician; and Derek Welch, trauma survivor.

Ms. Lawson, Dr. Kimbrell, and Mr. Welch talked about the Senate and House bills being considered in the Florida legislature and how they are dealing with the closures of local trauma centers. Dr. Kimbrell has been spearheading a wide range of efforts for the \$2.5 million trauma project, including recruiting, developing trauma protocols, construction planning, and training staff. Trauma survivor Derek Welch of Ocala suffered a splenic aneurism in October 2012. Mr. Welch was transported to the trauma center at Ocala Regional Medical Center, bleeding to death with low blood pressure and difficulty breathing. He died twice – the first time in transport to Ocala Regional and the second time on the operating table. Despite losing his spleen and part of his pancreas, Derek survived thanks to the trauma experts at Ocala Regional. Ms. Lawson and Dr. Kimbrell discussed the recent bills that did not pass the legislature and how citizens can affect the way their representatives vote in the next session.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Patricia Evans (verbalabuse.com), author, <u>Victory Over Verbal Abuse</u> and five other books; and Dr. Meredith Ferguson, Assistant Professor of Management, Jon Huntsman School of Business, Utah State University.

Incessant verbal abuse by a significant other can take a huge toll in misery. Abusers may be psychologically compensating for verbal, emotional, or sexual abuse they themselves received in childhood. Bosses are also significant abusers of subordinates, though for different reasons. Mr. Pence, Ms. Evans, and Dr. Ferguson discussed the consequences of verbal abuse, the hidden reasons it may occur, and what victims can do to stop verbal abuse.

2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Ira Lamster, Professor of Health Policy and Management, Mailman School of Public Health, Columbia University, and Dean Emeritus, Columbia University College of Dental Medicine.

Ms. Benson and Dr. Lamster discussed how people are keeping their teeth much longer than in previous generations and how it's creating new issues for them and for their dentists.

Guests: Dr. Donald Frust, Professor of Radiology and Pediatrics and Vice President of Safety and Quality, Duke University Medical Center; Dr. Susanna Lee, Chief of Women's Imaging, Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard Medical School; and Dr. James Brink, Chief Radiologist, Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard Medical School.

CT scans allow doctors to take a look inside the body to help make much more precise diagnoses, guiding treatment, avoiding mistakes, and preventing unnecessary surgeries. However, the X-rays emitted create a cancer risk, and doctors admit they don't know exactly how risky they can be. Mr. Pence, Dr. Frust, Dr. Lee, and Dr. Brink discussed the benefit vs. risk calculation for patients.

2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Emily Fetterer and Kimberlie Kranich, new parents; Angelica Pinkevich, mother of home-birthed children; "Anne", Certified Professional Midwife; Ashley Price, President, Illinois Friends of Midwives; Dr. Maura Quinlan, Chair, Illinois Section, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists; and William Haine, Illinois State Senator.

Home births have increased by more than 50% since 2004. However in 22 states, certified professional midwives have to work outside the law to assist women in home births. Although doctors and nurse midwives *can* assist home births, very few of them actually do, leaving many women without a single legal home-birth provider. Ms. Benson, Ms. Fetterer, Ms. Kranich, Ms. Pinkevich, "Anne", Ms. Price, Dr. Quinlan, and Senator Haine discussed what some activists call a home birth crisis in one such state – Illinois.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Louise B. Andrew, Emergency Room Physician and Attorney, MDMentor.com; Dr. Bob Patton, Nephrologist and Attorney, MediateNow.biz; and Dr. Jeffrey Segal, Neurological Surgeon and Chief Executive Officer, Medical Justice.com.

Doctors say frivolous malpractice suits are a major issue in driving up medical cost. Many doctors believe they're too often victimized by unethical "expert witnesses" who testify incompletely or untruthfully. Mr. Pence, Dr. Andrew, Dr. Patton, and Dr. Segal discussed why the justice system is relatively blind to erroneous medical testimony and the efforts that doctors are taking to get rid of it.

Guest: Dr. Jerome Kagan, Professor Emeritus of Psychology, Harvard University, and author, The Temperamental Thread.

Very little is understood about the creation of a personality. It is formed from natural-born temperament plus experience. Mr. Pence and Dr. Kagan discussed temperament, its origins, and the extent it can be changed or subverted.

Presenteeism is when people go to work at less than peak efficiency due to illness, injury, or distraction. Mr. Pence, Mr. Hosking, Mr. Whitthorne, and Mr. Klachevsky discussed the huge cost to the economy, the chronic illnesses that exact the most cost, and the accommodations that could save businesses billions of dollars.

Guest: Wendy Aronssen, Psychotherapist and author, <u>Refeathering the Empty Nest: Life</u> After the Children Leave.

Parents who have spent 18 years or more raising children often feel lost when the last child leaves home for college or into their own place. Mr. Pence and Ms. Aronssen discussed common reactions and strategies for renewing purposeful living in the empty nest.

Sunday, June 8, 2014 – Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Jayde Donavan, on-air host of WPOI-FM's morning show. Ms. Lawson and Ms. Donovan discussed the "Apple a Day" program that gives iPads to seriously ill children with cancer to aid in their recovery. Ms. Donovan explained how the gift helps get the young cancer patients through the arduous process of dealing with the issues relating to the disease such as chemo treatments. She elaborated on how she became interested in this program and how it's grown over the past several years. The "Apple a Day" program raised over \$25,000 from Cox employees and listeners, and the

iPads were given to the children at an event on June 7th. Ms. Lawson and Ms. Donovan discussed the toll cancer takes on the other children in a family and some of the options now available to patients and their families. Ms. Donovan explained how this technology helps kids keep in touch with teachers and their friends while they are in the hospital.

Every generation thinks that the one behind it is full of spoiled, entitled, lazy kids, prompting parenting advice that research shows is actually harmful to children. Mr. Pence and Mr. Kohn discussed why conventional wisdom about raising kids is often all wrong.

Guest: Carlin Flora, author, <u>Friendfluence: The Surprising Ways Friends Make Us Who</u> We Are.

Research shows that friends are the most powerful people in our lives, influencing our behavior, attitudes, and health even more than our parents or spouses. Mr. Pence and Ms. Flora discussed the many ways friends determine our destinies.

Ms. Lawson and Ms. Bouvier discussed the "Beauty Boot Camp" event which is coming up next weekend to benefit the Alzheimer's Association in Tampa. Ms. Bouvier shared her personal story of taking care of her ill mother suffering with the disease and how much it affected her family as well as the patient. The Gulf Coast Chapter is sponsoring the June 21st (the longest day of the year) event to highlight the challenges care givers face dealing with dementia patients. Ms. Lawson and Mr. Bouvier also talked about the standard test that should be added to every adult's health care routine. Good health protocols were explored as a way to help reduce the incidence of Alzheimer's. One of the event's goals is to help people connect and support each other while they deal with the disease.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Shelley Simonton, SCAD patient; Dr. Sharonne Hayes, Founder, Women's Heart Clinic, Mayo Clinic; and Carol Vich, SCAD patient.

A form of heart attack that strikes young, seemingly healthy people — most of them women, often near childbirth — is increasing. Mr. Pence, Ms. Simonton, and Dr. Hayes discussed heart attacks caused by arteries that split open rather than blockages.

Guests: Dr. Robb Willer, Professor of Sociology, Stanford University; and Dr. Matthew Feinberg, Postdoctoral Fellow, Stanford University.

Most people regard gossip with disdain. While backbiting and vicious slander are usually disruptive, Mr. Pence, Dr. Willer, and Dr. Feinberg discussed the research that has found that informational gossip has benefits for society by keeping people in line with societal norms.

Ms. Alvarez also shared details of first-time homeowner classes, mortgage loan modifications, and the additional funding for Florida's hardest hit – those homeowners who need help paying their mortgages because they are now unemployed.

The event will feature keynote speaker and author, Derek Clark, and will be held on Friday, May 16, at Pepin's Hospitality Centre, 4121 North 50th Street in Tampa. The

event will mark the five-year anniversary of A Kid's Place and honor its late founder, Dottie Berger MacKinnon, with the presentation of the newly created Dottie Berger MacKinnon Guardian Angel Award presented by her widower, Mr. Sandy MacKinnon. In 2009, Dottie Berger MacKinnon founded A Kid's Place with the goal of changing the way sibling groups are handled in the foster care system. The state-of-the-art facility features a unique layout and a homelike atmosphere where siblings are able to continue living together during a traumatic time in their young lives. This initiative also strives to provide an enriching experience for the children while instilling hope, encouraging growth, and offering opportunities for success. Today, A Kid's Place houses 60 children as it continues to foster change in residential group care in the State of Florida.

Ms. Lawson and Ms. LeDesma discussed the new initiative surrounding the adoption of children specifically in the United States. Mr. Gill shared his and his wife's story of adopting four children after their biological children were grown. He explained how much fulfillment they have experienced through adoption.

Ms. Wilburn shared her personal story of how having a guide dog has changed her life and the freedom a dog allows those with sight constraints. She explained the process of how the clients and dogs are paired and emphasized what a non-sighted person can expect a dog to do that will enhance their life. Ms. Sheppard talked about the breeding program at SEGD and what kind of temperament and other specific behavioral characteristics they look for. She also shared how the public can become involved by puppy raising, puppy petting excursions, donations, puppy naming, and gifting of supplies. Ms. Edwards talked about the health issues common to both dogs and people. She chronicled the plants and animals specific to Florida that are poisonous and explained how to treat accidental ingestions or encounters.
