Government	News	4/3/18	10:15am,	30sec	A lawsuit was filed over the added 2020 Census question about citizenship. In the suit, 17 states, the District of Columbia and 6 cities demand the question be removed. They say it will undermine the accuracy of the questionnaire.

China has filed a complaint with the World Trade Organization against planned American tariffs on Chinese goods. The White House has suggested adding a 25 percent trade tariff to 50 billion dollars of merchandise imported from Beijing. Our trade deficit was up in February to a 9 ½ year high. Both imports and exports were up. Experts say it's a sign of strong domestic and global demand. President Trump is asking for another \$100 billion in tariffs on Chinese products. U.S. Trade representative Robert Lighthizer said it is an appropriate response.

Companies have been limiting insurance coverage of opioids. There's concerns about addiction.

It's believed the Syrian government attacked civilians with chemical weapons. Ambassador Nikki Haley said the world must see justice done. Israel likely launched a missile strike against a major military base in Syria. About a dozen lost their life, including Iranians active in Syria. The incident happened after a poison gas attack against Syrian rebels over the weekend. President Trump says there will be a "big price to pay" for a weekend chemical weapons attack on Syrian civilians. More than 45 people lost their lives, including children. He is deciding how to respond to a chemical attack in Syria that took dozens of lives. He said his decision will probably be by the end of the day.

The confirmation came directly from Pyongyang, and not through South Korea. The summit between President Trump and North Korea President Kim Jong Un still hasn't been scheduled. It is expected in May or early June. North Korean officials re-emphasized Kim is open to denuclearization discussions.

There was a plan late last year to double some entry fees, but the public spoke up and the Interior Department got rid of that plan. 80 percent of the fees collected will stay in the park where it was received.

Russia has military forces in several places in Syria.</p> <p>Some Syrians are saying American and French airstrikes are providing hope after living for years under Assad's regime in a seven-year Civil War. The Pentagon says the weekend's strikes dealt a serious blow to the Syrian chemical weapons program. Speaking of chemical weapons, independent investigators have been kept from visiting the scene of the alleged gas attack near the Syrian capital. Both the U.S. and France say they have evidence of poison was used in the area to take the lives of dozens of people. Today independent investigators were not allowed access to the site of a suspected chemical attack in Syria. Russian and Syrian soldiers claimed 'security issues' are in play. And after that missile attack last week by American and allied countries – intended to stop Syria's chemical program, Russia is now responding... with a build-up. Two warships loaded with tanks and other military gear are headed for Syria. U.N. Ambassador Nikki Haley said if the Syrian government uses chemical weapons again, America is locked and loaded ready to respond.</p>

Photos show large caged rooms with hundreds of children inside.</p> <p>So far, 2,000 kids have been separated from their families after entering the country illegally. Members of Congress toured the immigration detention center in Texas and noted the caged rooms where the kids are kept. There's more support for a change in policy. First lady Melania Trump weighed in children being separated from their parents at the border, saying she believes we should follow the law, but also govern with heart. The acting Homeland Security Secretary said she won't apologize for enforcing immigration laws resulting in children being separated from their parents. Nielsen says the children have food, medical attention and education. Some have criticized the 'zero-tolerance' policy, saying keeping children in cages is inhumane. Former First Lady Barbara Bush commented about separating families at the border, saying that although she appreciated the need to protect our international boundaries, she believed the 'zero tolerance' policy was cruel and immoral. President Trump said today the united states will not be a migrant camp and won't be a refugee holding facility. It was in response to criticism of immigration policies involving kids and parents. He's asking congress to fix it.</p>

There have been so many packages of shirts, pants, underwear and notes of encouragement that the center had to rent additional storage space. The House this week, is expected to vote on an immigration bill, at this point, not likely to pass. A charity in Texas says they took in dozens of parents immigrating to the US from Mexico. The parents were held at a detention center. This is the first large release by the government since the president's executive order was signed last Wednesday. The Trump Administration announced its plan for the more than 2000 families separated due to the 'zero tolerance' immigration policy—parents can have reunited with their children if they agree to be deported together. The parents have the option of waiting for asylum but may not see their children for months or years. President Trump says due process for illegal border crossings is too time consuming, suggesting quick deportation instead of families being able to seek asylum in front of an immigration judge.
