Irma is currently about 50 miles east of Fort Myers. Wind was measured at 78 miles an hour near Tampa Bay just about an hour and a half ago. 9:00pm Irma is currently a category 2 hurricane. It's about 50 miles south east of Tampa with maximum sustained winds of 100 miles per hour. 10:00pm Irma remains a Category 2 hurricane with maximum sustained winds of 100 mph. Its 40 miles south east of Tampa, and moving north at 14 miles per hour. Irma's eye is currently forecast to hit Georgia by late afternoon. Georgia's Governor expanded the state of emergency to the entire state. Only emergency personnel and law enforcement officers will be allowed on the roads. South Carolina will feel the effects of the outer bands as well. Even though it looks like Irma is losing strength. There is still the possibility of property damage, downed trees, and power outages. Flooding is expected in seven states, Florida, Georgia, North and South Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama, and Louisiana. 11pm Irma has weakened to a category 1 hurricane. It's about 25 miles north east of Tampa with maximum sustained winds of 85 miles per hour. Irma's path has seen some regular changes, it is currently forecasted to travel through Tallahassee through Monday morning, and it will come into Georgia and Alabama into Tuesday. So prepare now, even though it may sound like Irma is losing strength. There's still the possibility of property damage, downed trees, road hazards and power outages. Residents are strongly encouraged to stay indoors, let the sun rise before you go outside. In South Florida emergency workers will begin clearing debris once it's safe to do so; no one in Miami should be moving around. And authorities in the Florida Keys say crews will begin house to house searches later today. Airports in Miami, Orlando, Fort Lauderdale AND Tampa are all closed. The storm has left more than 4.1 million people in Florida without power. Tornado warnings are in effect for Brevard and St. Johns Counties. Broward County has a county-wide curfew in place which won't be lifted until ten tomorrow morning. Deerfield, Aventura, and Hillsboro Beach are also under curfew. Miami,

has one starting at seven tonight. These curfews are in place for your safety, violation of them could lead to a fine and immediate arrest. Authorities really need you to stay off the streets and stay indoors where you're safer. There is an odd anomaly in Tampa Bay, the water was pushed out...but please do not go out and explore. Yes you could potentially see what was Old Tampa Bay but if you decide to investigate you will be in severe danger. That water retracted because of Irma's wind bands mixed with unusually low tides but once the wind moves out the water will return very, very quickly. 14 States have committed Guardsmen to assist the 7,000 soldiers in Florida's Army and Air National Guard with efforts related to Irma. The Miami-Florida State grudge match will have to wait till October 7<sup>th</sup>, it was scheduled for September 16<sup>th</sup> in Tallahassee but that is in Irma's path so it was postponed. Students attending the University of Miami should not expect to attend lecture until September 18<sup>th</sup> as the university is keeping both campuses closed until that time. Extreme hurricane-force winds of 77-92mph are continuing throughout southern Florida and the Keys. Officials say it's the strongest hurricane strike in 57 years. The White House says President Trump, Vice President Pence, and several Cabinet members have received a Hurricane Irma briefing and are planning to visit FEMA headquarters later today. President Trump has approved a major disaster declaration for Florida, which will make federal funding available for affected counties like Charlotte, Hillsborough, Lee, Manatee, Monroe, Miami-Dade, Sarasota, Collier, and of course the Keys. Some of the assistance could take the form of low-cost loans for uninsured property losses, grants for home repairs and temporary housing. The biggest concern Governor Scott has is the life-threatening storm surge, Naples for example saw water rise eight feet in two hours. Storm surge warnings have also been extended up the Georgia coast and into southern South Carolina, as well as most of the Florida coastline. All access to Miami Beach is prohibited until the roads are clear. There is a mandatory boil water warning that was issued for Hollywood and Broward Counties. In some areas it may appear the hurricane has passed and some people are ready to leave shelters and take stock of the damage. You are being strongly encouraged to not do that, curfews are still in place, and it is not yet safe to be out and about. Two manatees were stranded in Sarasota Bay earlier when the storm sucked the water out of the bay, and some good Samaritans decided to help, after trying to alert authorities they grabbed some tarp and used the tarps to gently get the marooned sea creatures that weigh several hundred pounds back out to deeper water. A Tornado Warning is in effect until midnight tonight for most of the Florida Peninsula. Irma is creating the perfect conditions for more tornadoes. So stay alert! Hurricane and Storm Surge Warnings are also in effect for most of Florida's southwest coast. Evacuating to a shelter

is no longer the best option for many in the keys and south Florida, authorities say to shelter in place in an interior room on the top floor of your house. Put your shoes on just in case and protect yourself from debris with things like pillows, helmets or mattresses. South and southwest Florida storm surges are expected to get as high as 15 feet and to be accompanied by 25 inches of rain. Streets in downtown Miami are already filling with water. The Atlantic coast is expecting a surge up to 6 feet. Meanwhile southern Georgia was just issued a Hurricane warning as hundreds of people make their way to the Columbus Civic Center. Glen County Sewer officials say service will be cut on Saint Sayemons Island south of Savannah. 3 people so far have lost their lives in car accidents during the storm. Officials have issued a *Precautionary Boil Water Notice* for the Keys. Florida officials say 127,000 people across the state have taken refuge in more than 500 shelters as Hurricane Irma takes aim at the state. Division of Emergency Management did not specify which shelters had the most people. One of the many tower cranes in Miami collapsed this morning because of increased wind gusts as Irma made landfall in the Keys. Georgia and Alabama are bracing for Irma as well. Forecasters believe the center of Irma will be in will hit Georgia by late afternoon. High winds bring with it the potential for power outages and downed power lines and trees. It's not safe outside until the storm has passed and cleanup is done. Officials are slowly piecing together the extent of Irma's path of destruction across the state. The fate of the Florida Keys remains largely a question mark. We do know there is no water, power or cell service on the islands. The Keys highway remains closed, and must be checked for safety before travel will be allowed back onto the islands. It's believed about 10,000 of us rode out the storm in the Keys, and could require evacuation. Officials warn us to please don't try to return to the Keys until you get an official okay. Police are warning of scams in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma. In Boynton Beach, two men posing as power company workers stole nearly \$13,000 in jewelry from a 95-year-old woman. Police say there is no reason for anyone with a power company to enter individual homes at this time. Any power company officials will be credentialed and most will be driving vehicles marked with company signage. Gov. He also says the Navy has deployed three ships, including the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln, to help provide emergency services, in the Keys. Scott also flew over the west coast and said the damage was not as bad as he thought it would be. Cleanup in the Keys is focused on the roads and the airports. They will be very important in getting rescuers and supplies to people who need it. It's been said the airport runways at the Key West airport are in excellent shape, and crews are working to get the Marathon Airport back up and running. Many airports are operating but on a limited basis. If you do have a flight at any of the airports in the state call ahead and make sure your flight is on schedule. Recovery efforts are underway. Some stores and restaurants have begun to open in some areas, which make it seem just a little bit more normal for some of us. Some evacuation orders were lifted for about 90-thousand of us living in Miami and the Keys. Officials say if you go home, it's probably not a good idea to stay there yet. In Jacksonville, officials say they've had some of the worst flooding in 100 years. Jacksonville Sheriff Mike Williams

says they're still assessing damage to the beach bridges, and they'll let us know when it's safe to return. In general, travel will be difficult, and it's not really safe to move around just yet. The best bet is to check with floridadisaster.org to find what roadways are open, and which are closed. You also may find information on where gas may be available. Miami International is expected to open today as is Orlando's airport. Speaking of Orlando, most of the parks will be re-opening today, which is good news. KLOVE and Air1 have partnered with Convoy of Hope to provide resources in the greatest areas of need distributing food, water and hygiene kits. They began helping in Houston, Texas and now they're in Daytona and Fort Myers here in Florida. Jeff Nene with our ministry partner, Convoy of Hope, says they're preparing to get ready for Florida operations, however, they aren't completely sure when that will begin. We're having to play some of that by ear, the two biggest issues right now in Florida are fuel and infrastructure. So we're having to wait you know much longer than we'd hoped for. Join with us in prayer for all here in Florida, as we've all been impacted by Irma in some form or another. The rescue and recovery will be ongoing for a long time.
