Date	Program Summary
1/7/24	Can crisis tip us into an ecologically sane civilization? UK Think tank report author Laurie Laybourn on a future where disasters ripple across the world. Then let's get away – to Antarctica. Why did sea ice crash around that frozen continent? Increasing El Nino events may drive global sea levels higher. Australian scientist Adriaan Purich shares big changes at the South Pole.
1/14/24	Welcome to a wild ride into "Necrocapitalism" – cutting observations by Greek scientist and author <b>George Tsakraklides</b> . Then more worrying news about methane: frozen under the deep sea around every continent, methane can melt, migrate and release closer to shore. We talk through this new discovery from Petroleum Geologist and Pro-Vice Chancellor of Newcastle University <b>Richard Davies</b> . It all wraps up with my short-take on French Situationalist <b>Guy Debord</b> and "Society of the Spectacle". You are living in it. All the creative images in this blog were created by our guest <b>George Tsakraklides</b> , as an artist using Al tools.
1/21/24	The Amazon – lungs of the world – is in last-stage crisis. It is boiling in record smashing heat, drought, and fire. We visit the last stand with <b>Rhett Butler</b> , Founder and CEO of independent media hub Mongabay. Does it seem more stormy where you live? Senior scientist <b>Aiguo Dai</b> confirms the atmosphere has been destabilized and is expected to get more wild as warming continues. I repeat: the atmosphere is destabilized. The show wraps with <b>Dr. Douglas Sheil</b> in Norway: can trees make their own weather?
1/28/24	A warming world is pushing us off the "snow cliff". Snow drought is increasing. Dry fire-filled summers with low rivers and crop loss surely follow in many parts of the Northern Hemisphere. We talk with Lead Author <b>Alexander Gottlieb</b> from Dartmouth. Then "satellites

	don't lie". Australian mining expert <b>Dr. Tim Werner</b> finds twice as much mining activity and damage, half of it undocumented – the dark mining economy.
2/4/24	Cornell Professor <b>Robert Howarth</b> returns to Radio Ecoshock reporting the whole Liquefied Natural Gas process leaks so much methane it may be worse than coal for the climate.  Oxford Professor <b>Raymond Pierrehumbert</b> tells us methane worries are overblown. Carbon dioxide is the real threat driving Earth to a horrible Hothouse state.
2/11/24	Is your city ready for extreme heat, floods, and wind? No! It is time for "Radical Adaptation" with Professor <b>Brian Stone</b> , Director of the Urban Climate Lab at Georgia Tech. Can we still make cement, steel – the basics – without fossil fuels? Is fossil-free tech out there now? We catch up with <b>Jeffrey Rissman</b> , Senior Director, Industry at Energy Innovation.
2/18/24	Horrendous climate-driven storms are here. From Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, senior scientist <b>Dr. Michael Wehner</b> makes the case for Cat 6. Electricity from natural gas is more reliable than renewables, right? Wrong. <b>Mark Specht</b> from the Union of Concerned Scientists finds gas plant failures bring grids down. From the New Zealand <b>Joseph Merz</b> on the latest World scientists' warning: The behavioral crisis driving ecological overshoot.
2/25/24	1.5 degrees C is already behind us. Could 2 degrees of warming arrive by 2030? Despite pushback, <b>Dr. Malcolm McCulloch</b> makes the case from Perth, during Australia's roasting, hottest-ever February. But first, UK Professor Emeritus and psychoanalyst <b>Paul Hoggett</b> on climate, victimhood, and the authoritarian urge.
3/3/24	Renewables cannot power the world we know. <b>Dr. Simon Michaux</b> from the Geological Survey of Finland crunched the numbers: not enough time, and not enough metals. In this unique interview on <b>Rachel Donald's PlanetCritical</b> broadcast, Michaux explains the limits – and what we CAN do in a sustainable society.
3/10/24	Amid human disasters, some hope evolution can save us. Maine Professor <b>Tim Waring</b> worries evolutionary design may stop humans from solving climate change. New science: a major meltdown in Antarctica can happen not in thousands of years, but less than 200. That leads to a new age of rapid sea level rise around the world. Royal Society Research Professor <b>Eric Wolff</b> explains.

3/17/24	Lost in endless political hype, this planet is hotter. Expert Earth System Modeler <b>Till Kulhbrodt</b> says this may be a glimpse of a future three degrees above pre-industrial. Are we approaching tipping points, or are some already behind us? We revisit an interview with <b>Dr. Tim Lenton</b> on cascading tipping points, as I line up guests to report the latest tipping science. The show closes with tips to survive times of mass fear. But first, let's learn more from the best, about how our planetary home really works.
3/24/24	When big systems flip into another state, that is trouble for species needing normal. Like us. We get the latest on global tipping points in 2023 from one of the world's experts, <b>Professor Tim Lenton</b> from Exeter University. Then we explore earth energy imbalance at the poles with <b>Hamish Prince</b> and "greenlash" – backward steps in the European Union.
3/31/24	Is it science or fiction? Both! Top climate science fiction writers <b>Kim Stanley Robinson</b> & <b>Bruce Sterling</b> . Robinson shocked the world with his 2020 book "The Ministry of the Future" where 20 million people perished in a massive heat wave. We talk consequences in a new interview. My feature on the climate sci-fi work of Bruce Sterling was produced in 2006 – but sounds like today (unfortunately).
