"Leaving Selma"

*** This program, coinciding with the Martin Luther King Holiday and Black History Month, told the story of the dramatic march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, known as "Bloody Sunday", and cut short by violence when law enforcement officers openly and brutally attacked peaceful demonstrators as they attempted to cross the Edmund Pettus Bridge. This event was memorable because it took place in front of news cameras, and the images so shocked the public that America no longer could turn its head to racial discrimination happening in the South. Andrew Young was there, and he tells the personal story behind the march. He focused on the lessons learned, on the present and not the past, and on the fact that a single confrontation on an Alabama bridged changed America for the better.
