****** Christina Leavenworth reported on two new career academies are now coming to Escambia County schools. The county is sponsoring a Firefighter Academy at Pine Forest High School and a Criminal Justice Academy at Escambia High School. The goal is for graduates to have a basic understanding of the job and then it will be much easier to train them straight from high school.

******* A number of students at Bellview Middle School spent the day on Tuesday teaching. About 125 students went to the elementary school to read to and mentor select students. Administrators say the program is not only enriching for the younger ones but for the mentors as well. The middle school students had to apply to be part of this mentorship program and receive special training in how to talk to younger students.

******* Anthony Pura reported that a controversial sign in Santa Rosa County classrooms stating that "students are invited to stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of our country, but are not required to do so", may lead to a new law modernizing the language written 70 years ago. Rep Doug Broxson, Rep. Mike Hill and Sen. Greg Evers held a public hearing Tuesday night at Pace High School to address some of the concerns many have raised over the signs. The signs went up in classrooms back in October, after a student and parent complained to teachers saying the Pledge of Allegiance isn't only optional, but the law requires the school to remind students they don't have to take part in it. Broxson said the original law was written 70 years ago. He believes the language needed to get revamped to fit its intent. Broxson along with Evers and Hill are drafting a bill that would clarify what's expected from students in regards to the Pledge of Allegiance. They're also proposing that a reminder in the student handbook be enough to satisfy the law.
