Domestic violence should always be handled by professionals and not friends and family", said Hand.

Consumer Reports says a mechanic should conduct a thorough inspection, but also gave tips for the average viewer to help recognize these vehicles. And if you're from an area affected by a flood and have a car that wasn't damaged, be aware that buyers might be wary. Consider having a mechanic inspect your car before you put it up for sale so you can present potential buyers with a clean bill of health

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* In our "Consumer Reports" segment, we reported that as fall weather sets in, so do the nagging coughs and head colds that seem to spread so quickly, from child to child. There are concerns being raised about children getting into cough and cold medicines and accidentally overdosing -- and the health team at Consumer Reports say the dangers are very real. While you should never give cough and cold medicine to kids under four, beyond that, there's not a lot of evidence they work very well anyway, so you may want to try some home remedies instead. You want to keep kids hydrated, with things like warm drinks, soup or decaffeinated tea -- those things may loosen congestion and soothe a sore throat. For kids one-year-old and over, try adding a bit of honey -- which some research has shown, can be as effective at relieving a cough as some over-the-counter cough drugs. Kids five and older can suck on a sugar-free lozenge or candy -- which can reduce the urge to cough and soothe an irritated throat, as can mixing a half teaspoon of salt in a cup of warm water, for a gargling solution. If you do have young children at home, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advises people to put medications Up and Away -- out of children's reach and sight. And, always lock the cap on a medicine bottle.

On Tuesday the sheriff's office hosted a neighborhood watch academy to teach folks how to handle different situations. The academy covered more than just keeping an eye on your neighbor's house. It also tackled more serious, dangerous situations, including how to handle active shooter scenarios. ECSO Chief Deputy Chip Simmons said these type of scenarios are one of many they teach. Richard Miller, a neighbor watch president in Escambia County, encourages people to take time to get to know their neighbors ... if you're friendly with people then you're going to be more concerned about their well-being. Alert ID is a service that helps identify crime in where you live. It allows people to search reported crimes in neighborhoods including theft, assaults and registered sex offenders.

\*10 Escambia County Fire Rescue, in collaboration with the Pensacola Fire Department, will launch its annual "Keep the Wreath Green" fire safety campaign Friday, Dec. 1. While a joyous time of year, cold weather, holiday decorations, and festivities can create serious fire dangers. Firefighters hope to reduce the number of fires by promoting simple, life-saving holiday safety tips each day, Dec. 1 through the 31. During the month-long campaign, five-foot wreaths will also be on display at 18 county fire stations and five city fire stations. Each time firefighters respond to a residential fire with damage, a green light bulb will be replaced with a red one to remind citizens of the dangers posed by fires in the residential home. In 2016, 12 bulbs were changed to red on county wreaths. We provided viewers with the Fire Department's list of daily tips to prevent fires throughout the month.

Pensacola Police Department (PPD) Public Information Officer Mike Wood said this type of crime is not exclusive to the city of Pensacola or Northwest Florida, but happen across the country. Men and women, so-called "porch pirates", can be seen walking up to homes and quickly getting away with boxes and other goods. Wood said crimes like these spike during the holiday season, and offered suggestions to eliminate the threat or temptation of would-be thieves.

\*12 Texting while driving could soon become a primary traffic offense in Florida. That means law enforcement officers would no longer need a second reason, like speeding, to pull someone over. The newly unveiled legislation, backed by House Speaker Richard Corcoran, would also bring harsher penalties for people caught texting or emailing behind the wheel, including increased fines and the possibility of racking up points on a driver's license. The bill would also include additional penalties for texting violations that result in car crashes or happen while driving through school zones. This bill will be on the table when the 2018 Legislative Session gets underway next month.

\*13 David Gonzalez reported road crews are keeping a close eye on the weather as a cold front is expected to roll through Northwest Florida bringing with it winter weather conditions. The exact impact the storm will have on this area is unknown but the Florida Department of Transportation isn't taking any chances. The big concern is black ice forming on roadways and bridges if temperatures fall below freezing. Ian Satter, spokesperson for FDOT, said the department doesn't want to see a repeat of the 2014 January ice storm that crippled the area. In recent years, Satter said the department bought several salt and chemical spreaders to prevent or remove ice that might build up on roadways and bridges. FDOT will pre-spray bridges in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties with snow melting chemicals as a preemptive measure on Thursday night and early Friday morning.

\*15 In our "Consumer Reports" segment, we reported that car crash deaths are on the rise and many experts believe driver distraction from smartphones remains a problem. In a recent survey Consumer Reports found 52% of licensed drivers who own a smartphone texted, played music, browsed the web, sent emails, or watched videos. Many smartphone and tech companies are introducing safety measures for teens and adults while driving, like a mode which blocks alerts for both calls or texts. Many newer car models have infotainment systems that can contribute to drivers taking their eyes off the road. Ironically, at the same time, many car manufacturers are also developing newer technologies designed to make new cars safer, like lane departure and collision warning systems - even automatic emergency braking systems - to help distracted drivers avoid dangerous situations. These can be useful, but Consumer Reports says nothing beats keeping your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road.
