Hitchcock says Cain's pipes apparently froze and she went to a nearby river to fill a bucket to give her chickens water.

That's where her body was found frozen in the river.

Sheriff Hitchcock says Pauline Cain was an independent and active woman who lived by herself. We'll keep you updated as more information is released.

TAXI DRIVER STABBED

A Chattanooga taxi driver is recovering tonight after one of his customers reportedly stabbed him over the weekend

Anthony Taylor was on duty Saturday night when a woman stabbed him several times in the ear with a box cutter.

Taylor drives for the Millenium Taxi Service.

It happened after Taylor was dropping off the woman near the Intersection of 36th street and 5th avenue.

Today, Taylor's supervisor, Beverly Bogan, says when the woman tried to get away without paying, Taylor grabbed onto the woman's shirt.

Thats when the woman reportedly stabbed Taylor in the ear and took off.

Taylor had to have 20 stitches.

It's a scare for many taxi drivers.

"If I get anybody that's kind of skeptical, I'll ask them do they have change because you're my first run for the day, or something like that, just to make them think that 'I'm not trying to say you have money, because I don't know if you do or not,'" said Sherrie Foster, a head taxi driver. Head Taxi driver Sherrie Foster told us that Taylor has picked the woman before. Taylor has been driving for the Millennium Taxi service since December. At last check, no arrests have been made.

BURGLARY VICTIM FIGHTS BACK

A burglary victim fights back against her attacker over the weekend.

Police say 24 year old Deangelo Lovinggood pulled a gun on Annie Rice when she came to answer her door at her Tunnel Boulevard home.

Lovinggood tried to force his way into Rice's home, but she wasn't having it.

She tells us that she began "beating" the man until a neighbor heard the commotion, and turned on a light..

That's when Lovinggood ran away.

Police arrested Lovinggood not long after getting the call.

They matched the cuts and bruises on his face to Rice's description.

Lovinggood faces 2 counts each of aggravated burglary and aggravated assault.

He is in jail with no bond.

MOLD FORCES CATOOSA FIREFIGHTERS OUT OF STATION

Winter weather has forced several schools and government buildings to shut their doors.

But one Catoosa County agency has closed for another, more dangerous, reason.

We confirmed today with multiple Catoosa County officials that Fire Station 3 has closed its doors for health reasons, primarily mold.

Right now we don't know the extent of the contamination, but in the meantime, an empty firehouse is causing an uneasy community.

"Now that it's closed down, if people have a house fire, you have got to go to a different fire department," said Robert Gresham, a resident of Catoosa County.

It's a concern shared by many in Catoosa County: could firefighters' response time from a station farther away... make the difference between life or death?

One of the engines from Station 3 on Highway 41 has been relocated to Station 7 on Lakeview Drive.

That could mean an increase in response time by four or five minutes, but we have yet to confirm if, in fact, response times are affected.

Meanwhile, Yellow "Do Not Cross" tape lies across the entrance to the Catoosa County Fire Department, Station 3.

The parking lot sits empty.

And the doors are locked.

...are locked.

Catoosa County officials confirmed earlier today that Station 3 is condemned while being restored to proper health standards.

One resident says he is glad the Health Department has intervened.

"Absolutely. I think the county should fund it to be cleaned up so they can have a functioning office to help us for our needs. That's what they're there for, right?" said Chad Vance, a resident of Catoosa County.

County Commissioner Jim Cutler says the Health Department put the tape up earlier this week. But this doesn't sit well with residents who say they aren't receiving the fire protection they deserve.

We weren't able to speak with anyone in the health department today, since their office was closed due to weather.

We did try to reach Fire Chief Chuck Nichols, at work and by cell phone several times but were not able to reach him.

Right now, we are working to confirm more details surrounding this issue.

We will continue to update you as we learn more from the Health Department, and Catoosa County government officials.

SINKHOLES OPEN UP ACROSS TN VALLEY

A huge sinkhole opens up on Shallowford Road near Lee Highway.

A barricaded turn lane was set up earlier today while crews temporarily fixed the hole by filling it in with cement.

Crews think it may have been caused by a water main break.

A plan is now being devised on how to permanently fix the hole.

The lane will be closed for at least the next few days.

Meanwhile, part of a parking lot off of Ringgold Road in East Ridge is blocked off as well because of a sinkhole at Jones Memorial United Methodist Church. The city's street supervisor says the church installed the drain about 50 years ago, and it has since decayed. Jones Memorial is responsible for the repairs.

Yet another sinkhole is plaguing the parking lot of the SunTrust Bank in St. Elmo. The bank has blocked off the area near the teller lanes. It appears work is being done to fill the hole with gravel. Bank customers say it's been there for several months.

CHILD DIES WHILE IN CARE OF FOSTER PARENTS

The GBI and Catoosa County Sheriff's Dept. are investigating the unexpected death of a foster child.

A Catoosa County deputy responded to Children's Hospital at Erlanger on Monday for possible child abuse.

Clara Edwards told the deputy that her 2-year-old foster child was playing when the girl slid down the stairs and bumped her head.

Then Edwards told the deputy there was another injury just a few hours later.

That's when the 2-year-old's brother found her in her room, where she had apparently fallen again and hit her head on a wooden wardrobe case.

Edwards says she shook the child, trying to wake her up, but could not get a response.

That's when she and her husband, Ronald, took both kids to Erlanger where the girl later died.

Catoosa County Sheriff Gary Sisk says they have requested an autopsy, and plan to speak with everyone who may have had contact with the child in the last 72 hours.

GIRLFRIEND OF DUI SUSPECT SPEAKS ABOUT THE CRASH THAT NEARLY KILLED HER KIDS

The girlfriend of the man arrested for a hit and run crash with his kids in the front seat is speaking out.

22-year-old Arterious Harris went before a judge this morning for his first appearance.

Police say Harris admitted to driving drunk last Friday on Orchard Knob Avenue.

They say his 1-and 2-year-old girls were in the front seat unrestrained.

Police say he hit two parked cars and never attempted to stop.

"That doesn't make any sense, if you know you're drunk and driving, then why would you drink anyway period, and drive with the kids in the car," said Tashay James, the suspect's girlfriend.

No one was hurt in the crash.

Harris' case was bound over to a grand jury.

If he makes bond, a judge has ordered Harris not to drive or consume alcohol, and he has to wear an alcohol monitoring device.

25-YEAR-OLD WOMAN DIES IN POLK CO. WRECK

A Cleveland woman has died after a serious accident on New Year's Day.

The single car wreck happened at 4:30 a.m. on Highway 411.

Tennessee Highway Patrol confirms 25-year-old Natasha Burchfield was thrown from her car after it left the roadway and rolled over.

She was taken to Skyridge medical center in critical condition and was then taken to Erlanger where she was pronounced dead.

Investigators believe alcohol and drugs may have been involved and she was not wearing a seatbelt.

We're working to find out exactly how many people suffered the same fate.

It's a good idea to let your water drip in your faucets at night and open your cabinets to let your heat from your home reach your pipes.

COLD CAUSES POWER OUTAGES

During the height of the cold weather the past couple of days, about 23-hundred customers of Volunteer Energy were without power..

This morning one of the power substations in Harrison went down, because components in the big transformers overheated from extreme demand..

Other substations had similar problems..

Robert McCarty with Volunteer Energy, says during the nights in the single digits, demand soared from people struggling to heat their homes..

JUST THE INCREASE IN THE DEMAND ON OUR SYSTEM COULD HAVE SUPPLIED POWER FOR ATHENS, 95-THOUSAND KILOWATTS WAS THE INCREASE.. THAT'S HOW MUCH WE BROKE OUR OLD RECORD BY, ENOUGH ELECTRICITY TO SUPPLY A CITY THE SIZE OF ATHENS..THE DEMAND HAS BEEN ABSOLUTELY UNPRECEDENTED," said Robert McCarty with Volunteer Energy.

We're told that most of the customers are now back online, as milder temperatures are easing demand..

Volunteer Energy serves 112-thousand customers from the Tennessee line north all the way to Kentucky..

MECHANICS KEEPING BUSY AFTER SNOWSTORM

Mechanics had a busy day fixing cars that had been in snow-related accidents...fortunately, many of those repairs were from low impact accidents.

That means that the repair time is faster, and the cars don't require parts to wait on.

reddick auto body shop holds up to 60 cars, they tell us they will be getting cars for the next 30 days, maybe even longer.

"It's like a hail storm just because of all the damage around town. Everybody's looking to get their cars fixed at the same time," said Buddy Gross with Reddick Auto Body.

The Chattanooga Police Department tells us there have been 323 accidents since Tuesday, but police only responded to accidents with severe injuries, so that number is actually a lot higher.

55 injuries were treated at Erlanger's entire system.

Amazon Sales Tax Goes Into Effect

If you live in Tennessee and you're planning on buying from Amazon, as of January 1st you must pay state and local sales taxes. The new tax started at midnight and you can see here what it looks like if you buy online. The online retail giant now collects the 7 percent states sales tax and average 2.5 percent local or Hamilton County sales tax on its products.

The tax is being implemented to boost Tennessee state revenue. And, in fairness to local retailers, there are 16 other states, including Georgia that require Amazon to collect sales tax. Amazon's sales tax will generate roughly 17 million dollars in state revenue yearly..

STATE COMPTROLLER FINDS ISSUES IN MEIGS COUNTY AUDIT

One public office in Meigs County receives a lashing from the state comptroller's office. The agency's latest report found 13 areas of serious concern in Meigs County's finance office. Those concerns include handling payroll, accounting, and budgeting.

In all, there were 20 findings in the report, which the state comptroller says, is "an unacceptably high number for any audit."

When asked if there was a loss of taxpayer dollars, County Mayor Garland Langford said, "NO, NO, NO.. PRIASE THE LORD, THAT WAS NOT THE CASE, MOST OF IT IS JUST FAILURE TO DO YOUR JOB IN A CERTAIN FASHION AND A CERTAIN MANNER ON PAPER."

But in fact, so far the county has spent 2 to 3 thousand taxpayer dollars, to fix the system so discrepancies don't happen again..

The former finance office director was fired, and the finance committee replaced.

TAXPAYERS FOOT BILL TO SUPERVISE SHOOTING SUSPECT

So far, it's costing taxpayers 28-thousand dollars to foot the bill for armed guards to supervise a Chattanooga shooting suspect..

Richard Manning is in custody right now in the hospital while receiving treatment for cancer..

He's accused of shooting and killing Norman Gallman during an apparent road rage incident last month..

Manning's court case is on hold because his attorney says, he's too sick to attend the court hearings..

There were 2 armed guards at the hospital the week of December 19th that were monitoring Manning..

After a week, that was changed to just one guard..

The case is scheduled to go before a judge again on March 18th..

Richard Manning is being held on a bond of 300-thousand dollars..

NATHAN DEAL WEIGHS IN ON GEORGIA SNOW RESPONSE

The car trouble is FAR from over for many drivers 90 minutes to the south of us, in Atlanta.

As of tonight there are STILL TWO THOUSAND abandoned cars on Atlanta's roads.

Crews say they plan to use four-wheel-drive vehicles to take motorists to them.

State officials say they will have fuel available for vehicles that ran out of gas.

They're also creating a database to help motorists locate vehicles that were towed.

Response from clean-up crews has drawn criticism from around the nation.

And today Georgia Governor Nathan Deal acknowledged the lashings.

"I have asked for an internal review by all the agencies involved in this process. We've had a preliminary meeting on that today. We have had offers of external reviews from other outside agencies who we will accept their input," said Deal.

Governor Deal went on to say he hopes the results of those investigations lead to a new plan of action for similar events in the future.

Meanwhile, Dalton Mayor David Pennington is running as a republican candidate for Governor. He says the gridlock was preventable.

On a smaller scale, the city of Dalton had its own problems with early school dismissal and road closures.

But Pennington says the state should have a plan for winter storms.

"the first thing they obviously should have done is pre-treat the roads. Some people say well that's a waste of money, but that's like paying your insurance premium. If the worst happens, you're glad you paid your insurance premium," said Pennington.

Deal faces re-election this year starting with the May 20th primary.

HASLAM GIVES STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam gave his State of the State address tonight.

One of his main focuses was community college, saying all Tennessee high school graduates could attend two years for free

It's called the Tennessee Promise proposal, and would operate at no direct expense to taxpayers. About \$302 million would be transferred out of Tennessee Education Lottery reserve funds to create an endowment, which would then be used to pay tuition and fees for students enrolling in the program.

ALSTOM ANNOUNCES FURLOUGHS

Alstom says it's furloughing about 250 workers in Chattanooga.

A spokesperson for the company says it's a temporary stoppage at the Chattanooga Boiler Workshop.

Alstom says it's adjusting its Boiler Service Centers in the US based on demand.

The furlough begins in March and will last 30 days.

During that time 80 employees will continue to work at the Boiler Workshop.
