Fresno county supervisor bob Waterston has filed paperwork with the county that's necessary if he decides to run for re-election. Waterston told action news today that he still does not intend to run but filed the papers as a formality in case he changes his mind over the next few months. He announced back in September that he's stepping down at the end of his term later this year. Waterston has been a county supervisor since being elected in 2000. clovis city councilman Nathan Magsig has announced plans to run for Waterston's seat as well as Debbie Poochigian, the wife of former state senator chuck Poochigian.

A north valley school district is asking voters to approve a large bond for a new high school when they head to the polls on February 5th. Action News reporter Sara Sandrik looks at why administrators say the Los Banos district is in desperate need and why some property owners don't want to foot the bill. Los Banos High school is filled with more than 24-hundred students. But it was only built for about half that number. Administrators say the overcrowding causes more discipline problems and creates safety concerns.

Fresno's mayoral hopefuls sought to separate themselves from the pack during a debate in northeast Fresno. The debate format allowed candidates to briefly ask questions of each other. Fresno's mayoral candidates hoped to improve their standing in the public eye. An exclusive action news/survey USA poll on January 8th showed Henry T. Perea attracting 27-percent of likely voters. Tom Boyajian second at 15-percent and Ashley Swearengin with 12-percent. The debate was sponsored by the central California Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. Candidates were asked how they would've handled Donald trump's failed bid to develop running horse. The challenge was to separate themselves from a crowded field. Public safety ranked high among all candidates.

With the theme from "Rocky" playing in the background, John McCain celebrated a knock-out win in South Carolina's republican primary last night, after being snubbed here last time he ran. It was moderate and independent voters who pushed McCain past Mike Huckabee. Huckabee's broad support from Christian voters just wasn't enough to win. To the west in Nevada, another win for Democrat Hillary Clinton, after an intense and bitter battle with Barack Obama. Hispanics and women helped Clinton win. But African American voters overwhelmingly supported Obama. Raising concerns over Clinton's chances in the democrats' South Carolina primary, where black voters could account for half the turnout there. It was Mitt Romney who easily won the republican caucus in Nevada, perhaps because he tried. He was the only major candidate to campaign in the state. The republican race still has no clear front-runner. And now, it has fewer challengers. Duncan Hunter dropped out of the race before the votes were even tallied. And Fred Thompson's presidential hopes are in serious doubt. He desperately needed a win, but came in a disappointing third. Next up for the democrats: next weekend's primary here in South Carolina, while Republicans head to Florida for that state's critical primary on January 29th.

California also votes on Super Tuesday and tomorrow is the last day for Californians to register. To vote in California, you must be 18-years old by Election Day, a US citizen, and a California resident. Again, the registration deadline for the February fifth election is tomorrow. The last day to request an absentee ballot for the primary is January 29th, that's a week from tomorrow. Elections officials must receive those ballots by eight p-m on Election Day. They can be hand-delivered to county polling places.

A recent study just released by the Public Policy Institute of California shows more voters in the state are leaving traditional party lines. As the partisan divide between democrats and republicans deepens more voters are registering as independent or "Decline- to - State" one more prediction from Professor Unruh concerning independent voters. If Hillary Clinton and Rudy Giuliani are the democratic and republican candidates in the general election predicts New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg will jump in the race as an independent.

Today is the last day to register to vote for the California primary next month. Election workers and volunteers have been canvassing the state hoping to get as many Californians as possible to the polls. Some of the Republican candidates for President appear to be running out of money and that could put their campaigns in jeopardy. Candidate Mike Huckabee today grounded his press plane for lack of money. Rudy Giuliani and John McCain are back in Florida after leaving the state to raise money in New York. Both are so low on funds senior staffers on their campaigns are foregoing salaries. And the upcoming primaries won't be cheap if candidates want to get their message out. Running TV ads in Florida can cost up to 2 million dollars a week. In New York it's up to three million a week, and here in California it costs up to four million!

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 1/24/08, LENGTH :27 SEC. LOCAL

A new poll looks ahead to possible matchups in the presidential race. The Los Angeles Times-Bloomberg poll finds that in a general election, either of the two leading Democrats, Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama, would beat Republican's Mitt Romney, Rudy Giuliani or Mike Huckabee by more than 10 points. When put up against John McCain, it would be a much closer race. The poll finds Clinton would beat the Republican Senator by four points. But McCain and Obama would be virtually tied.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 1/25/08, LENGTH 1:33 MIN., LOCAL

On the day before the South Carolina Democratic Primary, Hillary Clinton focused her attacks on President Bush. Barack Obama, who is leading in the polls here, talked economics with women voters at cafe in Charleston. The man with perhaps the most to lose is trailing behind at a distant third. John Edwards won this state in 2004, but has had a hard time gaining traction this time around. In last night's goop debate, it was clear that the republican candidates have set their sight on a single opponent.

It's the last State of the Union speech George W. Bush is going to make. With less than a year in office, his primary goal appeared to be pulling the economy out of the slide his administration may have caused. In homes around the valley, TV's were tuned to the President's State of the Union speech. The Nichols family in Fresno was among those watching. Herese Nichols liked what the President had to say about improving health care, and his pledge to push for a tax rebate. The President's pushing Congress to approve his stimulus package, that would put billions back in the hands of taxpayers. Ew argue it will be a boost, but will it turn things around. Economist Henry Nishimoto is skeptical. Ishimoto says the key to an economic turnaround is a restoration of public confidence in the country's direction. And he believes a dramatic change in leadership, with the election of either Barack Obama, or Hillary Clinton would increase optimism, and provide an economic boost. He experts say the President's stimulus package is likely to pass congress, but many of his other initiatives may fall flat during his final year in office.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 1/29/08, LENGTH 1:58 MIN., LOCAL

When even the powerful Speaker of the Assembly didn't get a chance to change some minds on the Senate Health Committee over the weekend, it was clear California's landmark Healthcare Reform bill was D.O.A. The proposal got only one 'yes' vote with six Democrats either voting 'no' or abstaining. Governor Schwarzenegger was hoping to the end, last-minute arm twisting would get the ambitious plan negotiated with Democratic leaders passed. An independent analysis released last week found the new taxes and fees would not be enough to pay for the healthcare plan aimed at covering 70-percent of the state's uninsured. That means taxpayers would be at risk for covering the rest.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 1/29/08, LENGTH :40 SEC. LOCAL

Election polls have been closed for about 20-minutes in today's Florida primary. So far, 30-percent of the precincts have reported. On the republican side, john McCain is leading with 34-percent of the vote. Mitt Romney is closing in on that lead with 33-percent.rudy Giuliani, who counted heavily on Florida is third with 15-percent. Mike Chickadee follows with 14-percent.and run Paul has three-percent. For the democrats, Hillary Clinton has 49-percent of the vote so far. Barack Obama is second with 29-percent.and john is once again third with 15-percent.the democratic winner in Florida will not receive any delegates at the national convention. The party stripped Florida of its delegates as punishment for moving its primary ahead of February fifth.

State leaders heard horror stories today from owners on the brink of losing their homes. But it wasn't enough to stop lawmakers from voting down a plan that could provide relief for thousands facing foreclosure. Action News Capitol Reporter Nannette Miranda explains how the bill could help and how community groups plan to get lawmakers to take another look at it.

Tonight, the remaining democratic candidates will go head to head for the first time. Both are hoping to win over supporters of John Edwards, who dropped out of the race yesterday." We do not know who will take the final steps to 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, but what we do know is that our democratic party will make history." Make history by nominating either a woman or an African-American. But for that to happen, one will have to defeat the other and the knives are out. Barack Obama offered a pointed twist on Bill Clinton's old slogan. I know it is tempting// to sort of turn back the clock and to build a bridge to the 20th century." Hillary Clinton responded with a jab at Obama's book "The Audacity of Hope," saying: "that certainly sounds audacious, but not hopeful." On the republican side, another rough and tumble battle between leading candidates John McCain and Mitt Romney. Adding to the pressure, there are just five days left until Super Tuesday, when at least 21 states will cast votes a day that could prove decisive for each side.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 2/06/08, LENGTH :36 SEC., LOCAL

Super Tuesday led to some super problems at several polling places across the state. In San Mateo, they ran out of Democratic ballots because of a high turn out of decline-to-state voters. These are the voters with no party affiliation who were allowed to vote for a democratic candidate in this primary. Polls workers in Contra Costa County refused to give decline-to-state voters democratic ballots. And in Los Angeles, one polling place had to turn away voters for about four and a half hours. It didn't have vote recorders and pens needed to mark ballots. When it finally got vote recorders, workers still had to put them together.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 2/06/08, LENGTH 1:48 SEC. LOCAL

Super Tuesday may be over but, the race on both sides is not. For the Republicans there is no definitive nominee, but there is a clear leader. John McCain took the much coveted delegate-rich states of California and New York. In an impressive surge, Mike Huckabee dominated the south after being called a spoiler by Mitt Romney and ignoring calls to drop out. Mitt Romney carried states he was expected to win and contests with fewer delegates. Despite the disappointing showing Romney told supporters he won't back down. The race is nowhere near decided on the democratic side. Hillary Clinton captured California and New York the contests with the most delegates. But, Barack Obama picked up more states than his rival leaving no clear frontrunner

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 2/06/08, LENGTH :20 SEC., LOCAL

Despite a loss in California, Barack Obama's supporters say Super Tuesday has energized his campaign about 40 volunteers and supporters gathered to watch the results come in at Obama's campaign headquarters in northwest Fresno. The Obama camp says the overall goal was to win as many delegates away from Hillary Clinton. They predict this neck-and-neck pace could continue for awhile.

Republican John McCain won a sweeping victory on Super Tuesday. McCain took the big prize of California and eight other states in last night's election. Democrats Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama fought to a draw, virtually guaranteeing a long and sharply contested democratic contest ahead. Two races one in Missouri and New Mexico are still too close to call

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 2/06/08, LENGTH :25 SEC., LOCAL

Expectations for voter turnout in Fresno County were high, between 60 and 65 percent. But those expectations fell short. In Fresno County, some confusion for independent voters. Many say they didn't know they could vote for democratic presidential candidates and some claim that poll workers never explained their options. Elections officials say about 100 thousand Fresno county residents voted absentee. But many of those absentee ballots came in at the last minute. And instead of mailing the ballots thousands of voters personally turned them in.

Two different scenarios are emerging after Super Tuesday. While Republicans appear to be solidly behind a presidential candidate, the democratic picture is still murky. For the democrats, call it a draw. Hillary Clinton appears to have won more delegates on Super Tuesday, but Barack Obama won more states.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 2/07/08, LENGTH :25 SEC., LOCAL

Mitt Romney is out of the Republican race for President. This morning, Romney said he is suspending his campaign to give rival Senator John McCain a leg up on the race for the white house Romney made the announcement in Washington, at the conservative political action conference. Romney said this was not an easy decision after he lost a number of key states in the Super Tuesday elections. But he said his campaign was not a failure.

ACTION NEWS 2/07/08, LENGTH :26 SEC., LOCAL

A valley state senator is hoping to put an end to the ballot confusion in California on Super Tuesday. State Senator Dean Florez of Shafter has introduced a bill, which would require ballots for independent voters showing a menu of races from which they can vote. Many voters complained they weren't allowed to vote in democratic presidential primary, even though state law allows it. Florez is also calling for a state audit, to see if poll workers were properly trained.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 2/07/08, LENGTH :25 SEC., LOCAL

The two democratic contenders are going strong especially when it comes to fundraising. Barack Obama's campaign says he's raised more than seven million dollars since Super Tuesday. Hillary Clinton pulled in more than six million. Her campaign also challenged Obama to five debates in the next month, which analysts say is an acknowledgment of his growing strength. Obama says first, he wants to spend time with voters in states where Clinton is better known.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 2/14/08, LENGTH :19 SEC., LOCAL

Nine days after Super Tuesday, Hillary Clinton was officially declared winner of the New Mexico Democratic caucus by less than two thousand votes. The announcement came after a marathon hand count of seventeen -thousand provisional ballots. Clinton's victory earns her fourteen delegates. Barack Obama picked up twelve delegates, and he still has the overall lead in delegates.

During his State of the State Address the governor proposed a constitutional amendment that would force automatic cuts to the state budget to avoid large deficits like the one California is now facing. Besides this Constitutional amendment, the Governor also made a pitch for his fourteen billion dollar health care plan. The measure has stalled in the state senate. The governor also says he would intervene with ninety- eight school districts that face sanctions under the federal "No Child Left Behind" act.

A federal appeals court today cleared the way for the city of San Francisco, to charge city businesses to pay for health care for the uninsured. The city ordinance is the first of its kind in the nation. The estimated 200-million-dollar annual cost is to be paid from state and local taxes, payments from patients based on their income, and fees from employers who don't offer insurance.
