Video segments stay within the server approximately 1-2 weeks, as space is available.

THE SEARCH FOR WOLVES IN YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK......STARTS BY SPOTTING A DIFFERENT KIND OF PACK, THE HUMAN KIND. AND JUST LIKE THE WOLF THEY'RE BARELY ABLE TO SEE IN THE LEFT PART OF THE SCREEN THERE... THEY TOO, HAVE A LEADER. RICK MCINTYRE... "ok...we have this collared gray out there." RICK IS AS LEGENDARY AS THE YELLOWSTONE WOLVES HE WATCHES. "everyday is just really exciting and I'm raring to go." "wolves are a natural part of the ecosystem a natural part of the wildlife community and they perform a natural function." A YEAR BEFORE WOLVES WERE REINTRODUCED TO THE AREA IN 1994, RICK CAME TO YELLOWSTONE AS AN INTERPRETIVE RANGER. HIS JOB WAS TO TEACH PEOPLE ABOUT THE ANIMAL. "to have people have a good experience seeing wolves in Yellowstone that really changes people." EVEN AFTER RETIREMENT RICK STILL SHOWS UP AT THE OFFICE. "this is somewhere around day 9,400 - I'm shooting for 10,000." HE'S ALWAYS GOT A GOOD REASON IF HE SKIPS A DAY. "Then I had to have an open hear surgery...so that stopped me." AFTER NEARLY 30 YEARS OF TRACKING THE PACKS...HIS LITTLE CABIN RIGHT OUTSIDE THE PARK IS STUFFED WITH ADVENTURE. "So this is my favorite wolf picture." AND LITERATURE. "I've written and published 4 books on my experience with wolves...I can't pronounce this but this is the Ukrainian language version of the rise of wolf 8." ADD THAT TO THE PLOT TWISTS

RICK NEVER EXPECTED. "we've been contacted by a bunch of movie people that are interested in the wolf stories." LIVES AND LANDSCAPES RICK FEELS ARE WORTHY OF HOLLYWOOD. "we signed a deal with the movie people...all of the wolves will pretty much be CGI." RICK KNOWS WOLVES CAN BE SEEN AS VILLAINS INCLUDING IN COLORADO WHERE THEY'LL BE REINTRODUCED BY THE END OF THIS YEAR. "we're going to try to find that wolve and other wolves." HE HOPES THAT SCRIPT IS FLIPPED. UPON RECEIVING A REPORT ON NOVEMBER 17, C-P-W PROMPTLY INVESTIGATED THE INCIDENT, AS A POTENTIAL DEPREDATION CASE, AFTER THE RANCHER FOUND THE LIFELESS LAMBS. A CPW WILDLIFE OFFICER DETERMINED THAT THE LAMBS HAD INDEED FALLEN VICTIM TO A WOLF. TO ADDRESS SUCH SITUATIONS, C-P-W OFFERS REIMBURSEMENT FOR DAMAGES CAUSED BY GRAY WOLVES TO LIVESTOCK, AS DEFINED IN COLORADO REVISED STATUTE 33-2-105.8, AS WELL AS ANIMALS UTILIZED FOR GUARD OR HERDING PURPOSES.

Today we're talking about cyber Monday scams, because like I said, it is the Monday after Thanksgiving, right? What can you tell us about that? Well, it's Cyber Monday, as you said, and so everybody's gonna be online. They're gonna be looking for all the great deals. But you know, I even got an online message this morning saying that my Netflix subscription has been revoked. And so I needed to re up it. Oh, wow. scam. And there's lots of those out there right now. That's why I brought Victor with me so that he could tell you and our audience a bit about the things that are out there now that we want to be on the lookout for. Yeah, yeah. So since it is Cyber Monday, everybody's getting these awesome deals like 80% off from the store that store. Unfortunately, a lot of those are scams. The easiest way to see that is, if it's too good to be true, it probably is. So I always recommend that when you get those types of emails, go to the source. So go to whatever store whatever company sends out those emails and look at their website, because

they're going to post those deals on their website. So if that is 80% off sweet, you get to get on their website and get it that way. If you jump through the phishing emails, or scams that they send you, then not so sweet, because then they have your financial information and can make purchases with your accounts. Yeah, I will say something that I've also seen is if you click on the email address that you got, oftentimes, it's not like a real email address, you can see it you know it with the ad. It's like a weird ad name or something like that. So also another, you know, useful tip. Well, we're also talking Christmas, porch pirates, things to be aware of. What about that? Yeah, you know, I don't know about everybody's house. But ours typically looks like you know, an Amazon shipping facility, because we have a whole bunch of boxes that show up on our front door regularly. So with that, there's a few things that you can do to avoid those being taken, track your package, make sure that you're going to be home when they arrive, then you can also have them dropped off at a facility, a lot of big shipping companies will have lockers that you can go there and pick up those items have neighbors watch out for it. They've even got some lock bags that you can attach to your front door that they can be put in. But if you're buying that 800 pound gorilla as a Christmas present, that's not going to fit there. It's better to have them to that facility. And also be cautious because there were text messages going around from USPS. I was getting to Yeah, saying that your package is at our warehouse. Yeah. And reply for it. Yeah, I talked to the gentleman at the post office when I was sending out a letter. And he was nice enough to say, Yeah, we didn't ask about that all the time. And why would we text you when we mail everything? Yeah, so So really the best, the best thing I feel like to do is honestly just delete those, you know, like, and then if you have an iPhone, you can like report it junk. So hopefully you won't get those again. But also, what's a guick tip for people who live in apartments, because I live in apartment and all of the Amazon packages just literally get thrown in the mouth not thrown but they get placed in the mailroom, and anybody can go in there and take whatever package you want. That's why it's important to do the tracking in in those apartment complexes, again, working with that, UPS FedEx USPS company to have those packages held at a locker or at a job facility. So you can go and pick those up or be neighborly and get to know your neighbors. And you know, work out something to where you're able to pick up your packages, watch out for your neighbor, or things like that. But tracking it is huge. Some of the companies anymore, you have like a live stream of when the package is going to get there. So trying to be diligent about having somebody around to pick up those packages. Yeah, another good thing to think of is who do you know that works at home and maybe ship it to a friend that is working at home, ship it to your office, because you know that they typically are going to be delivering there during the week especially if you know the tracking, then you're gonna have it shipped to your office or where you know your place of employment if you're you're okay with that. Use alternate addresses of somebody who will be there especially apartments Yeah. Or if you're someplace that there is a lot of porch pirating going on. So when you can trust someone well, this is all good information. We are have time but come back next month because we have a lot more to talk about regarding safety and the holidays. Yes. All right. "To know that these bikes wont ever be piloted by him again, it's really hard." His bikes are in the basement.... and upstairs next to his urn... are the sunglasses Magnus White was wearing the day he died. There were some details in the affidavit that we read that we didn't know about that happened to Magnus. Like how he got hit, you know, how far, was he thrown over the car, all that stuff where he landed. Why Magnus. Why Magnus. And how did this happen. So to kind of be filled in on that story how do you not read it? Jill and Michael White lost their 17-year-old son on July 29-th. This week... new court documents are

divulging more about the woman who killed him. The charges just bring us back to the day he died. You know it's heartbreaking. It's angering you know because you read about what led up to it, and why the person got behind the wheel of their car that day — M it's just maddening, yeah. Magnus was a cyclist on the U.S. National Team. He was hit by a car while riding his bike on the Diagonal Highway in Boulder County. You know I taught him and his coaches taught him all the rules of the road. He was doing everything right." I mean that's the thing with the road. You know it always made me nervous. He goes out on the road but he always came back." It's been a very difficult week for the family... learning these new details... and having to relive their son's death all over again. We've reached out to them in the past... but they weren't ready to talk until today... saying Magnus can't share his own story so they're doing it for him. Magnus's family also started a non-profit called "THE WHITE LINE".... working to raise awareness about bicycle and automobile safety... hoping to create safer cycling environments.

After we leave the scene, we hope that whoever it is that we encounter, whether it's a citizen, or somebody from another agency, that they feel closer to us at the end of the contact. THAT'S THE GOAL FOR THE CO-RESPONDER UNIT WITHIN THE GRAND JUNCTION POLICE DEPARTMENT. Our hope is that the community is open to giving us a chance. A PROGRAM THAT STARTED IN 2018...HAS QUICKLY BLOSSOMED INTO A MODEL FOR OTHER AGENCIES ACROSS THE STATE AND COUNTRY. In the last couple years, co responder programs have been popping up all over the state in the nation. Colorado actually has more CO responder programs in the state than any other state IN A TIME WHEN MENTAL HEALTH IS AT THE FOREFRONT OF CONVERSATIONS ACROSS THE COUNTRY...BRANDY BLACK A CLINICIAN...AND THE REST OF THE CO-RESPONDER UNIT HELP THOSE WHO ARE EXPERIENCING A MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS. my role is to add a behavioral health perspective and expertise to the mental health calls and crisis that law enforcement deals with every single day. I'll talk to them about what's going on today, you know, kind of work through the problem. And then I'll determine whether there's a criminal element to it that needs to be focused on that. Or if there is a mental health aspect to it, then my partner will come in, and we'll kind of go hand in hand with sharing the de-escalation. NATE LONG AN OFFICER WITH THE GRAND JUNCTION POLICE DEPARTMENT AND MEMBER OF THE SO-RESPONDER TEAM HAS BEEN IN LAW ENFORCEMENT FOR OVER SIX YEARS...DURING THAT TIME HE HAS SEEN THE EFFECTS ONES MENTAL HEALTH CAN HAVE ON AN INDIVIDUAL. there's a mental health aspect, behavioral health, or there's a substance use aspect to it, law enforcement alone can't address these issues. AND WHEN YOU DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO MENTAL HEALTH CARE...you know, we're going to call the call, trying to deem, hey, is there a crime or not, and then, you know, we'd have to move on to the next call. A WAY BLACK AND HER TEAM ARE HELPING THOSE AROUND THE COMMUNITY IS BY ESTABLISHING A RELATIONSHIP WITH WHAT THEY CALL FRIENDLY FACES. Folks in the community that are kind of cycling through hospitals, potentially jails, struggling to get into services, you know, working to get stabilized and get the resources that they need. THE CO-RESPONDER TEAM IS THEN ABLE TO GO OUT AND MEET WITH THESE FRIENDLY FACES AND DEVELOP A PLAN TO HELP THEM. That really helps us to kind of get out of that cycle of just responding, you know, to the same things, and it kind of helps us address the underlying issue and get some long-term support, and stabilization. AND AS OFFICER LONG PUTS IT...THERE'S A GROWING DEMAND FOR THIS TYPE OF TEAM. And it's just growing as we speak. ASIDE FROM MENTAL HEALTH...THE CO RESPONDER UNIT IS TRYING TO ESTABLISH A GOOD EXPERIENCE AMONG CITIZENS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT. We're trying to better the experience for people within that law enforcement role. So they'll see me, and maybe they've had bad experiences with law enforcement, but I'm hoping that by the end of that contact, we leave somebody better off than they were before. AS FOR THE FUTURE OF THE PROGRAM...Throughout Mesa County, we have a desperate need for this type of work for this CO responder unit. So I'd like us to get fully staffed to where we can help out as many people as possible.

Before Grand Junction becomes a town we have people recognizing that these two rivers coming together in this valley, the soil that we have here, the sunlight that we have here, all these are going to come together. And that's what's going to make this prosperous. BEFORE GRAND JUNCTION WAS FOUNDED IN THE EARLY 1880S...THE UTES HAD USED THE AREA FOR YEARS...AN IMPORTANT PART OF THEIR HOMELANDS FOR THE YOUTH. BUT THERE'S ONE THING THESE EARLY GRAND JUNCTION RESIDENTS HAVE IN COMMON...THEIR USE FOR THE LANDS NATURAL RESOURCES. What brought people out here was they saw those natural resources, specifically, they saw areas that were good for ranching, and areas that would be good for farming. They also believe that the area would be good to cultivate orchards, which as we know, is very successful today. WHAT WAS ONCE CATALOGUED BY ARMY EXPEDITIONERS AS A BARREN WASTELAND...QUIKLY TURNED INTO SOMETHING PROSPEROUS. it was the abomination of desolation that it was one of the most barren, lifeless places that this exploring party had seen. But as you get to the end of that account, this author talks about the rivers that come in, and they talk about how more precious than mines of silver and gold is the abundance of water. AND UTILIZING THE NATURAL RESOURCES AROUND THEM HELPED SHAPE GRAND JUNCTION INTO WHAT IT IS TODAY. Eventually what we get though, is large scale investment. we get really big things like the roller dam that you see in DE BEQUE Canyon, we get the hundreds of miles of very large canals all the way out to Highline. THROUGH THE USE OF WESTERN COLORADO'S WATERWAYS...40 MILLION PEOPLE ARE ABLE TO RELY ON THE RIVERS' WATER SUPPLY...BUT HOW MUCH CAN YOU TAKE BEFORE THERE'S NOTHING LEFT. that's one of the lessons that we tried to draw from history is we came here we pulled the water we change those resources. Is that going to last? How are we shaping communities today. IT'S THOSE SAME RESOURCES THAT SHAPED THE COMMUNITY DIFFERENTLY DURING WORLD WAR TWO WHEN URANIUM RICH MATERIALS WERE FOUND IN GRAND JUNCTION. The US government was out sending, exploring and mapping and surveying parties to look for vanadium was what the cover was, in reality,

they're looking for uranium. So, we are part of the Manhattan engineering district. AFTER THE AGE OF HOMESTEADING...THE MANHATTAN PROJECT REALLY PUT GRAND JUNCTION ON THE MAP. Uranium from western Colorado accounted for about 14% of the uranium that went into the Manhattan Project. We're like the Wall Street of the atomic era. BUT JUST AS WITH THE COLORADO RIVER'S SUPPLY...WHEN IS ENOUGH...ENOUGH? Sadly, a lot of people develop lung cancer or other types of cancers working in their MINES. Sadly, there's a lot of environmental disasters that occur because of mining. And so, as a community, we have this mixed message about the past. BUT AS MIRACLE PUTS IT...GRAND JUNCTION'S HISTORY ISN'T ALLL DOOM AND GLOOM. Finding that balance and finding that conservation is key. CURRENT RESIDENTS CAN LEARN FROM THE PAST AND HELP TO SHAPE THE FUTURE. THERE are definitely things that have worked in the past things that have not worked in the past. The Colorado Republican Party plans to file this petition with the U-S Supreme Court to get former President Trump qualified for the primary ballot in Colorado. Trump has yet to appeal last week's decision that disqualified him from Colorado's primary ballot based on the 14th Amendment. The petition by the Colorado GOP will ask the U-S Supreme Court to consider three questions...Does the 14th Amendment apply to the president? Is Section 3 of the 14th Amendment self-executing, meaning does it take effect without an action by Congress? And is it a violation of the First Amendment to deny a political party its ability to choose the candidate of its choice? The petition included this quote -- "There is a real risk the Colorado Supreme Court majority's flawed and unprecedented analysis will be borrowed, and the resulting grave legal error repeated." Colorado's highest court found that the 14th Amendment does apply to Trump...disqualifying him from holding future office for having engaged in insurrection after taking an

oath to support the constitution. Michigan's Supreme Court determined today that the 14th Amendment question is not for that state to decide. Michigan's highest court confirmed that Trump *can be on the ballot in that state. Michigan's state election laws are not the same as Colorado. In Colorado, presidential primary candidates are limited to qualified candidates... which means 35 years old, a natural born citizen and having lived in the U-S for at least 14 years. And based on Colorado's ruling last week -- it also means you can be disqualified if found to have violated the 14th Amendment.

So we typically see flu and RSV from October through March. And COVID. Although we've seen it year round, we believe that it may start to follow that same seasonal pattern, and we'll see higher case rates during that same time of the year. Right. And when does that exactly start? Is that now with fall season? Yes. So the beginning of October through the end of March. Okay. And what is Mesa County Public Health doing to make sure the community is informed and keeping themselves protected? That's another great question. So we actually have this really great web page called the what's going around page. And on there, you can find information and data about diseases. And right now we've updated it for respiratory illness season. And with that, we've made sure to have some previous year data, so past Flu Trends, along with a respiratory illness timeline, and that timeline, is going to track hospitalizations specifically for COVID, flu and RSV. And we track hospitalizations because they help to show us the severity of illness in our community. You pretty much answered my next question. What are the trends? But you answered it perfectly. So that kind of makes me wonder, you mentioned COVID, you mentioned the flu? Those are things we're now very familiar with. But how, what are those similarities when it comes to illness in between COVID, flu, RSV, and anything else really. So COVID, flu, and RSV are all contagious. They're all three viruses, and they all spread via respiratory droplets. Some great news is they all have vaccines. Now, depending on your age, and circumstances. They're all available now. And they all can affect people of all ages. However, there are certain populations like the elderly, or those with underlying health conditions that can have more serious impacts if they become sick with one of the three. Right and it's hard not to get sick, especially when you're working with people maybe working with children. But what are ways that you can try to do to prevent getting these respiratory illnesses. So we always like to suggest lots of hand washing, staying home when you're sick, and cleaning and disinfecting high touch surfaces and that's at home and at work to keep our work our fellow co workers safe. And those can be doorknobs, desks, light switches. And we also suggest staying up to date on the most current vaccines.
