While stories are continually posted and eventually drop off of the top 30 or so visually displayed, they never actually leave the Web Channel Feature server making these accessible for viewers to conduct a search to retrieve each of these in the future. Video segments stay within the server approximately 1-2 weeks, as space is available.

We don't want jump on the first puppy we meet, cause its easy to do that, so we're just trying to find the right dog for us. Another reason why we want to adopt, we want another buddy to go camping with us, just an adventure buddy. I think it's great to get outside and have a furry friend to take with you." AGRITOURISM IS A HUGE PART OF PALISADE'S ECONOMY. DESPITE COVID-19, ONE FAMILY- RUN FARM IS STILL HOSTING TOURS TO EDUCATE THEIR GUESTS. You can see there's quite a few alpaca's behind me and believe it or not it takes 15 hours to shave one of these to start the processing. This family run farm is still operating this winter and wants to teach people the process of where their clothes actually come from. Palisade is known for its wineries and peaches, but it's also home to a fiber mill. "I've been here about 4 years. I'm basically a fiber junkie. I love the fiber arts and being working here I can work with fiber and encourage and teach other people that have fiber that don't know what to do with it. " SunCrest Orchard Alpacas & Fiber Works has been operating in agritourism for 17 years. "We wanted to bring people out here to show em a step by step process on how we take the whole textile world from an animal to a finished product and that's all done right here." The family run business hosts mill tours and alpaca treks throughout the year for guests to experience what it's like working and living on a farm. "We step you through basically starting with the animals themselves. The purpose of the animal again and then we take you into the mill here and we show you the 15 step process of turning it into a yard. And then, from there we have another machine where we make knitted hats and scarves as well." Owner Mike McDermott has been working on the farm since he was 13 and decided to keep running it through adulthood to show his kids how to care for other lives through the animals. "Having it part of the family meant a lot to me because this is basically who I am. An extension of who I am at least is the farm and it's great to share that." AND IN A ANOTHER COLORADO CASE... Colorado Attorney General Phil Weiser announced Friday he was launching a grand jury investigation into the August 2019 death of Elijah McClain in Aurora. AUGUST 24TH -- 2019. THE DAY ELIJAH MCCLAIN, AN UNARMED BLACK MAN, WAS STOPPED BY AURORA POLICE OFFICERS ON HIS WAY HOME FROM THE CONVENIENCE STORE. DAYS LATER -- HE'D BE REMOVED FROM LIFE SUPPORT AND HIS HEART WOULD STOP TOO. ACTIVISTS AND THE MCCLAIN FAMILY ATTORNEY -- HAVE BEEN VOCAL ABOUT ELIJAH'S DEATH. PLACING BLAME ON THE FIRST RESPONDERS. Mari Newman - "Multiple crimes were committed by the officers and medics when they killed Eljah McClain." NOW -- ATTORNEY GENERAL PHIL WEISER HAS ANNOUNCED A GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION. WHICH MEANS THE JURORS COULD DECIDE WHO -- IF ANYONE IS RESPONSIBLE. Aya Gruber: "In a lot of these cases the prosecutor will bring these case to the grand jury for a variety of reasons." AYA GRUBER, A LAW PROFESSOR WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO LAW SCHOOL SAYS, ONE REASON COULD BE -- ATTORNEY WEISER WANTS TO BE ABLE TO SUBPOENA DOCUMENTS AND WITNESS TESTIMONY, ANOTHER REASON...Aya Gruber: "Or

they think it's a really hot button issue, and they don't want to the ones responsible for making the ultimate charging decision." SO WHAT CHARGES COULD A JURY DECIDE ON? HERE'S WHAT WE KNOW: RECORDS SHOW MEDICS GAVE MCCLAIN 500 MILLIGRAMS OF THE DRUG KETAMINE. A DOSE RECOMMENDED FOR A 200 POUND PERSON. MCCLAIN WEIGHED 143 POUNDS. THE CORONER RULED MCCLAIN'S DEATH UNDETERMINED, BUT DIDN'T RULE OUT KETAMINE AS A FACTOR. GRUBER SAYS IF ANY CHARGES ARE FILED -- IT WILL DEPEND ON THE EVIDENCE THAT'S PRESENTED. Aya Gruber: "A lot of it comes down to in many of these cases, were police following protocol, did they see a threat, and was there assessment of the threat and the level of force they used - reasonable?" THE ANSWERS TO THOSE QUESTIONS -- GRUBER SAYS -- COULD RESULT IN NO CHARGES OR AN ARRAY OF HOMICIDE CHARGES. Aya Gruber: "homicide can range from manslaughter type charges which just say 'hey this person was negligent or reckless in carrying out policing." WITH THE SO MANY POTENTIAL OUTCOMES, GRUBER FEELS CERTAIN ABOUT ONE THING. Aya Gruber: "If this investigative grand jury does not lead to the Attorney general bringing charges either himself or via the grand jury - I think people are really gonna wanna know, "why?'

We talked to mesa county sheriff's office and the police department to find out if there's an uptick in violent crimes after an unusually busy few days. DOES LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT THINK these types of VIOLENT CRIME IS ON THE RISE IN THE GRAND VALLEY? the mesa county sheriff's office said that it might seem like there is a lot more crime this year because of two recent shootings they've responded too, but they say there isn't a lot to worry about, because they are believed to be isolated incidents. "the two shootings that the mesa county sheriff's office is currently investigating, one occurred on Thursday afternoon on white avenue, that was a homicide. The other occurred in the candlewood mobile home park on Friday evening where one individual sustained non-life-threatening injuries" It is hard to tell exactly how much crime has taken place this year compared to last year "we are just at the beginning of the year, there is really not a lot of data to look at right now for the month of January because we are still in the middle of it" last year there was not a lot of criminal activity compared to years prior. "for the last year, crime has actually been down, quite significantly." but they still have seen some nonviolent crime recently "increase of what we call property crimes that is crimes that have to do with property, things getting stolen, cars getting broken into, cars getting stolen, that sort of thing" the sheriff's office said the recent shootings are not random acts of violence and don't pose a big threat to the community "it's important when we are talking about violent crime and the violent crime in the community is that it doesn't seem to be random" although the grand junction police department didn't respond to the two shootings last week, they agreed that the violent cases are not usually random "they are more than often between known subjects so weather it's a feud over family matters, or a feud over financial issues or drugs whatever it may be. the people who are usually involved in these shootings are typically known to each other" the police department has also had to respond to multiple firearms calls this month as well "the grand junction police department has responded to several shots fired calls so what that means is that there is often people who accidentally discharge a weapon or shoot it in the air which is illegal and can be very harmful to people and property around you" so far the homicide stats this year are..."in 2020 we had 2 homicides that we investigated and so far, this year we have one" I also talked to the coroner's office to see if they have been busier and they said there has been a slight increase, but nothing that unusual. So far, they have responded to 88 deaths this year, both of the shootings that happened last week are still under investigation, and if you know anything... please contact the mesa county sheriff's office.

This year the snowpack is well below average, if it doesn't increase it could lead to problems this summer, if we don't get more snow it could have some negative effects on both our water supply and fire season. Yes I am told by both Ute water and the bureau of land management that the lack of runoff from the snowpack could impact our community. not only does it limit our supply of water but could also lead to increased fire risk Last year there was very little snow "we are coming out of the 4th worst drought in Colorado's history and that was our 2020 drought" and this year has not been much different "the truth of the matter is we are facing a very severe drought this upcoming year" which could be bad for our community "the back-to-back droughts are our worst fear, and it is very impactful on the community and the amount of water that is available in watersheds" and Ute water feels that some might have a false sense of security "the snowfall over the past couple of days and weeks has given the false impression that we are going to have a really good runoff" and if we do not get more snowpack, there could be some changes "just like any other finite resource there is opportunity for our board institute drought rate which will make consuming water more expensive just as it would any other resource" but they are hoping to not have to do that "right now, what we want from our customers is make voluntary cutbacks. do what they can to conserve the water that they have right now" "think about draining your savings account. it's nothing that you want to do, and we treat our reservoir like our savings account" the B.L.M. is also warning that the lack of snow could potentially bring fires "with dry conditions to expect some fires" but they do believe they are prepared "the UCR is definitely prepared for this fire season" Ute water said they will not know until March the true impacts of the winter. in the spring they will have a better idea of what the summer impacts are going to be Ute water said that mesa lake received 7 inches of snow and is at 49% of its average and park reservoir is also a snow tell site and it received 21 inches of snow this past week and is only 64 percent full.

People have been flocking to backcountry trails this year, but public officials have been warning skiers to scale back. Emergency workers already exhausted from the pandemc have raised alarms about the increased threat of avalanches. 20 minutes. That's how long on average a person can survive at the bottom of an avalanche. "To get up there by the time we load up all our equipment drive to the top of the mountain ride there. You're looking at a couple hours before we get there." Earlier this week 3 BACK COUNTRY skiers lost their lives in an avalanche. An accident Mesa County Search and Rescue says shouldn't have happened. "A horrible tragedy in Silverton this week and you know looking in from the outside we can't say what they could've done differently besides not going at all. Know before you go. That's a saying the Skippers Team wants skiers to remember before they head out to hit the slopes. "If the avalanche rating is considerable which it is right now in Grand Mesa that does not mean it might slide or it might not that means you are going to trigger avalanches in certain situations. So I think this year more than I've ever seen you need to stay out and away from any hazard that you find out there." Weak layers of snow this vear throughout the state of Colorado have made for these easy avalanches. Knowing your routes and having the right equipment in case of an emergency to help self-rescue are key elements to maintaining your safety. "You're always pushing yourself to become a better rider to become a better skier and get out of your comfort zone and that's really great that's how we grow as athletes. But, it's really important that you don't go so far out of your comfort zone that you can never come back from it." MESA COUNTY SEARCH AND RESCUE SAYS ONE PERSON CAUGHT IN AN AVALANCHE IS AN ACCIDENT, BUT MORE THAN 1 IS A TRAGEDY THAT COULD BE PREVENTED. WHILE THEY ARE AVAILABLE FOR RESCUE EFFORTS BEING PREPARED TO SELF-RESCUE IS YOUR BEST CHANCE AT SURVIVAL IN AN EMERGENCY. Ken Russell, Snowmobiler: "So I lifted it up about 12 to 15 inches on that end of it, which means on the front end it was about 6 inches. Just enough for him to slide out and he got out and his hands were just like this a ball of ice in his gloves." MCGINN WAS COLD AND TIRED, BUT ALIVE. McGinn: "We both came to the realization that he had one mission to go out there and that was to find someone and luckily enough that was me." MCGINN SHARED HIS STORY ON SOCIAL MEDIA --- ENCOURAGING OTHER SNOWMOBILERS TO BE BETTER PREPARED FOR ALL SITUATIONS.

I think we're really excited about it and looking forward to seeing it built out. The site is originally chosen by property owners and developers, and then we have those conversations about whether the use meets the requirements and municipal code or not." The project was originally approved in 2016, but developers did not follow through with the idea until now. "The City Council heard this application on Tuesday night, and approved the project. These projects come about just by talking with developers or property owners about the ideas they want to do. This project was originally proposed in 2016-17 timeframe, it got approvals and then sat for a while, and it's kind of a resurrection project. So it's cool to see that come back." The park will provide more than 100 spaces for RVs, creating an opportunity for increased tourism in the Fruita area. "Certainly tourism is popular around here. That particular area in which this is located is referred to as the innovation or flexibility zone. So we really think that could be

a catalyst into some change down there along Greenway Drive, that are a little bit closer to the city's downtown." "Items like umbrellas and things that are like five bucks, and then there's some vases that are 20 bucks, and then we have a bunch of things that are free. BRIANA BELLINGER-DAWSON: My heart was racing. REPORTER SANDRA JONES: A gut wrenching feeling for Briana Bellinger-Dawson. BELLINGER-DAWSON: I usually know exactly where I park. JONES: In March, at the start of the pandemic, Bellinger-Dawson panicked when she couldn't find her car, BELLINGER-DAWSON: I was like, oh my goodness, I have everything in there and now I won't be able to get to work, or home, or to the grocery store. JONES: Her 2017 Nissan Roque was gone...repossessed by the bank. She said it took her 3 days to get it back. BELLINGER-DAWSON: "I was behind on payments." JONES: Bellinger-Dawson was lucky. LAWYER DANIEL BLINN: In difficult financial times, repossessions will go up. JONES: Consumer law attorney Daniel Blinn has settled over a dozen repossession class action lawsuits in which finance companies failed to give consumers like Bellinger-Dawson advanced notice or an opportunity to pay delinquent payments. Blinn says consumers have to act fast to get their vehicles back. BLINN: Really, the only way that a consumer can stop a sale of their car, if they're unable to get a bank to agree to let them have it back, would be to file a bankruptcy filing." JONES: A recent report released by US Public Interest Research Group's Education fund and the Frontier group states that at the start of the pandemic consumers had a record amount of automobile debt. In the first quarter of 2020 - nearly 116 million consumers had an open auto loan. A 40 percent jump compared to this same time in 2010. Some states temporarily halted repossessions, but not all of them. Investigate TV researched the number of vehicle repossessions in all 50 states and District of Columbia. At least two states, Kansas and Indiana, tracks them through their departments of revenue in what are called: "Certificates of repossession." In 2020, more than 13-thousand cars were repossessed in Kansas. That's a 34 percent drop from all the cars repossessed in the state in 2016 – when lenders took back more than 20-thousand vehicles. In Indiana – that drop was 31 percent with just over 73-thousand repossessed vehicles. John Van Alst specializes in

automobile fraud and other consumer interests at a national non-profit based in Boston. He predicts a real uptick in repossessions this year. VAN ALST: Part of it's the backlog, part of it is...we have really high unemployment in the US and a lot of people, maybe, no longer receiving unemployment benefits. JONES: If you find yourself behind on your vehicle payments, here are some tips from the Federal Trade Commission: Contact your lender now to delay payment or renegotiate the payment schedule. And get it in writing. Find out what rights you have in your state by checking with your State Attorney General or local consumer protection agency. See if you can refinance your loan with a credible lender or company. Don't do nothing...try to work something out with your lender. Despite the pandemic... if you get behind on your payments, your lender could still repossess your vehicle without warning. IN MOST STATES, YOUR LENDER IS ALLOWED TO SUE YOU FOR PAYMENT. AN ATTORNEY CAN TELL YOU WHETHER YOU HAVE GROUNDS TO CONTEST A DEFICIENCY JUDGMENT.

MESA COUNTY'S FIRST MAJOR OUTBREAK HAPPENED HERE AT GRANDVIEW CARE LODGE, IT DID LEAD TO THE DEATH OF ONE PATIENT. STARTING THIS FRIDAY, A YEAR TO THE DAY AFTER COLORADO'S FIRST CASE, THE LATEST VACCINE PHASE WILL BEGIN. IT'S YET ANOTHER STEP TOWARDS ENDING THE PANDEMIC. A year ago this week, Colorado saw its first case. Mesa County's first case was on March 15th, so not very far behind. We've been working hard on this for a year and we are certainly going to see it all the way through." Almost one year after Mesa County's first COVID case, the health department says they are proud of community efforts to limit the spread. Mesa County Public Health also reflecting on the five star variance program, which helped keep businesses alive not only in Mesa County, but across the state. "There has to be a balance between mental health, physical health, and a healthy economy. We knew the governor was a big fan of five star. Lots of other

counties were saying can we have a copy of your application in Mesa County, and we were glad to do that. It was at that point in time, the state decided to go ahead and emulate what we were doing in Mesa County." The Grand Junction Chamber of Commerce released a study in February, which found that Mesa County's five star program was worth 13 million dollars to local businesses directly, and up to 30 million dollars indirectly. "We're always looking for ways that we can quantify the work that we do, and what great results from that to know that this program and trying to keep our businesses open, not just trying but actually keeping those businesses open had such a big impact on the community." And depending on vaccination rates, the pandemic could finally end this summer. Governor Polis encouraging everyone to take the vaccine when eligible. "Get it out, get it into arms, end the pandemic, save lives." Phase 1-B-3 begins THIS UPCOMING Friday. That includes people over the age of 60, and those with two or more high risk conditions. Anyone eligible for the next phase can fill out the vaccine interest form on Mesa County Public Health's website, starting today. "In order for people to sign up, they should go to our website and right at the top is our vaccine banner. And they can click on that interest form, put their name on there and in fact, they can go in there today and do that. What's been great is now we are able to get those people on that interest form vaccinated within the same week that they sign up." AND WHEN VACCINE REGISTRATION FIRST OPENED UP, IT TOOK THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT AROUND A MONTH IF NOT LONGER TO SCHEDULE APPOINTMENTS. THAT WAS DUE TO A LACK OF RESOURCES, AND LESS VACCINE AVAILABLE THAN THEY HAVE NOW. AS OF TODAY, THOSE WAIT TIMES ARE LESS THAN A WEEK, SO IF YOU ARE ELIGIBLE FOR ANY PHASE UP TO 1-B-3, REGISTER TODAY, YOU SHOULD HAVE AN APPOINTMENT SCHEDULED BY FRIDAY. ABOUT 1 MILLION PEOPLE WILL QUALIFY FOR PHASE 1-B-3, WHICH ALSO INCLUDES FRONTLINE WORKERS IN GROCERY STORES OR AGRICULTURE.

DEPOMPA: One way he saves is buying un-used gift cards at a discount for places he likes to shop. CRUPI: If I could save roughly 12 to 15 percent on purchases that I'm making every day, that sounds like a reasonable and good idea. DEPOMPA: John found a company online re-selling other people's unwanted gift cards. Before the pandemic hit, he was going to Dunkin Donuts a lot, so he bought about \$265 in gift cards between September 2019 and January 2020 from a company called Cardpool. He loaded the gift cards in his Dunkin Donuts app and spent some of the balance. When COVID hit, he stopped going, but when he checked his balance in July, it said zero. DEPOMPA: Is it frustrating? CRUPI: Absolutely. When you look in hindsight, you feel like you were foolish. Roughly to save 35 dollars on all these cards together, I lost about 226 dollars in the process. DEPOMPA: John can laugh now, but he's been trying to get his money back from Cardpool for months. He can track the purchases through the shop's app. John lives in Virginia, and the gift cards were used in 4 other states. 51 dollars was spent at a Dunkin Donuts in New York-another 50 in South Carolina. There are multiple purchases in Maryland and Massachusetts. CRUPI: None of those i had been to for sure, especially during COVID times. DEPOMPA: Cardpool told him in an email: it was unable to approve a refund, because it shows all balances were intact when delivered. They told him to double check his records to make sure he didn't use them. The Better Business Bureau sent out a warning about Cardpool in December after a rash of complaints. More than 2,100 in 3 years. BARRY MOORE, BBB: We researched it, offered them opportunities to fix it, didn't get done. We informed the country. DEPOMPA: And as we were investigating this story, the company shut down, posting on its website: "Cardpool Is No Longer Buying or Selling Gift Cards. We tried our best to outlast the pandemic, but unfortunately, we couldn't make it to the end." DEPOMPA: What is happening there? CAMERON D'AMBROSI: ONE WORLD IDENTITY: How fraudsters might likely be able to drain a gift card after you have it in your possession is before they sold it on this platform, they scratched off that scratcher piece and took down the secret code. DEPOMPA: Most gift cards have a 4 digit number hidden under a scratch off. With the secret pin and the string of identifying numbers from the front of the card, anyone can use it. DEPOMPA: The store the gift card is for likely can't do much- because you didn't buy it directly from them. Research any third-party gift card sellers. See if they have complaints. Another option is see if you can change the pin, once you upload the card to a store's app. That gives you an added layer of protection. John knows getting his money back at this point-- isn't likely. He just doesn't want this to happen to you. CRUPI: If there's anybody watching this and they've purchased a card online I would say go use that right away.

But they're also getting hundreds and hundreds of hours of paid professional development." "Technically our model is called a social enterprise, which means we are an organization that has a social mission. But we also have this revenue generating business, and our overall operating costs are paid for by both the revenue from the business and foundation an philanthropy and donors." "We made a decision mid-March to close our coffeehouse for two months. Even though we didn't have revenues coming into the coffeehouse, we were able to be funded by some of our philanthropists and some of our supporters and donors who really doubled down on support. We were able to retain all of our staff and apprentices at that time." "There is a movement in the past decade, that social enterprises are becoming more prominent, and people are seeing that they're actually extremely key as you're looking at how do we design an economy that's more equitable?" "Our community already has what it needs to be so powerful and successful and vibrant and soulful. And so we're just trying to create a space where those young people can come in and step into their inherent greatness."

FOUR BRIDGES IN MESA COUNTY HAVE BEEN LISTED ON THE COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION'S NEW ENDANGERED BRIDGES LIST. THIS LIST IS CDOT'S FIRST STEP TOWARDS CHOOSING WHICH BRIDGES TO PRESERVE ACROSS COLORADO. THE GRAND AVENUE BRIDGE HERE IS ONE OF FOUR LISTED IN MESA COUNTY, ALL OF WHICH HAVE HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE. The Colorado Department of Transportation releasing a list of 46 bridges across the state that are considered endangered. CDOT's goal is to preserve as many of these bridges as possible. "We've lost a lot of bridges to replacement and in the last few years we realized that we really wanna try to preserve some of our bridges in place. We looked at engineering condition and historic significance to determine which ones might have the best chance to be preserved in place if we had a replacement project." Four bridges in Mesa County are listed. One in DeBeque on Highway 6, a second in Rabbit Valley just west of Fruita, and two on state highway 340, near the Colorado National Monument. "I think that this project at the Colorado Department of transportation is taking over is very important to the history of the state of Colorado. Because we're not flat and we've got a lot of tricky curves and tricky ravines, bridges are absolutely an important piece of our history that need to be preserved." The Mesa County Historical Society says preserving these bridges will give future generations an opportunity to see how transportation worked in the 19th and early 20th century. "They do educate you on how the West was run, how people moved about to get to town, to get to their farms, they also do tell the story of the advancements, and engineering advancements." CDOT's next goal in the project is choosing specific bridges, from the list of 46, that they will fully commit towards preserving. "The 46 bridges on this list, we're really saying we want to build awareness and advocacy for bridges. Looking at bridges differently not just as functional transportation features, but as a part of our history." AND C-DOT SAYS THEY TRIED TO PICK BRIDGES WITH A WIDE ARRAY OF HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE. Reading, writing, and math may be the first few things that come to mind when thinking about learning...But one new program for district 51 teachers has students thinking ABOUT stress-relief and mindfulness. THE program IS called asset. IT SHOWS educators how to teach their students to slow down and introduce more positive thoughts.

Something they say will help build future success. IT IS A unique learning program..."A social and emotional learning curriculum, designed to help students reduce stress and build resilience for future success." IT COMES DURING A time FILLED SO MANY challenges. "the way in which we do that is our curriculum is made up of 60 bite-sized lessons so they take 5 to 10 minutes to implement and in each lesson students learn a concrete tool to reduce their stress." S-C-L health granted the ASSET program 12-thousand dollars to go towards training for school district 51 educators. The program consists of Mindfulness, positive psychology and positive self-talk. "positive psychology would be understanding that you know, happiness is a great predictor of success than getting good grades—or having a string work ethic." this isn't the school district's first go-round with the PROGRAM. Heather O'brien is a Social and Emotional Learning Specialist with d-51. "Because if we just teach reading, writing arithmetic, we're not completely preparing the whole child for life, things like how to regulate your emotions, how to have empathy for other people, how to get along with other people." Ms. O'brien likes to start her classes off with a mindful moment before jumping into a lesson. "so as an interventionist here at Central, I teach kids who either struggle with school or are struggling in life and need a little bit more one on one attention." Some of the program's studies show ABOUT 90 percent of students use their stressreducing tools after they've learned them in the classroom. "and I've had some kids who have said things like, you know at lunch they got really mad at someone and instead of hauling off and punching them, they took a deep breath and realized they had a different choice that they could make." The district 51 schools currently USING the program are Bookcliff and East Middle Schools, Central High School and the Summit School Program. In 2019, the National Education Association called anxiety AMONG students a new epidemic. according to a Pew study in the same year, about 70 percent of teens said that anxiety and depression were a 'major problem among' that age group.

When a 9-year-old Broomfield girl, born without her right ear, wrote a letter to her congressman – she and her mother didn't think they would even get a response. But her letter inspired Congressman Joe Neguse to introduce "Ally's Act" -A bill that would require insurance companies to cover hearing devices for children just like Ally, all over the country. Here's Reporter Lori Lizarraga. When Ally Tumblin was 9-years-old, she wrote a letter. So it all started with a homework assignment. The then third grader and her mom sat down to write their congressman about something near and dear to their hearts. Ally's hearing loss. (Ally and Melissa Tumblin, Ally's Act) When Ally was born, we were a little surprised that her right ear was gone. More specifically, Ally wrote Representative Joe Neguse about her bone conduction hearing aid. These devices range anywhere from an average of \$5,000 to \$12,000 each. A device not covered by insurance. After Ally's insurance company denied coverage of her hearing device, she wrote to our office, she explained her situation. The congressman and father says, he was thinking of his own daughter when Ally's letter came across his desk in 2019. (Rep. Joe Neguse, (D) Colorado) Thinking about what it would be like if she had to experience the struggles that Ally has experienced. And so, that certainly had an impact on me and motivated me to really take a close look and ultimately get to work on trying to fix it. Last week, Representative Neguse introduced his first bill in the 117th Congress -- "Ally's Act." Legislation that would require private insurance companies to cover Osseo integrated hearing devices, just like Ally's. They have captured the hearts and minds of many of my colleagues in the Congress...As support for Ally's Act continues to grow --Senator Elizabeth Warren 00:30 "Ally you're 11 years old and you're off to a fantastic start at this point." The Broomfield girl is on her way to inspiring a federal law. Maybe we'll have a hearing. And, maybe this will pass. That's our hope. Melissa Tumblin, Ally's mom, has created a community online for other parents and children going through the same thing as them. It's called Ear Community and has thousands of members.

National School Counseling week begins today across the country. Thank you, school counseling week runs until Friday, but really it's a recognition of the effort counselors put in throughout the entire school year. And students need their counselors this year more than ever. National School Counseling Week IS underway, recognizing the hard work of guidance counselors across the country. "Counseling week is great, I think it's wonderful how much my schools appreciates who I am. I'm blessed to be in the school I'm in, the staff here is very supportive, I think we're one huge family. Each grade level writes me letters or makes me cards, they make me posters, so every day I get something different from my school." This year, counselors have navigated the pandemic by providing virtual guidance, through Zoom or other online mediums. "It wasn't the easiest way to do counseling, especially at the elementary level. But it

was still there, and we also worked a lot with the admin in the office on helping locating kids and working with their families." Online guidance has many more challenges than counseling in-person. "You don't get the full attention of a student when you're doing it more online, because there's so many more distractions. When youre one on one with a student at school, it's in a room, so I think that makes a big difference. Then you also have family members around, so some kids might not be comfortable enough to talk to you about how they're feeling, so I think those are the difficulties. I think the big thing was just attention and getting kids to be able to get online." Now that many students are back in the classroom, counseling has resumed in person too, with lessons that children can learn from long after the pandemic is over. "One of the things that I teach kids is how to handle any difficult situation. Many of my major lessons are always based on coping skills and life skills, so I just think teaching kids that has helped them no matter whether it's a pandemic or whatever comes in front of them."
