ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW: The following is the quarterly “Issues and Programs” Report placed in the public file of WNEM TV5 by January 10, 2004. The report covers the period from October 1, 2003 through December 31, 2003. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM’s community ascertainments. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some new segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to or address the problem or need.

2. Unemployment

6PM NAT/NEWS 10/3/03 :22

As unemployment continued to grow, the number of jobs eliminated fell. However, the number of jobs in 2002 actually dropped to its lowest level in eight years.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/10/03 :20

Those who file for unemployment may have to wait a while for that first check. The backlog was created partly because of a change over to an internet and phone system, and complicated by the fact that nearly 40 percent of the Unemployment Claims Division took early retirement.

5:30PM LOC/NEWS 11/6/03 :20

The state unemployment office in Lapeer is closing. It is one of seven to be shut down by November 14 as a cost-saving effort.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 11/11/03 :24

A slump in charitable giving forces many Michigan nonprofit agencies to find new ways to help the needy.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/26/03 :25

A new study indicates the number of immigrants in our state could rise by 250,000 before the end of the decade, which could put more strain on social services and lead to higher unemployment.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/8/03 :27

Jobs need to be manufactured in Michigan. More than 170,000 workers have been cut from payrolls in this state, pushing unemployment to 7.6 percent—the highest rate in eleven years.

3. Welfare/Poverty

5PM NAT/NEWS 10/17/03 1:45

Cardinals met to discuss Roman Catholic Church challenges, including America's priest shortage, poverty in Latin America, empty churches in Europe and other problems.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/17/03 :21

Michigan is in the middle when it comes to the healthiest states. Key indicators of public health include smoking and children living in poverty. Michigan comes in 28th, with the worst state being Mississippi.

11PM NAT/NEWS 12/6/03 :15
New census figures show the number of school-aged children living in poverty is “declining”. The census estimates Michigan has slightly more than 220,000 children between ages 5 and 17 living in poverty.

5PM NAT/NEWS 12/29/03 :26
The US Census reports there are more Michigan families living in poverty than ever before—the state’s poverty rate jumped to a little over 11.5 percent last year—a 2 point increase from the year before.

4. Domestic Violence

5PM LOC/NEWS 10/7/03 :26
Hundreds of women marched against domestic violence tonight in Bay County. The Bay Area Women’s Center sponsored the event to call attention to the problem.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/23/03 :18
Victims of domestic violence in Huron County will have another place to turn for help. Bad Axe is building a new “safe home” for abused women.

6PM NAT/NEWS 10/28/03 2:00
Statistics show that when a woman leaves her husband—at that moment she is at a 25 times greater risk of violence than she was when they were still in the relationship. Women are also at that time endangering not only their lives, but the lives of those around them.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/2/03 1:00
A woman is stabbed by her estranged husband in a quiet Bay City neighborhood. The husband was also injured; police say the family has a history of domestic violence.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/9/03 :22
The State Parole Board is not interested in considering a bid to free Luanne Szenay of Essexville, who is serving a life sentence for murdering her husband. The Michigan Battered Women’s Clemency Project says she was a victim of domestic violence and plans to file more petitions next year.

WAKEUP LOC/NEWS 12/18/03 :45
The Underground Railroad in Saginaw has about 50 families who need toys and household items this Christmas season.

5. Utility Cost (need for assistance)

6PM NAT/NEWS 10/26/03 :19
A “solar storm” on the sun is sending extra energy down to earth, which in turn is affecting electric utilities, airline communications and satellite navigation systems.

5:30PM NAT/NEWS 12/17/03 :22
Natural gas prices, on both the spot and futures market, have soared nearly 50 percent since just before Thanksgiving. A Senate Committee will look into the allegations.

6. Health Insurance Cost

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/5/03 :19
Group of doctors suing Blue Cross Blue Shield as that company takes too long for reimbursement. Blue Cross officials dispute the claim.

5PM NAT/NEWS 10/19/03 :25
The price of health insurance continues to rise with another increase of 12.6 expected in 2004. That means employers will be paying about \$300 more for each worker.

Weekend Wakeup NAT/NEWS 10/26/03 :25
A study found one third of the estimated 44 million Americans without health insurance work for big companies, which is a 25 percent jump in a four-year period.

5:30PM NAT/NEWS 11/12/03 :22
Nursing home insurance bought now and used later may be something you wish to avoid purchasing.

Wakeup NAT/NEWS 11/26/03 :23
President Bush plans to approve the Medicare overhaul passed by the Senate which gives seniors a prescription drug benefit for the first time and also gives insurance companies a chance to sell plans to medical recipients.

5PM LOC/NEWS 12/4/04 :18
Health insurance is the main sticking point for secretaries, custodial and maintenance staff in Clio, who have been working without a new contract since July 1.

5PM NAT/NEWS 12/25/03 1:43
Researchers at the Center for Budget and Policy Priorities found that up to 1.6 million people are losing health coverage and the situation is especially grim for African Americans. The Bush administration intends to announce a new health insurance initiative in the coming months.

7. Child Abuse/Neglect

Wakeup NAT/NEWS 10/13/03 :40
A Florida babysitter was caught on a “nanny-cam” shaking a baby and later throwing the baby on the floor. The babysitter faces four counts of child abuse.

11PM LOC/NEWS 10/18/03 :22
Former “owner and operator” of a Flint daycare pleads guilty to a child abuse charge. The daycare owner left her business for a few minutes which is when her 12-year-old son shook a crying baby.

Weekend Wakeup LOC/NEWS 10/19/03 :18
The mother of a boy who stabbed his brother over a fight about toys is behind bars, and faces four years in prison, if convicted. Both children are being placed in foster care.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/20/03 1:15
Two teenagers came forward to authorities to report sexual abuse from a Burton man who started out as their babysitter. Mother and daughters moved several times, fearing for their lives, finally had enough, and went to the Genesee Co. Sheriff’s Department.

5PM LOC/NEWS 11/20/03 1:20
The Child Abuse and Neglect Council experts say with the eruption of the Michael Jackson scandal, now is a good time for parents to revisit talks with their children about their bodies and inappropriate behavior from other adults.

6PM LOC/NEWS 12/5/03 1:30
A child porn ring, found in Mid-Michigan, is also allegedly wrapped up in the porn web that stretches into at least five states and possibly out of the country.

6PM LOC/NEWS 12/10/03 1:35
A Saginaw mother of two learned her husband was using his own 8-year-old and neighbor children for sex acts. A counselor to these children says they may develop behavior and trust problems as they grow older.

8. Emergency Shelter

11PM NAT/NEWS 10/27/03 :25
Because of raging wildfires in California, dozens of homes have burned and emergency shelters are filling up fast.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/24/03 1:00
A woman stabbed her estranged husband, possibly puncturing his lung while he beat her after breaking into her apartment. It's important for people to know there are shelters available.

6PM LOC/NEWS 11/25/03 :51
Drastic budget cuts have forced agencies to scale back on many services provided at area shelters. Consequently, these organizations can still use donations for the holiday season.

5:30PM LOC/NEWS 12/17/03 1:20
Dozens of Mid-Michigan families will be in domestic abuse shelters, or in transition housing creating an opportunity for viewers to experience the true meaning of holiday spirit by participating in the Adopt-A-Family Program sponsored by the Underground Railroad Advocacy.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/11/03 :26
With only 14 days 'til Christmas, a local radio station is asking you to buy an extra present, something non-violent, unwrapped, or make a money donation. It will be given to area shelters who take in abused and neglected children.

9. Prescription Drug Cost (need for assistance)

6PM NAT/NEWS 10/13/03 :23
People living in Wisconsin can get prescription drugs from Canada without having to cross the border. Canada Drug Services opened its second store today.

5:30PM NAT/NEWS 10/20/03 :14
Another U.S. pharmaceutical company has decided to limit sales of drugs to Canadian pharmacies claiming their products are increasingly being counterfeited and improperly stored.

NOON LOC/NEWS 10/31/03 :13
Michigan and Vermont say they've slowed the rising cost of prescription drugs for Medicaid programs. Both states now require doctors in most cases to prescribe drugs from a preferred list of more cost-effective medicines.

5PM NAT/NEWS 11/16/03 :37
President Bush is urging a quick passage of a bill that would be the largest expansion in Medicare's history. It still needs to be approved by the House and Senate.

5PM NAT/NEWS 11/17/03 :23
Members of Congress have reached a tentative agreement to overhaul the Medicare program. The legislation would give seniors help in paying for prescription drugs. It would also create a large role for private insurers, which is a major sticking point for some Democrats.

Weekend Wakeup NAT/NEWS 11/30/03 :20
Regarding the prescription drug benefit to seniors that President Bush plans to sign, the government assistance would not take effect until 2006. However, the bill allows seniors to buy a discount drug card this spring for around \$30.

6PM NAT/NEWS 12/8/03 :33
There is criticism and support for the \$400 billion Medicare bill signed today by President Bush. Democrats say the prescription part is too complicated and costly for seniors, but the President is hoping it will help him win support from seniors in the upcoming election.

5PM NAT/NEWS 12/13/03 :23
Autoworkers and their families will soon have to order prescriptions through the mail, or else fund their medications out of pocket, according to a new nationwide health contract. Health care experts say the agreement will help keep down health coverage costs.

10. Crime

5PM LOC/NEWS 10/22/03 :45
Two brothers are charged in a 1985 double murder. The defense says there is no case, because there are no bodies or murder weapon found. Prosecution has a witness who says different. The Duvall brothers face life in prison if convicted.

6PM LOC/NEWS 10/22/03 :45
Students at Central Michigan University wonder why they did not learn of an off-campus assault until weeks later. The Mt. Pleasant Police informed the Campus Police, who did not put out a campus-wide alert until much later.

5PM LOC/NEWS 10/28/03 :30
The Michigan Crime Report says overall crime is down, but some violent crimes are up, such as rape, arson and murder. There were fewer robberies and property crimes in 2002.

NOON LOC/NEWS 11/12/03 1:24

Two women were bound, gagged, sexually assaulted, and then left for dead as their building is set on fire. Investigators have been on the scene through the night and morning trying to piece together what happened last night at the Green Spa in Kawkawlin.

5:30PM LOC/NEWS 11/21/03 :40

Police arrested a Saginaw man in the murder of 37-year-old Calvin Tubbs. The arms and legs of the deceased were found in a field in Buena Vista Township over two weeks ago.

11PM LOC/NEWS 11/28/03 :52

A mother of three had her Christmas presents stolen from her car. Police recommend that shoppers store presents in the trunk of their cars, rather than the back seat, or if you have a van, at least out of site of would-be burglars.

Wakeup LOC/NEWS 12/11/03 :22

This morning Saginaw police are still searching for two men they say abducted a woman off an eastside street and raped her early Wednesday. Police hope to release a sketch of the men later this morning.

11PM LOC/NEWS 12/29/03 1:57

Two men walked into a McDonald's and demanded all the money out of the cash registers. The robbers also took the employees' personal belongings and forced them into a walk-in freezer. Buena Vista Township Police say the employees did the right thing and no one was harmed.

Specifically, I certify that, in the form and sequence in which the programming was disseminated by CBS to its owned and affiliated stations for broadcast:

- (1) Each hour of weekend children's programming (containing either one hour-long program or two consecutive half-hour programs) contained no more than ten and one-half minutes (10:30) of network commercials and was formatted to contain no commercials supplied by the local station;
- (2) When, due to preemptions, the network disseminated during the weekend a half-hour children's program which was not part of an hour's block of children's programming, that program contained no more than five minutes fifteen seconds (5:15) of network commercials and was formatted to contain no commercials supplied by the local station.


