ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM at the open of business day April 10, 2014. The report covers the period from January 1 through March 31, 2014. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainments. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

1. Job Market

5P LOC/NEWS 1/9/14 1:12

A local used car lot is closing its doors in five cities. The president of the company says he wasn't satisfied with how those dealerships were managed. Employees will need to seek new jobs, and the owner is left with a large inventory of vehicles.

6P LOC/NEWS 1/9/14 :25

Morley Company is making plans to hire nearly 300 workers. The company is expanding business with their current customers as well as new business contracts. Positions include help desk, agents, technical, automotive consults and appliance technicians.

6P LOC/NEWS 1/30/14 1:35

Consumers Energy announces they will not be building a new \$700 million facility locally because they received a better deal elsewhere. Area contractors looking forward to the business this project would have brought, express dismay at the change of plans.

5P NAT/NEWS 2/5/14 1:22

A new report on the Affordable Health Care Act states the law could lead to 2 million workers leaving the work force. Democrats argue shrinking employment does not indicate Americans are losing their jobs. Republicans say as the welfare state expands, the incentive to work declines. The report also references low wage workers, who they say are likely to reduce their hours or quit because of the law.

6P NAT/NEWS 2/8/14 1:32

The White House says there are now 4 consecutive months of job growth, and that unemployment is the lowest it's been in 5 years. Republics counter that the number of jobs added has been lower, and more Americans are dropping out of the job market.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/13/14 1:08

The TRW plan officially closes Friday, with nearly 600 employees out looking for a job. The Saginaw plant manufactured braking systems for General Motors. Many workers say this closure means nothing more than it's time to move on.

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530P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:39

General Motors broke ground this morning on a new paint facility at GM Truck Assembly, located in Flint. A spokesperson says the new paint shop represents the highest level of technology for the environment, along with energy conservation and paint quality. The employment impact of this new paint facility is estimated at 150 new or retained jobs.

Genesee County has several road construction projects set for 2014. They include a road bridge over I-75 in Grand Blanc Township. Another project happens at the I-475 junction to I-75 at the Genesee County-Oakland county line encompassing 19 miles of road and bridge work. The third major project is an upgrade to lighting from I-475 to Dort Highway.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/19/14 1:40

Tonight the Flint Community Schools District issued 41 pink slips with an explanation that not all of them will actually lose their jobs. It's something done with a district expects layoffs, but the number needed are unknown, giving them flexibility while they wait to hear what their student count number is. The school district struggles with nearly \$19 million in debt.

2. Economy/Business

LOC/NEWS 1/11/14 1:33

The puck drops in Bay City this weekend as the January Freeze Hockey Tournament gets underway. The event has continued to grow and attract more and more people in its nine years. There are 26 teams from all over here for the 3-day event, bringing not only their love of hockey to Bay City, but an economic boost for the city as well.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/12/14 1:24

The Snyder administration announces that lawmakers have nearly \$975 million more than expected when working on Michigan's next budget. Debate has begun between Governor Snyder and lawmakers on how to spend the money. At a local restaurant, customers share ideas on how they feel the money should be spent.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/22/13 1:39

The artic blast has business booming at a Saginaw Township auto repair shop. The owner says their shop had to extend their hours 3 weeks earlier than in the past, due to demand. An example given was a car battery which may have made it through the winter, dies due to the abnormal cold being felt this season. Remote starters are also popular buys this year.

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11P LOC/NEWS 2/4/14 1:55

A 25,000 square foot facility on M-15, which housed a consignment shop, weekly flea market and hosted estate auctions, was operated by an area woman. Late last summer vendors in the building say items mysteriously disappeared and checks were bouncing. Sixteen people have filed complaints, and now the woman operating the facility faces four felony charges.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/14/14 2:00

TV5 has received multiple complaints from people who say they ended up paying much more for their propane gas than they were originally told. Partially to blame is the extreme cold, driving up propane use, especially in the Midwest. This caused a shortage and a flood of complaints to the Attorney General's office of alleged price gouging.

5P LOC/NEWS 2/27/14 1:24

A local golf business says the harsh winter and delayed spring will also delay his course from opening this year. In addition to the late spring, flooding concerns are also a worry of the course manager, who says last year his course was a huge water hazard until June.

5P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:39

General Motors broke ground today on a new paint facility for their Truck Assembly Plant located in Flint. Workers will erect a 596,000 square foot building, using up to 280 people to complete. The plant will provide a 90 percent reduction in sludge to landfill, and use 20 percent less gas and 40 percent less electricity. The project generates hope for the future, not only for the Flint assembly workers, but for the City of Flint and its community.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/5/14 1:30

Starting April 21, Hamilton Street, in Saginaw, is set to undergo a million dollar construction project, closing a portion of Hamilton Street for 3 months. Local business owners express concern over the road project, worried over how the construction will hurt their bottom line. Business owners do expect the hassle will be well worth it once the project is complete.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/13/14 1:33

The vice president of Saginaw Futures says he's seen more growth in downtown Saginaw over the last 20 months than the 20 years before. He says there are several restaurants scheduled to open in the next few years. Area leaders indicate the opening of the CMU Health Surgical Disciplines building has also spurred economic development to Saginaw.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/31/14 :32

The State program MSHDA, announced the expansion of a popular first time buyers program which would now include repeat buyers. The program offers purchasers up to \$7,500 in down payment assistance. As many as 1 million homeowners are expected to qualify statewide.

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3. Crime

11P LOC/NEWS 1/1714 1:31

A church pastor holds an urban peace coach meeting, encouraging youth to open up and help solve the senseless violence in Flint. It is done in honor of the first victim of violence in 2014, as the family gathers to remember their loved one. The pastor feels a state of emergency should be called, looking for help to prevent more deaths.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/21/14 1:32

Crimestoppers of Michigan has replaced the Flint Area Crimestoppers. The organization has a new 800 number and will offer bigger rewards. They'll have more resources. Billboards and door hangers near the scene of the crime will promote the anonymous tip line, and people can earn up to \$2,500 if their tip leads to a homicide conviction.

6P LOC/NEWS 1/22/14 1:03

Two men stood trial in Saginaw today for the murder of 6-year-old Layla Jones in August, 2012. Today a jury found both guilty of first degree murder and a dozen other counts. The mother to Layla expresses her thanks to prosecutors for their help in bringing justice.

5P LOC/NEWS 2/4/14 1:20

The chain outlet Target's chief financial officer apologized to lawmakers for a massive data breach during the holiday shopping season of 2013. The retailer has been under fire since cyber thieves used malware to swipe credit and debit information of some 40 million Target shoppers. Congress is considering legislation to better protect Consumers from fraud and theft.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/6/14 1:24

The Sheriff of Saginaw County talks about catalytic converter thefts, which he says criminals are stealing at an alarming rate. The Sheriff says the parts can go for as much as \$100, maybe more. He wants people to be on the lookout, hoping a tip will lead to an arrest.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/19/14 1:28

For the past 3 years FBI statistics put Flint as the most dangerous city for its size in America. But the numbers for the first 6 months of 2013 removed that title from the city. Tonight the Police Chief of Flint commends his officers during their evening roll call on their diligence in patrolling crime hot spots. He also credited the presence of the Michigan State Police in lowering the crime rate in 2013.

5P LOC/NEWS 3/6/24 1:25

Burglars break into an unmarked police car and take 3 bullet proof vests and a taser. Local police are keeping quiet about which department this happened to, but a criminal is on the loose with some police-issued weapons. A gun store owners points own the offenses should the thieves be caught with any of the stolen gear.

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11P LOC/NEWS 3/19/14 1:30

The City of Saginaw defends its payout of nearly three quarters of a million dollars to the family of Milton Hall. He is the homeless man shot to death by police two summers ago. The mother of Milton Hall wishes to see police become more involved in the community, holding forums, listening to concerns, and understanding the experiences of those who are homeless.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/25/14 1:45

A man has his license plate stolen and then is charged with hundreds of dollars in parking tickets for cars he doesn't own. The City of Saginaw issued a total of 6 parking tickets from January to February, and even though the man reported his plate stolen months before, the tickets are still being written in his name. Now the debt has been turned over to a collection agency.

5P LOC/NEWS 3/26/14 1:27

Flint police along with other law enforcement agencies executed a warrant sweep today. Over 100 warrants addresses were checked, covering everything from parole violations to more serious crimes. More of these sweeps are planned in the coming months since the City of Flint alone has more than 23,000 outstanding warrants.

4. Politics

11P LOC/NEWS 1/1614 1:26

Today Governor Rick Snyder sounded like a man running for re-election. He says he wants to avoid 'playing politics' with Michigan's projected \$1.3 billion budget surplus over 2 fiscal years. He also wants to use the monies for long-term needs like retirement funding, the rainy day fund, and tax relief for working residents.

5P NAT/NEWS 1/21/14 1:30

The Winter Olympic games in Sochi, Russia are on 'high alert' under new threats of an attack. Russian police say they shot and killed a wanted Islamic militant leader in the Northern Caucuses region. U.S. military sources say two Navy ships will patrol the nearby Black Sea in case Americans have to be evacuated from the games.

11P NAT/NEWS 1/28/14 1:02

During the State of the Union address, President Obama said joblessness, deeper inequality, and stalled economic mobility have left many Americans less optimistic about the future. He said if Congress doesn't act on his economic proposals, the President will take action with Congress wherever he can. He also called on Congress to reverse the rise in equality, and reward Americans for hard work and sacrifice.

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6P LOC/NEWS 2/4/14 1:35

Governor Snyder kicked off his election campaign, meeting with business leaders in Frankenmuth. He touched on a variety of topics in during his interview with TV5 which included Michigan's failing school districts, public safety, and the outsourcing done on the Super Bowl ad he had done.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/7/14 1:11

Air Force One touched down in Lansing today for President Obama's stop at Michigan State University. While there he signed the 2014 Farm Bill into law. The president says the bill will help more than just farmers, but rural communities and businesses.

5P LOC/NEWS 2/14/14 1:56

The emergency manager of Flint, Darnell Earley says the city has sent letters to their retirees about his concern with costs and how it may affect the city moving forward. He says the city is working with approximately 24 separate health care plans for retirees. He would like to put everyone on the same plan and manage it.

5P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:29

Flint Mayor Dayne Walling gave his State of the City address today. His message is that Flint is smaller, stronger and smarter. He touched on a number of issues, but the one he emphasized was blight, saying it is tied to all of the city's major problems, including crime.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:30

Tonight Bay City has a new leader. The City Commission approved a contract to hire Richard Finn as City Manager. Finn's negotiated a salary of \$115,000, and will begin work on March 17. The City Clerk has managed the City during the interim period after the last manager left to work as County Controller for Saginaw County.

5P NAT/NEWS 3/25/14 1:22

Families say the Malaysian government has deceived them. People who lost loved ones on Malaysia Airlines Flint 370 tried to push their way into the Malaysian embassy in Beijing, China, after it was announced all on that flight are dead. Most of the 239 people aboard the plane were from China and their government is demanding to see satellite data that shows the plane crashed into the Indian Ocean off Australia's west coast.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/31/14 1:10

A surprising announcement was made today that could change things in Washington. Representative Dave Camp will not be seeking re-election this November. Camp has been a staple in the U.S. House for more than 20 years. He is head of the House Ways and Means Committee, which has a lot of sway over budget policy. The head of the House Intelligence Committee, Mike Rogers, announced last week, that he'll leave Congress as well.

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5. Health

5P LOC/NEWS 1/7/14 1:45

The recent snow storm, and possibly boredom, has some local teenagers participating in a new social media phenomenon called 'Snow Challenge'. It consists of running outside and jumping in the snow wearing only socks and shorts, video tape it and post it on social media websites. Doctors don't recommend the trend, but say it's the length of the exposure that is the real danger.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/7/14 1:26

A local doctor who works in the Emergency Room at McLaren Hospital in Flint says they are seeing an increase of patients suffering from the flu. She says it is not just babies or the elderly in need of medical attention, but is also affecting people in the twenties and thirties. Those age groups usually don't think they need flu vaccines, and that group has been hit pretty hard.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/11/14 :27

Health officials warn of a deadly outbreak of flu and confirm six deaths in Michigan. The Center for Disease Control reports some of the most severe cases are the H1N1 strain of influenza. Specific warnings are directed at college students as they head back to class. The CDC estimates that 40 percent of Americans have not gotten a flu vaccination.

530P LOC/NEWS 2/5/14 1:15

This fall CVS shoppers will no longer find cigarettes behind the counter. The drugstore chain says it will stop selling tobacco products by October 1. Several health organizations praise the move by CVS, and so is the White House. But the move won't hurt tobacco companies much, as drugstores account for only a small percentage of cigarette sales.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/19/14 1:23

A hallucinogenic drug known as DMT is being blamed for the death of an MSU student, and Owosso native. Drug addiction counselors say there are cases of DMT abuse here in Mid-Michigan which creates a euphoric effect experiencing hallucinations. A survey says the newest users are more likely to be young, male and in school.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/21/14 1:40

Buildings in the Millington school district are being scrubbed down today after administration was informed a student is sick with the H1N1 virus, also known as swine flu. The victim is an 8th grade student who is now at the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/5/14 1:45

Cars flying by and subzero temperatures are not exactly ideal ways to birth a child. But a new father did just that, wrapping the baby in clothing that was destined for Goodwill, to keep him

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warm. The baby boy was born on the side of the freeway; minutes later, an ambulance came to take the family to the hospital. The proud parent says it was 'amazing' bringing his son into the world with his own hands.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/6/14 1:24

A Michigan State Senate bill called the Youth Tobacco Act would prohibit the sale of alternative nicotine products, like electronic cigarettes, to minors. The proposed legislation also bans the possession of these vapor items by minors. Proponents of the bill say e-cigarettes and products like them lead children to addiction and real cigarettes.

530P LOC/NEWS 3/7/14 1:25

Saginaw County's mosquito control program runs from April to October. It was created to help control and protect against mosquito-born diseases like West Nile. It currently costs taxpayers \$2.5 million per year and could increase. The Director of the Mosquito Abatement Commission says a modest increase is needed, since the current funding has maintained status quo since 1988.

6. Safety

11P LOC/NEWS 1/6/14 1:30

The first real snowfall has left a lot of the white stuff behind, giving snow removal businesses an opportunity to cash in on the bad weather. One delivery person says her four-wheel drive vehicle is earning her paycheck, as she delivers pizzas, which are a hot commodity as the dig-out continues.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/20/14 1:35

The Good Samaritan Rescue Mission has been open for almost 9 years. One man lost his job after being injured last year. He and his wife struggle to make ends meet ever since. They'll have a warm place to stay thanks to the shelter in Bay City. The Director of the shelter says more than 100 people stayed at the shelter last night, caused by an artic blast working its way through the state.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/23/14 1:05

Bitter cold weather has some local shelters working overtime to make sure everyone is safe and warm. The Shelter of Flint is one of those places people can turn to and many already have. The Director of Development at that shelter says tonight 55 people are staying here. One woman says she doesn't want to think of the alternative, and feels with the weather as cold as it is, one can't be too proud to ask for help.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/6/14 1:37

Snow covered sidewalks are forcing people to walk in the streets, making it dangerous for both drivers and pedestrians. Our cameras repeatedly caught people in this area forced to walk in the street because sidewalks weren't shoveled. The Saginaw City's Chief Inspector told us a city ordinance says residents are responsible for shoveling the sidewalks in front of their homes.

1:30

Police say a plow truck driver ran a red light and hit an SUV this morning. He will probably not be ticketed in the accident. State law gives snow plows rights on the road similar to emergency vehicles, like ambulances or police cars. Bay City officials say plow trucks are only supposed to go through red lights when it's safe to do so, but as today shows, accidents do happen.

A local elementary school is being criticized for holding a fire drill in the middle of sub zero wind chills. The Essexville-Hampton superintendent told us the children were allowed to take their hats, coats and gloves outside with them during the drill. Some parents felt children need to prepare for all kinds of situations, and the situation was of a very short duration.

A man is in jail after police say he neglected his elderly mother and stole thousands of dollars from her. An 80-year-old woman needed medication daily and her care giver and son stopped taking his mother to the doctor over a year ago. A neighbor called police, requesting a welfare check.

1:08

General Motors has halted the sale of most of its Chevrolet Cruzes which have a 1.4 liter turbo engine—the company's best selling model last year. A reason has not been given for the stoppage. General Motors is already under fire for delaying a recall related to flawed ignition switches, which led to 12 deaths.

An accident victim describes in court today the actions which led up to a crash that killed his new wife, and seriously injured his son and himself. Prosecutors say a 20-year-old man partied with friends and drove away drunk. His blood alcohol level was twice the legal limit, and the accident occurred as he drove the wrong way into oncoming traffic. He now faces 8 criminal charges including second degree murder.

7. Weather

1:10

As wind chills drop below zero degrees, those in need turn to shelters like the Carriage Town Ministries in Flint for shelter from the weather. Carriage Town has 60 beds for men. It also has space for up to 45 women and children. With a winter storm dumping several inches of snow in the area, and artic air now settling in, the beds are full every night.

1:07

Rescue crews like police and firefighters brave the artic air to keep the rest of us safe. Three local fire departments responded to a residential fire in Owosso today. It started with an elderly homeowner trying to thaw pipes by using a blowtorch. The old house quickly went up in flames.

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The fire chief says when water gets on you, it adds a layer of protection, but at the same time makes mobility difficult.

This winter's record-breaking cold is wreaking havoc on water lines in one local city, and problems are expected to continue. Authorities in Washington State say the death toll from Saturday's mudslide will likely reach at least 24 victims. A rain-soaked hillside collapsed, burying dozens of homes in Oso, Washington. Heavy equipment was bought to help clear the wreckage amid rainy conditions.

1:20

Nearly a week after a massive mudslide wiped out the small town of Oso, Washington, the official death toll remains at 17. Officials say they expect those numbers to rise sharply as they expand their search. Crews are building an emergency road to open up access through the wreckage. Volunteers continue to search for the 50 people still missing.

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8. Veterans/European/Middle East Unrest

530P LOC/NEWS 1/10/14 :25
The American Legion in Saginaw Township will give away a jackpot of more than \$60,000.
The raffle started as a method to raise money for local veterans along with building improvements to the post on Weiss Street. Sixty percent of the raffle goes to the winner and the rest to the American Legion Post.

6P LOC/NEWS 1/24/13 1:55
Members of the Michigan National Guard return home from a nine-month tour of duty in
Afghanistan. Friends and family welcomed them with hugs and kisses at a ceremony in Owosso.
One guardsman we caught up with was meeting his son for the very first time.

5P NAT/NEWS 1/27/14 1:10
The Olympic torch made its way through a violent region of southern Russia today as it continues its journey to the host city of Sochi, in Russia. Crowds cheered the flame at a stadium in the region of Dagestan, a base for Islamic insurgents who have threatened to attack the winter games. The State Department has issued a travel warning for Americans heading to Russia.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/18/14 1:30
A retired Army captain was in Bay City Federal Court today, fighting foreclosure, saying his rights as a U.S. service member were violated. He says while he was gone on a five-year deployment from 2007 to 2013, his truck was repossessed and sold, and the home he's owned for ten years is in foreclosure with a mortgage company.

Violent clashes occurred overnight in the Ukrainian city of Kiev after months of mostly peaceful protests. Pro-western demonstrators want Ukraine to have stronger ties with the European union. Its president rejected a trade deal with the European Union, and accepted a \$15 billion bailout from Russia. The European Union has already imposed sanctions. Delegations from both sides have been sent to Kiev to mediate a truce.

Veterans who served during the Gulf War are entitled to certain benefits and services. One local Army veteran was unaware he could get help to attend school, and has been working as a barber. Now he has applied for school funding and is a full time student, working toward being an electrician. A organization known as Alternative Veterans Solutions, located in Flint, helped make his dreams come true.

11P NAT/NEWS 3/2/13 1:43
The Ukrainian military is on its highest alert as Russian forces surround three military bases in the strategic Crimean Peninsula, prompting fears an armed conflict could occur momentarily.

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The majority of Crimeans are ethnic Russian, and Moscow keeps a naval base there. The Prime Minister of Ukraine feels this is actually a declaration of war. So far Canada has recalled its ambassador to Moscow and the United States and Great Britain say they are suspending any meetings ahead of an upcoming summit.

530P NAT/NEWS 3/20/14 1:22

The Russian flag now flies above a Ukrainian Naval Base along the Black Sea in Crimea. Moscow is moving quickly to incorporate Crimea, following a weekend vote in the region to join Russia. Russian President Vladmir Putin has signed a treaty with Crimean leaders and Russian lawmakers plan to make it official by the end of the week. This move came despite the threat of tougher sanctions from the White House. Washington and its European allies have already frozen assets and slapped visa bans on some Russian and Crimean officials.

NOON NAT/NEWS 3/28/14 :25

Researchers say they've been able to show for the first time veterans with Gulf War illness have problems with how their cells produce energy. Hundreds of thousands of veterans from the Persian Gulf War in the early 1990s suffer from symptoms including fatigue, muscle pain, and cognitive problems.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/15/14 1:33

Today parents of students attending Bay City Public Schools received a recorded message saying a teacher at Handy Middle School was arrested for alleged sexual involvement with a student. The 31-year-old teacher was arraigned today with first degree criminal sexual conduct charges—having sex with a middle school student between the ages of 13 and 15 years. She is currently lodged in the Bay County Jail.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/16/14 1:24

A 23-year-old janitor working at Hamady Middle High School in Mt. Morris was arrested for having sex with a 16-year-old student. School administrators immediately terminated the man. Police also found two guns in the man's car which was parked on school property. The suspect has been charged with 11 counts.

5P LOC/NEWS 1/29/14 :53

A mid-Michigan teacher accused of having sex with a teenage student was in court today. The student, who at the time was age 14, and is now 15 years, took the stand. The woman is a substitute teacher; prosecutors say the incidents happened at both the woman's house and at school.

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11P LOC/NEWS 2/6/14 :30

Tonight a town hall meeting was held to help educate doctors on the warning signs of human trafficking. Experts estimate there are more than 7,000 people, ages 16 to 25 years, in the county who are at high risk of becoming victims. Tonight's speakers include the Genesee County prosecutor and a human rights advocate.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/24/14 1:38

A local state representative introduced a bill last week that would allow victims of domestic violence and stalking to carry a concealed pistol into gun free zones, such as schools and churches. Under the bill, that person would need a concealed pistol license and a protection order in place. A spokesperson for the Underground Railroad, a woman's shelter, says the key to stopping domestic violence is to hold perpetrators more accountable, not more laws.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/28/14 1:00

Police found a 6-year-old boy unresponsive at a home in Saginaw. The boy is in critical condition tonight, a victim of what appears to be child abuse. A 39-year-old man is charged with torture, assault with intent to murder, and first degree child abuse. The man's relationship with the child is still unclear, as police continue to investigate.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:26

A 17-year-old youth is formally charged with an attack on two women. The male faces first degree sexual assault charges. Police say he met the two women through a social media website. He then allegedly became angry and used a gun to force the women to a parking lot, where he assaulted them.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/3/14 1:22

A six-year-old boy died this past weekend at a local hospital where he was brought after police found him unresponsive at a home in Saginaw. His parents face charges of child abuse, and the boy's father has been formally charged with torture and assault with intent to murder. A spokesperson from the Child Abuse and Neglect Council advises if a child appears to be in danger, 9-1-1 should be called.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 3/21/14 :31

An Army General is accused of forcing a female captain to perform inappropriate acts during a three-year extra-marital affair. The General pleads guilty to lesser charges, including having an improper relations with three subordinate officers and adultery. In exchange for that plea, the sexual assault charges are dropped, along with two other counts.

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10. School/Campus

11P LOC/NEWS 1/17/14 1:20

Tonight a parent questions the policies of the Atherton School District. The district doesn't make it mandatory for an adult to be outside when the bus drops off a child. Earlier this week the woman's 5-year-old daughter was dropped off at the wrong home, and the little girl sat outside in the cold for at least an hour.

5P LOC/NEWS 1/24/14 1:20

The Flushing School District closed at noon today, due to a power outage. Frustrated parents had to then make arrangements to pick up their children. Parents were already surprised the district was in session today, as many schools closed because of weather.

11P LOC/NEWS 1/28/14 1:20

Today's school cancellations meant another day off for hundreds of local students, but not for all athletes. Saginaw Public Schools chose to still host sporting events, even after skipping class due to the cold. Parents didn't have a problem with the mixed decision. School administrators say the decision is based on the fact that the game is not a mandatory event, and children won't be forced to be outside for extended periods of time.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/4/14 1:33

Saginaw Public Schools presented a plan to close several buildings, including Saginaw High. The district may also lay off dozens of teachers and staff. Parents and community members say they are shocked by the potential changes coming to the district. The school district needs to eliminate its \$5 million deficit. If the district fails to submit a plan to the state on how they eliminate the debt, they could lose their next state aid payment.

6P LOC/NEWS 2/17/14 1:30

After weeks of debate, the Saginaw school board voted on a new deficit elimination plan. Seven elementary schools will house all pre-k through 5th grade students. There will be only one middle school, and both Saginaw High and Arthur Hill High Schools remain open, housing students in 8th to 12th grades. The plan eliminates nearly \$5 million from the district's \$6 million deficit, and now goes to the state for approval.

11P LOC/NEWS 2/21/14 1:10

The Saginaw School Board submitted its deficit elimination plan to the state, trimming millions off next year's budget. State officials have now asked them to submit a plan for cutting costs over the next few years. Having student-athletes pay to play sports is one plan being considered.

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11P LOC/NEWS 3/2/14 1:26

Voters in the Burton-Bentley school district rejected a bond proposal for needed repairs. Its failure is forcing the district to re-do the proposal. The school's football stadium is in such bad shape, it's not clear if it's safe enough to host games. The boilers are so inefficient some classrooms feel excessively warm while in others, students are forced to wear coats. District officials say their plan now is to go back to the voters in hopes of essentially saving the district.

6P LOC/NEWS 3/4/14 1:32

State lawmakers contemplate a pilot program converting some public schools to an all-year calendar. The Beecher Schools superintendent supports this approach and has implemented it already at their school. He says they are already seeing improvements in their test scores since making the switch to year-round classes. Low income school districts could apply for state aid to add air conditioning to buildings.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/4/14 1:30

Vassar and Millington schools already share the same superintendent. Tonight parents from both schools were invited to Vassar High School to hear their district leaders discuss sharing other administrative positions and jobs. Both districts must make several hundred thousand dollars in budget cuts going into next year. Tonight state funding and declining enrollment were blamed for the drastic moves.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/18/14 1:20

Trustees at Delta College held a meeting to discuss plans for another Delta College location. Four sites are under consideration, but tonight's meeting was to determine a zone location for the proposed Saginaw Center. No action will be taken for site selection on the April meeting.

11P LOC/NEWS 3/25/14 1:35

The Bridgeport-Spaulding School District faces a \$2.5 million deficit going into next year. The deficit is caused by lower student enrollment which then affects funding provided. Union contracts have to be finalized before the state will consider the district's deficit elimination plan.

Though sports betting in South Carolina is illegal, Brett Parker and his father ran an honest family bookmaking operation that was generally left alone by police. At first police took Parker's story at face value, but as the investigation continued, they discovered a co-worker (Capnerhurst) with financial problems who was demanding money he was owed from Parker, and a marriage not as solid as they were led to believe. Police determined that Capnerhurst was a victim, rather than a killer, and that the adulterous Parker had murdered his wife, in part to collect on a life insurance policy. Police worked methodically on the case, discovering that before moving to California, David was involved in the drug trade in Florida, and had helped authorities bust up a drug ring. After more than a year, as police were closing in, a frightened David Viens opened up to Kathy Galvan: he confessed that he killed Dawn, but claimed it was an accident. Then he recklessly drove on a California coastal highway, with Galvan in the car, to a scenic overlook, and jumped off a 200-foot-high cliff. Surprisingly, Viens survived the fall. His story was that Dawn had started using cocaine and crystal meth. They fought, and David Viens bound her (something he had done in the past), taping her mouth to keep her quiet, and went to sleep. He awoke and found her dead. While in the hospital he told police an incredible tale of disposing of Dawn's body in the way a chef knows best, by cooking her. He boiled her body in a pot for four days, broke down what would not boil down, and threw it away in the trash. Nineteen months after his leap, a wheelchair-bound Viens was in court to face murder charges. The defense said that Dawn's death was an accident -- manslaughter, not murder -- and that he did not cook her. After a two-week trial, David Viens was found guilty of murder. 48 HOURS: "Pain and Gain" - a report about the crimes of the Sun Gym gang, a group of Miami, Florida drifters, petty thieves, and bodybuilders who kidnapped and killed wealthy people to fuel their lifestyle, which provided the inspiration for the recently released black comedy motion picture "Pain and Gain". The story began with the disappearances of Frank Griga and his girlfriend Krisztina Furton in 1995. Police investigation led detectives to a connection to the Sun Gym, a Miami health club, and its manager Danny Lugo and his protégé Adrian Doorbal. Police would discover that they were at the center of a complicated and deadly plot which involved kidnapping, money, and murder. Lugo's girlfriend Sabina Petrescu played a crucial role as police gathered evidence connecting Lugo and Doorbal to the disappearance of Griga and Furton. In a bizarre twist, detectives in another Metro-Dade police department were also looking into Lugo and Doorbal in the kidnapping case of another Miami millionaire, Marc Schiller. Schiller told police that he had been grabbed by a gang and held for more than a month. Schiller also worked out at the Sun Gym, which provided the connection to Lugo and Doorbal. The plan was to kidnap Marc Schiller - a man who had many shady dealings -- have him write his own ransom note, and then kill him. There were several stupid attempts involving costumes, comic book code names, and a staged accident - all of which provided Hollywood with inspiration for the movie. While imprisoned, Schiller was forced to sign over his assets to the gang. They went through the money in about five months and decided to find a new target: Frank Griga. Almost four years after Marc Schiller was left for dead, he faced the Sun Gym gang in court, as Danny Lugo and Adrian Doorbal went on trial for the murders of Frank Griga and Krisztina Furton. They were found guilty of first-degree murder. However, Marc Schiller's ordeal was not over. He was arrested by the FBI on charges involving Medicare fraud. In another twist, the trial judge, Alex Ferrer (now a TV personality), described how important Schiller's testimony was in bringing down the Sun Gym gang. In a plea deal, he ended up serving two years in federal prison and paying \$137,000 in restitution. On screen text graphics: Lugo and Doorbal remain on death row. 48 HOURS: "The Last Confession" - a report on the investigation into the 1960 murder of Irena Garza, in McAllen, Texas, and the efforts family members and police have taken to bring the suspect, a Roman Catholic priest to trial for the crime. The night before Easter, Irene Garza went to church and disappeared. Five days later she was found dead in a canal. Police said she was sexually assaulted and suffocated. There was one immediate suspect, Father John Feit, the priest who admitted to hearing Garza's confession that night, but who has denied any involvement in the murder. Noemi Ponce Sigler, the original investigator's daughter, says her father was told to step away from the case because a deal had been made between the Church and the police regarding Feit. In 2002, the McAllen Police Department asked the Texas Rangers Cold Case unit to re-examine the murder. The investigation took a dramatic turn when a former monk, Dale Tacheny, told police that Feit admitted to killing a young woman while Tacheny was a counselor at a monastery. Joseph O'Brien, an assistant pastor at the church in 1960 also told investigators that Feit told him that he did it. Despite these new findings, Hildago County District Attorney Rene Guerra doesn't believe the case is strong enough to take to court, though he would have prosecuted Feit in 1962 on the charges. Members of the Garza family have pinned their hopes on Ricardo Rodriguez, a candidate for Hildago County District Attorney, who has said he would look into the case. 48 HOURS: "The Blue River Murder" - a report on the investigation into the 2010 death of Stephanie Roller, a Colorado mother of three who allegedly went for a walk during a blizzard and was later found dead in a nearby river. According to Roller's husband, Dale Bruner, she packed up her laptop and headed out for a walk during a blizzard. He waited 11 hours before calling police to report her missing. Friends, as well as the police, found the story strange. Three days later, she was found dead in the Blue River, the victim of a brutal murder: she had been badly beaten and was still alive when thrown into the water. The police investigation uncovered: a marriage on the brink of collapse, Stephanie's emotional affair with Ron Holthaus, and her concerns for her safety and that of her children. Police had three suspects - the jilted husband, the married boyfriend and the boyfriend's jealous wife. Ultimately, the focus turned to Dale Bruner as the chief suspect when information was discovered regarding his dark, violent side, and eight months later he was arrested for the murder of his wife. Hurst and her new husband, Bill Hurst, had recently moved to Pasco County, Florida, leaving her two young children in the care of relatives in Michigan. Then she just disappeared. Sixteen-year-old Wendy Huggy lived with her grandparents in Pasco County, and went to a party - she never returned home. A fisherman found a body floating in the Gulf of Mexico, wrapped in a homemade afghan, but identification proved difficult. There was no connection made to either woman, although Hurst's husband was immediately viewed as a suspect in her disappearance - but he too disappeared, and both cases languished for decades. Detective Lisa Schoneman, a member of the cold case unit, stepped in and a new investigation began. In 2009, Amy Hurst's son discovered significant evidence about the afghan, through the Doe Network, and a body in a Tampa, Florida potter's field once thought to be Wendy Huggy's was examined. In 2011, it was determined to be that of Amy Hurst. Investigation led to her husband, Bill Hurst, who was in Kentucky. Police were able to get Hurst into custody, and he was indicted on first degree murder charges -- he was found guilty. Detective Schoneman says she will keep trying to find Wendy Huggy. 48 HOURS: "aka Rockefeller" - a report about the mysterious life of Christian Gerhartsreiter, a con-man, who pretended, since he came to America from Germany, to be a bond trader, a TV producer, a baronet and even Clark Rockefeller, a member of the famous and wealthy Rockefeller family. In 2008, Gerhartstreiter, then claiming to be Clark Rockefeller, made headlines when he abducted his 7-year-old daughter. The Rockefeller family made it clear that he was not a part of their family. What he was, according to police, was a killer on the run. His arrest in the kidnapping case blew the lid off a 30-year con. All the other identities he had used came to light including the alias he was living under in 1982 in San Marino, California: Christopher Chichester, the 13th Baronet of Chichester. San Marino police believe he murdered John and Linda Sohus, who disappeared in 1985. Years later, the bones on John Sohus were found in the backyard of the house where they lived. At the time, Christopher Chichester lived in the guest house on the property. He went on trial for the murder of John Sohus and was found guilty. 48 HOURS: "Last Chance" (10:00-11:00p) - an interview with Damon Thibodeaux, who was wrongfully convicted of the 1996 murder of his 14-year-old cousin Crystal Champagne and who spent 11 years in Louisiana's notorious Angola prison. Thibodeaux, a distant cousin who was staying with the Champagne family was immediately questioned by police after the girl disappeared. After nine hours of interrogation, he confessed to murdering - and raping - the girl. Thibodeaux says he confessed to police after an intense interrogation and because he was sure he would be cleared during trial. When he met with attorneys hours later, he denied having anything to do with the crime. At the 1997 trial, he was convicted and sentenced to death by lethal injection, even though none of the 84 pieces of physical evidence were ever tied to him. His case caught the eye of attorney Denny LeBeouf, who specializes in cases getting inmates off death row. LeBouef sought the help of Minneapolis attorney Steve Kaplan. Their investigation revealed that Crystal Champagne had never been raped. Together, they came up with a risky plan to present their evidence to Jefferson Parish District Attorney Paul Connick. Connick agreed to re-examine the physical evidence and Thibodeaux was freed two years later. 48 HOURS interviewed various individuals to piece together what may have happened to Champagne.
