daughter Peggy and her husband Doug Ryan were brutally murdered along

survived the attack. Kevin Cooper was arrested, subsequently tried and
convicted of the murders. 86-year-old Dr. Howell, a practicing

"Truth Be Told" - on October 14th 1983, an intruder entered 18-year-old
Laura Neuman's Baltimore apartment through a window and raped her in
her own bed. She had a difficult time convincing police, and even her
own family, that a stranger committed the crime. Nineteen years after
the attack Baltimore Police started a new cold case unit investigating
unsolved rape cases. Laura Neuman's case was reopened in April 2002.
Based on fingerprints at the scene of the crime, police identified
Alfonso Hill as the assailant. Hill confessed to the crime, was tried

"Mystery Man" - "Karen," who prefers to remain anonymous, claimed that

48 HOURS INVESTIGATES: "Tacoma Confidential" - a report on corruption and a cover-up by city officials of Tacoma, Washington, focusing on David Brame, the city's police chief who rose to power despite a shady past. In February 2003, after 11 years of marriage, Brame's wife Crystal filed for a divorce. In April, John Hathaway, a man with an internet site called The New Takhoman, anonymously received the Brame divorce papers, which contained details about the couple's marriage, including allegations of sexual demands, abuse and death threats. Hathaway published the information, titled "Tacoma Confidential," on his website. The story then made the headlines in local papers. The following day, David shot Crystal in the head and turned the gun on himself. He died almost immediately, while Crystal lingered for a week. There are three separate investigations into the Brame murder-suicide, including an FBI inquiry to determine whether any one should face criminal charges. Crystal's parents are preparing to file a multimillion-dollar lawsuit against the city of Tacoma.
