"Bridgestone Firestone"- since 1997, 47 people in Venezuela have died in accidents involving Ford Explorers whose Firestone tires blew out. Critics charge that the incidents were a red flag ignored by Bridgestone/Firestone and Ford and that the deaths could have been prevented by a recall. Includes interview with Hector Rodriguez, a senior Ford executive in Venezuela who places the blame on Firestone. "Sleepless in The Cockpit" - a report on pilot fatigue as a cause of crashes and near crashes involving commercial airlines. Because of a loophole in FAA regulations, airlines can require pilots to stay on duty indefinitely when there are unforeseen delays, such as bad weather or air traffic. "Bud Shuster" - recently the House Ethics Committee rebuked Rep. Clarke claims that the U.S. must be prepared for a new kind of threat, not from missiles, but from terrorists entering into the country, living there for a period, and acquiring weapons of mass destruction. "Made To Order" - a report on people who go to sperm banks requesting sperm from donors with certain physical and mental characteristics in order to produce an ideal child. Critics charge that the high cost of this kind of selection will make it an option only for the wealthy, while proponents say that it's quite normal for parents to want to give their children advantages. "Wall Street Whiz Kid" - 16-year-old Jonathan Lebed made close to a million dollars trading on the stock market. The SEC claimed that his strategy -- which consisted of buying stock, hyping it on the Internet and then selling it when the price soared -- constituted securities fraud. Jonathan has negotiated an out-of-court settlement with the SEC but may still face criminal charges. (C: Steve Kroft - P: Trevor Nelson)

"Negative About Affirmative Action" - three white students charge in a lawsuit that the University of Michigan denied them entry but enrolled black students who they say were less qualified academically. Critics charge that using race as a standard for admissions is illegal, while Michigan University spokesmen claim that it the only way to achieve diversity. "Megan's Law" - variations of Megan's Law, which states that communities must be notified whenever a convicted sex offender moves into the neighborhood, have been adopted by every state. The law, first passed in New Jersey six years ago, has been repeatedly challenged in court by lawyers who claim that it violates the Constitutional privacy of people who have served their time in prison and are trying to get on with their lives. The report focuses on Robinson's inability to control her daughter following her divorce from the girl's father and Valessa's association with two teenage boys, her boyfriend Adam Davis and Jon Whispell. She now claims that Adams was the real killer while she is only guilty of not rescuing her mother. A Florida jury found the girl guilty of murder in the third degree. Her lawyer is appealing the conviction. (C: Peter Van Sant - Sr. P: Katie Boyle - P: Abra Potkin, Loen Kelley)
- 10/19/00 "Brutal Consequences"- in 1996, Lori Berenson, a 26-year-old American journalist, was sentenced to life in prison by a military tribunal on charges that she plotted with Marxist rebels to attack the Peruvian Congress. The conviction has been overturned but the young woman will still have to stand trial in a civil court. (C: Peter Van Sant - P: Patti Aronofsky, Chuck Stevenson) "Forbidden Love"- Jason Johnson, a U.S. Marine stationed in the Persian Gulf fell in love with Meriam Al Khalifa, a member of the royal family of Bahrain. The couple managed to escape to America but Meriam was arrested for entering the country illegally. Following her temporary release from jail, the couple married, but U.S. immigration officials have yet to decide whether she may remain. (C: Harold Dow - P: Sr. P: Katie Boyle - P: Patti Aronofsky, Susan Wiggins) "A Family's Shame"- a report on male-dominated societies in the Middle East and Asia, where women and girls who are perceived to have brought shame on their family's reputation can be at grave risk. Includes reports on incidents involving two women, one Pakistani, the other Jordanian. (C: Troy Roberts - P: Susan Wiggins Moore, Gail Zimmerman - P: Sr. Broadcast P: Al Briganti)
- 10/26/00 (48 HOURS MYSTERIES) "A Grandmother's Mission"- on June 4, 1983, Dr. Mary Howell's daughter Peggy and her husband Doug Ryan were brutally murdered along with their 10-year-old daughter Jessica and a friend, Christopher Hughes. Their eight-year old son Josh was seriously wounded but survived the attack. Kevin Cooper was arrested, subsequently tried and convicted of the murders. 86-year-old Dr. Howell, a practicing chiropractor, was not convinced that Cooper was guilty and fearing that the real killers are still at large, has begun a campaign to get the state of California to provide DNA tests which would prove Cooper's guilt or innocence. Attached is the CBS Television Network Certification of Compliance with the Children's Television Commercial Limits for the Fourth Quarter of 2000. Two copies are provided, one for you and one to give to the Community Affairs Director or the individual at your station responsible for the public file.

As you know, the Children's Television Act of 1990 requires every television station to place in its public file, no later than the tenth day after each quarter, documents certifying that all children's programming broadcast by the station during the quarter did not exceed the commercial limits imposed by the Act.

The attached document, which is suitable for placement in your public file, certifies that regularly scheduled children's programs distributed by the CBS Television Network were formatted to comply with the commercial limits, if they were broadcast by affiliates according to the sequence and schedule recommended by the Network in the order wire for the programs. You should augment this network certificate with additional documentation certifying that your station broadcast the core programs according to the sequence and schedule recommended by the Network, or, if you did not do so, that all the programs, as broadcast, nevertheless did not exceed commercial limits.

With regard to non-regularly scheduled children's programs, the attached document certifies that such programs distributed by the CBS Television Network were formatted to comply with the commercial limits. You should augment this network certificate with additional documentation certifying that in broadcasting these non-regularly scheduled network programs, your station did not exceed the station break time formatted for local affiliate commercials.


