ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

OVERVIEW

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM at the open of business day October 10, 2015. The report covers the period from July 1 through September 30, 2015. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainments. 1. Job Market

5P LOC NEWS 7/14/15 1:57

While tips are greatly appreciated by food servers, the possibility of getting paid sick leave in the future is just as valuable. Paid sick leave has sparked a heated debate in the State House. A statewide coalition is promoting paid sick leave—one hour earned for every 30 hours worked. Restaurant owners say this will drive up menu prices, while servers dream of what it would be like to have a luxury like paid sick leave.

5P LOC/NEWS 7/23/15 2:00

A press conference held to combat prevailing wage, ends in a shouting match between union members who support it and those who wish to end it. There are strong feelings on both sides. Those supporting prevailing wage say it could lead to unskilled workers, drive down wages and hurt Michigan's economy. Those against it say it's an artificially inflated wage in order to build a government entity or school.

Thirteen Saginaw City firefighters have had their jobs saved as the City of Saginaw announced receipt of a \$2 million grant which will hold jobs for two more years. The City Fire Chief says plans are in place for the day the city no longer has the grant to assist in wages.

General Motors announced today plans to spend nearly \$900 million on improvements to the Flint Metal Center, including a new body shop, located closer to the facility, which supplies sheet metal, and other parts used to produce their line of full-sized pick-up trucks. Officials at GM believe this project will be completed within two years, and that new job growth will evolve from today's announcement.

This was training week for all the staff at a new restaurant, opening in Flint next week. Owners chose to invest in Flint and bring about 200 jobs to the area. Food prepared this week was donated to the Northend Soup Kitchen, feeding more than a thousand people. The owner's goal is make his restaurant one that 'helps people that really need that help.'

Donald Trump visited Birch Run, Michigan, letting voters know how he hopes to improve their lives. He says bringing jobs back from China, and other countries will reduce crime, and decrease unemployment.

Governor Snyder declares this week one to celebrate Michigan's immigrant population. It is part of his plan to bring more entrepreneurs and skilled worker from other countries to the state. Saginaw Valley State University leaders say international students are already making the difference, with retailers noting revenues are up in the area.

The arrival of a new hockey team in Flint is bringing people in search of jobs. The arena where the team will play is being renovated, putting more people to work, along with those needed to work for the team itself.

Michigan needs workers in skilled trades. Today a trade school in Midland unveiled curriculum for students, including a state of the art welding lab. The four-year skilled trades program is designed for students looking for jobs or employees looking to advance their careers. Both the state's governor and President Obama have emphasized the need to develop a strong skilled trade labor force.

For Bay City retailers, the sound of fireworks means money in their tills, with many people traveling to watch the Bay City fireworks. Tourists say supporting the local businesses is all part of the experience that keeps them coming back year after year, citing the antique shops, convenient lodging and variety of restaurants available.

At the corner of Court St. and Michigan Avenue, crews re-create the Weinberg-Pankonin Drug Store sign. The store was in business for decades, before it closed a few years ago. Now on that same block, a skate shop has opened, along with a wellness center set to open soon. Other new businesses include a smoothie shop, a brewing company, a distillery, and a pizzeria. The owner of a shoe repair shop recently located in this area after years of doing business in Saginaw Township. He says he loves his new shop and its location.

6P LOC/NEWS 7/28/15 1:22

A local, popular apple farm is looking for a new owner, but the current one assures customers and workers, the farm may switch hands, but it's not going anywhere. They say they will only sell to the right buyer. The owner says it's time to move in a different direction, but values the business, which grew after it was passed on by her parents to her.

business man in Flint talks about the increase in his business during the Back to the Bricks festivities. For those retailers, it is an event about much more than just the cars, and they say it gets better every year.

Thousands of people fill the streets of Caseville to get fresh burger off the grill. It's all for the annual Cheeseburger in Caseville festival. Business owners say they are thrilled with the turnout for the week-long festival. People from all over the state enjoy the food, beach and summer time fun—and when it comes to cheeseburgers in Caseville—fans say you can never eat too many.

After an unprecedented 1,000-point decline at the open of the stock market this morning, the Dow closed with a loss of nearly 600 points. It was the worst decline for the Dow since August, 2011. A local investment firm owner says these types of "10 percent pull-backs" have happened 30 or more times, and generally take about 10 months to recover.

A Fenton couple opened a winery and brewery in 2007—a time when the recession was looming. Starting a small business isn't easy, but the two overcame obstacles, and now the business is booming. Along the way the couple sought assistance from the Small Business Development Center, which provided resources to any problems that surfaced.

Plans to move the Midland Farmer's Market to a new location were progressing, when in a surprise move today, the group behind the proposal suddenly withdrew its plans. Developers said the proposed market move would allow more vendors to sell and the parking situation would improve. Those against the move weren't happy with bridge modifications being proposed. The company said they will continue with other Midland development projects.

With the addition of a Flint hockey team, competition between the Saginaw Spirit and Flint Firebirds should provide a winning combination for Saginaw and Flint restaurants. A Saginaw city business says before every hockey game, her restaurant is packed with fans, before the puck drops. A 45-minute drive from Flint to Saginaw, could mean both cities benefit from the new rivalry.

3. Crime

530P LOC/NEWS 7/27/15 2:08

Neighbors reminisce how Atwater Street used to have more occupied homes, less blight, and no fear. Now the street consists of vacant lots and piles of smoldering rubble from arson fires. The Saginaw Fire Marshall inspects three recent fires to vacant homes, earmarked for demolition, as police look for the suspects who set them.

11P LOC/NEWS 7/30/15 1:20

Today the State's Supreme Court ruled mandatory guidelines are unconstitutional. Before this ruling, judges across the state handed down sentences using a series of variables to determine how much time the convicted will serve. Now those 'mandatory' guidelines are simply 'advisory' guidelines.

6P LOC/NEWS 7/31/15 1:38

The Saginaw Sheriff's Department investigate a robbery at a local hotel, where a man walked up to a clerk working the front desk, pulled out a knife and demanded money. As the suspect left, the clerk got a good look at the getaway vehicle. One day earlier another hotel had been robbed just across the street, and now authorities investigate to see if the crimes are connected.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/5/15 1:30

Thirteen abandoned homes were set on fire in thirteen days, with most of them located on Saginaw's east side, and nearly all of them set during daylight hours. Firefighters were able to prevent the fires from spreading to neighboring homes and no one was hurt in the arson spree. Police distribute sketches of two suspects, hoping for tips leading to their arrest.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/10/15 1:40

A family mourns after a one-year-old boy is killed along with a 71-year-old caregiver. Authorities continue to investigate the shooting which happened in a local Saginaw neighborhood around 2:30 a.m. today.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/12/15 1:30

Michigan State Police unveil 22 illegal weapons seized throughout the City of Flint in the past two weeks. So far this year 152 firearms have been taken off Flint streets. Troopers are assigned to the highest crime areas of the city to get violent weapons off the street.

11P LOC/NEWS 9/6/15 1:15

Saginaw Police discovered the bodies of a man and a woman inside a vehicle early this morning on Eaton Street. Neighbors were too scared to talk on camera, fearing for their own safety, but say violence like this is nothing new for the area.

5P LOC/NEWS 9/16/15 1:32

A rolling meth lab discovered yesterday when the vehicle was stopped by police for littering. The driver of the vehicle had an outstanding warrant which led to his arrest, and the passenger complained of illness, wherein the meth lab was discovered in the trunk of the car. Five people were hospitalized and nearby businesses evacuated. Traffic was detoured while a Hazmat team removed the drugs.

5P LOC/NEWS 9/24/15 1:30

A police manhunt unfolded earlier today just around 8:30 a.m. Police were searching for a suspect accused of pointing a gun at an officer last week. When they approached the man, he left the scene, hiding in the woods. He was eventually found by a Michigan State police canine officer hiding in brush in an area northwest of Birch Run. His charges include a 16-count felony warrant with multiple weapons offenses.

4. Politics

5P NAT/NEWS 7/14/15 1:30

President Obama says the deal to curb Iran's nuclear program will meet the national security interests of the United States and its allies. Iran agreed to reduce its stockpile of enriched uranium, cut the number of centrifuges by two-thirds, and allow inspectors to verify its compliance.

11P LOC/NEWS 7/14/15 1:34

Kid Rock continues to display the Confederate flag at concerts. General Motors sponsors Kid Rock concerts and the singer has even produced Chevy commercials. A local economist says General Motors will have to find a way to satisfy its diverse customer base, because if the corporate giant stays with Kid Rock, they are, in essence, alienating themselves from the black consumer.

Hillary Clinton defends herself after a Federal investigation asked the Justice Department to look into her personal e-mail account. The State Department Inspector General's office reports discovering hundreds of potentially classified e-mails within the collection. The Clinton campaign says she never sent any classified e-mails from her private system.

5P NAT/NEWS 8/6/15 1:13

The first Republican debate of the 2016 campaign is tonight in Cleveland. Ten of the 17 candidates take part, all trying to make an impression. Because the field is so crowded, the seven candidates tailing in the polls are having a debate of their own prior to the main event. This is the first of several Republican debates before primary voting begins in February, 2016.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/10/15 1:30

A state lawmaker breaks his silence tonight, after being accused of engineering a bizarre plot to cover up an affair with another lawmaker. In his statement today, the lawmaker apologized for his actions, including to the family of his married mistress.

530P NAT/NEWS 8/24/15 1:15

Vice President Joe Biden is back at the White House amid increasing debate over whether he is considering a presidential run. Biden added to the intrigue with a weekend meeting with Senator Elizabeth Warren believed to be a discussion about a possible candidacy. Hillary Clinton is the current Democratic front-runner, but she continues to be dogged by controversy over her personal e-mail server during her term as Secretary of State.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/25/15 1:50

Investigators found that a Lapeer County representative and fellow representative misused taxpayer resources. The findings were released in a very short, undetailed report. Watchdog groups say all information should be made available to the public. They also want a team, outside of the Capitol, to investigate the entire affair.

5P NAT/NEWS 9/7/15 1:15

The traditional Labor Day weekend is typically a big day for presidential candidates. President Obama appears relieved to be off the campaign trail. Bernie Sanders is in New Hampshire, having breakfast with AFL-CIO members. Hillary Clinton remains the front runner in Iowa, but her lead has been cut in half. Vice President Joe Biden hedges when asked if he's getting into the presidential race.

5P NAT/NEWS 9/14/15 1:16

Two candidates running for president have never held office, and are on top of the GOP polls. The Democratic candidates have avoided directly attacking one another, but will debate next month. A Republic debate is scheduled this Wednesday, in Simi Valley, California.

5P NAT/NEWS 9/16/15 1:17

The leading Republican candidates for president get ready for their second debate. Donald Trump insists he is superior to his rivals. Jeb Bush, former Florida governor has slipped in the polls to third. The remaining four candidates trailing in the polls will participate in an earlier debate.

5. Health

530P LOC/NEWS 7/21/15 1:32

A local hospital in Midland host a 3-day career camp to present to students that hospitals are not scary places, and that a career in the medical field can be challenging, yet rewarding. Students participating will be able to do many hands-on activities, and tour the building. The morgue was high on the list of departments of interest.

11P NAT/NEWS 7/21/15 1:24

The debate continues over which bathroom a member of the transgender community should be allowed to use. The Occupational Safety and Health Department has declared this issue a matter of health. OSHA released a guide requiring all employers, as it relates to bathroom use for transgender persons, to accommodate their employees, based on which gender that employees chooses. Another solution was to provide separate facilities, such as a gender neutral facility.

6P LOC/NEWS 7/24/15 1:30

TV5 has received calls from viewers, complaining about the taste and smell of the Saginaw drinking water. The Saginaw Water Treatment Plant superintendent says it can come from warmer weather and increased organic materials in the water. One of the reservoirs that supply Saginaw with water is the source of the problem, and that location has now been shut down, while the Plant takes steps to improve the water.

530P LOC/NEWS 7/27/15 1:25

Employers, caregivers and people with disabilities gathered at a summit held in Midland today. Purpose of this summit is to celebrate 50 years of the Americans with Disabilities Act, and discussing how they can keep moving forward. One disabled man, in a wheelchair, says understanding occurs simply from spending more time with people with disabilities.

530P LOC/NEWS 8/5/15 1:40

The Teddy Bear Ride involves over 200 motorcycles and drivers riding, raising money for teddy bears to give to children who are in Covenant Hospital with health issues. Their goal is to make sure there are always teddy bears for any child who needs one. The coordinator of the event says it also is a way to change stereotypes of bikers.

11P LOC/NEWS 8/6/15 1:30

A nine-year Burton police officer spends her days in and out of the hospital after a recent lupus diagnosis, with medical bills piling up. Her colleagues started a GoFundMe account, and plan a community fundraiser to help. The officer continues to remain upbeat, providing an example of courage to her co-workers.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/25/15 1:38

Federal school lunch guidelines' purpose is to make sure children get the nutrition they need. More fruits and vegetables have been incorporated into school lunch programs. Student favorites have been revised, using low fat substitutes, with presentation also considered to entice students to eat healthier.

11P LOC/NEWS 9/14/15 1:37

Flint water tested by an independent firm indicates high levels of lead in some consumer's water. The company did hundreds of spot checks throughout the city, with every zip code indicating a problem with lead. The City's director of public works says these concerns are being addressed

by Mayor Walling with a request to the Governor of Michigan asking for \$30 million to upgrade the city's struggling water system, with \$10 million used to remove lead pipes.

6P LOC/NEWS 9/24/15 1:30

The CEO of Mott Children's Health Center, joined other medical professionals today to express concerns about data which showed lead levels have more than doubled in some neighborhoods since the city started tapping into the Flint River for water. City officials plan to work with the health coalition and the medical community to insure that their water concerns are addressed.

11P LOC/NEWS 9/28/15 1:43

Many families have added drinking water expenses to their budget, wonder if their concerns about high levels of lead in city water are being addressed. The Flint city administrator says she's in contact with the Detroit Water and Sewage Department to possibly switch back to its system. The cost for this change is estimated at \$1.5 million per month, and the city wants the state to pay for it.

11P LOC/NEWS 9/29/15 1:34

The Governor's spokesman says action will come soon to help Flint with its current water concerns of high lead in the drinking water, but they had no concrete timetable. At the Friday night high school football game is a new addition on the player's bench, which is a water jug filled with bottled water for players to drink. The coach says he's not using the city's tap water.

6. Safety

11P LOC/NEWS 7/14/15 1:30

A child drowning is one of the leading ways children die in the United States, and the number one cause of death among autistic children. This makes teaching your autistic child about water safety so important. The YMCA in Saginaw was recently one of the scholarship award recipients that will receive funding to teach autistic children how to stay safe in the water. In the past month, two autistic children, one six and the other nine years old have died from drowning.

5P LOC/NEWS 7/24/15 1:39

A boy continues to recovery after being accidentally shot by his friend, with a shotgun found near their neighborhood. A local pastor reacts to the incident saying all inner cities have this problem of weapons or guns, hiding guns, and children being accessible to guns. He says more education of the community on the topic is needed.

5P LOC/NEWS 7/24/15 1:34

A deadly shooting at a movie theatre in Louisiana last night, brings concern to local movie goers. Tighter security locally was not apparent, but customers expressed a need for tighter gun control and more background checks as a way to reduce the potential of a similar scenario in Michigan.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/19/15 1:35

Local police are adding surveillance cameras in areas of Old Town, in an effort to increase safety and deter crime. Many business owners are happy to see the city providing the extra vigilance. The Saginaw Police Chief says when cameras were installed in neighborhoods, they definitely reduced crime in those areas.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/21/15 1:30

The City of Flint Police and the University of Michigan-Flint campus police unite to provide security for the huge Back to the Bricks festival happening in downtown Flint this weekend. Over 50,000 people are expected to attend, and police plan to make themselves very visible to provide a safer environment for participants and attendees of the event.

530P LOC/NEWS 8/25/15 1:27

A new enforcement initiative is announced today, covering a 5-mile stretch of M-46 in Saginaw and Thomas Township. The area is considered dangerous to drivers with 4 deaths occurring in the last few months. Combined forces of the Thomas Township, Saginaw Township, Michigan State Police and the Saginaw County Sheriff's Department hope the increased patrol will decrease accidents on this stretch of road.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/26/15 1:21

An early morning news reporter and photographer are killed today, while performing a routine live shot. A disgruntled former employer fatally shot them, and severely injured the person they were interviewing. TV5 management says it re-enforces the need to maintain strict security standards at the station and while doing live shots.

5P LOC/NEWS 9/2/15 1:17

A man is hit and killed by a car in Davison Township last night. Authorities say the driver stopped right away and is fully cooperating with police. They also say the victim was not wearing any reflective clothing.

11P LOC/NEWS 9/9/15 1:30

Last week a family changed the battery in one of their smoke detectors near the back of the home. This week, that action and smoke detector are credited for sounding the warning which allowed the family to vacate the house with no injuries. The family had two four-year-old grandchildren and a wheel chair-bound son which were ushered to safety.

5P LOC/NEWS 9/10/15 1:31

Another accident occurs on M-46, within the 5-mile stretch of road receiving increased police presence. The Saginaw Sheriff says he still feels the initiative is working, decreasing the amount and severity of accidents in the area. No one was seriously hurt in today's accident.

5P LOC/NEWS 9/14/15 1:16

Bay City's neighborhood watch group was formed by people unhappy with the crime occurring in their neighborhoods. The group now has almost 4,000 members, whose goal is to use social media to help residents re-claim their neighborhoods, asking its members to be another set of eyes for law enforcement. Bay City Police are happy for the support, saying these groups bring the community together and assist police in fighting crime.

7. Weather

6P LOC/NEWS 7/14/15 :27

Heavy rains soak mid-Michigan, along with powerful winds overnight. A barn housing a number of cattle in Isabella County was destroyed, but the livestock appear to be all right.

11P LOC/NEWS 7/18/15 1:37

A Mt. Morris coach teaches a football clinic during hot summer days. He says keeping players hydrated with water and other fluids is important, along with taking off the heavy equipment and lowering the intensity of the practices. He says practice is cancelled if the temperatures reach 90 degrees, to prevent heat-related injuries.

5P LOC/NEWS 7/28/15 1:30

The question is: if you help someone escape from a hot car by breaking the window, or by harming the vehicle, can you get into legal trouble. The Midland County prosecutor says first to contact the authorities, and if possible, let them address the situation. She says acting in good faith to rescue some will likely not lead to criminal charges, but she says that does not mean you won't face a civil lawsuit.

5P LOC/NEWS 8/4/15 1:24

Two days ago an EF-1 tornado ripped through Owendale in Huron County. A historic church was in the direct path of the twister, causing considerable damage to it, along with a trailer thrown on top of a building and wires and trees down.

530P LOC/NEWS 8/20/15 1:12

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources sent a team of 17 firefighters to help out in multiple states, including Washington. Three U.S. Forest Service firefighters were killed near the town of Twisp, when they crashed their vehicle and shifting winds turned flames toward them. More than 1,300 residents from several communities were forced to evacuate with evacuations also occurring in the town of Conconully and Chelan in western Washington state.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/25/15 1:30

The residents of Owendale still cleaning up after an EF-1 tornado came through their town in early August. One man had to put his wife in a nursing home, because seeing the damage to their home was too devastating for her. He lives in a trailer home now while he waits for the insurance company to determine whether or not they will pay his claim.

The California governor has declared a state of emergency for Middletown, which burned after wind-driven flames destroyed up to 1,000 buildings, including hundreds of homes. The fire forced at least 13,000 residents from their homes, with 1,200 firefighters battling the inferno.

:39

A Millington saddlery was destroyed in severe storms almost three months ago, including a barn, workshop and farm machinery. The owner is rebuilding his home with his own money, because the insurance company has not yet paid him for damages.

2:02

Armed civilians patrol the Flint Township recruitment station in response to the deadly shooting of recruiters in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Some states have called for the National Guard to do what local citizens have decided to do on their own in Flint Township. They stand at the building, rifles at the ready, supporting the military in the wake of the Chattanooga tragedy.

1:30

A local veteran has been waiting months for his retirement and workers compensation to take effect. The army refuses his traumatic service benefits. They say he had a pre-existing condition, and also he was injured by a U.S. soldier and not an enemy. The family is in limbo as they wait for financial relief.

7/27/15

1:30

Soldiers from multiple states and countries converge at Camp Grayling in Michigan, to train and learn from military experts. It's called Operation Northern Strike. More than 3,000 soldiers, airmen, and marines participate. Their goal is to foster grater cohesion between ground and air forces, using live fire. The exercises continue until July 31.

Today Amir Hekmati spent his 32nd birthday behind bars in an Iranian prison. He has been in jail four years now, unjustly accused of spying. A local Bay City man painted 'Free Amir' on his business, hoping people would learn about Hekmati's plight and demand his release.

6P LOC/NEWS 8/6/15 1:35

An 11-year-old boy has raised more than \$2,500, soliciting donations through his church and local businesses. The money is given to a Saginaw County food pantry, who say they are one of the only kitchens in the country that provide to service members and veterans exclusively.

11P LOC/NEWS 8/6/14 1:30

A local veteran, permanently disabled while serving in Afghanistan cannot get his traumatic service benefits from the U.S. Army. An area congressman gets involved and the Veterans Administration reinstated the family's health insurance and paid his retirement compensation. However, the army refuses his traumatic service benefits. They say he had a pre-existing condition, and also he was injured by a U.S. soldier and not an enemy. 

Police did not believe Bethany killed herself. After the Medical Examiner ruled it a suicide, Micah Moore, another member of "The Community", told police that he had killed Bethany, and was subsequently charged with murder. The case was upended when he recanted his confession. Investigators were unable to substantiate his confession and just weeks before the trial was to begin, charges were dropped against Micah. Questions remained. Was Micah manipulated? Did Tyler have something to do with it? Tyler is ready to admit he played a role in her death, but to what end? One of his guns matched the cartridge found at the scene and he was arrested for murder. Mintz's daughters emerged as powerful advocates for their mother, and prosecutors, after consulting with them, offered a plea deal to McGraw: second-degree murder with a sentence of 16-20 years. He accepted, but at the last moment changed his mind about pleading guilty. Three years after the murder the trial began. McGraw was found guilty of first-degree murder. The other passenger, Josh Askin, is not on the video. Attorneys for Rusty Kofman and Zach Rozenberg have declined to comment. Greg Rozenberg's attorney says his client just made stupid comments. While initially cooperating, Askin's attorney has now told him to take the Fifth Amendment in all questioning. All four men say they had nothing to do with Smith's death but the men are still on the FBI's radar in this cold case. Mike Jones believes that Josh Askin knows what happened. She was interrogated for nine hours, never asked for a lawyer, and eventually confessed to dropping the child in a way that may have led to a head injury. She was convicted of murder, largely on the fact that she had confessed and that the Medical Examiner's report said that the child suffered from fresh injuries to his head. Her family persuaded a newly-elected coroner, Dr. Thomas Rudd, to reexamine the evidence. His findings revealed an older head injury -- a significant discovery. Eventually, state pathologist Dr. Eupil Choi, admitted to missing the old injury in his report. With this information, attorney Kathleen Zellner, who specializes in cases pertaining to false confessions, says that Melissa Calusinski did not receive a fair trial. Advocates say that, under extreme conditions, 60% of people confess to crimes they did not commit. The police say they played by the rules. Two courts have allowed the conviction to stand. Attorney Zellner believes the medical evidence needs to be re-examined, but the State Attorney will not pass it on. Family and friends vow not to give up. Update for the 07/18/15 rebroadcast: after a phone call suggesting x-ray images from the autopsy existed that contradicted testimony, Melissa's lawyer petitioned to void her conviction. The cause of death was changed from homicide to undetermined. In September, the trial judge will decide whether to hold a new hearing that could be a first step to a new trial. They did, but Tracey did not agree and decided to take her chances of not being convicted of murder. The verdict: guilty. At sentencing, her lawyer argued that she was a battered woman, hoping to receive a lighter sentence. The judge gave her twenty-five years, neither the minimum, nor the maximum sentence. 48 HOURS: "Paradise Lost" - an updated report on the investigation into the 2010 shooting death of Wall Street millionaire John Bender, who was killed in his exotic home in Costa Rica. His wife, Ann, is charged with the crime, but she claims innocence. After making a \$100 million fortune on Wall Street, Bender and his wife bought land in Costa Rica where they built a nature preserve, along with an elaborate, four-story hilltop home with no walls or windows as the centerpiece. The couple seemed to have everything; but both suffered from severe depression, became isolated, and were not entirely welcomed by the locals. They lived in fear after an abduction attempt and a break-in, and were forced to arm themselves and hire a security team. On January 8, 2010, John Bender died from a bullet wound to the back of the head. Was it murder, suicide or accident? Prosecutors say it was murder. Ann Bender says her husband was trying to kill himself and had been suicidal for some time. Other issues in the investigation include: allegations that the trustee of the Bender's \$100 Million fortune siphoned money from the trust, and the Bender gem collection, which to the Costa Rican authorities, looked like it could have could be a smuggling operation. Nineteen months after the shooting, Ann Bender was charged with murder. At trial, Ann was found not guilty of murder; but in Costa Rica, there is no double jeopardy rule and Ann was brought up on the same charges again and this time was found guilty. 48 HOURS brought in the world-famous independent forensic team of Richard and Selma Eikelenboom, who, after examining all the evidence, say there were problems with the conclusion drawn by the prosecution. Today, Ann Bender is in prison continuing to fight for her innocence. Original On screen text graphic: The Bender gems, worth an estimated \$20 million, were confiscated by the Costa Rican authorities. 07/25/15 EPILOGUE: Last February, nine months after Ann Bender was convicted, an appeals court overturned that decision. 48 HOURS: "The Secret Life Of Paige Birgfeld" (10:00 - 11:00p) - An updated rebroadcast of the report on the June 28, 2007 disappearance of Paige Birgfeld, twice-divorced mother of three and a resident of Grand Junction, Colorado and the subsequent double-life uncovered by investigators following her disappearance. Following her divorce, Paige became the primary caregiver to her children and was described as such a devoted mother that the Mesa County Sheriff's Department was convinced she would never have left on her own accord. As friends and family searched for her; her car was found abandoned and on fire in an empty lot. Her first husband, Ron Beigler became the focus of the investigation, when it was learned that the two had been on a date the day of her disappearance, but Paige's friends and family were far more suspicious of the children's father, Rob Dixon, as she had a troubled history with him. After a thorough inquiry, both men had solid alibis. As the investigation continued, it was discovered that Paige was also known as Carrie, a high-priced escort. Investigators then began to believe Paige was murdered by one of her clients. Using her cell phone records, police began carefully looking at all of her clients and eventually honed in on one man, Lester Ralph Jones, an ex-con who had served time for kidnapping and assault. Authorities searched his home, but will not discuss what evidence they uncovered. Search dogs led investigators from Paige's car to an RV shop where Jones worked as a mechanic. Although authorities have zeroed in on Lester Ralph Jones, no charges have been filed and he denies any involvement. The lack of a body, coupled with Paige's secret life, have made it that much harder to prove anything beyond a reasonable doubt. Her friends and family continue their search. On-screen text graphic: Paige Birgfeld's parents sought custody of her children, but the courts ruled they would remain with their father, Rob Dixon. The investigation is continuing into the disappearance of Paige Birgfeld. 09/05/15 UPDATE: In 2007, five years after Paige went missing there was a break in the case: a hiker came across human remains which police eventually identified as Paige. Although the evidence is still circumstantial, Chief Deputy DA Dan Rubenstein, who is now heading the investigation, believes he has enough to make a case against Lester Ralph Jones. In 2014, Lester Ralph Jones was arrested and charged with her murder and kidnapping. Now, prosecutors must prove he killed her. Marriott accepted an invitation from McDonough to hang out with her and her boyfriend and watch a movie - and she never returned home. Mazzaglia used McDonough to bring other women into their relationship for his pleasure -- and that, for him, involved ropes and bondage gear, a fantasy brought into the mainstream by the book series and current motion picture, "Fifty Shades of Grey". Police investigation led to Mazzaglia and McDonough. During interrogation, Mazzaglia said Marriott died accidentally during a BDSM encounter. McDonough told police Marriott was never there, but later, in a plea deal, changed her story. She said Mazzaglia killed Marriott when, after playing strip poker, she twice turned down his requests to initiate sex. After Marriott's death, they disposed of her body in the ocean. At Mazzaglia's 2014 trial, McDonough's testimony was critical. Ultimately, Mazzaglia was found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced to life without parole. Included is evidence that links the alleged killer to other cases in Virginia involving unsolved attacks against young women; and a report on the life of Jesse Matthew, the man who is allegedly the last person to see Graham alive. This hour concentrates on Graham's disappearance, the national attention the case garnered, the social media aspects of the case and the subsequent connections between the disappearances and deaths of Morgan Harrington, Trina Murphy and an attempted rape of another young woman. Graham's mysterious disappearance spread far beyond the Charlottesville, Virginia area in the days following her disappearance, reminding people of the death five years earlier of Morgan Harrington, a Virginia Tech student in 2009. Her case became one of the first to use social media as a crime-fighting tool. After her body was found, clothing was recovered which contained unknown DNA which was eventually linked to the 2005 assault of another woman in Fairfax, Virginia. Still there were no answers. In 2013, when 17-year-old Alexis Murphy disappeared, Morgan Harrington's parents reached out to the family. Alexis Murphy's body was never found, but DNA evidence linked Randy Taylor to the crime; he was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. Now, the families have joined together to help the Graham family through their ordeal and the search for Hannah. Ultimately, police think they have a suspect: Jesse Leroy Matthew, Jr.. (No on-screen text graphic.) 48 HOURS: "Hannah Graham: Stalked by Evil" (10:00-11:00p) - the second hour of an investigation, told in back-to-back episodes ("Hannah Graham: Deadly Connections", 9:00-10:00p), detailing the 2014 death of University of Virginia college student Hannah Graham, and the evidence that linked the alleged killer to other cases in Virginia involving unsolved attacks against young women (Morgan Harrington, Alexis Murphy, and an unidentified rape victim). This hour concentrates on Jesse Matthew, the man who was allegedly the last person to see Graham alive. Other crimes in Virginia, in which he became a suspect, are also detailed. Matthew fled from police and was located in Galveston, Texas. He does not cooperate. Thirty-five days after Graham's disappearance, her body was found. The site is close to where Morgan Harrington's body was found, near Matthew's childhood home. The challenge now is to build a case against Jesse Matthew. Meanwhile, a detective believes Matthew could be the suspect in an unsolved rape case in Fairfax, Virginia. A DNA test is taken; it is a match and that DNA is also a match to unknown DNA from the Morgan Harrington case. Matthew is indicted and will stand trial for attempted capital murder and sexual assault in the rape case. Prosecutors are still building the Graham case. Questions are also raised to a connection in the Alexis Murphy case; no link has been found. In early 2015, the rape trial begins. The victim (identified only as R.G.) returns from Asia to testify. As the defense portion of the trial is about to begin, Matthew takes an Alford plea (a kind of guilty plea where the defendant admits guilt, but does not admit to committing the crime). Then, Matthew is handed an indictment for first degree murder in the Morgan Harrington case. The Graham trial is scheduled to begin next summer. No date has been set for the Harrington trial. On-screen text graphic: Jesse Matthew will be sentenced in the Fairfax rape case on October 2, 2015. Matthew's trial for the murder of Hannah Graham is scheduled for July 5, 2016. If alive today, Hannah Graham and Alexis Murphy would be 19 years old. Morgan Harrington would be 26.
