### ISSUES AND PROGRAMS REPORT

### **OVERVIEW**

The following is the quarterly "Issues and Programs" Report placed in the public file of WNEM at the open of business day January 10, 2014. The report covers the period from October 1 through December 31, 2013. The report is based on ten significant problems and needs determined by WNEM's community ascertainments. Below each problem/need is a brief description of some news segments broadcast during the quarter designed to call attention to, or address, the problem or need.

### 1. Job Market

5P NAT/NEWS 10/1/13 1:21

Thousands of people are out of work, national parks are shut down and NASA is also closed, due to lawmakers battling over the budget. The president notes the irony of the government being "shut down" on the first day of open enrollment for Obamacare.

5P LOC/NEWS 10/7/13 1:27

The newly renamed First Merit Bank is now laying off more than 100 workers from its headquarters in downtown Flint. Local businesses express concern over the loss of business and also the plight of loyal customers no longer working in the area.

530P LOC/NEWS 10/18/13 1:06

Store policies are coming into question after a Wal-mart employee says he was fired for trying to help a woman. An employee, on break, witnessed a woman being assaulted in the Wal-mart parking lot, and went to her aid. Wal-mart says getting involved violated company policy.

6P LOC/NEWS 10/21/13 1:20

Governor Rick Snyder took a trip to Owosso today, to a company announcing the hiring of dozens of new employees. The jobs are permanent, full time positions funded by a \$31 million contract with the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority. The governor notes this activity as an example of job growth in Michigan.

Consumers Energy breaks ground on their latest energy park, just outside of Akron in Tuscola County. When completed, the Cross Winds Park will have 62 wind turbines at a cost of \$250 million. A Consumers Vice President says the park will need over 200 trades people, office people and support staff to maintain the park.

Three days after Burton city residents approved a 16.5 millage increase, three full-time police officers are sworn in to duty. The three men were given conditional offers last month, should the millage pass, allowing for their quick induction into service.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/13/13 :41

The American Cast Iron Company announced expansion plans today in Flint. The Alabama-based company will provide pipe for the Karegnondi Water Authority project from Flint to Lake Huron. The company expects to hire 50 to 60 employees at first, but as their business grows, so will the number of people they employ.

5P LOC/NEWS 12/16/13 1:16

General Motors announced it will invest \$1.3 billion into five factories across the Midwest. Approximately \$600 million has been earmarked towards a new paint shop at the Flint Truck Assembly Plant in Flint. This investment means job security and new jobs for the work force, and has a ripple effect in the community.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/17/13 1:36

TRW Automotive, a manufacturer of brakes in Saginaw announced nearly 600 employees will lose their jobs effective mid-February. The plant announced they will close because they lost a big contract with General Motors, and could not find new business elsewhere.

5P LOC/NEWS 12/27/13 1:33

Benefits for the unemployed are set to expire tomorrow, because Congress did not include funding for them in the budget deal passed last month. Almost 1.3 million unemployed loose their benefits, with another 1.9 million Americans losing theirs in mid-2014.

### 2. Economy/Business

530P LOC/NEWS 10/9/13 1:28

Orchards across the state of Michigan enjoy a bumper crop this fall, except for one problem, which is finding enough people to pick this year's apple crop. Farmers say the immigration debate, and crackdown on illegal workers in the country has slowed the traffic of migrant laborers to the state. Hence, in some locations, orchards are having trouble finding people to bring in this year's crop.

6P LOC/NEWS 10/15/13 1:16

The Salvation Army visited both Chesaning and Hemlock to make sure people in rural areas of the county had a chance to apply for programs that provide Christmas dinner, as well as toys and coats for kids. Anyone who did not sign up today, can still do so by visiting the Salvation Army office in Saginaw before November 1.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/22/13 1:20

The State Senate passed bills today that would restrict where users can and cannot use electronic benefit cards. The Senate's plan is to ban the use of bridge cards at ATM's in liquor stores, horse racing tracks, and strip clubs. The bill will cost the state at least \$120,000 per year.

There are only 10 homes left for sale in the first phase of the Smith Village. The project began in 1998 and has been marred by delay. Now the H.U.D. and city joint-funded project seems to be on track. Phase II homes currently under construction are available for reservation.

Michael Lawrence was arraigned on more than 30 charges for his role in the drive-by- shooting death of the 6-year-old girl, and the murder of his former girlfriend.

1:43

In his first briefing since taking over as Flint's new emergency manager, Darnell Earley introduced the city's new Police Chief. Mr. Earley stressed public safety as a top priority, and the new police chief said he hoped to increase communication between his department and the community. He feels this will play a big party in solving crimes.

6P LOC/NEWS 10/24/13 1:12

An inmate attacks a nurse inside a local jail. The prisoner pretended he was sick and deputies were alerted of the possible problem. They sent in a nurse. She determined he was not sick, and when she turned to leave, he grabbed her by the lanyard around her neck and pulled her backwards. The inmate was quickly restrained, with the attack happening just after recent cutbacks eliminated a corrections officer from the overcrowded Saginaw County Jail.

A local mother counts how long it has been since her daughter, who was pregnant at the time, was murdered and the crime has gone unsolved. Saginaw Crimestoppers approached TV5 to air some of the high profile cold cases, including the death of Kia Frierson.

6P LOC/NEWS 11/21/13 1:38

A 33-year-old man was discovered dead from gunshot wounds, behind an abandoned Saginaw building last night. Friends say the deceased was planning on proposing to his girlfriend this week. Neighbors say he was a good guy, talking often of his children and girlfriend.

5P LOC/NEWS 11/27/13 1:54

A 2-year-old boy is dead and his 23-year-old mother has been charged with the boy's murder, including criminal sexual conduct. Police say the toddler had bruises all over his body, and the abuse appeared to be ongoing. Police say the boy's twin brother died of natural causes a few months ago.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/2/13 1:15

Neighbors hear and see gunfire in the middle of the day in a Saginaw neighborhood. Police confirm two males were taken to area hospitals with gunshot wounds. Residents express concern over violence in their neighborhood.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/6/13 1:10

Police investigate an assault and attempted robbery which occurred in the popular tourist town of Frankenmuth. They say a man walked into the Szeuchaun House restaurant, less than block from the police station, and attempted to rob the business, but did not go through with the robbery.

6P LOC/NEWS 12/10/13 1:16

Jury selection began today for one of Michigan's most wanted ex-fugitives, Michael Lawrence. Lawrence is accused in the drive-by shooting of a 6-year-old girl, and Lawrence's former girlfriend. Today jury selection proceeded for the 6-year-old girl's death.

#### 4. Politics

5P NAT/NEWS 10/1/13 1:21

Thousands of people are out of work, national parks are shut down and NASA is also closed, due to lawmakers battling over the budget. The president notes the irony of the government being "shut down" on the first day of open enrollment for Obamacare.

530P LOC/NEWS 10/10/13 1:00

Former Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick has been convicted on two dozen crimes, including racketeering, bribery and extortion. Today he was sentenced to 28 years in prison. His sentence was a victory for prosecutors, who had recommended Kilpatrick serve at least 28 years in prison, while the defense wanted no more than 15 years.

5P NAT/NEWS 10/10/13 1:15

GOP leaders are taking a proposal to the White House that includes extending the government's ability to borrow money until November 22, in exchange for broader budget negotiations. The White House is open to the idea. Democrats have concerns about another short-term fix. Republicans say granting a debt limit expansion could lead to negotiations to re-open the government.

5P LOC/NEWS 10/15/13 1:16

With little more than 24 hours before the U.S. loses its ability to borrow money, the credit rating agency, Fitch, says it has put the U.S. bond rating under review until the end of March. The Senate's top Democrats and Republicans have resumed talks to re-open the government.

5P LOC/NEWS 11/5/13 :50

Today is election day and Saginaw residents choose from 19 candidates, narrowing the field to four council members. Flint residents vote for six of nine wards for city council. A special election is being held for a house seat in the 49<sup>th</sup> district. Genesee county residents pick one of three candidates.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/18/13 1:10

Tonight the Bay City Commission swore in two newly elected commissioners. Residents came to the meeting to voice concern over plans to build a new low income housing unit along the Saginaw River. They feel it is prime waterfront real estate and could be put to better use.

5P NAT/NEWS 11/21/13 1:10

A Florida congressman apologizes to his family and constituents after being busted with cocaine and faces a misdemeanor charge. He says he is seeking help for his addiction. Some supporters feel betrayed. The congressman says he will donate his salary to charity during his absence.

5P LOC/NEWS 12/2/13 1:34

Flint's First Ward residents react to the news that their newly elected city councilman, Eric Mays, was arrested. He was taken into custody for alleged drunk driving and possession of marijuana. Many in the First Ward are waiting to hear the outcome of this incident before they pass any kind of judgment.

WAKEUP NAT/NEWS 12/7/13 2:18

A pilgrimage of song and dance is being made by South Africans and others to the Nelson Mandela home in Johannesburg. Nelson Mandela passed away after struggling with illness for the past six months. Nelson Mandela unified a country divided by history with his lasting message of forgiveness and reconciliation. The country and the world mourn his loss.

5P NAT/NEWS 12/16/13 1:13

A U.S. District Judge says the "National Security Agency's phone surveillance program is likely unconstitutional," and has a lawsuit challenging the NSA's mass collection of phone records can proceed. The White House is also now examining an outside review of NSA activities. The report includes 40 recommendations to help the agency maintain public trust and reduce the risk of unauthorized disclosure of classified material.

### 5. Health

11P LOC/NEWS 10/2/13 1:27

Hundreds of cancer survivors and those battling the disease tonight participated in the Covenant Cancer Care Center's survivor event. The event is a place where survivors receive support, and realize they are not alone in the battle against cancer. They can also receive health information and do a little shopping or be pampered with manicures and massages.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/8/13 1:47

Three years of frustration and persistence is paying off for residents along Shaffer Road in Edenville Township. Board members have finally voted to pave the road in question. Residents say the gravel contains dust which is blamed for causing lung problems in recent years for some neighbors. Sixteen hours after the vote took place, work began upgrading the road.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/11/13 1:45

A six-year-old boy has a long battle against cancer ahead of him, but he was most concerned about losing his hair. Tonight at a Mt. Pleasant barber shop, the line stretched out the door, as close to 50 men came in to shave their heads. The boy was afraid to go to school with no hair, so that is when others stepped in to show their support. Some of the boy's best friends from school were part of those at the barber shop today.

5P LOC/NEWS 10/22/13 1:45

According to experts, flu season begins in October and lasts until the end of May. During these months people are at the highest risk of developing the virus. Health officials say people are

more likely to get the flu this year than last and recommend everyone 6 months and older receive a flu vaccine.

11P NAT/NEWS 11/7/13 1:13

Certain products containing trans-fats may soon be banned from being sold at grocery stores across the country. The government has determined trans-fats, which increase shelf life of food, may not be safe for your health. Products containing trans-fats are microwave popcorn, margarine, frozen pizza and desserts. The Food and Drug Administration took the first step today, by proposing totally eliminating trans-fat from all food.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/13/13 1:47

A clinic that gives out free prescription drugs for people who can't afford them is closing. The clinic helps dozens of people each week, and has no problem finding the money to pay for the medicine it distributes. The clinic says their issues are less qualified volunteers to distribute the medicine properly, and the money to run day-to-day operations isn't there.

5P NAT/NEWS 11/14/13 1:12

The White House is giving insurance companies the option to keep offering plans that would have otherwise cancelled, through 2014. Providers will also have to make clear what the plans do not include, and let consumers know what other new options are available in the Federal Exchanges. The Speaker of the House will introduce legislation allowing consumers to keep their current insurance plans permanently, not just for one year.

6P LOC/NEWS 12/2/13` 1:30

A bill working its way through Lansing legislatures will allow smokers to light up at outdoor bars and restaurants. For the last few years, smokers have been banned from lighting up inside pubs and restaurants. One pub owners says the ban has actually helped his business, saying he gets more families as customers now, bringing their children with them.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/11/13 :52

Today an official announcement made at McLaren Bay Region which should mean better treatment for those fighting cancer. The hospital has joined forces with a cancer institute and will be building a new oncology and cancer research center they hope to have open and operational by next fall.

530P NAT/NEWS 12/23/13 1:40

Tuesday is the last day to sign up on healthcare.gov for health coverage to begin January 1. This applies if you live in one of the 36 states using the federal government's enrollment website. Another deadline ahead is consumers have until March 31 to sign up for health insurance, otherwise, they will be fined for being uninsured.

### 6. Safety

5P LOC/NEWS 10/2/13 1:33

A Michigan man says the reason he is alive today is because he wears a helmet while riding his motorcycle.. The man walked away from an accident with some large scrapes only, confirming the need for helmet use. The state allows motorcyclists to decide for themselves whether to wear a helmet or not.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/2/13 2:00

During a football game between Beecher and Lake Fenton, a Beecher player received what was perceived as a neck injury. The Beecher trainer examined the player and determined he needed to go to the hospital, wherein 9-1-1 was called. The ambulance took 45 minutes to arrive at the scene. Further questioning indicates the call was sent out as a Tier Two call which does not allow the ambulance crew to use excessive speed.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/30/13 1:50

The Midland Police Department has a newly formed Traffic Services Team whose focus is to apprehend those who text and drive. Our reporter went along for the ride, and soon the officer spotted a driver displaying the signs of someone texting while behind the wheel. If you're stopped in Midland, and issued a violation, it's a \$240 fine.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/18/13 1:30

In Michigan, a Jackson County man was killed in a storm last night which caused a tree to crush his car. A Shiawassee County man was electrocuted after getting tangled in downed power lines caused by the same storm. Local residents are shocked to hear of his death and say he will be missed.

6P LOC/NEWS 11/21/13 1:42

Live power lines were exposed in an open field for three days following stormy weather throughout mid-Michigan. Neighbors wonder why it took that long for the utility company to disconnect the wires. There was concern that the area had hunting blinds near the wires which posed a possible danger. DTE said they had over 1,500 downed power lines this week, and were forced to prioritize.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/28/13 1:28

A local man's dog falls into the frozen waters of the lake bordering the man's property. The man attempted to rescue the dog using his paddle boat, but ended up falling through the ice too. Both man and dog waited to be rescued by a dive team, fire rescue crew and medical staff. The man said he was more worried about his dog being rescued than himself.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/3/13 1:52

A Saginaw family stays at a hotel tonight after a fire forced them out of their home this morning. A smoke alarm is credited for alerting the family and getting them out safely. The Fire Marshall gave suggestions on how to stay safe and keep warm, when using portable heaters and Christmas lights.

6P LOC/NEWS 12/12/13 1:18

A resident who lives near the Goodrich dam speaks out over concerns that the structure is deteriorating faster than initially thought. TV5 reported last month that sink holes were developing near the dam in the Village of Goodrich. Since our report the State Department has discovered other issues with the dam. The resident said the new developments were not brought up at the December monthly village council meeting.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/26/13 1:05

Grand Blanc police discovered an 84-year-old man unresponsive inside his garage. The man had been using a generator inside his garage, after losing power from the ice storm. The man's wife had been in the house and she is fine.

#### 7. Weather

530P NAT/NEWS 10/4/13 1:10

The first named storm of the season, Karen, is predicted to hit this weekend along the Gulf Coast. Forecasters predict 'Karen' could bring as many as 10 inches of rain to some areas. Some emergency officials express concern they could face problems getting help to stricken areas because of the partial government shutdown. The Governors of Louisiana, Mississippi and Florida have all declared states of emergency in advance of the storm.

11P NAT/NEWS 10/12/13 :24

Tropical Cyclone Phailin brought high winds, tidal surges and enough energy to re-arrange the landscape to parts of India's east coast today. Emergency crews spent days bracing for the storm. Officials say several people are dead. Winds from the cyclone were recorded at 140 miles per hour with heavy rainfall.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/17/13 :33

Today Consumers Energy unveiled its new mobile storm units. They will be taken to the hardest hit areas after a storm. They are 53-foot semi-trailers full of equipment essential to speed repairs. The units will be kept in Cadillac, Grand Rapids and Jackson until they are deployed.

11P NAT/NEWS 11/12/13 1:30

Days after a powerful typhoon struck the country, the Philippines were hit with a 4.9 magnitude earthquake. The storm nearly wiped out the city of Tacloban. Thousands are homeless, survivors are desperate for food and drinkable water. U.S. Marines have landed with much needed supplies.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/18/13 1:00

In Genesee County, strong winds blew out a window from the front of a Family Dollar and an entire wall from the back of the store. Gusts last night reached between 50 and 70 mph causing one family's home to lose every tree on their property. The people who live there are grateful no one was hurt.

6P NAT/NEWS 11/19/13 1:07

The death toll in the Philippines continues to rise in the wake of the super typhoon. The Red Cross believes more than 1,200 people are now confirmed dead. Typhoon Haiyan reduced entire towns in the Philippines to rubble, carried 150 mph winds and created a storm surge 40 feet high into village streets. Clean up and rescue efforts are difficult because there is no power or phones in most places.

530P LOC/NEWS 12/10/13 1:35

A local tow truck company advises how to prepare your vehicle for the coming winter weather. Roofing crews who work in the weather all day long also follow safety precautions to keep themselves safe and healthy while working. Gear includes ropes and harnesses, shoveling snow off the roof, tarp and making it walkable and safe.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/23/13 1:45

Thousands of people across mid-Michigan won't be home for the holidays. A winter storm coated trees and power lines with ice, knocking out power. Many folks are settling into hotels which are quickly becoming filled. Consumers Energy is bringing in more than 1,000 workers from other states to help get the lights back on in mid-Michigan.

11P LOC/NEWS 12/24/13 1:59

A severe ice storm and widespread power outages may have frozen holiday plans for some mid-Michigan residents, but others found a way to continue with Christmas preparations. A Genesee County church had no power, but parishioners were able to gather extension cords, generators and space heaters to be used in the church, as they refused to cancel Christmas Eve services. Another parish held services in the Clio High School gymnasium.

5P LOC/NEWS 12/27/13 1:49

A Consumers Energy spokesperson expresses concern that a predicted warming trend could bring a different problem. The ice storm has left tree branches coated in ice and they have dropped below the utility lines. Warm weather would cause the branches come right back through the wires again. He assures workers will continue to persevere until all customers have their electricity restored.

#### 8. Veterans/Middle East War

530P LOC/NEWS 10/3/13 1:20

Some state lawmakers are pushing legislation that would require local governments to make sure the flags on veterans' graves say "made in America." The challenge of this law is the flags need to be competitively priced with non U.S. made products. The bill that passed in the State Senate says if a community chooses a less expensive non U.S. flag, it must post that on its website.

11P LOC/NEWS 10/11/13 1:47

Fenton High School is in its fourth year raising funds on and around the field. The year the school enlisted country star and former Marine Josh Gracin to help. This was an idea that started after one of the school's alumni was injured while on active duty. The Fenton football coach wanted the players to know it wasn't about just wearing camouflage jerseys.

6P LOC/NEWS 10/30/13 1:28

Workers at a local credit union sent a trailer full of donations, and a check, to the organization behind "Operation Care Package." All of the credit union branches had drop boxes, so both members and employees could contribute to the cause. The folks at Operation Care Package say the letters they get from the troops really re-enforces what they are trying to do—bringing a little piece of home to the troops in the Middle East.

5P LOC/NEWS 11/4/13 1:40

The Yellow Ribbon Guard is back in operation, seeking donations to send care packages to more than a thousand soldiers spending the holidays away from home. The Guard reiterates that with troops away from their families, holidays are especially hard when you're alone without those small amenities which make life bearable. They say the troops are grateful for the cookies, jerky and games, but it's the personal touches they love the most—such as Christmas letters, snowflakes the children make and the pictures drawn.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/7/13 1:17

A 13-year-old girl is on a mission to purchase 7,500 wreaths for a wreath-laying ceremony at the Great Lakes National Cemetery on December 14. She's approaching the final stretch of a project she started back in June—"Operation Thank You." The Patriot Guard say because of all her efforts, they are making her the youngest member of the Patriot Guard.

11P LOC/NEWS 11/11/13 1:00

After 19 months at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center, local vet Travis Mills is packing his bags, heading to Maine. While Mills was born in Vassar, Michigan, his wife is from Maine, and that is where they plan to put down roots. After being hit by an I.E.D. Mills lost both arms and legs and has had to relearn how to live with four new limbs.

A \$12 donation makes you the person to send the package—not the organization.

What he was, according to police, was a killer on the run. His arrest in the kidnapping case blew the lid off a 30-year con. All the other identities he had used came to light including the alias he was living under in 1982 in San Marino, California: Christopher Chichester, the 13th Baronet of Chichester. San Marino police believe he murdered John and Linda Sohus, who disappeared in 1985. Years later, the bones of John Sohus were found in the backvard of the house where they lived. At the time, Christopher Chichester lived in the guest house on the property. He went on trial for the murder of John Sohus and was found guilty. Police immediately suspected Dan DeWild, but there was no murder weapon, no fingerprints, no blood. His identical twin, David DeWild quickly married his girlfriend, Roseanne. Heather's body was found one month later, bound and buried on a canyon road. Police came to the realization that Dan DeWild and his identical twin brother David were most likely responsible for her murder, but the case grew cold due to lack of evidence. In 2009, Russ Boatright was assigned full-time to the circumstantial case. Investigation led to a sex tape, and Dan's fascination with bondage and rope. Heather was found bound in a similar manner. In 2011, Dan DeWild, David DeWild and his wife Roseanne were arrested and charged with murder. David DeWild broke down and admitted that his brother Dan had killed Heather and that he had participated in the crime. Prosecutors then learned that the brothers had been watching television crime dramas and forensic shows. They believed that Heather had gone to the house to retrieve the sex tape and then was killed. David DeWild took investigators to the crime scene and re-enacted what happened. David had to pass a polygraph test in order to secure a plea deal. Roseanne's charges were dropped due to lack of evidence. Dan DeWild's trial hinged almost entirely on his brother's testimony and with the lack of physical evidence, prosecutors hoped it was enough. In the end, it wasn't. Jurors deadlocked on the first degree murder charge, but agreed on the lesser charges. Plans were started for a retrial, but a month after the conviction, Dan DeWild pled guilty to second degree murder in a plea deal. Redding was found dead in her Santa Monica, California home. According to authorities, the killer hoped to erase any evidence of the crime; the killer tried to blow up the entire crime scene by leaving the gas on and a candle burning. This did not happen, and there was plenty of DNA evidence remaining at the scene. A sometime boyfriend, John Gilmore, who had a history of violent behavior had an alibi and was cleared. Further investigation led to the discovery that Redding had recently broken up with her wealthy boyfriend, Dr. Munir Uwayda after learning he had a wife and children in Lebanon. Investigators also learned of a lucrative business deal offered to Redding's pharmacist father. Less than a week after the deal fell apart, Redding was dead. Inside the home, police found evidence of a struggle and DNA evidence that led to a woman: Kelly Soo Park. Park was in the employ of Dr. Uwayda. She was arrested and within days Uwayda had vanished. Five years later, the trial commenced. While authorities thought the case was an easy win, the defense, with the help of jury consultant Lee Meihls, presented a bold argument of DNA transference. Only three people were in the home at the time: Lanny Horowitz, his ex-wife Donna Horowitz, whom he had divorced twice, but had reconciled with, and his son, Radley, who also resided there. Both had strained relationships with Lanny. The investigation led investigators to the knowledge that theirs was a deeply troubled family. Both Radley, a former gun dealer, who also served a stint in prison, and his mother Donna, who was bothered by her ex-husband's close relationship with female business partner Francine Tice, were considered suspects. Eventually, Donna was arrested and charged with first-degree murder. At the trial, the defense ultimately blamed her son, Radley. The jury made a quick decision: Donna was guilty. 48 HOURS: "Highway of Tears" - A report on the more than twenty girls and women, who since 1969, have disappeared or been killed along the stretch of pavement in rural British Columbia, Canada, known as Highway 16. To locals, the road is now known simply as "The Highway of Tears". Maddy Scott may be one of the roadway's many victims. On May 28, 2012, the 21-year-old went to a party with 50 others at Hogsback Lake, not far from the highway, only to never be seen again. Just six months earlier, in the same town, 15-year-old Loren Leslie's body was found on a logging road not far from Highway 16. Leslie was brutally beaten and molested. There are signs all along Highway 16 warning women not to hitchhike because a killer might be on the loose, but the murders have not ceased. Police arrested 20-year-old Cody Legebokoff in Leslie's murder. A patrolman pulled him over, thinking he was poaching game. He had Leslie's ID in his truck. Her body was just down the road. Legebokoff has since been identified as the alleged killer of three others, though police have not revealed how they've connected him to the murders that occurred in 2009 and 2010. Still, because of his age, police know Legebokoff couldn't be responsible for all of the murders along Highway 16. Just two months ago, officials at the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) got a break in some cases because they linked DNA samples from one of the highway's victims, Colleen MacMillen, found murdered in 1974, to Bobby Jack Fowler. Police also believe Fowler, a Texas native who worked as a roofer in Prince George, may have killed as many as twenty people in the United States and Canada. Although brutally wounded, Busby was able to write a note for police at the scene that said "Not an accident. Mel Reine." Melvin Reine, a convicted arsonist and suspected murderer of three people, was a local thug whose brother, John Reine, had been arrested by John Busby. For undetermined reasons, Melvin Reine had long intimidated the Falmouth police, and the attempted murder of John Busby was not aggressively investigated. Fearing for their safety, the Busby family moved to an undisclosed location in Tennessee. Twenty-four years after the shooting, in 2003, John Reine confessed to the police that his brother Melvin had indeed shot John Busby while he, Melvin, drove the car. However, because of the statute of limitations, the Reines will remain unpunished. Melvin is now institutionalized, in a state of dementia. Hill did not show up for work one day in September 2010, and her co-workers grew concerned when she did not answer texts or phone calls. Police were summoned after Hill's boss drove to her home and found her car still in the driveway. She was found by police, at the bottom of the basement steps, barely breathing and covered in blood. Believing she was dying, Prairie Village Police Officer Bill Baldwin tried to coax out of her who was behind the vicious attack. Doctors were not sure that she would survive; she was beaten and her throat slashed open. They spent hours treating her. Police found out that Marti was a workaholic, and if she was not working, she was at home. Her ex-husband was ruled out as a suspect. Hill's mother alerted police towards Brian Pennington, a construction worker whom both she and Marti had hired to do work. Police questioned him and became suspicious, but needed to hear Marti's side of the story. They soon learned she was recovering and able to talk to police. She confirmed to police that Brian Pennington had attacked her; he was arrested for attempted first-degree murder. Frustrating to police was the fact that Pennington apparently had absolutely no motive. However, they found that he had a record of over sixty contacts with law enforcement officers, including several domestic violence incidents involving women. During the preliminary hearing, Pennington eventually agreed to a plea deal; the only issue would be how long he would be held in the Kansas State prison system. It took months, but finally a twenty-eight-and-a-half year prison sentence was agreed upon. To this day, no one knows why Pennington attacked Marti Hill. 
