CAPITOL UPDATE – Sundays at 10:30am

Capitol Update is a weekly half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial, and Executive branches – in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as "Budget Watch" and "Bill Track" – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action. *Please note that the 2023 Legislative Session will begin on March 7 and runs through May 5*.

- **4/2 #202320** Topics this week include: The Governor signed into law an affordable housing package and the bill making state-funded private school vouchers available to all students. The full Senate approved the bill allowing Floridians to carry concealed firearms without a permit, sending it to the House. House and Senate Appropriations Committees approved their respective budgets.
- **4/9 #202325** Topics this week include: New bills on elections reform and insurance reform dropped this week. The full House and Senate approved their respective budgets. The Governor signed the bill allowing Floridians to carry a concealed weapon without a permit.
- **4/16 #202330** Topics this week include: The Governor signed the bill banning abortion after 6 week, only a few hours after the House passed it. Bills opposed by the LGBTQ community advanced through House and Senate committees, despite marches and protests against them. Senate President Kathleen Passidomo celebrated the Governor's signature on one of her top priorities the bill expanding Florida's Trail Network.
- 4/23 #202335 Topics this week include: The Senate President and House Speaker said budget conference is about get underway. Election reform bills are now ready to go before the full House and Senate. Governor Ron DeSantis signed the bill that does away with the requirement that juries must be unanimous on imposing the death penalty.
- 4/30 #202340 Topics this week include: The Legislature passed a hate crimes bill that the Governor signed into law on a trip to Israel. An election reform bill was approved by Legislature, amended to make it clear that the Governor can stay in office if and when he runs for President. Disney sued the Governor and other state officials, claiming they're waging a campaign of retaliation against the company for disagreeing on gender education policy.

- 5/7 #202345 Topics this week include: The 2023 Legislative session adjourned "sine die" after passing a \$117 billion budget. The Governor joined the Senate President and House Speaker to celebrate achieving almost all of the Legislative agenda he asked for. On the day session ended, the Governor signed one of the bills aimed at Disney, designed to nullify contracts the Reedy Creek special district board signed before they were replaced.
- 5/14 #2610 Topics this week include: The Governor signing five education bills including the use of cellphones in classrooms. The Nestle permit case involving environmentalists fighting the companies use of a north Florida spring. The Florida Wildlife Commission's discussion over how to fight invasive species in Florida.
- **5/21 #2611** Topics this week include: The Governor signing several bills aimed at human trafficking and human trafficking victims. A discussion from a panel on Florida's healthcare workforce shortage. The Governor making national headlines after signing legislation the defunds diversity, equity and inclusion programs at the state colleges and universities.
- **5/28 #2612** Topics this week include: The Governor signed a \$1.3 billion tax relief package. Several lawsuits were filed against the elections reform bill also signed this week. The Governor and Cabinet approved conservation easements for more than 39,000 acres in the Florida Wildlife Corridor.
- 6/4 #2613 Topics this week include: The Governor signed new laws, including a bill that eliminates Enterprise Florida and bills aimed at catching drivers who speed in school zones and zip around school buses loading kids. The Florida Highway Patrol explained why the 100 days between Memorial Day and Labor Day are the most dangerous for teen drivers. Supporters of a constitutional amendment that would legalize recreational marijuana in Florida gathered enough signatures to make the 2024 ballot, if the Supreme Court approves.
- **6/11 #2614** Topics this week include: Affordable housing funds started flowing from the 2023 "Live Local Act." The Office of Insurance Regulation quizzed Citizens Property Insurance executives about a 13.3% average rate hike request. Visit Florida announced that tourism is now exceeding pre-pandemic levels.
- 6/18 #2615 Topics this week include: The Governor signed the \$116.5 billion state budget, vetoing almost \$511 million in local projects and state programs. The Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission activated a response plan after Chronic Wasting Disease lethal to deer -- was detected in Florida for the first time. The Historic Capitol Museum opened an exhibit featuring unique, rarely seen objects from state government history, including a tire tread dress and a samurai helmet.

6/25 - #2616 Topics this week include: The Governor signed more bills into law including one that creates a sickle cell disease registry and another that expands eligibility for KidCare. The University System Board of Governors named Florida International University #1 in the state, based on graduation rates, student retention, costs and more. Visitors are welcome once again to visit the House Chamber in person and get a tour of the murals representing Florida history and culture.

5/4 & 5/7 - #3544 Take a Hike: Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail

In our continuing series, we look at four unique places considered "Off the Beaten Path." Ormond Memorial Art Museum & Gardens is a museum dedicated to veterans with a permanent collection from Malcolm Fraser, a veteran himself. Orlando Wetlands Park offers a plethora of hiking trails and an expansive boardwalk that gives you an up-close wildlife viewing experience. Bradford-Ma Barker House is a preserved home where notorious gangsters Ma and Fred Barker hid from the authorities. Lubee Bat Conservancy, situated in North Gainesville, focuses on the research and conservation of bats, particularly Megabats.

5/18 & 5/21 - #3546 The Grove: Digging Up History

Designated a National Historic Landmark in 1976, The Grove's mission is to preserve the surrounding acreage and engage the public in a dialogue about civil rights and American history. People connected with this site have figured prominently in the moments that shaped Florida history. Senior archaeologist Brandon Ackermann takes an audience through the history of The Grove and discusses ground-penetrating radar testing on the site and findings from his research.

5/25 & 5/28 - #3547 Sunshine State Suds

Fans of craft beer are willing to travel far and wide to try new brews. Increasingly, they're coming to Florida, where the number of breweries has increased from less than ten a few years ago to a few hundred today.
