| Verify: Flu | 1/2/18 at 5:00pm 1:54 | We are now in the middle of flu season. And it "does come with lots of widely-held beliefs, on how to protect yourself from the flu. So what's fact and what's fiction? Bill McGinty is here to verify what we "think" we know about the flu. |
| Flu Season Setup & Local Flu Update | 1/8/18 at 5:00pm | <p>Its flu season, and it's hitting especially hard this year. Emergency rooms around the country are overwhelmed with cases. Adults and children are missing work and school. And doctors are encouraging "anyone" who has not gotten a flu shot, to get one while they can. This is the time of year when flu cases go on the rise. But experts say they're seeing twice as many cases compared to last year. This is a look at the National Flu Activity map from the U-S Centers for Disease Control. 46-states are reporting "widespread" cases of the flu. The only states "not" showing widespread cases: Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey and Hawaii. Doctors say one strain appears to be dominating flu cases, a subtype of "influenza-A" called H-three-N-Two. And they say this strain is notoriously hard on children and the elderly.</p> <p>Here in Michigan there are also more cases of the flu than in previous years... and health departments say we haven't even peaked yet. In Kent County... health officials say flu cases are up significantly over percent over last year. In Ottawa County it's the same story with an increase in hospitalizations. 95% of the cases are the influenza Type A virus. The flu is always more severe in years where the Type A flu is circulating the most... that's because the flu vaccine is less effective against the Type A virus. This year's flu vaccine is about 60% effective. And it's not too late to get it. Having some protection from the flu is better than no protection.</p> |
| FFL 3D Mammograms | 1/12/18 at 5:00pm | It's 13 Friends For Life Day... and time to remind your friend for life to know her normal and that includes everything from doing a self-breast exam... knowing what's normal for their body... and scheduling a yearly mammogram. The 3-D mammogram has become a new tool to help women with dense breast tissue. There's a study being conducted on 3-D mammograms to help determine if they are the better choice for women. Joining me now to talk more about them is Dr. Tammy Kreuzer, medical director of Spectrum Health's Betty Ford Breast Care Services. One of the main advantages of the 3-D mammogram is being able to find more cancers that are life threatening. What some |

As flu season winds down, we set out to verify: Is flu season over? Sneezing, stuffiness and sniffles. "We saw a lot of influenza A because the vaccine really didn't work as well as we were hoping it would work." Dr. McGee agrees, this flu season was rough. "Fortunately Michigan is following the trend of the rest of the country and we're seeing a lot less influenza than we had previously." The latest Kent County Health Department influenza report says: "Influenza indicators for the week ending March 24 show evidence that local activity continues to decrease and is lower than what is typically seen during this time of year." So does that mean flu season is over? "Flu season is not over, it's just that it's less than it was a couple weeks ago." Kristen Nordlund with the CDC says the same. "Based on what we've seen from previous seasons, the second wave of activity, typically influenza B is not very long or very intense." But it's not time to let your guard down. "It's a misconception the influenza B isn't as severe or can be as bad as A. Based on CDC research, both flu viruses can cause severe illness, influenza B especially in young children." And if you already had it once this year..."Doesn't mean you're not going to get it again." So after speaking with these experts we can verify, flu season is not over yet. "We still probably have a few more weeks of flu season left to go." |
