Ramiro Gonzales is scheduled to be executed on July 13 for fatally shooting 18-year-old Bridget Townsend in 2001.
				The Department of Justice is investigating alleged civil rights violations under Operation Lone Star, a multibillion-dollar border initiative announced last year by Gov. Greg Abbott, according to state records. Operation Lone Star was launched to combat human and drug smuggling.
				The city of McAllen is looking into setting regulations on pop- up markets. According to commissioner's workshop slide show presentation, markets are in violation of an ordinance prohibiting outdoor sales. Now, the city is proposing limiting 4 markets per year per address on top of a \$100 permit fee. It may be considered at next week's meeting.
				Local health officials say the number of positive COVID-19 cases is up and we may see a spike in cases over the next few days. Hidalgo County is reporting an average of 350 COVID-19 cases daily. Cameron County reported nearly one thousand cases this week. Health officials say with the July 4th gatherings, we can expect to see a spike in cases.
				Boris Johnson's future as UK prime minister is in greater jeopardy than ever before. Several top level people in his administration have quit. There are calls for him to resign but so far Johnson remains defiant and says he has no intention of resigning.
				Russia's aggression against Ukraine is high on the agenda as U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken meets with other foreign ministers from the Group of 20 largest economies, or G-20, this week
				Bumble Bee is recalling cans of smoked clams that have been found to contain so-called "forever chemicals." If you have cans of smoked clams, look into how to identify if it is part of the recall.
				NASA said that contact has been restored with its \$32.7 million spacecraft headed to the moon to test out a lopsided lunar orbit. Contact was lost after one successful communication and a second partial one on Monday, after the spacecraft left Earth's orbit on its way to the moon, the space agency said.

Cox Automotive estimates U.S. car sales were only 1.2 million units, 7.5% lower than in June 2021.  Consumers may soon enjoy new protections when they shop for a new or used car. The Federal Trade Commission has proposed a new rule that would eliminate some sales tactics that have annoyed car buyers for decades, such as bait and switch advertising and add-on fees at the end of the transaction.

The finding of three specimens at an apartment complex pond in Brownsville that connects to a nearby resaca confirms an earlier 2013 sighting of a female redclaw crayfish.  The main entrances to all 54 Brownsville Independent School District campuses will be locked during school hours and will require admission from school staff when the school year begins tomorrow. All classroom doors also will remain locked during the school day, with door viewers to assist in seeing people who are knocking at the door to be provided. All doors leading to outside the campus must be locked.  The McAllen Independent School District will be providing free meals to all students for the 2022-2023 school year. The Community Eligibility Program helps ensure that all students receive nutritious meals, without requiring parents to complete a lunch application. Classes start in the McAllen ISD next Monday.  A new survey conducted by the Pew Research Center discovered that almost half of U.S. teens say they are on the internet or using it "almost constantly." The survey looked to examine the technology habits of the younger generations of Americans, and it found that since 2015, the online presence of teens has skyrocketed. As for what teens use online, it tends to be video-based, with TikTok and YouTube leading in popularity.  A delegation of U.S. lawmakers arrived in Taiwan on Sunday, just 12 days after a visit by U.S. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi that prompted China to launch days of threatening military
			drills around the self-governing island that Beijing says must come under its control.  A man drove his car into a barricade near the U.S. Capitol early Sunday and then began firing gunshots in the air before fatally shooting himself, according to police, who said he did not seem to be targeting any member of Congress.  Tesla has made over three million cars according to a tweet from CEO Elon Musk. The tweet was also congratulating China's Shanghai factory that has made one million cars.  Johnson & Johnson stopped selling their talc-based baby powder in the United States and Canada in 2020, and now they say they will end their global sales of the product in 2023.

The agency has filed notice with the Postal Regulatory Commission regarding a temporary price adjustment for the 2022 peak holiday season. The increase would apply to mail sent after October second.  According to Triple-A, the average price of gasoline has fallen below \$4 a gallon – something that may give motorists a psychological boost. It's the first time the average price has been below four dollars since early March, when gas prices surged after Russia's invasion of Ukraine.  Rents are rising faster than home prices in many parts of the country. The cost of renting an apartment in New York City hit a record high in June, as the median asking price hit \$3,500, according to data collected by New York real estate site StreetEasy.

It is believed it was an electrical fire. 5000 worshippers had gathered for Mass at the Coptic Abu Sifin church in Giza. Lord we pray for your comfort on the families who are now grieving the loss of a loved one.  Suspected Muslim terrorists in northern Nigeria killed an 86-year-old Christian in his home on Aug. 2 and kidnapped two others who were later released, likely after ransom payments, sources said. The daughter of the pastor who was killed said the gunmen ordered their door be opened, and when the five relatives in the home refused, the terrorists forced their way in. Lord we pray for an end to these assaults on Christians in Nigeria.

Turner started his job the same year that Christina Sadberry started bringing her then-4-year-old son, Bryson, to the hospital for treatments. Turner's wife, Maria, bought him a 23andMe DNA kit for Christmas in 2021 so he could learn more about his lineage, and they were surprised to find he matched with a sibling: Christina Sadberry. When rain waters that seemed heavier than usual began to fall in eastern Kentucky roughly two weeks ago, Pastor Brad Stevens of the Church of God Worship Center in Clay County, KY, said he wasn't afraid. As the pastor became aware of how the rain had taken its toll on the masses, he immediately felt deep within his heart a call from God to take action — to be

				the "hands and feet of Jesus" — by devoting his time to helping his community. Stevens took to social media, holding multiple live videos from his Facebook page to show his followers the devastation caused by the flooding. He informed viewers that he needed donated funds to further aid in disaster relief work. Stevens said he then began receiving donations from "generous" donors across the nation, allowing him to provide aid to over 300 Kentucky residents directly impacted by the flooding. He delivered food and water to those in need while helping rebuild infrastructure and bridges.

Gonzalez's annual evaluation Monday and is expected to revisit that topic a third time next week. Discussion on the evaluation has so far largely occurred in executive session, behind closed doors.
				A collaboration between the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley and South Texas Independent School District will provide dual credits to high school students planning to attend UTRGV. Under this partnership, students at South Texas ISD will be able to take college courses through UTRGV while they are still in high school. The dual enrollment program will be available for students for the 2023-2024 school year.
				The City of Kingsville Health Department reported a mosquito tested positive for the West Nile virus last week. Because of this the city is spraying mosquitoes in the area where the tainted mosquito was found.
				Responding to a number of videos that have trended on social media, the Food and Drug Administration warned Americans, specifically young people, not to use over-the-counter drugs as ingredients when cooking. Several clips have gone viral recently claiming that posters have treated cold symptoms with so-called "sleepy chicken" – that is, chicken that has been marinated in NyQuil prior to cooking – and urging others to try it.
				American Airlines says personal information of a "very small number" of customers and employees was compromised after hackers breached some employee email accounts. The airline spokesman says there is no indication that the attackers have misused any of the personal information.
				Canada will likely drop the vaccine requirement for people who enter Canada by the end of September. It is not immediately known whether the U.S. will make a similar move by Sept. 30.
				The Food and Drug Administration acknowledged Tuesday that its response to the U.S. infant formula shortage was slowed by delays in processing a whistleblower complaint and test samples from the nation's largest formula factory.
				President Biden said that the pandemic was over during an interview last Saturday, but COVID-19 remains a leading cause of death in the U.S. An average of 500 Americans die daily from the virus and experts predict that the disease will remain a leading cause of death indefinitely

The region has been the scene of a bloody conflict between anglophone separatists and the country's government for several years. A lump on his collarbone was found and that was when doctors gave him 6 to 12 months to live. The little boy underwent surgerychemotherapyand radiotherapy.  Then, eight months after the diagnosis, the family learned that he had made a miraculous recovery—and just two days before Christmas Albie got to ring the bell at Bristol Children's Hospital to declare he was cancer-free.  Now the family treasures every day together and urges other parents to follow their instincts when they know something is wrong. The AnGeL Ministries founder and author was a featured speaker during the Family Research Council's Pray Vote Stand Summit held at First Baptist Atlanta. She believes the nation is in "crisis." Sharing the message of Isaiah 6, Lotz stated that the most appropriate response in

such situations is to follow the prophet's example by looking up to God and asking what He wants.
The Museum of the Bible has opened what curators say is one of the first exhibits to its scale illuminating the history of the Samaritan people group, which features an ancient stone inscription loaned by Israel President Isaac Herzog.
