The border policy also creates a pathway to bring as many as 24,000 "qualified" Venezuelans into the country. Shoppers in the Valley are now able to purchase hearing aids over the counter without a prescription. Over the counter hearing aids are not available for Children under the age of 18. Doctors who specialize in hearing problems say they should be used only on people with mild hearing loss. The doctors stress they are not a replacement for seeing a hearing specialist if you are having hearing problems. Valley Congressman Vicente Gonzalez introduced a bill that, if passed, would allow military working dogs to be buried in national and certain state veteran cemeteries. The Sgt. Fieldy Act is named after a military dog who served three tours in Afghanistan and now lives with his handler, U.S. Marine Corps Corporal Nicolas Caceres. If the bill passes, Corporal Caceres would be able to bury Sgt. Fieldy at the Rio Grande State Veteran Cemetery in Mission. The city of Harlingen has installed 50 cameras in strategic locations in their war on illegal dumping in the city. Those who are caught doing illegal dumping will face a hefty fine. Conspiracy theorist Alex Jones has been ordered to pay \$965m in damages after falsely claiming the 2012 Sandy Hook school shooting was a hoax. The families of eight victims, and an FBI agent who responded to the attack, had sought at least \$550m in the defamation trial in Connecticut.
				The United Nations General Assembly has voted overwhelmingly to condemn Russia's attempts to annex four regions of Ukraine. The resolution was supported by 143 countries, while 35 states - including China and India - abstained.
				A federal judge in St. Louis is weighing the fate of the Biden administration's plan to forgive student loan debt for tens of millions of Americans following a court hearing on Wednesday. No word on when he will rule but if he rules against it an appeal will be immediately file.
				The State Department reopened a temporary online portal for Americans to renew their passports – but the slots are likely to fill up quickly for the applicants who qualify.
