According to the Texas Comptroller's Office, there is no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase and you also don't need to give an exemption certificate to claim the exemption.</p> <p>52-year old Melissa Lucio is set to be executed Wednesday for the death of her 2-year-old daughter Mariah in Harlingen. Her defense team and others say that new evidence indicates the execution should be cancelled and she should get a new trial. Nearly half of the jurors who sentenced her to die have called for her upcoming execution to be halted and for her to get a new trial.</p> <p>The search for a Texas Army National Guard soldier assigned to Operation Lone Star continued over the weekend. The soldier, Bishop Evans, went missing after he jumped into the Rio Grande near Eagle Pass, in an attempt to save two migrants.</p> <p>Early voting for the May 7 city and school elections begins today. There are several races on the ballots from cities and schools across the Rio Grande Valley. Some state constitutional amendments are also on the ballot. Early voting runs from through Tuesday, May 3.</p> <p>The U.S. secretaries of state and defense met Sunday night with Ukrainian President Zelensky in the highest-level visit to the war-torn country's capital by an American delegation since the start of Russia's invasion. Zelensky said he was looking for the Americans to produce results, both in arms and security guarantees.</p> <p>Pfizer is voluntarily recalling certain lots of another blood pressure medication after finding elevated levels of a potentially cancer-causing chemical. Accupril blood pressure tablets are being recalled.</p> <p>Twitter is reportedly warming up to the idea of Elon Musk taking over the company after the billionaire said last week he had secured the necessary \$43 billion in funding.</p> <p>New Mexico's Governor has signed emergency declarations as 20 wildfires continued to burn in nearly half of the state's drought-stricken 33 counties. Dozens of evacuation orders remain in place.</p>

But a sobering new survey suggests that applicants should think long and hard about how they will pay for their education. Sixty-three percent of borrowers say they regret going into debt.</p> <p>If you think grocery prices have gone up it's not your imagination. Nestle says it has increased prices in North</p>

					America by eight and a half percent in the first three months of the year. The company said it is stepping up prices “in a responsible manner” and that there are more price hikes to come. United Airlines CEO Scott Kirby says it is “very unlikely” that the Biden administration’s mask mandate for airlines will return. The Biden administration is appealing a judge’s ruling that overturned an extension of the mandate, which – for the time being – is not being enforced.

Bartholomew, who has previously called for an end to war in Ukraine, said that he hoped this year's Easter would be "the impetus to open humanitarian corridors, safe passages to truly safe areas for the thousands of people surrounded in Mariupol." Lord we pray for a safe exodus for civilians and we pray for an end to the war. Yesterday marked two months of war in Ukraine, and Easter for Orthodox Christians, the vast majority of the country’s population. Services this year in battle-worn areas were often sparse amid growing numbers of deaths, injuries and families fleeing their homes. Lord we pray Ukranian families including refugees were able to observe Easter.

That’s what’s happening all over Kansas City--and now, in cities across the U.S.--as a sprawling tree-planting effort bears fruit. In 2013, Giving Grove, a Kansas City nonprofit, started cleaning up dump sites, empty lots, and other underutilized spaces, and planting orchards and gardens in them. The groves have flourished and made an impact on several levels. Besides replacing polluted and underused urban space, they provide food to the surrounding community, whose members care for the orchards themselves. In the nine years since Giving Grove sprouted, it has spread to ten other cities and planted some 330 orchards, many of them cultivated by youths who live in "food deserts."

The number of stops at the border is a 5.8-percent increase from March.

				<p>The Texas Department of Insurance is notifying millions of people that they may have been affected by a data breach. An audit found a security issue in a software application the Texas Department of Insurance used to track workers' comp information. Personal information of people who filed workers comp claims between March of 2019 and January of this year could have been affected.</p> <p>Texas Secretary of State John Scott encouraged all registered Texas voters to vote early in the upcoming May 24th Primary Runoff Elections. The Early Voting period for the Primary Runoff Elections began yesterday and ends Friday, May 20th.</p> <p>The city of Brownsville is scheduled to get 30 new bus shelters. Construction is scheduled to begin in November and is expected to be completed in either June or July 2023. The city has a couple of hundred bus stops but not all have shelters. The shelters are welcome to bus riders who need to be out of the weather while waiting for a bus.</p> <p>Baby formula maker Abbott said it has reached an agreement with U.S. health regulators to restart production at its largest domestic factory, though it will be well over a month before any new products ship from the site to help alleviate the national shortage facing parents.</p> <p>Ukraine has confirmed that hundreds of its fighters trapped for more than two months in Mariupol's steelworks have been evacuated. The wounded soldiers were taken to towns held by Russian-backed rebels. Russia had agreed to let the wounded soldiers be evacuated.</p> <p>US officials have announced plans to ease tough sanctions imposed on Cuba by former President Donald Trump. Under new measures approved by the Biden administration, restrictions on family remittances and travel to the island will be eased.</p> <p>Nasa's Perseverance rover has reached a big moment in its mission on Mars. Today it will climb a hill, stopping every so often to examine rocks that look to have the best chance of retaining evidence of past life on the planet.</p>

The Senior Citizens League, an advocacy group for older Americans is forecasting an 8-point-six percent increase in Social Security Benefits for 2023.</p> <p>Consumers who are driving older Mercedes-Benz GL, ML, and R-Class vehicles are being told to park them until an important safety issue can be resolved. The Do Not Drive recall is for more than 292-thousand model-year 2006 to 2012 cars because of a problem that could cause the brakes to fail,</p> <p>If you need a copy of a previous tax return from the IRS, you may be out of luck. According to a recently released report from the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration, the U.S. income tax agency destroyed data belonging to an estimated 30 million filers in March 2021.</p>

Ukraine's military said the Russian forces were pulling back from the northeastern city of Kharkiv and focusing on guarding supply routes while launching mortar, artillery and airstrikes in the eastern province of Donetsk in order to "deplete Ukrainian forces and destroy fortifications." Lord we pray for an end to this invasion of Ukraine.</p> <p>In China, Police raided the home of a youth leader associated with the heavily persecuted Early Rain Covenant Church while he was hosting a gathering for youth just days ago and detained him for interrogations, according to a report. He was released about 4 hours later but this is just another in a series of harassment by the Chinese government toward Christians. Lord we pray protection for Christians in China and an end to the persecution.</p>

Officer Barron Dixon was actually off-the-clock and heading home after a shift when the call for help came in. He jumped into action without hesitation and was the first on the scene.</p> <p>Yakema Harris said her son had started vomiting after they arrived home from daycare and then stopped breathing. She called 911 and Dixon was the first to arrive. He immediately began CPR and was able to resuscitate the child. "His eyes just opened. And once his eyes opened, the gravity of it all just hit," Dixon said, describing it as "a rush of emotion."</p> <p>The boy was taken to a local hospital and was doing well, police said. Yakema Harris believes Dixon is her son's guardian angel. "I think he is an angel sent here from God," Harris told reporters. "His presence was very needed at that time."</p>

"The shortage [is what's behind the wait], that's what they're telling us from the synod," Nancy Rupe, a Montana church's office administrator, who now runs the daily operations of the church with more than 260 active members, told The Christian Post. When asked what she thinks was the reason behind the pastor shortage, Rupe said she believes people are no longer as attracted to ministry as they were in the past and the COVID-19 pandemic was a big shock to the profession.</p> <p>Football analyst and Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow urged graduates of Trine University to make a positive difference in others' lives and not to get caught up in worldly pursuits, telling them that money and fame won't bring true satisfaction. Some of the most famous people in the world, he said, aren't happy. Tebow encouraged the graduates to 1) live by their convictions, not their emotions, 2) obtain the right perspective, and 3) be ready to make a difference.</p>

				<p>state saw 75,083 megawatts of demand at 5:20 p.m. Sunday, which is the highest ever. There have been sporadic power outages across the state.</p> <p>Former Mission City Councilmember Norie Gonzalez Garza is now the new mayor, the first woman in the city's history, having defeated Mayor Armando O'Caña in Saturday's runoff election.</p> <p>The National Republican Congressional Committee is injecting nearly \$3 million into fall television advertisements targeting Democrats in the Rio Grande Valley's congressional districts. The NRCC said it will spend the money on TV advertisements in favor of Republicans running for U.S. House of Representatives Districts 15, 28 and 34.</p> <p>After months of being categorized as an area of "low-risk" for COVID-19 transmission, Hidalgo County once again has a designation as high risk of COVID-19 transmission. Cameron and Starr counties also went from a low level area of COVID transmission to a "medium" level of transmission last week.</p> <p>A bi-partisan group of US senators say they have agreed to a framework for potential legislation on gun control. The measures would include support for tougher background checks for buyers under the age of 21 and cracking down on illegal gun purchases. President Biden supports it but says it falls short of what he wants.</p> <p>The Biden administration is lifting its requirement that international travelers test negative for COVID-19 within a day before boarding a flight to the United States.</p> <p>Kremlin-installed officials in occupied southern Ukraine celebrated Russia Day on Sunday and began issuing Russian passports to residents in one city who requested them, as Moscow sought to solidify its rule over captured parts of the country.</p> <p>Food prices have been on the rise in the past few months. And rice, a staple food in much of Asia, could be next, industry watchers said. The prices of many foods, ranging from wheat and other grains to meat and oils, have shot up.</p>

The Federal Trade Commission warns consumers about an increase in scammers who claim they work for Medicare. Some scams try to trick seniors into providing their Medicare number and other sensitive personal information.</p> <p>The Wall Street Journal reports a whistleblower claims Abbott Laboratories was told about problems at its infant formula plant a full 12 months before the FDA ordered the plant to close in February because of possible contamination. The shutdown has caused a nationwide infant formula shortage.</p> <p>Target has issued a recall for 120-thousand Cat & Jack Unicorn Cozy Pajama Sets because they fail to meet federal flammability standards for children's sleepwear. The products could pose a risk of burn injuries to children in some situations. No incidents or injuries have been reported.</p>

Cluster munitions are controversial because they detonate in the air and release a cluster of smaller bombs which fall indiscriminately over a wide area, potentially putting civilians at risk. Lord we pray for an end to this ruthless attack on Ukraine.</p> <p>In the Democratic Republic of Congo, fighting between rebels and security forces puts civilians at risk. Tens of thousands have fled their homes since May 22, when the rebels launched their biggest offensive in a decade. Heavy fighting reached the outskirts of Goma, a provincial capital city. The Human Rights Watch has previously documented atrocities committed by the rebel group, known as M23. Lord we pray for an end to the fighting in the DRC.</p>

One of the motorcyclists was then pinned underneath the car. According to reports, police and bystanders immediately jumped into action to help lift the car off the trapped man whose name is Alex James. About two dozen people all worked together to free James. The two people riding on the motorcycle were both treated for non-life-threatening injuries and are doing better today all thanks to everyone working together to free the cyclist from the wreck.</p>
