THE SHOW, CREATED AND PRODUCED BY THE NEWS DEPARTMENT, AIRS TWO TIMES PER DAY MONDAY THROUGH SATURDAY AND THREE TIMES ON SUNDAY DURING THAT WEEK. FOLLOWING IS A BREAKDOWN OF “EYE ON THE ISSUES” PROGRAMS WHICH AIRED DURING THIS QUARTER:

April 6th 2018 – April 13th, 2018

STATE OFFICIALS ARE PREDICTING A "FAIRLY TYPICAL" YEAR FOR LYME DISEASE IN CONNECTICUT.... IT FOLLOWS A RECORD YEAR IN 2017 FOR THE NUMBER OF TICKS TESTED BY THE STATE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION-- MORE THAN 57-HUNDRED....EXPERIMENT STATION DIRECTOR, DOCTOR TED ANDREADIS SAYS AS SOON AS THE WARM WEATHER ARRIVES, ADULT TICKS WILL BE OUT. HE SAYS THEY TEST FOR THREE TICK-BORNE ILLNESSES, AND ARE CONSIDERING ADDING A FOURTH THIS YEAR--- THE "POWASSAN VIRUS".ADREADIS SAYS POWASSAN REMAINS AT A RELATIVELY LOW LEVEL, WITH ONLY THREE TO FOUR PERCENT OF TICKS CARRYING IT.

CONNECTICUT'S MEDICAL MARIJUANA PROGRAM CONTINUES TO GROW...THIS IS CONSUMER PROTECTION COMMISSIONER MICHELLE SEAGULL. THERE ARE NINE MEDICAL MARIJUANA DISPENSARIES AROUND THE STATE AND SEAGULL SAYS THEY ARE LOOKING TO ADD MORE.

May 18th, 2018 – May 25th, 2018

30 YEARS AGO, THE ICONIC CLOCK TOWER AT OCEAN BEACH PARK IN NEW LONDON COLLAPSED DURING A REFURBISHING EFFORT. NOW, A GROUP OF COMMUNITY MEMBERS ARE STARTING A FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN TO RAISE MONEY FOR A NEW TOWER. THE PROPOSAL IS THE BRAINCHILD OF NEW LONDON BUSINESS OWNER JEFF SUNTUP, WHO SAYS HE EXPECTS THE PROJECT TO COSE BETWEEN THREE OR FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS. CITY COUNCILOR MARTY OLSEN SAYS HE SUPPORTS THE IDEA FOR NOSTALGIC REASONS, BUT HE'S NOT SURE IF EVERYONE IS ON BOARD. SUNTUP SAYS THE CITY CAN RAISE MONEY FOR THE PROJECT BY SELLING SOUVENIR CARDS WITH PHOTOS OF THE OLD CLOCK TOWER.

May 25th, 2018 – June 1st, 2018

ROOF REPAIRS WILL BE MADE TO THE BUCKINGHAM MEMORIAL BUILDING IN DOWNTOWN NORWICH. MEMBERS OF THE CITY'S HISTORICAL SOCIETY ARE HOPING IT'S THE START OF AN EXTENSIVE RENOVATION OF THE MAIN STREET SITE. OFFICIALS GATHERED THIS (FRIDAY) MORNING OUTSIDE THE BUILDING TO ANNOUNCE A 118 THOUSAND DOLLAR DONATION FOR THE WORK, COURTESY OF GROTON PUBLIC UTILITIES, BOZRAH LIGHT AND POWER, AND JENSEN COMMUNITIES. HISTORICAL SOCIETY PRESIDENT BILL CHAMPAGNE SAYS THE HOPE IS TO BRING BACK TO THE BUILDING MANY ARTIFACTS THAT HAD BEEN LOCATED THERE. THE 1847 BUILDING WAS THE HOME OF WILLIAM BUCKINGHAM, WHO WAS THE GOVERNOR OF CONNECTICUT DURING THE CIVIL WAR, AND WAS ONE OF THE FIRST GOVERNORS TO SUPPORT THE UNION CAUSE. BUCKINGHAM ALSO SERVED AS NORWICH'S MAYOR, AND AS A U-S SENATOR. CHAMPAGNE SAYS THERE ARE PLANS TO HAVE NORWICH PUBLIC UTILITIES GET INVOLVED IN SOME ENERGY CONSERVATION UPGRADE TO THE BUILDING.

June 1st, 2018 – June 8th, 2018

THE STATE IS TRYING TO CAPITALIZE ON SEVEN OFFSHORE WIND PROJECTS CURRENTLY PLANNED IN THE NORTHEAST. GOVERNOR DANIEL MALLOY HAS PROPOSED 15 MILLION DOLLARS WORTH OF INFRASTRUCTURE UPGRADES FOR STATE PIER IN NEW LONDON. NEW LONDON MAYOR MIKE PASSERO SAYS HE'S EXCITED ABOUT THE PROSPECT OF INVESTING IN STATE PIER. THE UPGRADES INCLUDE STORM WATER TREATMENT AND DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS AND THE CONSTRUCTION OF A HEAVY LIFT PAD, AMONG OTHER THINGS. THE STATE BOND COMMISSION APPROVED THE APPROPRIATION ON FRIDAY.

June 8th, 2018 – June 15th, 2018

FORESTRY EXPERTS ARE DEALING WITH LOTS OF QUESTIONS CONCERNING GYPSY MOTH CATERPILLARS WHICH DEFOLIATED MANY AREAS IN EASTERN CT LAST YEAR...UCONN COOPERATIVE EXTENSIVE SERVICE PROFESSOR TOM WORTHLEY SAYS THIS YEAR MAY NOT BE AS BAD AS LAST YEAR DUE TO A FUNGUS BROUGHT ON BY DAMP WEATHER WHICH KILLS THE CRITTERS...HE SAYS THERE ARE SOME PRECAUTIONS HOMEOWNERS CAN TAKE TO PROTECT THEIR TREES...WORTHLEY SAYS LOTS OF PEOPLE ARE SEEING CATERPILLARS, BUT MANY ARE TENT CATERPILLARS WHICH ARE GREEN UNDERNEATH, WHILE GYPSY MOTH CATERPILLARS ARE IDENTIFIED BY RED MARKINGS.

June 15th, 2018 – June 22nd, 2018

SINCE JANUARY LAST YEAR, A NEW POLICY DESIGNED TO HELP DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIMS HAS ALLOWED THE STATE TO FIND HOUSING FOR 28 SINGLE ADULTS AND 45 FAMILIES. KILLINGLY SENATOR MAE FLEXER SAYS THE PROTOCOL CREATES EQUITABLE ACCESS TO FEDERAL AND STATE HOMELESS HOUSING RESOURCES FOR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS. FLEXER SAYS THE NEW POLICY WAS CREATED TO TAKE THE PRESSURE OFF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SHELTERS ACROSS THE STATE. SHE SAYS IT'S LED TO A STRONG PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE CONNECTICUT COALITION AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND THE CONNECTICUT COALITION TO END HOMELESSNESS.

June 22nd, 2018 – June 29th, 2018

A PROPOSAL THAT PREVENTS NEW LONDON POLICE FROM ARRESTING OR DETAINING ANYONE BASED SOLELY UPON A PERSON'S RACE, NATIONAL ORIGIN, RELIGION, OR LANGUAGE HAS BEEN APPROVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL, BUT NOT WITHOUT SOME CONTROVERSY. IT ALL STARTED WHEN COUNCIL PRESIDENT ANTHONY NOLAN READ AN EMAIL FROM THE ORGANIZER OF THE ACTIVIST GROUP PEOPLE POWER, WHICH HAD BEEN PUSHING THE MEASURE. THE EMAIL QUESTIONED THE INTEGRITY OF A FEW CITY COUNCILORS, INCLUDING NOLAN, AND HE DIDN'T TAKE TOO KINDLY TO IT. CITY COUNCILOR ALMA NARTATEZ SUPPORTED THE RESOLUTION, SAYING IT REAFFIRMS THE POLICE DEPARTMENT'S CURRENT POLICY. MEMBERS OF PEOPLE POWER HAVE AGREED TO HOLD INFORMATIONAL HEARINGS SO CITY RESIDENTS CAN LEARN ABOUT THE ISSUES FACING UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS.

June 29th, 2018 – July 6th, 2018

A NEW INITIATIVE DESIGNED TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF NEW HIV INFECTIONS IN CONNECTICUT IS UNDERWAY. HEALTH DEPARTMENT COMMISSIONER RAUL PINO SAYS THE STATE HAS MADE GREAT PROGRESS IN COMBATING HIV IN RECENT YEARS, BUT MORE NEEDS TO BE DONE. DR. BYRON KENNEDY SERVES AS DIRECTOR OF THE NEW HAVEN HEALTH DEPARTMENT. HE SAYS FINDING WAYS TO ATTACK HIV SHOULD BE A PRIORITY FOR ALL OF US. THE GETTING TO ZERO CAMPAIGN WILL FOCUS ON THE STATE'S FIVE LARGEST CITIES.

THIS FEATURE INCLUDES ITEMS SUCH AS CHURCH SUPPERS, ORGANIZATIONAL MEETINGS, SUPPORT GROUPS, SCHOOL REGISTRATIONS, LOCAL HEALTH SCREENINGS, FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES, MESSAGES FROM ORGANIZATIONS SUCH AS THE AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY, HOSPICE, AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION AND OTHERS AS WELL AS EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AND OTHER LIKE EVENTS. THE MESSAGES ARE APPROXIMATELY 20 SECONDS IN DURATION, ASSEMBLED AND EDITED FROM INFORMATION SUBMITTED BY SUCH GROUPS AND ARE ROTATED ONCE PER HOUR. MESSAGES ARE INSERTED INTO ROTATION ABOUT 4-7 DAYS PRIOR TO THE EVENT OR UP TO A MONTH AHEAD FOR SPECIAL FEATURES FROM THE VARIOUS ORGANIZATIONS.

ATTACHED HERETO ARE PAGES OF EXAMPLES OF SOME OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE LISTINGS AND A SEPARATE LISTING OF THE ORGANIZATIONS NOTHING THEIR MESSAGE/DATE AIRED. LISTINGS USUALLY CONSIST OF AN AVERAGE OF 20 DIFFERENT RECORDS. AS TO BE EXPECTED, DURING HOLIDAYS AND IN THE SPRING, MORE EVENTS OCCUR AND THEREFORE, FAR MORE RECORDS WILL APPEAR. DIALOGUE 2018 QUARTERLY REPORT: APRIL, MAY, JUNE

GUESTS AND SUBJECT MATTER DESCRIPTIONS

April 1, 2018 – Democratic gubernatorial candidate Ned Lamont

Subject Matter: Lamont, who ran unsuccessfully for U.S. Senator and Governor in the past, explains why he is back for another try at the governorship. He discusses the challenge of running as a Democrat trying to succeed Dan Malloy, one of the most unpopular governors in years. Lamont also talks about how he'll deal with the state's ongoing deficit problems and how he will address controversial issues such as a return to highway tolls.

April 8, 2018 – State Sen. Mae Flexer (D-Danielson).

Subject Matter: Flexer, a long-time advocate for women's issues in the legislature offers her views on Connecticut Congresswoman Elizabeth Esty (D-5th Dist), who decided not to seek reelection after claims that she protected her male chief of staff after serious allegations of sexual harassment surfaced. Flexer also discusses various bills in the 2018 legislative hopper designed to improve Connecticut's protections against sexual harassment and domestic violence.

April 15 – Brian Flaherty, vice president for public policy at the Connecticut Business and Industry Association (CBIA).

Subject Matter: Flaherty, speaking for the state's largest business lobby group CBIA, discusses the state budget battle and whether lawmakers can find a bipartisan solution again this year, instead of slipping into an ongoing budget stalemate. Flaherty also offers CBIA's view of proposed legislation on sexual harassment, the minimum wage, paid family and medical leave, and the so-called "captive audience" labor issue in the workplace.

April 22, 2018 – Shawn Lang, deputy director of AIDS Connecticut.

Subject Matter: Lang discusses the challenge of promoting AIDS awareness at a time when other illnesses have captured the spotlight. She says testing for HIV is still an important strategy, and Lang addresses the overall drug treatment picture including the exploding incidence of opioid overdoses.

April 29, 2018 – State Rep. Melissa Ziobron (R-East Haddam), ranking House Republican on budget-writing Appropriations Committee.

Subject Matter: As the end of the legislative session approaches, Ziobron gives her views on the potential for a bipartisan budget deal. She discusses several issues at play including: the rainy day fund, how to pay for transportation improvements, pension issues, and whether or not Democratic Gov. Dan Malloy should play a role in achieving the final budget package.

May 6, 2018 – Robert Klee, Commissioner of the State Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (DEEP).

Subject Matter: Klee discusses the increasing challenge of meeting clean air standards in Connecticut, now that the Trump administration appears to be siding with Midwest powerplants and other polluting sources that send bad air into Connecticut on a daily basis. He is asked whether individual states can make a difference in promoting clean air if official Washington turns a blind eye to the problem.

May 13, 2018 – Brenda Watson, executive director of Operation Fuel in Connecticut.

Subject: May 1 was the cutoff date for the winter protection against utility shutoffs for non-payment of bills. Watson explains that the financial challenge remains as the weather gets milder and discusses what her organization is trying to do to help those families in need. Watson indicates that the picture of who needs utility bill assistance is changing. It is not just the poor and the elderly, but increasingly it includes millennials.

May 20, 2018 – State Sen. President Pro Tempore Martin Looney (D-New Haven).

Subject Matter: Looney, the top Democratic leader in the State Senate, discusses the recently-achieved bipartisan budget deal and how it was crafted despite the intense political pressures of an election year. Looney talks about key elements of the package including a plan to save the Medicare Savings Program and measures to protect funding for cities and towns. He also tells why several controversial issues such as legalization of marijuana, sexual harassment legislation, and highway tolls failed to gain approval this year.

May 27, 2018 – Assistant Senate Republican Majority Leader Paul Formica (R-East Lyme).

Subject Matter: Formica brings a Republican view on why a bipartisan budget deal was achieved this month for the second year in a row despite political pressures. He explains why GOP lawmakers signed onto the deal even though it did not include changes in collective bargaining procedures that they sought. Formica explains why Republicans continue to battle against any return to highway tolls, and he comments on what the state legislature may do now that the U.S. Supreme Court has cleared the way for legalized sports betting.

June 3, 2018 – Amy Parmenter, AAA manager of public and government affairs.

Subject Matter: Parmenter offers expertise of why gas prices in Connecticut and elsewhere spiked bigtime this Spring, and how long the upward trend might last. She discusses how prolonged high gas prices impact tourism and other elements of the economy. Parmenter discusses in detail the so-called “100 deadliest days” of summer that often see a rise in teenager driving deaths. Parmenter talks about the importance of parental involvement with the driving habits of their teenage children.

June 10, 2018 – Independent gubernatorial candidate Richard “Oz” Griebel.

Subject Matter: Griebel, a former business executive, explains why he decided to try a run for governor as an independent, a difficult task because of the dominance of Connecticut’s two major parties. Despite the tough odds, Griebel has chosen not to seek public financing for his campaign and he discusses how he can raise the funds to be a viable candidate. Griebel voices his views on key issues including job growth, tax policy, education, and highway tolls.

June 17, 2018 – Democratic State Comptroller Kevin Lembo.

Subject Matter: Lembo explains why he decided against a run for governor this year after several months of exploring the field. He discusses his ongoing effort as Comptroller to fight the skyrocketing prices of many important prescription drugs. He also assesses the state budget situation, some reforms that are still needed, and the plusses and minuses of Connecticut’s dependence on revenues tied to the stock market.

June 24, 2018 – Michael Lawlor, criminal justice advisor to Gov. Malloy.

Subject Matter: Lawlor discusses the raging controversy over immigration enforcement in the United States, including the separation of parents and children at border stations. On the home front in Connecticut, Lawlor goes into the reasons why the state's prison population continues to decline. He addresses concerns that the effort to keep the prison population low may be allowing some dangerous individuals to get back on the street. Lawlor also comments on the status of juvenile justice in Connecticut.

July 1, 2018: Dr. Theodore Andreadis, director of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station.

Subject: Andreadis offers details on this week's warning that the tick population in Connecticut is peaking now, and more importantly, that higher than average tick infection with Lyme disease is being seen, along with higher infection of another worrisome illness babesiosis. Andreadis also discusses the state's ongoing mosquito management program that captures and tests mosquitoes around the state for West Nile virus and other dangerous mosquito-borne diseases.


