SECTION A: NEWSCAST OVERVIEW AND QUARTERLY ISSUES ADDRESSED

WNCC-FM airs four local newscasts during its broadcast day, Monday through Friday at 7:03am, 8:03am, 12:02pm, and 5:02pm, following three to ten minutes of world and national news from NBC Radio News. WNCC reports local and area news events and issues on an ongoing basis.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature news stories described below is between 30-seconds and one minute 30 seconds.

Some of the issues covered in these newscasts and programs during the **third** quarter are as follows:

<u>1-Jobs</u>

News Treatments: July: 1, 3, 24, 31; August: 21,29; September: 19,20

Both the economy and jobs picture continued improving during the third quarter, but there are still many in need and looking for work. We kept citizens up to date with the latest jobs news including the sectors adding jobs and job listing information at the local JobLink office.

2-Pet Population

News Treatments: July 2, 11;

The early part of the quarter brought larger than normal numbers of cats and dogs to the animal control shelter. We informed listeners about adoption specials and other information to help get the pets find a home.

3-Obesity/Recreation

News Treatments: July 31; August: 1, 5, 27; September: 27;

Macon County continues to face obesity as a top health concern. Numerous other health problems have been documented as a result of being overweight. Our intent was to inform listeners of hospital programs that promote weight loss, in addition to recreational opportunities that provide a chance for citizens to become more active.

4-Election Reform

News Treatments: July 26, 30; August: 12, 14; September: 10;

North Carolina lawmakers passed a bill with sweeping changes to North Carolina's election process. Some of the key changes were the requirement for a voter ID to vote and changing of registration laws and early voting schedule. We kept citizens up to date with the latest news on this issue. We provided views from those against and those for the voting reform. We also provided key information about how it will affect them.

5-Public Safety

News Treatments: July 30; August: 19, 21, 28, 30; September: 11, 17, 18;

Public safety was and will always be an issue for Maconians. We provided information on an array of issues from swimming hazards to highway safety. Our intent is to inform listeners of arising dangers and help them avoid these public safety hazards for a safer community.

<u>6-Health</u>

News Treatments: July 16; August 22; September: 9, 19, 23, 30;

Our focus with health was to inform community members about how important preventative care is. We aired numerous stories regarding special events and activities, most of them free, which could help citizens find out which health tests/screenings they should have.

7-Heavy Rainfall

News Treatments: July: 2, 3, 8, 9, 10; August: 1, 8, 15;

Record rainfall pummeled Macon County during July. This affected citizens in many ways. Our goal was to keep them informed with the latest forecasts and about hazards and other problems that were created due to the rain. We also notified citizens about sewer spills that resulted from the summer deluge.

8-Food Insecurity

News Treatments: July: 26; August: 7, 9; September 3;

Food insecurity remained a top issue in the county for the third quarter. Fortunately, there are many programs and opportunities for local citizens to help fill the gap. We reminded residents about the need in the community to help spur donations to food bank Carenet. We also provided information about events and places residents could check with to get food.
