ISSUE: Workers

The janitorial workers union SEIU 32BJ negotiates with the Washington DC Janitorial Services Contractors Association. The goal is to sign a decent work contract for janitorial employees in the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia. Salary and labor improvements for nine thousand cleaning employees, most Latinos, depend on negotiations between the cleaning union and the contractors association. The Executive Vice President of SEIU 32 BJ, Jaime Contreras, explains how inflation levels, housing, and food do not allow workers to work one job only. Also, the contractors' association stopped hiring workers last year, causing a significant workload for those who remain.

Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) represents more than seven thousand companies in the automotive industry parts market. SEMA members manufacture specialty vehicle parts and accessories. According to a new national study, the automotive parts industry supports more than 1.3 million jobs in the US and accounts for at least \$104 billion in annual wages and benefits. SEMA supports legislation that helps build up innovation and preserve the environment. For example, SEMA is sponsoring a California bill that provides a rebate of up to \$4,000 for those who convert an existing internal combustion car or truck to an EV. This type of rebate would both foster new technology and help the state meet its environmental goals.

Reforest Montgomery is a program that favors and promotes reforestation in Montgomery County. Through this program, trees are planted in forests throughout the county in addition to programs aimed at neighborhoods, parks, and homeowners. The Forest Conservation Fund finances the replacement of forest trees and lost canopies in certain areas around the county. The Free Tree program is open from October 1 and will close on October 8. Residents living in Equity Forest Areas with limited resources and whose first language is not English are a priority. Those interested can choose trees from the species offered on the website. A second application will open in February. The trees are free and include tree planting through contractors working

Immigrant activists from more than 20 progressive pro-immigrant organizations, including FIRM, CASA, CHIRLA, Make the Road New York, and community members impacted by immigration policies, will travel from across the country to gather in the nation's capital to ask President Biden and members of Congress to keep their promises and protect immigrant families. The rally is scheduled for Thursday, September 28 at 2 p.m. Hundreds of people will gather in Lafayette Square, where family members of affected immigrants and advocates will share their stories to ask the current administration of President Biden for a path to citizenship for millions of undocumented immigrants and DACA and TPS beneficiaries.

Dr. Hector Colon Rivera, spokesperson for the American Psychiatric Association, shared the results of a survey that shows that Americans are more open to talking about substance use disorder and behavioral addictions and are also more open to asking for help in case of having to assist a family member. Dr. Colón said that the concept of substance abuse has changed by the term substance use disorder, conceptualized as the use of any substance for more than twelve months. When it comes to behavioral addictions, whether gambling, pornography, or exercise, for example, when it becomes an obsession or compulsion, it becomes an addiction. Once these obsessive behaviors affect work, sleep, temperament, family, or daily activities, it can be considered a behavioral addiction, much like substance use disorder.

Beginning during Hispanic Heritage Month, the American Heart Association has launched two new awareness campaigns about heart health, healthy eating, and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation CPR targeted to Spanish-speaking communities. In the United States, Hispanics-Latinos and African Americans are at a higher risk for out-of-hospital cardiac arrest with a poor prognosis due to longstanding structural racism and social policies that have limited access to quality education and health care. CPR is also less common in Black and Hispanic-Latino neighborhoods.

Child safety is of utmost importance. So many childhood deaths, injuries, and accidents are preventable. Injury is the #1 killer of children and teens in the United States. In 2019, more than 9,000 youth aged 0-19 died from unintentional injuries in the United States. Millions more children suffer injuries requiring treatment in the emergency department. Leading causes of child injury include motor vehicle crashes, suffocation, drowning, poisoning, fires, and falls.

Financial literacy classes teach children about checking and savings accounts and the value of money and goods, including thinking about the negative consequences of overspending. According to research, children begin to understand the basic concepts of money at three years old and start having monetary habits at 7. Our guest, Alfonso Guzmán, said children learn the value of savings from a young age through allowances, and there are bank accounts for children so they can learn to value savings. These accounts are for 6-year-old children and up and are linked to the parents' accounts so that they can control any transaction and also add money.

Dr. Federico Asch, a spokesperson from the American Heart Association, cardiologist, and member of the board of the American Society of the Heart, spoke about the "Together at the Table" campaign Aimed at the Latino community. This campaign aims to help people eat better and this way to prevent diseases in the community such as diabetes, hypertension, heart problems, and overweight. Dr. Asch recommended avoiding excessive consumption of fats, salt, and sugar and practicing exercises since this contributes to modifying eating behavior.

A DOL spokesperson announced the Whistleblower Protection program that protects workers against retaliation from a bad employer. He also mentioned that immigration status is not a limitation to complain to the Department of Labor. This Hispanic Heritage Month, the US Department of Labor is raising awareness among Hispanic workers about the Whistleblower Protection Program. Workers have the right to notify a supervisor or employer of a hazardous condition, report a workplace injury or illness, refuse to perform a dangerous task, or request an inspection at the workplace by OSHA. If an employer has retaliated against a worker, the worker must file a retaliation complaint with OSHA within 30 days of the alleged adverse action.

For over 15 years, Healthier Generation has worked with schools, youth-serving organizations, businesses, communities, and families to promote health equity environments that support whole child health. Their work has impacted 31.1 million children in the country by increasing access to nutritious foods, high-quality physical activity, social-emotional support, and tobacco-free environments. Healthier Generation recognized Sergeant Shriver Elementary School in Montgomery County as one that elevated better nutrition and physical activity levels this year. Latino students represent 80% of the population, and parents participate in different school activities such as the Let's Play a Soccer campaign, in which, after practicing soccer, families receive free fruits and vegetables once a month. The school also promotes mental health with the support of a therapist for students and families in need.

The janitorial workers union SEIU 32BJ reported the results of negotiations with the Washington DC Cleaning Services Contractors Association. The contractors and the union reached a new agreement to increase the salary of the janitorial workers and maintain their benefits, most of them of Latino origin from the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia. The salary and labor improvements of nine thousand cleaning employees will be gradually thanks to the collective agreement negotiated every four years. Salary improvements fluctuate between 4 and 5 percent. Additionally, union members have a legal fund if they need legal advice on immigration issues. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, the union lost around 25 members who died from Covid-19.

One of the most prominent defenders of young Dreamers, Gaby Pacheco, was named Director and Executive President of The Dream US. TheDream.US is a nation's college and career program for undocumented immigrant youth that provided more than 10,000 college scholarships to Dreamers attending 80+ partner colleges in 20+ states and Washington, DC. They believe everyone, regardless of where they were born, should have equitable access to a college education, a meaningful career, and opportunities to contribute to the communities they call home. In 2010, Gaby Pacheco, together with Felipe Matos, Carlos Roa, and Juan Rodríguez, embarked on the Path of Dreams, a journey from Miami, Florida, to reach Washington DC, to support the DreamAct to grant legal status to young immigrants brought by their parents to the United States.

Two new guidelines have been published this year that affect women and their decisions about breast care. The US Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) now recommends that women at average risk of developing breast cancer begin having regular mammograms at age 40, ten years earlier than previously established. Additionally, a new FDA rule requires that starting next year, all breast centers notify women of their breast density, considered a risk factor for breast cancer, in their mammogram report. Breast cancer rates are increasing among young women, and overall breast cancer incidence rates have increased by 0.5% each year.

Having a family history of breast cancer increases the risk of developing it, but it is believed that only between 5% and 10% of breast cancers have a hereditary component. Due to disparities in access to health care, Hispanic women may be less likely to be up-to-date on their mammograms compared to non-Hispanic white women. Although Hispanic and Latina women are less likely to be diagnosed with breast cancer compared to non-Hispanic whites, some research indicates that they are more likely to be diagnosed with more advanced diseases.

The American Heart Association invites the community to participate in the Heart Walk scheduled for November 4 at the National Mall. During the walk, there will be Cardiopulmonary resuscitation demonstrations where people can practice. The walk will promote physical activity and healthy eating as part of heart care. Going to the doctor regularly to prevent health problems should be a priority.

For 40 years, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) has been sending money to foreign laboratories where experimenters have addicted rats and dogs to cocaine, caused strokes in monkeys, cut the vocal cords and spinal cords of rabbits, and forced mice to ingest amphetamines and alcohol, among other cruel and useless experiments on animals. In Colombia, a research group received \$17 million from US taxpayers over two decades to develop a malaria vaccine that was never produced. An 18-month PETA investigation led to the closure of a laboratory, the rescue of 108 abused monkeys and 180 mice with no veterinary care, and an audit of experimenters' contracts. The new Ceasing Animal Research Grants Abroad (CARGO) bill would prevent the NIH from giving money to foreign labs to experiment on animals.

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is a common respiratory virus that can infect people of all ages. It is so common that most children have been infected with the virus by age 2. An injection, a monoclonal antibody, has now been developed to boost the immune system of babies

Alzheimer is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking, and reasoning skills. Latinos are 1.5 times more likely to develop Alzheimer than non-Hispanic according to the Alzheimer's Association. Memory loss that disrupts daily life may be a symptom of Alzheimer's or other dementia, and there are at least ten warning signs and symptoms. Latinos often go undiagnosed or diagnosed later when the disease is already present and advanced. When a sign of Alzheimer's is noticed is best to schedule an appointment with a doctor as soon as possible

On Veterans Day, a former US Marine explained to the audience about the Veterans and Military Affairs Initiative, a program created by JPMorgan Chase, which has turned ten years old. This program's mission is to attract, retain, and develop the veteran corps' abilities, support veteran-started businesses through access to capital, provide resources and tools for military families, and support veterans with philanthropic financial resources. Since 2011, the Initiative has hired 18 thousand veterans and plans to hire two thousand more. The Initiative also works with the US Department of Defense to hire more veterans. A 92 percent of military spouses are women, which means skilled military wives need opportunities to leverage their leadership skills. Supporting spouses is supporting military members.

A SEIU 32BJ spokesperson explained that cabin cleaners, warehouse workers, and ramp workers at Washington Dulles Airport confronted their employers over wage and hour complaints, alleging that the timekeeping system fails to pay them for hours worked before or after shifts. Workers are missing over 384 hours in eight weeks, totaling \$9,747. At LaGuardia, Newark, and Boston Logan Airports, workers for the same company are demanding an end to apparent wage theft by Swissport. A report reveals that OSHA has cited the company 35 times for safety violations since 2013 and that the rate of injury or illness among workers is higher than in comparable companies with more than 50 employees per worksite.

Latinos are increasingly in debt, especially adults over 50 years of age. A new AARP survey reveals that situations such as job loss, health problems, and inflation are triggering major debt problems for Latinos in the United States. Two out of every three Latinos with credit cards face considerable debt with exorbitant interest rates that could take more than ten years to pay off if they make minimum payments each month. About 75% of Latinos over 50 have some debt, and about 25% of them have a significant debt level.

USDA recommends taking care when preparing food just days before Thanksgiving celebrations. Turkeys must be kept at a safe temperature during "the big thaw." While frozen, a turkey is safe indefinitely. However, as soon as it begins to thaw, any bacteria that may have been present before freezing can begin to grow again. Immediately after grocery store checkout, frozen turkey must be in the freezer. A package of frozen meat or poultry left thawing on the counter for more than 2 hours is not at a safe temperature. Even though the center of the package may still be frozen, the outer layer of the food is in the "Danger Zone" between 40 and 140 °F, at a temperature where foodborne bacteria multiply rapidly.

During November, Diabetic Eye Disease Awareness Month, retina specialists in the United States urge people with diabetes, those who may be at risk, to pay close attention to their vision. Diabetic retinopathy, a complication of diabetes, affects more than 50% of diabetics and is the leading cause of irreversible blindness among working-age Americans. A 2023 survey of Americans aged 40 and older revealed an alarming lack of knowledge about diabetic retinopathy that could put millions of people at risk of vision loss. Nearly two-thirds of Americans age 40 and older (64%) did not know that spots or floaters in their vision could be a symptom of diabetic retinopathy. And more than half of Americans age 40 and older (51%) did not know that people with diabetes who have high blood pressure are more likely to develop diabetic retinopathy.

"Take Control in 1, 2, 3" seeks to encourage older adults, emergency management personnel, and all those who work to support older adult communities, encouraging them to follow three simple steps: 1) evaluate the needs, 2) create a plan, and 3) involve support networks. FEMA created a guide to help older adults in the event of disasters. This guide provides checklists and questions to answer at each step.

The Medicare Open Enrollment period is October 15 to December 7. More than 65 million people with Medicare can review their health and prescription drug coverage options and make changes now. Those who do not make changes during this period may have to wait a year before they make changes to their plan. Several improvements to the Medicare program add savings and better access to affordable treatments thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act. Plans may change each year, and by comparing all the options, people with Medicare could save money, find better coverage, or both. Comparing medication and health options is easy at Medicare.gov.

People who qualify for Extra Help will pay no more than \$4.50 for each generic drug and \$11.20 for each brand-name drug. For couples with infertility problems, adoption is an option to explore, but there are also infertility conditions that are evaluated and treated. Primary infertility refers to couples who have not become pregnant after at least one year of having sex without using birth control methods. The common cause of infertility in Latino couples is secondary infertility, couples who were able to have a child before, but after years, it is not possible to conceive. The use of some surgical contraceptive methods, such as tubal ligation, is often one of the causes of infertility. Currently, some health insurance policies offer coverage to finance infertility treatment.

American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) declared a state of national emergency on children's mental health last year. A growing number of experts say social media is a significant factor in the nation's youth mental health crisis. This Hispanic Heritage Month, the US Department of Labor is raising awareness among Hispanic workers about the Whistleblower Protection Program. Workers have the right to notify a supervisor or employer of a hazardous condition, report a workplace injury or illness, refuse to perform a dangerous task, or request an inspection at the workplace by OSHA. If an employer has retaliated against a worker, the worker must file a retaliation complaint with OSHA within 30 days of the alleged adverse action.
