A. Aging

I Remember Better When I Paint

Broadcast on April 21 at 12pm Duration: 60 minutes

Creative therapies such as drawing and music are being used to treat Alzheimer's patients in this informative documentary. New insights about the transformative and positive power of drawing, painting, music and cultural excursions for those living with Alzheimer's and related memory disorders.

Homes on the Range: The New Pioneers

Broadcast on May 9 at 8pm Duration: 60 minutes

Passionate citizens in Sheridan, Wyoming establish a nonprofit skilled nursing facility that uses the Green House philosophy. Elderly people enjoy excellent quality of life and care where they, their families, and the staff engage in meaningful relationships built on equality, empowerment, and mutual respect.

Caring for Mom and Dad

Broadcast on June 21 at 7pm Duration: 60 minutes

Problems in caring for the 75 million Baby Boomers entering their retirement years are examined.

B. American History / Biography

The Draft

Broadcast on April 27 at 9pm Duration: 60 minutes

The military draft in the 1960's and 1970's was a lightning rod that lit up every schism in American society: race, class and culture. But ending the draft has produced unintended consequences, creating a population completely disconnected from that of the soldiers who experience the burden of endless wars.

The Day the 60's Died

Broadcast on April 28 at 8pm Duration: 60 minutes

In May of 1970, four students were shot dead at Kent State in Ohio. The mayhem that followed has been called the most divisive moment in American history since the Civil War. Fallout from the event was felt from college campuses all over the United States to the jungles of Cambodia where the Vietnam war had spread.

Prohibition 101: A Nation of Drunkards

Broadcast on May 5 at 8pm Duration: 120 minutes

Alcohol has been embedded in the fabric of American culture since the country's early days. But by 1830, the average American consumed nearly seven gallons of alcohol a year. A wave of

spiritual fervor for reform swept the country, blaming alcohol abuse for wreaking havoc in the lives of families. A wave of immigration after the Civil War brought drinking customs from Ireland, Germany and other European countries. The temperance campaign ignited from these events and in 1917 the 18th Amendment banning alcohol is quickly passed into law. But making Prohibition the law of the land is one thing, enforcing it will be another.

A Century in the Sun: Henry Flagler and the Making of Modern Florida

Broadcast on June 23 at 1pm Duration: 60 minutes

This is the story of Florida's dramatic transformation from America's last east-coast frontier into the fourth-largest state. Standard Oil magnate Henry Flagler arrived in Florida in the late 1800's and built a railroad that launched the population and construction boom that drove Florida's economy until it was stopped by the Great Recession and an unnamed hurricane.

C. Arts

Great Performances 3914: Annie Lennox, Nostalgia Live in Concert

Broadcast on April 2 at 10pm Duration: 60 minutes

In her latest album, "Nostalgia", music superstar Annie Lennox performs melodies from the American Songbook. Songs include "Summertime", "Georgia on My Mind", "I Cover the Waterfront", and other timeless classics.

Great Performances at the Met 902: Macbeth

Broadcast on April 5 at 12pm Duration: 180 minutes

Soprano Anna Netrebko portrays the Lady Macbeth, the insane and murderous mate of Zeljko Lucic's doomed Macbeth, for the first time at the Met. Verdi's masterful adaptation of Shakespeare's tragedy also stars Joseph Calleja as the noble Macduff. Fabio Luisi conducts.

Billy Joel: The Library of Congress Gershwin Prize

Broadcast on May 8 at 10pm Duration: 90 minutes

The work of singer-songwriter Billy Joel is celebrated as Joel receives the Library of Congress Gershwin Prize for Popular Song. Performances by Joel, Tony Bennett, Josh Groban, John Mellencamp and others are featured.

In Performance at the White House 2102: The Gospel Tradition

Broadcast on June 26 at 9pm Duration: 60 minutes

President and Mrs. Obama celebrate gospel music and its profound influence on American music and culture. The concert showcases music that cuts across the boundaries of race and class to provide comfort and inspiration.

D. Education

Independent Lens 1612: The Homestretch

Broadcast on April 13 at 10pm Duration: 60 minutes

Follow three smart and ambitious Chicago teens who brave frigid winters, school pressures and homelessness as they fight to stay in school, graduate and build a future.

Race to Nowhere

Broadcast on April 17 at 12pm Duration: 60 minutes

There is a silent epidemic plaguing America's schools. Students are pushed to the brink by over-scheduling, over-testing and the relentless pressure to achieve. From long nights of homework to the desks of child psychology experts, this documentary explores whether the current education system properly prepares students to think and work independently and creatively.

180 Days: Hartsville

Broadcast on May 1 at 12pm Duration: 60 minutes

A southern town attempts to address the urgent demand for reform in American public schools. Established systems – bureaucracy, economic opportunity and fixed mindsets – interact and blend can either fuel or diffuse such reforms.

Cafeteria Man

Broadcast on June 26 at 12pm Duration: 60 minutes

A unique look at what it takes to bring healthier food to millions of kids in the nation's schools, with the ultimate goal of enhancing students' well-being and reversing the childhood obesity epidemic.

E. Environment / Nature / Geography

The Quietest Place on Earth

Broadcast on May 4 at 12pm Duration: 60 minutes

In the Hawaiian Islands, on the second-largest island of Maui, the Haleakala volcano rises nearly two miles into the sky. The massive crater at its summit carries the unique distinction of "The quietest place on Earth" for the stillness of the stark landscape. For some, the crater mimics a religious experience. For others, it inspires a deeper awareness of humans' place in nature.

Liquid Assets: The Story of Our Water Infrastructure

Broadcast on May 5 at 12pm Duration: 90 minutes

The history and engineering challenges of water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructures are explored. These systems – some more than 100 years old – are essential for economic development and growth. Maintaining these systems may be the single largest public works endeavor in US history, as several urban and rural locations are examined.

F. Health/Health Care

Cancer: The Emperor of All Maladies 103 – Finding the Achilles Heel

Broadcast on April 1 at 9pm Duration: 120 minutes

Scientists face the prospect of harnessing the human immune system to defeat cancer. They believe they have cracked the mystery of the malignant cell, and targeted therapies have been developed. Many experts call for a new focus on prevention and early detection as the most promising options.

Twice Born: Stories from the Special Delivery Unit

Broadcast on April 7 at 8pm Duration: 60 minutes

Groundbreaking fetal surgery takes place at the Special Delivery Unit at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, where rare surgeries are performed on babies inside the womb.

Frontline 3308: Outbreak

Broadcast on May 5 at 10pm Duration: 60 minutes

The story of how the Ebola outbreak of 2015 began and why it wasn't stopped before it was too late. With interviews with global decision-makers and health responders, accounts of victims from the slums of Monrovia to the jungles of Guinea, tragic missteps in the response to the epidemic is exposed.

G. Recreation / Leisure / Sports

Signs of the Time

Broadcast on May 13 at 1pm Duration: 60 minutes

It's hard to believe there were no hand signals in the early days of baseball. As a result, the umpire's voice was usually drowned out by the screams of fans, muddling the calls and creating confusion. The origins of baseball's hand signals and the pioneers of this innovation is explored. Narrated by Richard Dreyfuss.

Good Sports with Ric Blackwell

Broadcast on May 20 at 5:30pm Duration: 30 minutes

"Good Sports" highlights all the positive and wonderful things happening inside the Palm Beach County School System. We profile amazing students, athletes, artists, coaches, teachers and administrators. This week on "Good Sports" we have highlights of a girls volleyball game between the two best teams in Palm Beach County. The teams from Jupiter High School and Boca Raton High School played a five set thriller. We also focus in on a young chess champ from Citrus Cove Elementary School in Boynton Beach.

Hidden Legacy: Japanese Traditional Performing Arts

Broadcast on June 30 at 1pm Duration: 60 minutes

A look at how traditional Japanese cultural arts were maintained in Japanese-American relocation camps during WWII. While American recreational activities such as baseball and swing dancing were widely documented, many Japanese artists performed kabuki dramas, obon dancing and music with traditional instruments while interned.

H. Science / Technology

Nova 4208: Invisible Universe Revealed

Broadcast on April 22 at 9pm Duration: 60 minutes

The Hubble Space Telescope, one of the most ambitious experiments in all of astronomy, forever changed our understanding of the cosmos and our place in it. This single telescope has helped astronomers pinpoint the age of the universe, revealed the birthplace of stars and planets, and uncovered black holes lurking at the heart of galaxies.

Super Skyscrapers 101: One World Trade Center

Broadcast on April 29 at 10pm Duration: 60 minutes

One World Trade Center, the tallest building in the western hemisphere and a modern landmark, is engineered to be the safest and strongest skyscraper ever built. For all involved in the project, this is a construction job suffused with the history of the site and a sense of duty to rebuild from the ashes of Ground Zero.

First Peoples

Broadcast on June 24 at 9pm Duration: 120 minutes

Scientists and anthropologists believe the mixing of prehistoric genes led the way for humans to survive and thrive around the globe. New revelations in archaeology and genetics cast new light on 200,000 years of history, detailing how early humans became dominant.
