A. The coronavirus pandemic and its effect on public health

COVID-19 updates aired once an hour on WHLS. They consisted of the latest data and information from local and state health authorities. The number of new cases and deaths and total cases and deaths were shared every morning for our listening area, including the counties of St. Clair, Sanilac, and Lapeer. These updates also included sound-bytes from public health officials and elected officials including but not limited to: Dr. Annette Mercatante, Medical Health Officer for St. Clair County; Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, Chief Medical Executive for Health for the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services; Port Huron Mayor Pauline Repp; Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley; Jamie Cain, Superintendent of Port Huron Area Schools; Michigan Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson; and Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer.

A flattening of the curve when it comes to the number of COVID-19 infections in the local area may in fact be happening. April 16th was the third straight day of single digit increases in the number of new coronavirus patients locally. As of the 16th, the number of county-wide positive test results was 234 people with 8 attributable deaths. St. Clair County Medical Health Officer Dr. Annette Mercatante says

those numbers however are just a snapshot of the overall COVID-19 situation as more testing needs to be done. Earlier in the week, state health officials relaxed COVID-19 testing requirements. Healthcare workers, patients in long term care facility, those over 65 with symptoms, and first responders now all have priority when it comes to testing in Michigan. A website has also been set up to determine where the closest testing site is located in your community, you can visit michigan.gov/coronavirus.

Starting June 9th, free drive through COVID-19 testing began in St. Clair County. St. Clair County Medical Health Officer Dr. Annette Mercatante says a doctor's order is not needed, however you will need to make an appointment. The testing will take place in the parking lot behind the Health Department's offices on 28th Street in Port Huron during regular business hours each Tuesday. To date, just over 6300 COVID-19 tests have been deployed. About 7% have been positive, and nearly 93% were negative for the virus. To schedule an appointment for drive through testing, you can call 987-5300.

Local businesses are being encouraged to take advantage of federal dollars being made available through the recently signed Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Dan Casey of the Economic Development Alliance of St. Clair County says one of those programs includes the Economic Injury Disaster Loan. He says applications are now being accepted for the low-interest federally insured loans. Casey also says businesses can request a \$10,000 advance when applying for the loan, giving them access to fact capitol that will be forgiven. A relativity dry Spring has led to local farmers putting many more seeds in the ground compared to this time last year. Phil Kaats is an educator with MSU Extension serving the lower thumb area. He says much of the thumb's sugar beet crop is already in the ground, with corn and soybeans to follow suit. He also says the winter wheat crop, which was planted last year, is looking very healthty. Kaats says an

unusually wet spring in 2019 led to 1 out of every 3 tillable acres in St. Clair County and Sanilac Counties going unplanted last year.

Tuesday May 5th is Election day in Michigan and only a few area communities have issues on the ballot. A Blue Water Transit millage is up for renewal in the City of Port Huron and Fort Gratiot Township. Bob Buechler, Fort Gratiot Township clerk, says nearly all voting is being conducted through the mail but the clerk's office will be open Tuesday for last minute voters. All clerks offices will be open from 7am to 8pm on Election Day. There are also millage askings Tuesday in the Sandusky and Carsonville-Port Sanilac school districts.

Students currently enrolled or looking to enroll in courses at St. Clair County Community College now have access to federal coronavirus relief dollars. Pete Lacey from SC4 says the college has been granted slightly over \$950,000 from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Port Huron Schools Superintendent Jamie Cain says the district will hold some form of in person commencement ceremonies for the class of 2020 later this year.

The Michigan legislature green-lighted \$880 million in Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act dollars. Up to \$3 billion has been doled out to the State of Michigan through the federal government to help offset the negative social and economic impacts of COVID-19. State Representative Shane Hernandez of Port Huron, who chairs the house appropriations committee, says schools and small businesses will be the beneficiaries. About \$50 million has been directed to schools, with Hernandez saying that is only the beginning. \$150 million is also headed to small businesses in Michigan in the form of grants and loans.

Port Huron's mayor is asking for the public's patience when it comes to routine activities such as processing payments. Mayor Pauline Repp says with a limited staff working at city hall, it will take longer than normal to process water payments, but that doesn't mean you'll get shut off. All water shutoffs in the City have been suspended due to the pandemic. Port Huron City Council does plan to meet Monday April 27th at the Municipal Office Center. Repp says social distancing will be used and the public is encouraged to view the meeting online rather than showing up in person to the city council chambers.

Memorial day is going to look quite different at Port Huron parks and beaches. Port Huron City Manager James Freed says the city will be doing everything possible to limit capacity and encourage social distancing. Freed says the Governor's office so far has not provided guidance on what municipalities should do regarding beaches. He adds that parking lots at Port Huron City beaches will be reduced to 50% capacity in hopes of limiting the number of people using the beach.

The City of Marysville could go to the voters to help ease the burden of the cornoavirus pandemic. Racism and social inequities are now deemed as a public health crisis in the City of Port Huron. At Monday night's meeting of Port Huron City Council, members unanimously approved two resolutions, one denouncing the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis last month, and the other setting the groundwork to combat prejudice in city departments. Port Huron Mayor Pauline Repp says the resolution calls for racism equity training for all city agencies, including the Port Huron Police Department. City administration would also be required to identify diversity goals and objectives, and to report periodically on their progress to city council. A similar measure was passed by the Marysville City Council June 22nd.
