### **SECTION 1. ISSUES**

The above stations have identified the following as some of the more significant community issues addressed this quarter.

A. **Education.** Education can come in many forms. We spoke with several representatives from the City of Missoula about a variety of issues the public needs to know about. We also spoke with the Missoula Economic Partnership and Dr. Patrick Barkey from the University of Montana about the local economy.

B. **Local Government.** We covered the usual topics of government, but also focused on communication as a whole. Twice a month we have a “City Talk” show where we discuss a variety of issues. We also meet with our Missoula County Commissioners every month to discuss property taxes, budgeting, how tax dollars are spent, and more.

C. **Law Enforcement.** Crime has so many topics, and we try to check on them all. We spoke with the President of the Crime Prevention Research center about a local lockdown that occurred at one of our High Schools. We also spoke with our Attorney General about human trafficking.

D. **Affordable Housing.** We spoke to our City officials and other public figures about the cost of housing in Missoula. As a result, we also talked about the homelessness issues around Missoula and how to try and solve them.

E. **Election.** We are preparing for the upcoming election in Missoula where we will choose a new mayor. We spoke to one of the individuals who had already thrown his hat in the ring, and we plan on speaking to the other candidates as well.

F. **Development.** The City of Missoula is focusing a lot of its efforts on development. As a result, we introduced a new monthly program discussing that specific issue. We also talked about development with the Missoula Economic Partnership.

Logan's main pieces of great news are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The City has started reinvesting almost \$7 million in water line replacements this summer, all over town.</li> <li>• We have finally turned the corner on leakage and gotten ahead of it, with a net reduction of nearly 1,200 gallons per minute of leakage.</li> </ul> We also answered these questions: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• How do you do these projects without disrupting traffic?</li> <li>• Why is it important to replace old mains?</li> <li>• How do you prioritize water main projects?</li> </ul> |

The plan starts with a comprehensive analysis of the natural hazards in Missoula County. Local jurisdictions need a plan to be able to qualify for federal money for mitigation of the hazards that lead to disasters. (Common formula says that every \$1 saves \$6 in addressing a disaster.) The plan will be adopted by the City and the County elected bodies. The plan is based on what the public want to see mitigated – what they see as the biggest threats. |
| 6/17/23<br>6/18/23 | <b>Education, Homelessness.</b> Our guest was Jim Hicks. He is the Executive Director of the Hope Rescue Mission here in Missoula. They are responsible for the Temporary Safe Outdoor Space for Missoula’s homeless. They also have a women’s shelter that involved an 18-month program. They also help the Poverello Center with homeless outreach on a daily basis.  |

Fahey explained the work his organization does here in Missoula.   |
