**New 13-Part Docu-Series Pays Homage to Carl Sagan's
Award-Winning Scientific Masterpiece**

National Geographic Channel to Air Same-Night Encores

More than three decades after the debut of "Cosmos," Carl Sagan's stunning and iconic exploration of the universe as revealed by science, FOX sets off on a voyage for the stars with COSMOS: A SPACE-TIME ODYSSEY. Seth MacFarlane (FAMILY GUY, AMERICAN DAD) has teamed up with Sagan's original creative collaborators – writer/producer Ann Druyan and astrophysicist Steven Soter – to conceive a 13-part "docu-series" that will serve as a successor to the Emmy and Peabody Award-winning original series.

Hosted by renowned astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson, COSMOS: A SPACE-TIME ODYSSEY will blast off on the FOX schedule.

"Never more than at this moment in the modern era have we needed a profound reminder of the colossally important and exciting role that science, space exploration and the human quest for knowledge must continue to play in our development as a species," said MacFarlane. "We should be vigorously exploring the solar system by now, and who better to inspire us to get there than Ann Druyan, Steven Soter, Neil deGrasse Tyson and, of course, Carl Sagan."

"Carl believed that science belongs to all of us," said Druyan, Sagan's widow. "He wanted to convey the thrill of its cosmic perspective to the widest possible audience. I wish I could tell Carl what Seth's leadership on this new COSMOS has made possible. Besides, I know how much they would have liked each other."

"This is a golden opportunity to introduce COSMOS to a new generation," said Kevin Reilly, President of Entertainment, Fox Broadcasting Company. "While admittedly on the periphery of our brand, we believe this can have the same massive cultural impact that the original series delivered, and we're going to use all of our resources – on-air and company-wide – to help bring that to fruition."

Produced in conjunction with National Geographic Channel, COSMOS: A SPACE-TIME ODYSSEY is the story of how human beings began to comprehend the laws of nature and find our place in space and time. By exploring never-before-told stories of the heroic quest for knowledge, the series will take viewers to other worlds and travel across the universe for a vision of the cosmos on the grandest scale. The most profound scientific concepts will be presented with stunning clarity, uniting skepticism and wonder, and weaving rigorous science with the emotional and spiritual into a transcendent experience. National Geographic Channel will air a same-night encore of the episodes following their broadcast on FOX.

Carl Sagan's original series "Cosmos" was first broadcast in 1980 and remains the most globally successful American public television series of all time. Seen by an estimated 700 million viewers, "Cosmos" has remained popular in all media throughout the world.

COSMOS: A SPACE-TIME ODYSSEY will be produced by Cosmos Studios, the Ithaca, NY, based company Druyan co-founded in 2000. Ann Druyan, Seth MacFarlane and Cosmos Studios president Mitchell Cannold will executive-produce the series. Allan Butler will serve as executive producer for National Geographic Channel.

Submerged in a metal cage, Jack's encounter with a 14-foot great white is the experience of a lifetime. Outside his lodge room, before the shark dive, Jack finds himself face-to-face with a deadly puff adder.

Jack's Camp (2152)

In Botswana's Kalahari Desert, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen observe the den behaviors of brown hyena with pups. Then they help care for an orphaned zebra foal, ride four-wheelers in the desert and visit with village children. Also, Jack digs for scorpions with a Bushman named "Cobra."

The Outer Banks (2153)

Jack's visit to North Carolina's Outer Banks includes black bears, migratory birds, red wolves and wild mustangs. Atop the East Coast's highest sand dune, and near the site of Orville and Wilbur's first flight, Jack talks to a glider pilot who lives to soar like a bird.

The Tropics Bird Refuge (2154)

In 1990, Mary Bradford of Kannapolis, North Carolina took one parrot into her house in need of care, now her commitment has grown to more than 275 birds. Mary's unique care center is believed to be the only retirement home of its kind for exotic birds.

Week of 1/13/14-1/17/14

Africa on the Edge (2156)

In between serenades from camp singers and pushing an airplane out of the mud, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen discover some of the finer points of Botswana's Okavango wilderness. Also, learn how Bushmen in the Kalahari Desert extract water from roots.

Baby Animals (2157)

At the Columbus Zoo, Jack interacts with a baby cougar, wolverine, armadillo, gibbon, clouded leopards, snakes and a four-month old lowland gorilla. At the Ohio Wildlife Center, Jack learns of efforts to get an assortment of orphaned baby animals, including birds, a red fox, a faun and a possum with young back into the wild.

Okavango Horse Safari (2158)

On a horse back safari in Botswana's Okavango Delta, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen are charged by a bull elephant. Later, while riding past a scenic water hole, Jack and Kathaleen observe a variety of animals, including a playful hippo.

Chitabe Camp (2159)

At Chitabe Camp in Botswana's Okavango Delta, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen track leopards. On a night safari, they observe lions, bush babies and elephants. Also, Kathaleen finds out what it takes to put together a remote camp.

Grin and Bear It (2160)

Jack travels to the Katmai region of Alaska to experience the annual arrival of throngs of brown bears feeding on Sockeye salmon in the Kulik River. Jack encounters bears everywhere, even on a makeshift tundra golf course.

Week of 1/20/14-1/24/14

Touchdown Alaska (2162)

After her floatplane touches down on Kulik Lake, Jack's daughter, Kathaleen, joins him in the Katmai region of Alaska for some brown bear watching and fly-fishing. Later, Kathaleen flies off to a remote lake where she visits Carol Ann Woody, a noted salmon researcher.

On a Mission (2163)

It's no secret that Jack loves zoos! Join him as he visits some of his favorite aquariums and zoological parks that are on a mission to help save wildlife. Meet sun bears, moose, sea lion pups, a baby rhino and other wild animals that are all part of new zoo and aquarium programs that focus on enrichment, education, breeding and animal rehabilitation.

On the Fly (2164)

In Central Florida, Jack assists in the release of eight captive-born Whooping Cranes, considered among the rarest and most endangered birds in the world. Jack also goes up in a helicopter for the annual survey of Florida's Bald Eagle population. The chicks in nest 24-A have two volunteers in Audubon's Eagle Watch program feeling like proud parents.

Wildlife on Easy Street (2165)

In Tampa, more than 200 unwanted, abused or abandoned animals, most of them exotic cats, have it made for the rest of their lives at the sanctuary on Easy Street. Jack finds out from the founder of Wildlife on Easy Street that caring for 17 species of cats, including Bengal Tigers, Barbary Lions, Leopards, Lynx, Ocelots, and Caracals is a labor of love.

Rainforest Eagle (2173)

While in Barro Colorado, a dense forested island in Panama, Jack goes in search of a Harpy the world's largest eagle. The island is home to the famed Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute. Later, at the Summit Zoo, Jack helps care for an injured anteater. Daughter Kathaleen checks out the rainforest from a zip line.

Week of 1/27/14-1/31/14

Panama Canal, Jungle Paradise (2175)

Jack and his daughter Kathaleen share a boating adventure exploring the animal rich rainforest surrounding the Panama Canal, including Howler and Capuchin monkeys and the deadly Fer de Lance snake. Father and daughter also explore an abandoned military outpost in the jungle.

Canopy Tower (2176)

An old Air Force radar station converted into a small lodge provides Jack with a perfect platform for bird watching in Panama's Sobering National Park. Among the many tropical birds Jack spots from high atop Canopy Tower is the beautiful Blue Cotinga. Daughter Kathaleen takes a tour through Old Panama.

Corcovado, Lost in Time (2177)

In Costa Rica, Jack treks through the pristine Corcovado National Park in search of the elusive jaguar. On a night hike, Jack comes face-to-face with the tapir, a rainforest relative of the rhinoceros. While on a rafting adventure, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen challenge the raging rapids of an environmental treasure, the Pacuare River.

Costa Rica: Snakes and Sloths (2178)

In Costa Rica, Jack encounters reptiles including an Eye Lash Viper, a huge Python and the deadly Bushmaster at the World of Snakes. On the Caribbean coast, Jack meets an American couple who has established the Sloth Rehabilitation Center.

Diving into Dominica (2179)

The watery world of Dominica, one of the Caribbean's most pristine islands, provides Jack and his daughter Kathaleen with an unforgettable island adventure. From an ocean encounter with Sperm whales to a lazy paddle up the Layou River, father and daughter plunge right into the Nature Island. Also, Kathaleen makes her first open water dive.

Week of 2/03/14-2/07/14

In the Blind (2182)

In Manitoba, Canada Jack and his daughter Kathaleen set out in search of native wildlife. Jack is determined to find the hard to find Hog Nose snake in the rolling dunes of Spirit Sands, while Kathaleen watches Black Bear behavior at Riding Mountain. Kathaleen also goes on a bicycle safari with a moose expert.

Glacier Bay Adventure (2183)

Jack and his daughter Kathaleen depart Juneau, Alaska aboard the Wilderness Explorer in search of the endless natural beauty of Glacier Bay. Among their encounters: bears, humpback whales and glaciers. Jack also explores an old gold mine.

Galapagos: Plazas and North Seymour Islands (2184)

Jack and his daughter Kathaleen begin their exploration of the famed Galapagos Islands off the Pacific coast of South America. On the islands of Plazas and North Seymour, the Hanna's encounter iguanas, sea lions and bird rookeries teeming with blue-footed Boobies and Frigates.

Galapagos: Fernandina Island (2185)

Six hundred miles due west of Ecuador in the Pacific Ocean, Jack and his daughter Kathaleen continue their adventures on the Galapagos Islands. On Fernandina, Jack investigates the Galapagos penguin population while Kathaleen swims with the world's only marine iguanas.

Jambeli Animal Rescue Center (2186)

Because Ecuador doesn't have the money to fund wildlife conservation programs, private landowners, like Joaquin Orrantia, have stepped forward to offer assistance. Jack and Kathaleen visit Joaquin's massive farm outside Guayaquil where he provides a haven for 45 species of animals native to Ecuador, including endangered spectacled bears, tapirs and great green macaws.

Week of 2/10/14-2/14/14

Oasis in the Desert (2189)

Jack and Kathaleen journey to the Middle East to experience the animals and culture of Israel. In the Judean Desert, Jack encounters a large herd of Ibex at the beautiful Oasis En Gedi. Kathaleen hikes to the top of Masada, then floats in the Dead Sea. Later, Jack and Kathaleen square off in a father and daughter mud fight. At a desert kibbutz, Jack profiles a woman whose love of animals inspired her to start a small zoo for children.

Over the Hump (2190)

On a camel trek in Israel, Jack learns first hand about the animal's unique physiology and important contribution to early trade. Later, Jack visits the International Camel Center, where he learns about one scientist's plan to help impoverished countries by exporting a "drome-dairy" program. At the Alpaca Farm, Jack and Kathaleen discover the camel's South American relative has adapted nicely to wool production in the desert.

Red Sea (2191)

In Eilat, Jack and Kathaleen discover the natural treasures of the Red Sea. While Jack explores the underwater depths in a submarine, Kathaleen dons scuba gear to help in the release of captive-born hawksbill turtles and sea horses. At the Dolphin Center, Kathaleen swims with the playful marine mammals, meantime, Jack befriends an unforgettable dog named "Joker".

In the Beginning (2192)

Jack pays a nostalgic visit to Central Florida where he got his start as a zoo director thirty years ago. Through old film clips and personal reminiscences, Jungle Jack recalls his days at the one and a half acre Sanford Zoo. Later, Jack heads south to the Brevard Zoo in Melbourne to see how Margo McKnight is doing in her first zoo directorship.

Winging It (2195)

In Costa Rica, Jack becomes enthralled with the country's beautiful butterflies, including the Blue Morpho, the "Queen of the Rainforest." Meanwhile, daughter Kathaleen learns about Costa Rica's rich bio-diversity with treks to Tortuguera on the Caribbean coast and INBio, a research park near San Jose.

Week of 2/17/14-2/21/14

Costa Rica: World of Reptiles (2197)

In Costa Rica, Jack encounters reptiles including an Eye Lash Viper, a huge Python and the deadly Bushmaster at the World of Snakes. On the Caribbean coast, Jack meets an American couple who has established the Sloth Rehabilitation Center.

Iguassu Falls (2200)

In southern Brazil, Jack and Kathaleen boat up a raging river to Iguassu Falls, the world's largest. At the base of the falls, dad and daughter marvel at the unusual nesting site for thousands of Swifts. Later, in drier conditions, Kathaleen interacts with a family of hungry Coati Mundis. At the nearby Parque das Aves, Kathaleen encounters many native Brazilian birds including Toucans, Macaw Parrots and the Macuco

In Search of the Giant Anteaters at Serra Canastra (2201)

At the Serra Canastra National Park, near the town of Sao Roque de Minas, Jack sets off in search of Brazil's Giant Anteater. Jack also visits the humble beginnings of Rio Zoo Francisco, the country's longest river.

For Goodness Snakes (2202)

In Sao Paulo, Jack visits the famed Institute BuTanTan, which has been producing anti-snake bite serum since 1900. In research labs, Jack encounters Brazilian Rattlesnakes, Jararacas and 50,000 poisonous spiders. During Jack's stop at BuTanTan, a rattlesnake victim is brought into the Institute's snakebite hospital for emergency treatment. Meantime, Kathaleen heads for the town of Monte Verde and the Hotel Itapua where she checks out hundreds of Hummingbirds.

Saving Beautiful Brazil (2203)

Jack visits the Sao Paulo Zoo, where a small cat-breeding program aims to save many of Brazil's endangered wildcats including the Margay, Oncilla and Pampas Cat. At a Government Rehab Center in Campo Grande, Jack seeks scores of animals confiscated from smugglers, including Macaws, Toucans, Tapirs, Monkeys and an Anaconda. Meantime in Bonito, Kathaleen repels down 270 feet to discover the fresh water inhabitants living in the Anhumas Abyss.

Week of 2/24/14-2/28/14

Surin Elephant Round-up (2217)

Jack's daughter Kathaleen ventures to Surin in northern Thailand to experience the annual elephant festival. The colorful celebration, featuring more than 250 elephants, once employed by the logging industry, includes parades and pageantry.

Canine Companions (2221)

At a training center of Canine Companions for Independence, Jack learns how dogs are trained to assist the disabled. From volunteer-raised puppies to graduates of the advanced training program, CCI dogs are something special. Also profiled are two disabled persons who depend on their working service dogs.

Southbound (2222)

Jack heads south from the tip of South America to the frozen wonderland of Antarctica. During his adventures, Jack experiences a colony of Gento Penguins and the desolation of Deception Island. Jack is also joined on Antarctic voyage by Sea World Penguin expert Rob Yordi.

Thai Elephant Conservation Center (2223)

Jack travels to Lampang, Thailand to experience a unique camp dedicated to preserving the Asian elephant. Jack's visit includes a hospital where the forest giants are treated for an assortment of ailments, including injuries from land mines. Jack also joins the drum section in the world's only Elephant Orchestra.

Wild As Ever (2224)

In rural Ohio, Jack gets behind the wheel to experience "The Wilds," the largest zoological reserve in North America. Formerly a coal-mining site, the 10,000 habitat is now home to many rare and endangered species including the Indian Rhino, the Bactrian camel, Przewalski's Horse and Pere David's Deer.

Week of 3/03/14-3/07/14

Antarctica and Back (2226)

As he observes Antarctic Wildlife, Jack is moved by a colony of nesting Gentoo penguins struggling to endure a freak summer blizzard. Jack also observes a colony of Chinstrap penguins. After returning to the tip of South America, Jack ventures into Argentina's Tierra Del Fuego National Park, in search of the world's largest woodpecker species.

Bats! (2227)

Jack makes an adventurous trip to Central Florida to learn more about bats. From crawling down into a limestone cave to observing a large colony of Southeastern bats, to watching thousands of Brazilian free-tailed bats fly from the "World's largest Occupied Bat House," Jack discovers the earth's only flying mammal is both misunderstood and declining in population.

Elephant Seals (2228)

After traveling to San Nicolas in the Channel Islands, off the coast of California, Jack observes Northern Elephant Seals. One of the biggest environmental success stories ever, elephant seals have rebounded from less than ten in number a century ago, to more than 175,000. Jack is joined on San Nicolas, the island at the heart of the marine giant's comeback, by experts from the Hubbs-Sea World Research Institute.

Zoo School (2229)

At Santa Fe Community College Teaching Zoo in Gainesville, Florida Jack visits with the students. This unique "hands-on" program teaches them how to become zookeepers. The teaching zoo, which includes more than 80 species, dates back to 1974 and was the first program of its kind in the country.

A Day with Julie (2230)

At Sea World-San Diego, Jack spends the day with Julie Scardina as she works with a wide range of animals, including Killer Whales, Arctic Foxes, Sea Otters and her own dog "Libby." In her role as ambassador for the Busch Gardens and Sea World Parks, Julie's dream job enables her to educate the public about animals, as well as advance wildlife conservation.

Week of 3/10/14-3/14/14

Busch Wildlife Sanctuary (2232)

Venomous snakes, alligators, bobcats, gopher tortoises and birds of all kinds are among the hundreds of animals Jack finds in the care of the Busch Wildlife Sanctuary in Jupiter, Florida. As he spends the day at the small sanctuary specializing in the rehabilitation of native Florida animals, Jack helps on an animal rescue, gets a closer than expected look at Florida's poisonous snakes and observes cataract surgery on an owl.

Going to the Dogs and Cats (2233)

In one of the zaniest and most amazing animal shows ever, "Pets Ahoy" features a stage full of cats, rats, birds, dogs, a skunk and a pig accomplishing the seemingly impossible. To find out how these remarkable animals take their cue, Jack visits with master trainer and show creator Joel Slavin at Sea World Orlando. Jack even gets in on the act when he shares the stage with a Jack Russell Terrier named "Cosmo".

Animal R & R (2234)

Injured, sick and orphaned wildlife in the San Diego area have the benefit of one of the country's most effective community-based animal rescue and rehabilitation networks. At "Project Wildlife," Jack visits a California couple that shares their home with baby possums and owls, while at Sea World San Diego orphaned elephant seals are nursed back to health.

Turtle Time (2235)

Jack travels to Florida's East Coast and the Archie Carr National Wildlife Refuge, one of the world's most important nesting sites for sea turtles. Jack's first-hand account, late at night on an Atlantic shoreline, includes an up-close look at three turtle species, including Green, Loggerhead and a rare 700 pound Leatherback. Jack also aids a stranded pygmy whale and visits Pelican Island, the nation's first wildlife refuge.

Race for Survival (2236)

Jack journeys to Namibia in southern Africa to meet Laurie Marker, a dedicated American who is determined to save the endangered cheetah. The aim of the Cheetah Conservation Fund is to better educate farmers who consider the speedy predator a threat to livestock. As an alternative to shooting cheetah, one of CCF's successful projects provides farmers with livestock guarding dogs. Jack also watches the world's fastest land mammal run at top speed.

Week of 3/17/14-3/21/14

Phinda: Dry as a Bone (2238)

In South Africa's Zululand, Jack finds the safari camp at Phinda is dealing with months of drought. However, the adverse weather conditions make for some interesting game viewing since fewer available water holes attract a greater concentration of animals. Jack also follows a lion pride, tracks a leopard, and observes a cheetah family consume its prey.

Ngala (2239)

Jack gets a close look at the natural behaviors of an active hyena den tunneled under a large termite mound. On a walking safari, Jack keeps pace with a white rhino. Also on this South African adventure, Jack is captivated by two playful leopards climbing trees. The Ngala Camp Choir entertains with traditional African music.

Skeleton Coast (2240)

In the African country of Namibia, Jack and daughter Kathaleen experience animal life along the Skeleton Coast, one of the most desolate places on earth. In search of desert dwelling elephants, the Hannas encounter springbok, Oryx, black-back jackals and fur seals. Masterful guide Chris Bakkes is one-of-a-kind and Kathaleen visits a Himba village.

Reptile City (2241)

At Richard's Bay, north of Durban, South Africa Jack makes a hair-raising visit to Reptile City where he survives close encounters with black mambas, Mozambique spitting cobras and a Nile crocodile. From a boat on the nearby St. Lucia Estuary, Jack and Kathaleen observe the behaviors of hippos.

Rhino Capture (2242)

In South Africa, redistributing wildlife to areas without animals has proven to be an effective conservation tool. As Jack found out in Zululand, the safe relocation of rhino has evolved into a science, if not an art form. But at the same time, capturing a wild rhino can still provide plenty of excitement. Jack also has fun visiting the Duma Zulu cultural village.

Week of 3/24/14-3/28/14

Backyard Habitat (2244)

With so much natural habitat being lost to growth and development, Jack looks into ways to help creatures of all kinds survive. Jack learns, no matter where you live, you can create a natural haven for animals in your own backyard. Featured: a San Diego elementary school science club dedicated to the restoration of a once-polluted creek for the benefit of wildlife.

Sweetwater Sanctuary (2245)

In East Africa, Jack visits a sanctuary for orphaned and abused chimpanzees. Though chimps are not indigenous to Kenya, this fortunate group of primates lives along a protected riverbank at the Sweetwater Sanctuary.

Laikipia Predator Project (2246)

In the Laikipia District of Kenya, Jack finds out about a conservation project aimed at reducing the number of lions, leopards and hyenas killed by livestock owners. Instead of killing predators, researcher Laurence Frank is urging ranchers and villagers to improve their methods of protecting cattle and goats. Jack is accompanied by Sea World and Busch Gardens Animal Ambassador Julie Scardina.

Grumetti River Camp (2247)

On safari in Tanzania, Jack narrowly escapes the charge of a bull elephant. Sighting a family of beautiful black-and-white colobus monkeys is a special treat. Jack also gets a close-up look at some monstrous crocodiles awaiting the annual zebra and wildebeest migrations.

Lewa Conservancy (2248)

Jack returns to the arid landscape at Lewa in central Kenya to check on the conservancy's remarkable progress with breeding and safeguarding endangered rhinos. Jack also gets involved in field research on the endangered grevy zebra. In a marshy area, Jack's daughter Kathaleen observes the sitatunga, Africa's most aquatic antelope.

Episode #121 (1/07/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we travel to Vancouver and visit the Marine Mammal Rescue Center. Researcher Bruce McCellan shows us how he uses hair traps to research Grizzly bears. Then we meet up with Rob Hope of O.W.L. who introduces us to a rescued Great Horned Owl that is about to be released into the wild. And finally, we learn about 3 timber wolves, who were raised to be actors, but didn't make it in the acting world and are now running free in Grouse Mountain.

Episode #122 (1/14/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we visit Corolla North Carolina and their beautiful wild Spanish mustangs. We also visit some of these horses that were injured in the wild and are now being tamed by the help of youth in Virginia. Then we stop by Canine Corps to see what they are doing to help troops from Pennsylvania. Lastly homeless teens get a chance to get back on their feet with the help of sheltered animals.

Episode #123 (1/21/14)

We'll take a look at the controversial sport of horse racing, and what's being done to help save retired racehorses from slaughter. We'll hit the links at one of Costa Rica's most famous golf courses, where animals can be found everywhere you turn. We'll travel to the Umatilla Army Depot, in Oregon, where an incredible effort is being made to bring back the Burrowing Owl population.

Episode #124 (1/28/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we visit a donkey rescue in Texas and learn about this misunderstood animal. We then head over to New Jersey where a group of dogs is helping service men and women get back to life post-war. Lastly we stop by the town of Punxsutawney and meet their biggest star.

Episode #125 (2/04/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we see how one Giraffe united an entire staff together. We visit primates in Texas, who were raised by humans and now must learn what it means to be a monkey. Then we stop by the Santa Barbara Zoo where one penguin really knows how to accessorize. Finally we follow one couple on their noble journey of dog adoption.

Episode #126 (2/11/14)

This week we travel to the land down under: Australia. Rob Ambrose rescues snakes for a living so we follow him around on a typical day that includes a call from a local high school that spotted a venomous snake living in the building wall. It's Rob's job to get it out. After that we head north to spotlight another risky profession - what it's like to be a crocodile handler in Darwin. And finally, Tasmanian Devils are seeing their population numbers decrease rapidly because of disease.
