Magic Of Storytelling

ABC is teaming up with the nonprofit First Book this January-March for the Magic of Storytelling campaign. As a part of this initiative, Disney has pledged to donate up to one million new books to children in need through First Book and we've set aside 1,000 books for each ABC station to provide to children in your community.

First Book (www.firstbook.org) is a national nonprofit organization and longtime Disney|ABC partner that provides millions of new books to children in need each year.

In addition to providing 1,000 books locally, we've got lots of ways for your station to get involved on air, choose a local school/program to receive books, and involve your community. For example, many stations are conducting a "Speed Reads" on air. For this simple activity one of your anchors could challenge another to read as many words as possible in 10 seconds from a children's book. The winner could then announce that 1,000 new books will be donated to nearby programs and schools serving children in need. The winner then challenges viewers to beat his/her record, share videos of speed reads, and consider making a donation to First Book. For every \$5 donated Disney will donate two ADDITIONAL books to First Book kids nationwide.

Stations selecting a local school or program to receive books must sign up by February 5, 2015. Your station's Promotion Manager is being sent books and stickers might be useful in hosting your own speed read on air. Here are links to assets to help you promote this promotion.
