U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Director John Morton will announce the results of a major operation to identify and rescue sexually exploited children.

More than 30 immigrant rights, labor, faith and civic leaders will hold a civil disobedience demonstration on Thursday, August 1st, on Capitol Hill protesting against immigration policies and the House GOP's inability to pass a bill that contains a pathway to citizenship and keeps families together.

New scam targets immigrants. USCIS is warning about fraudulent calls made to immigrant families asking for personal information (such as social security numbers and green card numbers.)

Women from various counties in Virginia and Maryland will hold a panel discussion to explore the particularly harmful impact of the immigration crisis on women and girls in the United States. Speakers will include service providers, immigrant women, and Congressman Luis Gutierrez (D-IL). The panel is held on Women's Equality Day, which commemorates the day in 1920 when the 19th amendment was certified first allowing women the right to vote.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) announce the launch of a new smart phone app designed to seek the public's help with fugitive and unknown suspect child sexual predators.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Immigration Reform Supporters Announce Major Mobilization and Concert for October 8, 2013 at the Nation's Capital.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion with two Latin American former Presidents, Leonel Fernandez from the Dominican Republic and Marco Vinicio Cerezo from Guatemala, expressed their views on how Latin America perceives the decisions of the U.S. in terms of immigration and other topics. Also, Daniel Garza from The Libre Initiative discussed how even with the borders of U.S. and Mexico being patrolled, there are many undocumented immigrants still entering the United States.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion focused on two issues, immigration reform and security and militarization of the border. According to an undercover border agent, drug raids and arrests are being made more often than before. Although the narcotics are seized, the traffickers are not sent to jail due to lack of funding. We also discussed if immigration reform is still a priority for the Republican-controlled Congress.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion with a panel of community leaders focused on what has been achieved with the Senate bill on immigration reform and the challenge for U.S. Representatives to propose a measure that harmonizes with the one in the Senate, and also to make the long-awaited reform of the country's immigration laws.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion focused with a panel of three immigration lawyers on the topic of immigration reform. The panel answers a variety of questions from our viewers such as what forms are required in the immigration process, to a request of the procedure for same-sex couples to follow to get legalized.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion focused on immigration reform and where we stand on current efforts. Immigration reform is still alive and active although it may seem it has not been at the center of discussion in Congress lately.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. We discuss immigration reform with leaders from the Congressional Hispanic Leadership Institute (CHLI). CHLI announced they are backing an immigration reform, especially in support of hundreds of young people involved in the organization through internships and projects.

Attacks by U.S. unmanned drones in the Middle East and Africa are commonplace, but it would be unheard of to see these aerial military weapons appearing over the U.S.-Mexico border. Yet it's a possible scenario, according to a newly-unearthed document from the country's leading federal border agency, U.S. Customs and Border Protection. According to a Customs and Border Protection reports obtained by the Electronic Frontier Foundation through a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit, the agency has considered adding weapons to its Predator drones that currently serve as the agency's eyes in the sky on the lookout for undocumented immigrants and drug trafficking coming across the border.

As Chairman of the House Democratic Caucus and member of the Immigration reform bipartisan group, Congressman Xavier Becerra (D-CA) visits Al Punto to discuss factors that would not be negotiable with Republicans under any immigration deal.

A fervent opponent of the immigration reform bill, Congressman Steve King (R-NY), visits Al Punto to explain his position and to discuss what should be done to fix the current immigration system.

The fate of comprehensive immigration reform is still, somewhat, up in the air. Virginia Congressman Bob Goodlatte (R-VA) visits Al Punto to talk about his step-by-step approach and to discuss why any immigration proposal may be subject to enforcement and border security. Rep. Goodlatte also discusses whether immigration reform will include a path to citizenship.

D.A. King is known for lobbying lawmakers in his state of Georgia in favor of stricter immigration enforcement measures and is now also known for his stands against immigration reform. Mr. King visits Al Punto to explain his position, which has earned him plenty of followers as well as critics.

U.S. Representative Joe García (D-FL) District 26, Florida García returns to Al Punto to talk about the new Democratic initiative aimed at reviving immigration reform.

The state of Maryland has amended its 2013-2014 vaccination requirements. Students enrolled in kindergarten through 12th grade are required to get two Mumps and Rubella vaccines before the start of the new school year.

Testing for tuberculosis will continue today for students at one Fairfax County high school. The Fairfax County Health Department announced last month that it recommended all 2012-2013 students, faculty, and support staff members at Robert E. Lee High School be tested for the disease, following two cases of TB that were confirmed at the high school last month.

August is National Breastfeeding Month, today we provide information for pregnant and nursing women on how the Health Care Law requires most health insurance plans to provide breastfeeding equipment and counseling.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Beginning in September, Fairfax County Public Schools will be conducting a regular soda ban pilot in seven of its 25 high schools. Soda products are not currently available in any Fairfax County public school during the school day, except for adult purchases in teachers' lounges.

The 2013-2014 influenza season is here, and with it comes a couple of improvements in the available flu vaccines. The Center for Disease Control recommends a flu shot for everyone six months and older. The 2013-2014 influenza season is here.

In a study of over 700,000 people diagnosed with the most deadly forms of cancer, researchers found that patients who were married were more likely to detect the disease earlier, receiving earlier treatment and perhaps living longer. Scientists believe the social support of married couples may lead to earlier detection and better survival rates.

Although many genes that lead to different types of cancer when mutated have been identified, the cells that initiate tumor formation following accumulation of these mutations have, until recently, remained elusive. This review explores how mouse genetic lineage-tracing experiments that allow the expression of oncogenes and/or the deletion of tumor suppressor genes in defined cell lineages have been instrumental in defining the cellular origin of different solid tumors in mouse models for various human cancers. Cancer is usually viewed as an evolutionary process that results from the accumulation of somatic mutations in the progeny of a normal cell, leading to a selective growth advantage in the mutated cells and ultimately to uncontrolled proliferation. The most frequent human cancers arise in epithelial tissues such as the skin, colon, breast, prostate or lung, and collectively lead to several million deaths per year

High-income people who live in states that generally do poorly in healthcare are worse off than low-income people in states with high healthcare scores, according to a Commonwealth Fund study released today. "In the United States, income is not a guarantee of good healthcare or good health," said David Blumenthal, president of The Commonwealth Fund, a private foundation that works to increase access to healthcare. "Where you live plays a very big part in your experience. As an example, Blumenthal said low-income seniors who live in Connecticut and Wisconsin are less likely to receive medications considered high-risk than are high-income seniors in Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama. To compile health scores, investigators looked at everything from how many people in a state had health insurance versus those who had none or did not have enough coverage.

The political whirlwind that has surrounded the historic health reform passage was powered by many issues. Cost was chief among them. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has weighed in with what remains a preliminary cost assessment. The agency's initial analysis heartened supporters of the legislation since it projects the reform package, if followed to the letter, could reduce projected deficits over time. The health reform package would provide government subsidies to low- and middle-income families buying health insurance on their own, expand eligibility rules for Medicaid and provide coverage for a majority of uninsured Americans. It would also establish a number of insurance reforms. The whole package will cost roughly \$940 billion over 10 years to provide expanded insurance coverage, according to CBO. But overall, the plan could reduce the deficit by \$143 billion over the first 10 years. And over the following decade, the CBO projected, health reform could reduce the deficit by more than \$1 trillion, although the agency stressed that such long-term projections are highly uncertain. The estimated long-term deficit reduction comes mainly from more than \$500 billion in savings from health programs like Medicare, and \$438 billion in new tax revenue.

The Obama administration is shifting into high gear to promote the new healthcare law ahead of the October 1, 2013 launch date for uninsured people to begin signing up in the online healthcare exchanges. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius is revealing premiums and plan choices for 36 states where the federal government is taking the lead. The average sticker price will be \$328 a month nationally for an individual plan. Results may vary considerably by state and particular circumstances. A tax credit will work like an upfront discount for most consumers. Sebelius says about 95 percent of consumers will have two or more insurers to choose from.

We discussed the benefit to the community as well as how it will be reflected within the tax system. We also spoke with a representative from one of the largest health insurers in the country on how the Marketplace will work under the Affordable Care Act.

The panel consisted of Maryland's Secretary of Health, Dr. Josh Sharfstein; Teresa Nino, spokeswoman for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; and George Escobar, Director of Health and Human Services of Casa De Maryland.

The integrated campaign announcement will include the State's plans for advertising, partnerships and outreach

Less than a month away from the start of enrollment in health insurance policies under Obamacare, there's a fight between Republicans and Democrats in Congress about the federal budget and delaying the money for implementation of the health law. Republicans want to defund Obamacare in exchange for not letting the government shut down after October 1.

Locally produced show by Entravision Communications. Discussion centered on the Affordable Care Act coverage for small businesses and the positive and negative impact on medical practice. Teresa Nino, spokeswoman for the Department of Health and Human Services, explained why it is a great alternative for small business owners and their employees.

On October 1, Americans will be able to start shopping for health insurance under Obama care. But are Hispanics actually informed about this and other issues regarding the Affordable Healthcare Act? Meanwhile, House Republicans have voted to delay the obligation that all individuals and employers must buy health insurance. The government has already delayed the mandate for small businesses.

Over the past several months, the Administration has been engaging in a dialogue with businesses - many of which already provide health coverage for their workers - about the new employer and insurer reporting requirements under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). We have heard concerns about the complexity of the requirements and the need for more time to implement them effectively. We recognize that the vast majority of businesses that will need to do this reporting already provide health insurance to their workers, and we want to make sure it is easy for others to do so. We have listened to your feedback. And we are taking action. The Administration is announcing that it will provide an additional year before the ACA mandatory employer and insurer reporting requirements begins. This is designed to meet two goals. First, it will allow us to consider ways to simplify the new reporting requirements consistent with the law.

CASA de Maryland and other Immigrant Advocacy organizations filed a lawsuit in November 2009 against the Frederick County (Maryland) Board of Commissioners, stating that Frederick County Sheriff Charles Jenkins and two deputy sheriffs violated the civil rights of Roxana Orellana Santos who had illegally been arrested and detained on October 7, 2008.

A community organization in the District of Columbia is reaching out to Latinos who are physically challenged.

Deadly Mexico storm leave thousands stranded. At least 80 people left dead across the country in the aftermath of two tropical storms, and efforts by the Mexican government to help its citizens.

Officials at the Florida Department of Health said Wednesday that they have received no reports of cholera imported from the island - although tens of thousands of Cuban-Americans visited there during this summer's vacation period. Cuba's government has said almost nothing in public about the recent cases of cholera, which causes intense diarrhea that can lead to dehydration and death. The state-controlled news media has referred only to "acute diarrheic diseases." But Havana will find it difficult to avoid all the negative publicity this month: the U.S. warning, reports of five cases in people who flew from Cuba to Venezuela, Chile and Italy, and a report by the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO). The statement from the U.S. Interests Section in Havana urged U.S. citizens living in or visiting Cuba to follow public health recommendations, such as frequent hand washing and special care with food and water to be consumed.

The American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA) has received reports of a new phone scam, in which callers pose as officers of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. The callers have apparently done a bit of research beforehand, they know the person's name and address, and their immigration status in the United States. The caller then claims that USCIS has found discrepancies (inconsistent information) in the person's immigration files. and asks for personal immigration data such as an I-94 number, "A" number, or visa control number. This is not data you should share with anyone, as it can be used to get more of your personal information from USCIS or potentially to create false immigration documents in your name.

Mexico's Former Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Jorge Castañeda, and Carmen Fernández join Joerge Ramos separately to discuss their opposing views on the ongoing debate regarding the legalization of drugs.

Scammers either convince them to pay a large fee upfront in return for their help to save the home, or deceive them into signing over the deed to their house, devise a rent-back scheme, or ask the owner to send them monthly mortgage payments while they "work things out with the bank."

Latino families protest housing violations in their apartments in Virginia. They claim the high costs of services, including water is unfair.

If cheap gas is considered as patriotic as draping Old Glory in the back window of your pickup truck, the news from the government's oil price watchers couldn't come at a better time. The price of regular-grade gasoline has fallen below \$3.50 a gallon on average nationally just in time for the Fourth of July weekend in the weekly survey by the Energy Information Administration reports. And it wasn't just a tiny price drop. A gallon of regular fell eight cents during the week from \$3.577 to \$3.496. That's unusual, given not only that the four-day holiday weekend is coming up, but also because the nation is entering the heart of the summer vacation driving season. Among regions, the cheapest gas can still be found, as usual, on the refinery-rich Gulf Coast. There, it averaged \$3.312 a gallon, down from \$3.377 a gallon.

President Barack Obama wants to overhaul the nation's mortgage finance system, including shutting down government-backed Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. The President has some bipartisan support on Capitol Hill. Obama is outlining his proposals today at a construction company in Phoenix, once the epicenter of the housing crisis following the 2008 economic collapse. The housing market in the region, as in much of the country, has rebounded in recent months, buoyed in part by low interest rates. The President's trip marks the latest stop on his summertime economic tour to refocus his agenda on middle-class Americans still struggling to recover from the recession. The State Department has dramatically cut its funding for social media after an inspector general's report found the department spent excessive amounts on advertising for some of its Facebook pages. "We take the valuable feedback of the (Office of Inspector General) seriously, and we're committed to addressing the recommendations and the concern outlined in this assessment," State Department Spokesperson Jen Psaki said Wednesday in the daily press briefing. Released in May, the IG report found that the Bureau of International Information Programs spent \$630,000 on two advertising campaigns to expand the numbers of fans for four of its Facebook pages-as well as the translated versions of those pages. According to its website, the bureau serves as the department's hub for engaging conversations with foreign audiences, both in person and online. The IG notes the advertising campaigns were successful in increasing the English Facebook pages from 100,000 fans to more than two million for each page. The foreign language pages also saw an uptick to 450,000 fans from 68,000 over the course of two years. Psaki said the bureau has sharply reduced its budget for online advertising to \$2,500, down from roughly \$26,000 per month in 2011 and 2012.

The Federal Trade Commission's revised Children's Online Privacy Protection Act Rule took effect today, giving parents greater control over the online collection of their children's personal information. It addresses changes in the way children use and access the Internet, including the increased use of mobile devices and social networking.

President Barack Obama brief members of Congress on a possible U.S. attack on Syria, after Syria's chemical weapons attack.

The Obama administration is set to release declassified information on Syria attacks today and strategies for a possible military response.

Vice President Joe Biden will swear-in Thomas E. Perez as the 26th U.S. Secretary of Labor. Secretary Perez was nominated by President Obama on March 18, 2013, and confirmed by the Senate on July 18, 2013. Secretary Perez is the only Latino serving in President Obama's cabinet.

As Congress debates possible military involvement in Syria, District officials are raising their security posture. Residents and tourists should expect higher police visibility at sights that might present a target.

The Internal Revenue Service urged taxpayers whose tax-filing extension runs out on October 15, to double check their returns for often-overlooked tax benefits and then file their returns electronically using IRS e-file or the Free File system.

An internal audit provided by Snowden to The Washington Post shows the agency has repeatedly broken privacy rules or exceeded its legal authority every year since Congress granted it broad new powers in 2008. In one of the documents, agency personnel are instructed to remove details and substitute more generic language in reports to the Justice Department and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence - reports used as the basis for informing Congress. Senior lawmakers said they had been unaware of the audit until they read the news on Friday Senate Judiciary Committee chairman Patrick Leahy announced he would hold hearings into the revelations.

Senator Bob Menéndez (D-NJ), Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, returns to Al Punto to talk about the situation in Syria and the possible U.S. military intervention.

The United States of America and the international community are trying to find a diplomatic solution to the crisis in Syria. Senator John McCain said he is "deeply skeptical" of Russia's proposal. House Republicans narrowly pushed through a bill on Thursday that slashes billions of dollars from the food stamp program, over the objections of Democrats and a veto threat from President Obama. The vote set up what promised to be a contentious fight with the Senate and dashed hopes for passage this year of a new five-year farm bill. Republican leaders said the bill would make needed changes to a program that has grown out of control. Democrats, though, called the cuts to the food stamp program draconian and said millions of hungry people would lose their benefits. The bill would cut \$40 billion from the food stamp program over the next 10 years. It would also require adults between 18 and 50 without minor children to find a job or to enroll in a work training program in order to receive benefits. It would also limit the time those recipients could get benefits to three months. According to the Congressional Budget Office, nearly four million people would be removed from the food stamp program under the House bill.

With time running out before the government closes for the first time since 1996, Congressional Republicans are rallying around the same message "A shutdown won't be our fault". It is preemptive damage control as the GOP tried to counter the narrative that the House essentially voted early Sunday to close the federal government when they amended a Senate-passed continuing resolution to include several Obamacare-related provisions. Sen. Ted Cruz said it is Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid who is being obstructionist for refusing to advance the House legislation. Cruz, who derided Obamacare in a floor speech that spanned more than 21 hours last week, declined to say whether he will try to halt any further progress on the CR as it heads back to the Senate. The House amended the Senate-passed CR to include provisions that would delay the health care law for a year, repeal the medical device tax that helps fund Obamacare and postpone until 2015 the law's requirement that employers cover birth control as part of their health insurance packages.

The CATO Institute published a study last week in which it found in 35 states a person receiving welfare benefits earns more than \$15 an hour, an amount not even some professional workers as well as skilled laborers earn. A panel of community leaders analyzed the study further and the issues it poses and whether it is fair for a person not working to receive welfare benefits beyond what is earned in the workplace.

The U.S. economy added 195,000 jobs in June, continuing a trend of steady growth as private hiring across a broad spectrum of industries offset declines in government and manufacturing employment. While not enough to push down the 7.6 percent unemployment rate, the number beat analysts' forecasts and stoked expectations that the Federal Reserve will begin reducing its support for U.S. financial markets this fall. The composition of job gains and losses reflected both what appears to be a durable U.S. recovery and weaker demand for U.S. goods in places such as Europe, which is still in the midst of a recession, and China, where growth has begun to slow. The monthly jobs report is considered among the most important barometers of the economy. It is taking on additional importance now because of its influence on when the Fed will begin to reduce the monthly asset purchases with which it has been supporting the U.S. economy - a key issue in the debate over domestic and global economic policy.

The Democratic-controlled Senate is on a path toward defeating tea party attempts to dismantle President Barack Obama's health care law, despite an overnight talkathon on the chamber's floor led by Senator Ted Cruz (D-TX). The freshman Senator Cruz and other conservative Republicans were trying to delay a must-pass spending bill, but were virtually sure to lose a test vote on that legislation planned for later Wednesday. Since Tuesday afternoon, Cruz -- with occasional remarks by Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah, and other GOP conservatives -- have controlled the Senate floor and railed against Obamacare. As 4 a.m. EDT Wednesday approached, Cruz and his allies had spoken for more than 13 hours.

The State Department issued a worldwide travel alert Friday over the threat of a possible terrorist attack by Al Qaeda or its affiliates, which also prompted a decision to temporarily close 21 embassies and consulates in the Middle East and several predominantly Muslim countries elsewhere. The greatest risk of attack is in the Middle East and North Africa, the department said, and it warned that the attack could emanate from the Arabian Peninsula. The British government is closing its embassy in Yemen on Sunday and Monday but not missions in other Middle Eastern countries, suggesting that London believes the source could be Al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula. The group, centered in Yemen, is the only Al Qaeda affiliate that has recently shown sustained interest in attacking U.S. interests beyond its local base.

A mysterious woman is in the midsts of a worldwide manhunt. Interpol is looking for a woman called the White Widow, in connection to the terrorist attack in a mall in Kenya. Samantha Liuth-Waite is the widow of a terrorist believed to be responsible for the 2005 attack in London, and member of a group called Al Shabab.

There's a new tool to protect kids and track down those who commit crimes against children. It's a first-of-its-kind smartphone application that U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement launched Thursday. The app is called Operation Predator and it's basically a way for the public to help federal agents solve crimes against children. People can use their smartphone to report suspected child exploitation directly to federal agents. The app is free, and ICE's web designers say it's fairly easy to use. The first of four screens allows users to submit anonymous tips either online or via a hotline. The next section alerts people to ICE's most wanted list. Right now, the photos of nine men suspected of child pornography crimes are posted, including one of a "John Doe." Agents recently uncovered a video of him sexually abusing a child from a home in Los Angeles. In the news section, users can read about ICE's latest arrests and convictions. Lastly, in the resources section, people can link to other websites that are crucial to solving child-exploitation crimes. Local parents seem to be mixed about whether they would download the app to their phones.

A National Rifle Association leader criticized the Washington Navy Yard on Sunday for being "unprotected" last week when a mass shooting left 13 dead, including the shooter. The NRA, which has lobbied successfully against restrictions on guns, advocates the enforcement of current federal gun laws and greater attention to the mentally ill. Law enforcement authorities have identified the Navy Yard shooter as Aaron Alexis, 34, whose primary weapon in Monday's rampage was a shotgun that he had recently purchased.

Maryland residents have been buying guns in record numbers before a law takes effect Tuesday, with provisions aimed at helping keep guns away from criminals and the mentally ill, strengthening safety training and banning 45 types of assault weapons. Opponents decry what they call an ineffective law that will only make it harder for law-abiding citizens to exercise Second Amendment rights. They say the state also failed to prepare properly for implementation after Governor Martin O'Malley, who is considering a run for the White House in 2016, pushed the complicated measure through the General Assembly to build his credentials for a potential Democratic primary race. On Thursday, opponents of the restrictions sued in federal court in Baltimore, seeking to block the legislation from taking effect. The court scheduled a hearing for Tuesday on their motion for an order that would temporarily block implementation while the court considers whether to permanently bar Maryland from enforcing the law.

Total nonfarm payroll employment increased by 162,000 in July, and the unemployment rate edged down to 7.4 percent, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Employment rose in retail trade, food services and drinking places, financial activities, and wholesale trade. Both the number of unemployed persons, at 11.5 million, and the unemployment rate, at 7.4 percent, edged down in July. The rates for adult men (7.0 percent), teenagers (23.7 percent), whites (6.6 percent), and Hispanics (9.4 percent) showed little or no change.

The economy may be in a recovery - the national unemployment rate fell from 7.6% to 7.4% in July, and the August jobs report comes this Friday, but for hundreds of thousands of other workers, a sustainable full-time job remains elusive. Of nearly one million U.S. jobs created this year, 80% - four of every five - were part-time and most had meager or no benefits. Economists expect spikes in part-time jobs during recessions. Historically, they drop off as the overall economy recovers but this time, part-time employment is falling more slowly than in previous recoveries. According to a study, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco released in August, the report said young workers were more likely to work part-time, and it disputed the theory circulated by some economists and opponents of the Affordable Care Act that health care reform is discouraging employers from adding full-time positions. The number of jobs that need to be done by full-time employees continues to diminish," said Carl Camden, president and CEO of Kelly Services in Troy. "Work has become more fragmented, and more people are willing to work in non-traditional environments. Since 2008, the percentage of people in the work force regarding themselves as free agents has grown from 26% to more than 40%, according to a Kelly survey. Employees - especially Generation X workers in their 30s and 40s - want more freedom to set their own hours and create their own enterprises.

The number of Americans seeking unemployment benefits dropped 9,000 last week to a seasonally adjusted 323,000, near the lowest level since June 2008. Weekly applications are just 1,000 above a five-year low reached last month, the Labor Department said Thursday. The four week average, a less volatile measure, declined 3,000 to 328,500. A private survey released Thursday by the payroll company ADP showed that businesses added 176,000 jobs in August, roughly in line with the monthly average for the year. Combined, the two reports point to steady improvement in the job market.

Democratic senators and the White House both predicted that a deal would be reached in Congress to bring the rates down again before students return to campus. But if an agreement remains elusive, students could find themselves saddled with higher interest rates this year than last.

A man convicted of home invasions, burglaries and forced sex acts upon women is scheduled to be sentenced in Montgomery County. Kevin Ray, 34 years old faces more than 100 years in prison when he's sentenced Tuesday.

Police have identified the Howard University student killed during what may have been an attempted robbery Thursday night. Omar Sykes, 22, and another student were walking when they were approached by two men. Sykes was shot and later pronounced dead at an area hospital. The other victim was beaten, and suffered non-life-threatening injuries.

D.C. police are still searching for two suspects in connection to an armed sexual assault that took place in Northeast D.C. during the weekend.

Police are searching for a young man who sexually assaulted a 6-year-old girl in Silver Spring, MD, and seek the public's help in finding and apprehending the suspect.

A woman was sexually assaulted in the District's Chinatown area early Thursday morning. The woman was walking in the 700 block of H Street NW around 5 a.m. when a man approached her from behind and forced her into an alley, according to police.

Fairfax County police search for a suspect who sexually attacked two Hispanic women.

A woman charged with defacing the Washington National Cathedral with green paint is due in court. Jiamei Tian faces a preliminary hearing in D.C. Superior Court today. The 58-year-old has been charged with damaging two chapels of the cathedral with a soda can of green paint on Monday. A judge ordered her jailed pending her appearance, with prosecutors calling her a flight risk and a danger to the community.

Reston Police District - Police are investigating a scam in which a local couple was bilked out of thousands of dollars by an unknown suspect claiming to be affiliated with the Internal Revenue Service. The caller also claimed to be holding a family member in exchange for numbers associated with prepaid money cards in the victim's possession. The victim relinquished information from the cards and the money was gone. No family member was actually held against their will.

Con artists are targeting senior citizens, and using confusion and intimidation to force them to withdraw cash from ATM machines. Montgomery County Police have issued an alert, and offer a \$10,000 reward for information leading to those responsible.

A music teacher in Silver Spring, Maryland, has been arrested and faces 14 counts of sexual abuse of a minor. Detectives say 54-year-old Lawrence Wesley Joynes abused at least 15 female students between 2005 and 2013, while the victims were in kindergarten, first and second grades. Investigators also found images of children at his home and in his classroom.

Dispatchers have released a horrific 911 call from a Latino eight-year-old boy, just minutes after he was attacked by a woman inside his father's Cheverly home. Jacob Soliz-Amaya was in his bed Saturday morning when his father left for work. Once his father was gone, his father's ex-girlfriend, 26-year-old Helen Marie Newsome, emerged from a closet where she had been hiding for more than 12 hours, and struck Jacob in the head with a dumbbell, but the boy got away, using a move he says he saw on television.

D.C. police and the FBI say there's a report of a shooter inside a military building at the Washington Navy Yard. Police are responding to reports of shots fired, and an FBI spokeswoman says there's at least one victim.

Experts recommend taking precaution on the fourth of July. It is important to protect ourselves from the sun and avoid dehydration by consuming plenty of water. People should dress with light colors and limit the time under the sun.

A heat advisory for D.C., Arlington, Alexandria and Falls Church starts at noon and continues until 7 p.m. Tuesday. A heat advisory means that the combination of high temperatures and high humidity will make conditions that could lead to heat illnesses. Sunny, very hot and humid Tuesday, temperatures will be in the mid 90s but will feel like 105 degrees.

Experts offer their recommendations on how to prevent child fatalities, after an 8-month-old baby died Friday afternoon when he was left inside a hot car by his mother. Zoraida Magali Conde Hernandez was arrested Friday and charged with felony child neglect; she reportedly forgot the child in the car when she arrived to work, later finding the boy in the back seat. The baby was pronounced dead in a local hospital.

Police continue their search for a 7-year-old boy who's been missing from his Northeast D.C. home since yesterday morning. Authorities say Michael Kingsbury is an autistic child.

The Community Emergency Response Team program (also known as CERT) is a federally funded program taught nationwide for free. Anyone can sign up for the training, and it empowers people from thinking they are victims to thinking they can assist not only themselves, but others in any emergency or disaster. Authorities from Prince George County expanded on how the program works.

Today, about 200,000 residents of four communities in the Prince George's county face the first of several days without water, due to repairs to a main pipe that provides service to the area.

AAA is asking the National Transportation Safety Board to step in and inspect the Maryland's Bay Bridge barrier railing system, after a car crash last Friday in which an 18-wheeler truck pushed a car off the bridge. The car fell 40-feet into the Chesapeake Bay.

It's still early in the season, but some of the first positive test results are popping up for West Nile virus from mosquitoes. The Fairfax County Health Department reports it has detected the virus in three of 780 mosquito pools. West Nile virus has been detected in Prince William County, as well.

Smishing is an identity theft scheme that involves sending consumers text messages containing a link to a fraudulent website or a phone number in an attempt to collect personal information. This scheme is becoming increasingly popular and consumers should know how to determine if they are being targeted by these criminals and how to ensure that their mobile devices are secure.

The District of Columbia is launching the ASK DC app for smart phones, which provides resources to help sexual assault survivors. The ASK DC app connects to immediate medical help, police and a 24-hour support hotline, with specialized help for the military, deaf and LGBT communities. All 33 life-saving resources will be available in English, Spanish and 26 Asian languages.

During the school year, the school asks parents to sign several forms. If the personal information contained in these forms falls into the wrong hands, the information can be used to commit fraud under the name of your son - to apply for government benefits, open credit card accounts, or to request a loan. But there are laws that help you protect your family's personal information.

September is National Preparedness Month and FEMA says that only 43% of American households have a family emergency plan. Most parents agree that being prepared for an emergency is important, but most lack with a home protocol for it. FEMA and other federal agencies are launching a public campaign, aimed to offer tools and resources for families to make an emergency plan.

Rally to urge Congress to support common-sense background checks legislation that will keep guns away from dangerous individuals and help save lives.

The number of kids being hurt by falling televisions is on the rise. According to a new study published in the Journal of Pediatrics, researchers looked at emergency department data from 1990 and 2011. Researchers found that more than 12,000 kids were hurt by falling TVs in 2011, an increase of 126% from 1990. The study found that most of the children who went to the hospital with TV-related injuries were under the age of five.
